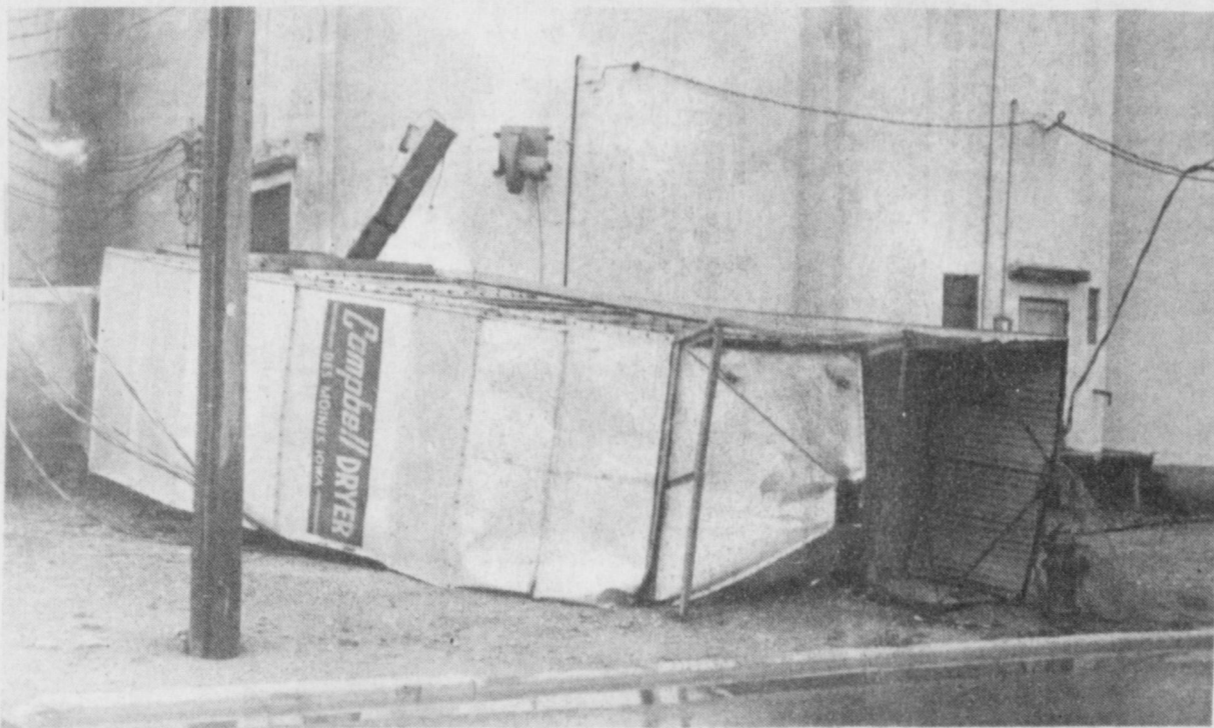
To Perform

At Lazbuddie

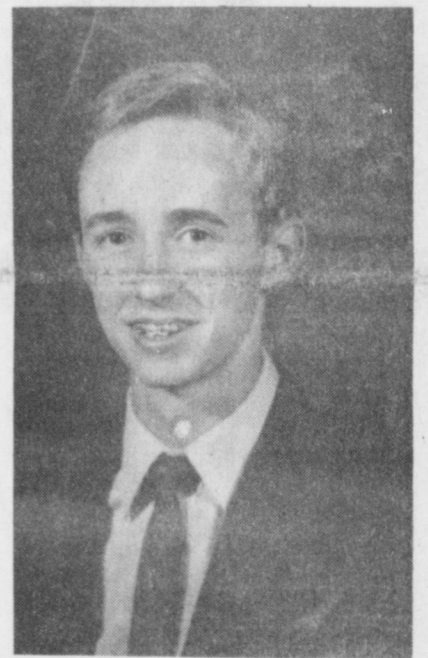

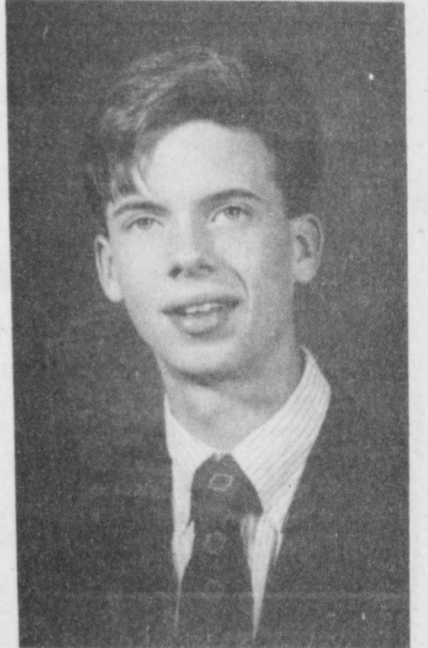
A Board of Trustees has been set up for the endowment fund. Trustees include: David's parents, Eugene and Vernie Schacher; Guy Brockman, Anne Farris and Hardy Carlyle. This board will make all decisions regarding the fund to be administered by the Lazbuddie Independent School District.

The amount of the scholarship for the 1990-91 year will be \$500.00. The scholarship will be awarded each year and the amount will be determined by the amount of interest earned by the fund each year, but will never be less than \$500.00

Steven Garcia Receives Rotary Scholarship

This year's Rotary Scholarship was presented to Steven Garcia during the noon Rotary meeting Tuesday. Garcia plans to attend Texas Tech University.

Dr. Bruce Purdy was in charge of the program and he introduced Richard Murphy. Murphy is the administrator of Muleshoe Area Medical Center.

He has been administrator for the hospital 415 days, which is longer than the last nine administrators.

He also gave the history of the hospital closing, the forming of a Hospital District, re-opening and tax liens filed by the Federal Tax Service.

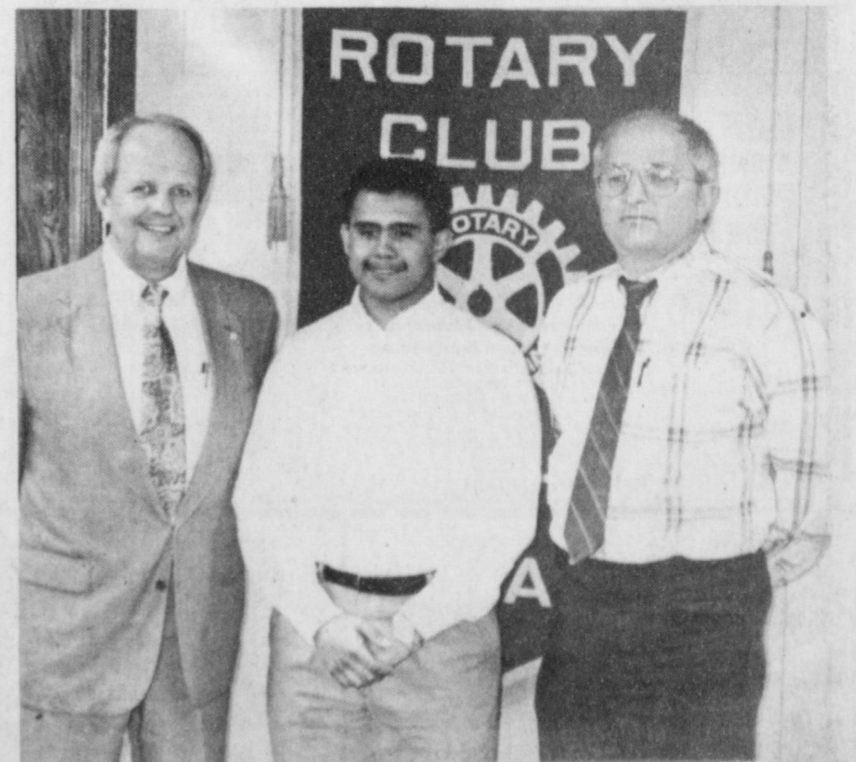
Murphy told the group that "IRS has released their claims on the hospital. The hospital's attorney paid for the filing fee. The hospital board is a five member board, with the new members to be installed at the hospital board meeting Thursday night. "We have four family practitioners and a surgeon.

"We are trying to collect on the accounts receivable" he continued. "Over 120 accounts are presently turned over to a company. The hospital is showing \$288m000 gain in operations, \$288,000 gain in \$37,000. This is 180,000 over the same period last year, due to better collections and con-

fidence in the hospital" he continued.

"At the present time we have a 46.8 occupancy with an average of 15 patients" added Murphy.

"New area improvements are being made in the hospital. We have filed for a grant for a rural health clinic."





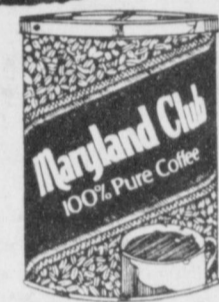
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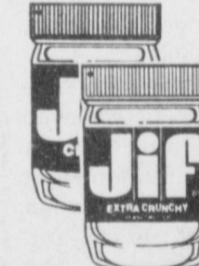
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Creative Living

Information on a wildlife organization, making narrow hems, and recycling efforts will be the featured topics on "Creative Living" on Tuesday, May 28 at 12 noon and Saturday, June 1 at 2 pm. (All times are Mountain.) "Creative Living" airs on public broadcasting station, KENW-TV, from Eastern New Mexico University.

Sara Vickerman, Regional Program Director of Defenders of Wildlife, will talk about the Defenders of Wildlife organizations, and will explain what makes this group different from other environmental groups. Ms. Vickerman lives in Portland OR.

Jane Schenck, with the Pellon Division, in Chelmsford, MA, will demonstrate a new easy technique for making narrow hems using a pre-cut fusible tape called Wonder-Under. The technique is suitable for clothing and home decorating and machine stitching is optional.

Bill Owen and his family recently were recognized with a Congressional Citation for recycling. The Owen family of Painesville, OH devotes six to eight hours a week to the effort. Owen will tell you why he and his family think recycling is so important.

On Tuesday, May 28 at 9:30 pm and on Thursday, May 30 at 12 noon, "Creative Living" will present information on microwave oven accessories, cooking fast nutritious meals, and dolls that care about children.

Amy Makemson, representative of the Tappan Co. in Dalton, GA, will explain what gives the most even cooking pattern in a microwave oven - a turntable or a stirrer blade.

Karen Babin, home economist with the Rice Council in Houston, TX, has a simple solution to those who are looking for ways to save time in the kitchen and still have nutritious, delicious meals.

Diane Creston, New York City, will introduce a line of dolls called "Children for Children" which is affiliated with the Save The Children Federation. Ms. Creston will explain how the program works and how the "Children for Children" dolls play a role in the program.

"Creative Living" is produced and hosted by Sheryl Borden. The show is carried on more than 100 PBS stations in the United States, Canada, Guam and Puerto Rico and is distributed by Pacific Mountain Network, Denver, CO.

LIGHT AND EASY Oriental Stir Fry

1 tablespoon vegetable oil
1/2 pound boned and skinned

chicken breast, cut in small pieces

1 package (10 oz) frozen Chinese or Japanese style stir-fry vegetables with seasonings
2 cups hot cooked rice

Remove seasoning pouch from vegetable package; reserve. Heat oil in large skillet over medium-high heat; add chicken. Stir-fry until chicken loses pink color; push to side of skillet. Add vegetables. Do not add oil to vegetables as directed on package. Cover and cook 2 minutes, stirring once. Sprinkle vegetables with reserved seasonings; add water as directed. Cook and stir 30 seconds. Serve with fluffy rice. Makes 3 servings. Each serving provides 307 calories, 21.6 g. protein, 6.4 g. fat, 40.0 g. carbohydrate, 520 mg. sodium, and 46 mg. cholesterol.

BRUNCH RICE

1/2 cup each sliced celery, diced green sweet pepper, and sliced fresh mushrooms

1 tablespoon butter or margarine
6 eggs, beaten
1/2 cup 2% lowfat milk
1 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon ground black pepper

2 cups cooked rice
Cook celery, sweet pepper, and mushrooms in butter in large skillet over medium-high heat. Combine eggs, milk, salt, and black pepper in small mixing bowl. Reduce heat to medium and pour egg mixture over vegetables. Continue stirring until eggs are almost cooked, about 1 to 2 minutes. Add rice and stir to gently separate grains; heat thoroughly. Makes 4 servings.

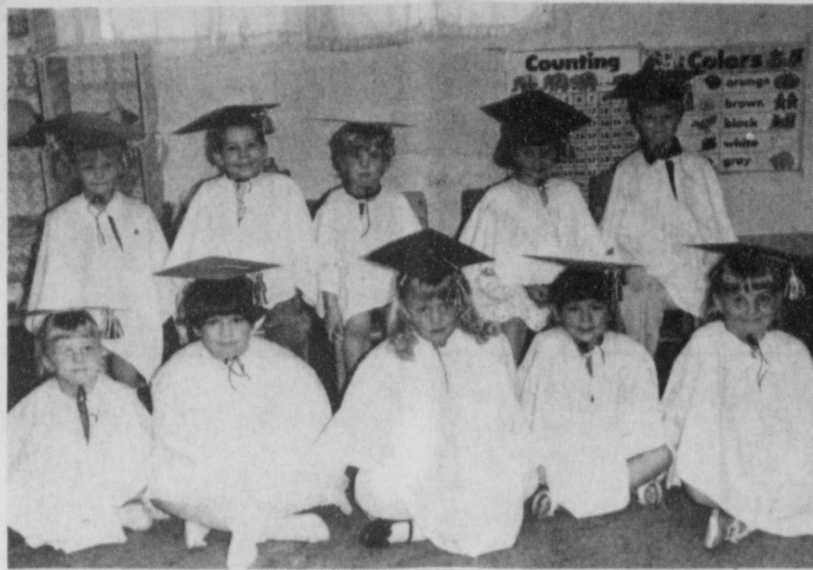
1 sweet red pepper, seeded and thinly sliced
1 cup shredded Wisconsin Swiss cheese
2 carrots, thinly sliced
1 cup broccoli flowerettes
1 cup shredded Wisconsin Provolone cheese

MEAT LASAGNA

3 skinless, boneless chicken breast halves (about 1 pound) cooked and chopped
1 cup shredded Wisconsin sharp Cheddar cheese
1-1/2 teaspoons dried tarragon leaves
8 ounces small white mushrooms, sliced
1 cup shredded Wisconsin Monterey Jack Cheese

To assemble casseroles layer just enough noodles to cover bottom of each casserole, then:

For *Vegetable Lasagna*: top noodle layer with sliced red pepper, 1/4 cup each Swiss and Provolone cheeses and 3/4 cup sauce. Top with another layer of noodles, then sliced carrots, 1/4

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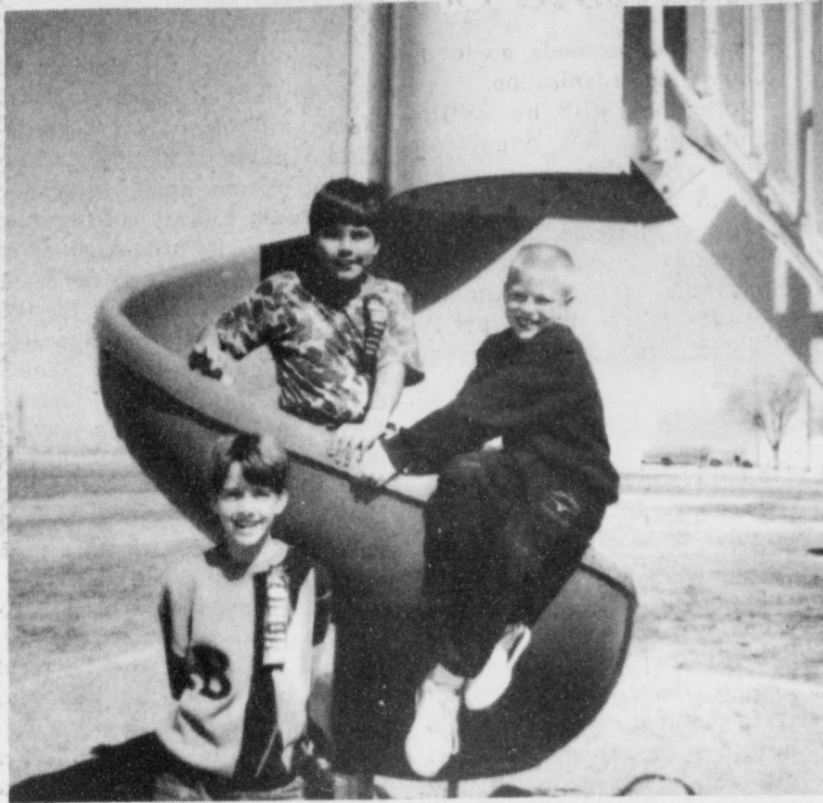

Schools Undergo T.B. Testing

Bill Moore, Superintendent of Schools, reports that the Muleshoe Independent School District has just completed a skin testing program on all employees and students. "We were made aware of a case of primary T.B. It was a non-infectious early form of the disease that was easily treated with antibiotics. Through an agreement with the Texas Department of Health, it was decided that a school-wide testing would be in order," Moore said. After that, it was found that no contagious cases of TB were present. Followup studies are being conducted on 15 or 20 students of the 1600 students total that were tested. Additional followup screening will occur in the fall, Moore noted.

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

More than half a million dollars in scholarships will be awarded to outstanding young people at the 1991 Texas 4-H Roundup at Texas A & M University June 4-5.

The biggest 4-H event of the year, Roundup brings together more than 2,500 young people who learn by demonstrating skills and leadership in competitions.

Gayle W. Laine, 4-H youth development specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, said that \$592,000 in scholarships sponsored by the Texas 4-H Foundation will be awarded during Roundup.

"We have over 200 applicants this year and 91 scholarships to award," Bullard said. "Selection is a difficult process that takes a seven-person committee five days to complete."

The young people are judged on their 4-H experiences, leadership skills, projects, community service, personal needs and other qualifications pertaining to high school academic performance and college entrance exam scores, Bullard said. Scholarships are granted in agriculture, life sciences and unrestricted categories.

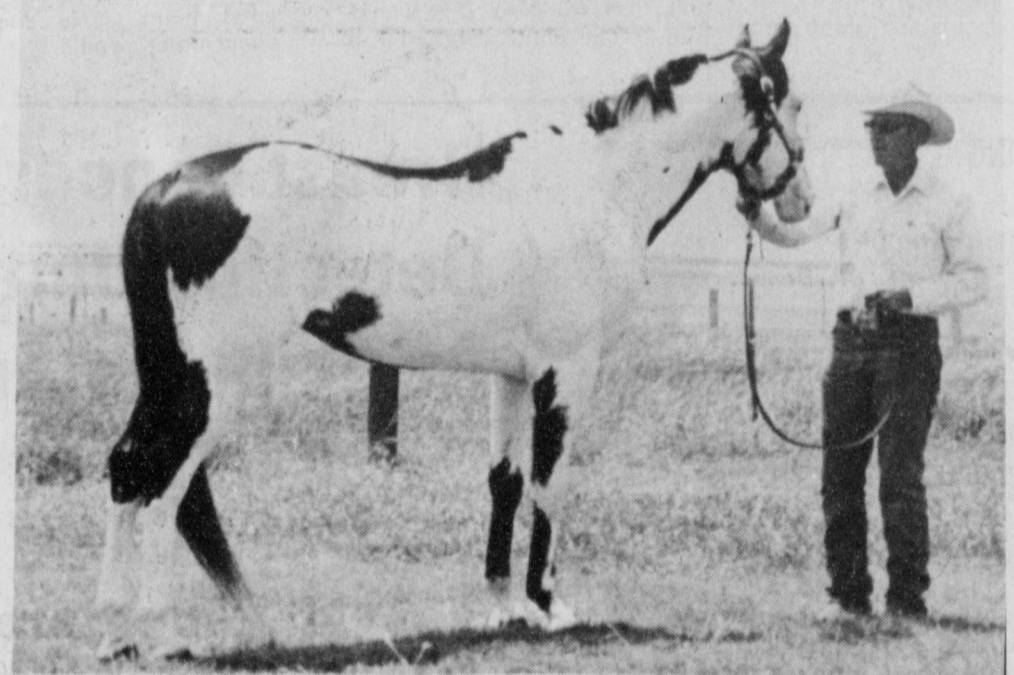
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Report From U.S. Representative Larry Combast

This Memorial Day across America is a special observance in honor of those whose sacrifice and dedicated service throughout the military's distinguished history is in the defense of freedom and liberty. Our most recent heroes lost their lives in Operation Desert Shield, during Operation Desert Storm and in the aftermath of the desert calm. Each of the 147 killed in action, and the 188 who gave their lives before the war, during Desert Shield, and since the termination of Desert Storm will always be more than names to the people their lives touched. They have been united with the 1.1 million men and women who have fought and fallen in wars now memorialized in courthouse squares throughout our area. To all of us, because their lives touch our freedoms today, their names are on more than just monuments.

We can pay no price greater than to send American troops to a foreign land. I want that to be remembered. When you worship in the way of your choice, when you exercise your freedom to speak out and when you consider the freedoms that make our country unique, remember these are living monuments to the sacrifice made for all of us.

This Memorial Day is also for the sacrifice of the military family. Desert Storm Commanding General Norman Schwarzkopf in his speech to those of us in the Congress earlier this month, praised military families for enduring the hardships of separation. "It is your love that truly gave us the strength in our darkest hours," said the general. Those same military families enduring their own darkest hours now need some of that love. They deserve due recognition for the sacrifice made by their loved ones.

For the mother who knows the empty chair at the family dinner table will never be filled, for the family of the service veteran who died working to defuse the danger of a land mine, and for the young soldier

with a dream that lives in the hearts of others, Memorial Day is more than just monuments.

Important Snack News For Children

When it comes to eating snacks this summer, it is just as easy for kids to reach for a frozen orange wedge as a sugary snack cake.

"Summer time often means increased activity for children, and with that increase comes the need for snacks to help meet their extra energy needs," said Janice Stuff, a nutritionist at the USDA Children's Nutrition Research Center in Houston.

About 20 percent of a child's calories and nutrients come from snacks. By giving some thought to snack selection, parents can provide their children with healthy choices.

"Try to avoid spur-of-the-moment purchases like soda pop, chips and candy," said Stuff, who is also a research instructor at Baylor College of Medicine.

Stuff recommends the following summer snacks:

- unsweetened fruit juices
- milk shakes made with bananas or fruit-juice
- natural frozen fruit pops (purchased or homemade)
- fresh fruits
- frozen orange wedges or grapes
- low-fat yogurt
- low-salt, low-fat pretzels, whole wheat or soda crackers
- graham crackers
- bagels
- low-sugar cereals
- raw vegetables

"Encourage carbohydrate snacks, like crackers and fruit juice, when your child is very hungry because these are absorbed more rapidly and will satisfy hunger quickly," Stuff said.

The plan for providing healthy snacks includes education, convenience and some pre-planning.

"Post a list of snack choices on the refrigerator," Stuff said. "Make it easy for children and family members to find snacks by designating a special area in the refrigerator and on the counter."

Stuff encourages parents to include children in grocery list planning, to store snacks in easy-open containers and to discuss proper times for snacks.

"Children should know not to have a snack too close to a meal," Stuff said. "The best time is one to two hours before or after a meal."

Most children need three meals and possibly two snacks to meet their daily nutritional requirements.

Toxic Plants Cause Major Problems For Livestock

Can animals grazing on the open range be taught to avoid eating poisonous plants?

Utah researchers Michael Ralphs and Fred Provenza think they're close to being able to demonstrate just that.

Ralphs is a range scientist with the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Poisonous Plant Research Lab at Logan, Utah, and Provenza is with the Utah State University range science department, also at Logan. The pair have sought to minimize toxic plant losses in livestock by using behavior modification.

Their work is based on an animal's ability to associate a toxic plant's taste with the illness that it caused. A technique called conditioned food aversion learning is commonly used to help people suffering from alcoholism.

Toxic plants cause major problems for livestock producers. More than 100 species are known to infest Texas rangeland, and about 70 percent of them are found in the western half of the state, according to Allen McGinty, range specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service at Fort Stockton.

"The economic impact is not restricted to actual livestock deaths," said McGinty. "Toxic plant consumption also results in reduced calving, kidding and lambing percentages, lower weaning weights, increased supplemental feeding costs and reduced production of more desirable range forage."

"These losses have been estimated to exceed \$100 million annually for Texas ranchers. Perennial broomweed alone costs ranchers in excess of \$36 million every year."

To a crusty West Texas rancher, however, the theory that animals can learn good plants from bad may seem farfetched. Ralphs argues that native livestock on familiar rangeland suffer less from toxic plants than do newly introduced animals.

"This is a common occurrence that most ranchers know," said Ralphs. "This phenomenon suggests a learning process. Those native animals have learned to avoid certain plants, but their counterparts have not."

In South Africa, for example, the tulip is a problem only with new animals. As a preventive measure, Ralphs said, ranchers typically give new animals a dose of this tulip to have them associate its taste with the resulting illness. Subsequently they avoid eating the plant.

Ralphs said one theory of how learning occurs suggests that when an animal gets sick after eating a plant, illness information is conveyed by the same nerves that also carried the

plant's taste, and an association is made. An actual change in palatability occurs, he said, that makes the plant distasteful.

"This process is not foolproof in nature; we still have large livestock losses to poisonous plants," Ralphs said. "An animal may not be able to associate which plant made it sick."

"One of the principles in conditioned learning is to avoid the interference of other tastes. We associate the taste of just one plant with the illness. The animal can make that simplistic type of association."

In diverting animals from a certain plant, the researchers found one specific requirement: for the association to remain whatever is given to induce illness must cause a gastrointestinal distress. This can be accomplished by using an emetic. The Utah researchers prefer lithium chloride, widely used in behavioral studies of humans and rats, which causes a rapid nausea without dangerous side effects.

Some stumbling blocks have been encountered in the research; a major one is differences in the individual animals.

"Animals vary greatly in their ability to learn, much as we humans do," said Ralphs. "They may not be able to

discriminate between tastes too well or they may not be too particular about what tastes good and what tastes bad."

To complicate matters, Ralphs said, animals may respond differently to the emetic or to the associations made. Some animals may be fast learners, and others may never learn at all.

New tastes are more strongly associated with an illness than familiar ones. A new animal is more likely to form a stronger aversion than one that has grazed the plant in the past.

"Around the time of weaning, animals are developing preferences and learning what's acceptable and what's not. This is an appropriate time for them to learn aversions. However, young animals also are very inquisitive. They may form aversions faster, but they also may lose them faster."

"Mature animals on the other hand, once preferences are set, are less likely to change. We're thinking now that mature animals may be the more efficient (learners)."

"In our studies on larkspur (considered the most important poisonous plant on mountain ranges), we found that peer pressure also was a strong force," Ralphs said. "If an animal sees his neighbor eating something, and we are not there to dose the animal for that immediate negative feedback, then it will eat more and more until the aversion is gone."

For this reason, Ralphs said, "averted animals should be kept separate from non-averted ones for the first year or two."

"Hunger, however, will extinguish any aversion. When an animal is hungry, it will eat almost anything."

"Is aversion training a viable management tool in a typical ranching operation? I guess the answer is maybe," Ralphs said. "We're not to a point where we can make strong recommendations. Too much research needs to be conducted."

"But if a rancher has a situation where a palatable poisonous plant is causing persistent losses, and other options are cost prohibitive, aversion training might be considered."

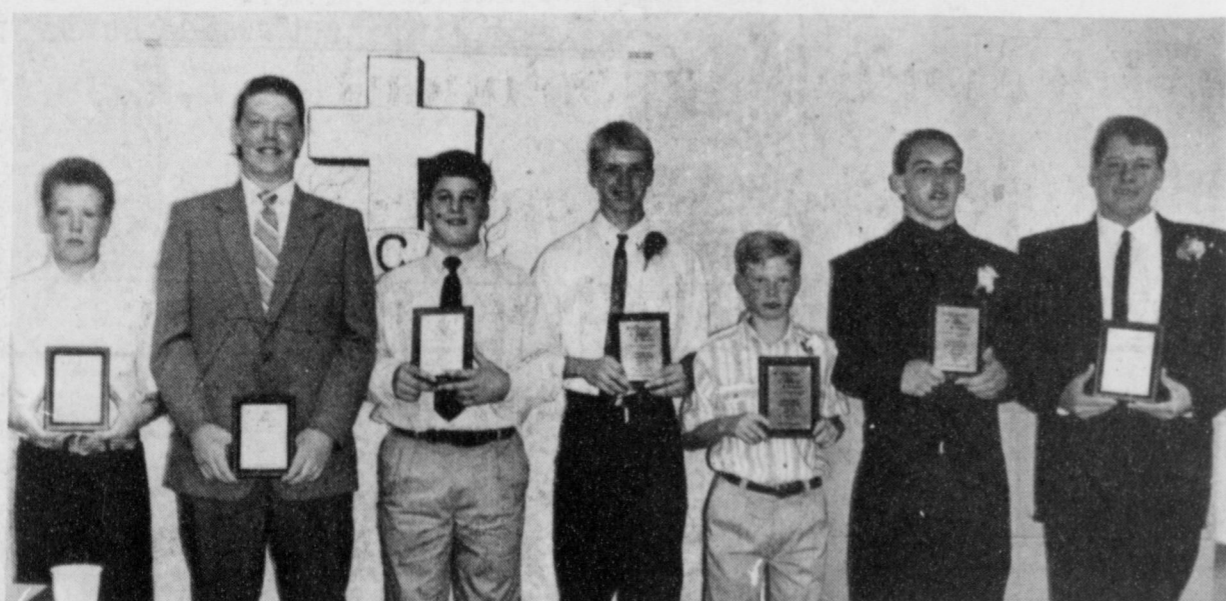

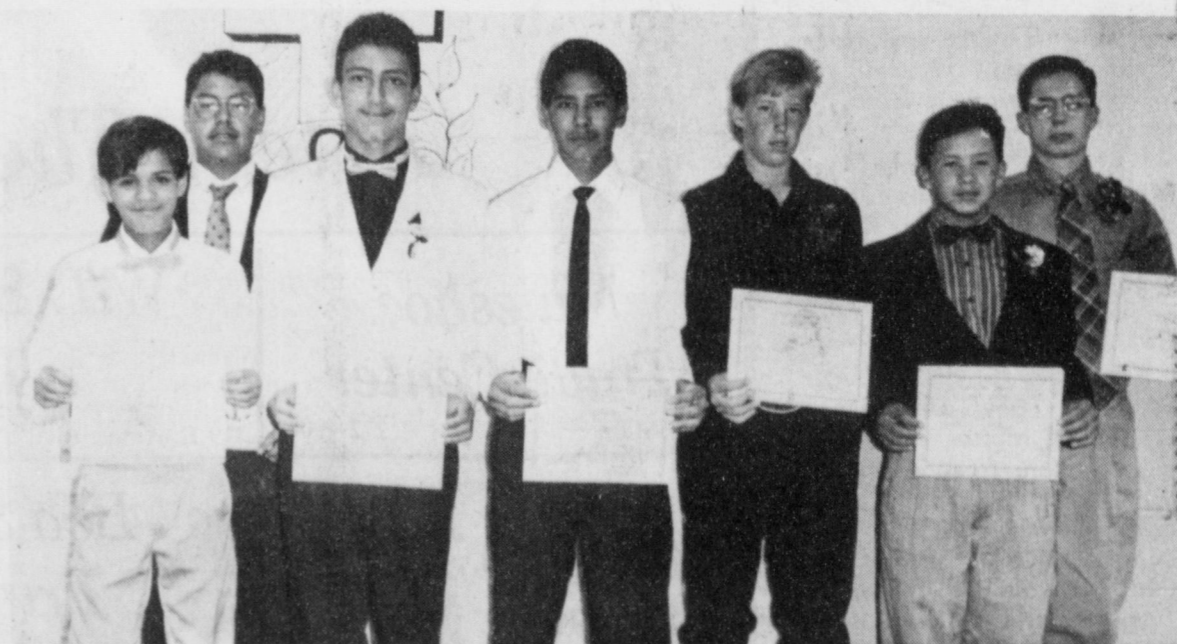

Children's Drinking Water Must Be 'Better' Than Average

Children have special needs for safe drinking water, according to a water expert at Texas A&M University.

"Because of their young age and the fast pace that their bodies develop, the water children drink must be 'better' than water adults drink," said Dr. Susan Quiring, a Texas Agricultural Extension Service specialist working with water quality and conservation.

"Too many substances in drinking water can be detrimental to a child's health," she said, adding that this can be especially true in private wells that aren't monitored regularly. Quiring noted that a good way to observe National Drinking Water Week is to have well water tested to ensure its quality.

The specialist said nitrates, for example, are a concern for infants up to 6 months of age.

"When an infant drinks water with high levels of nitrate, the baby's blood becomes unable to carry oxygen, thus leading to possible suffocation," she said.

"A sign of nitrate poisoning is a bluish skin color."

Rural water wells can be subject to nitrate contamination, either through natural causes or from such sources of ground water pollution as agricultural chemicals.

Quiring said exposure to relatively low levels of lead over time can cause serious damage to young children.

Nationally, the Environmental Protection Agency estimated last year that more than 2.4 million children are at risk from potentially high lead levels, she said, and about 250,000 of these youngsters are exposed to lead levels high enough to impair their intellectual development. As many as 70,000 children below age 5 have high lead levels in their blood, according to the EPA.

Quiring said children can ingest lead in many ways—from polluted air, lead-based paint chips, or drinking water.

"Generally, lead found in tap water is from lead pipes or the solder used in some household plumbing, rather than in the water supply itself," she said.

Because of the increasing health concerns of lead in drinking water, a 1986 federal law made sweeping amend-

ments to the 1974 Safe Drinking Water Act.

The amendments made it unlawful for builders or contractors to use lead pipes and solder in public water systems or homes.

"In practice, within the past five years most builders have quit using lead pipes and solder," said Ric Jensen of the Texas Water Resources Institute at Texas AM University.

Many good private water testing labs are located around the state, and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service has operated such labs since 1959.

Dr. Dale Pennington, Extension Service soil chemist at Texas A&M, said Extension's water testing labs at A&M and Lubbock conduct comprehensive water quality tests from private wells, using a computer software program known as WATERS, or Water Analysis, Technical Evaluations and Retrieval System.

The labs can test for 23 chemicals and compounds, including nitrates, lead and fluoride, another substance in water that can affect a child's health—but in a beneficial way.

High fluoride levels in water can stain a child's teeth, Quiring said. "Levels high enough to be of concern are found in water supplies in the Panhandle and High Plains.

Many cities add fluoride to their water systems, however, because fluoride prevents cavities in teeth of people of all ages, but especially those under age 8.

A huge sign was carried into the gym by SCAC members with names of local men and women now serving in the Persian Gulf War.

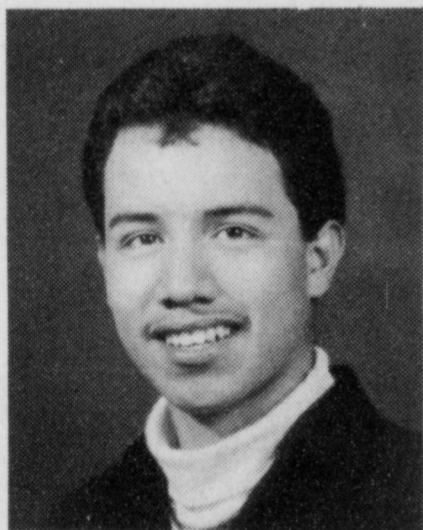
Pouring into the gym were other SCAC members, basketball players and supporters waving U.S. flags.

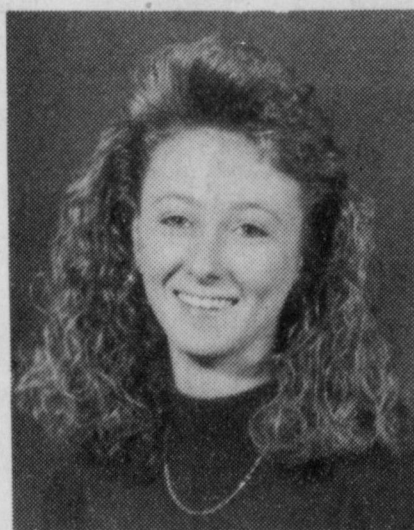
Muleshoe 54 and Littlefield 49. The Junior varsity girls also won their game with a score of 47 to 38.

Childress Pitcher Limits Muleshoe To One Hit

PLAINVIEW- Chuck Steed lost his chance to pitch a no-hitter Monday with the first batter. But the Childress senior settled for the next-best thing.

Steed tossed a complete game one-hitter to lead the Bobcats past Muleshoe, 3-1, in a Class 3A bi-district playoff at Jaycee Park. The victory earned Childress (13-9) a trip to the area round against the winner of today's Iowa Park-Seminole game.

On Steed's sixth pitch, Muleshoe lead-off hitter Ricky Flores slapped a Texas League single to right field that stood up as the Mules' only hit of the day.

"He (Flores) just kind of stuck his bat out there and got that bloop single," said Steed, who improved his record to 6-4 with a low, late-breaking curve. "That really made me mad that he got it that way, but I shut 'em down after that."

The Childress right-hander's control was unassailable in the late innings, as he retired the final 13 batters he faced and finished with eight strikeouts and three bases on balls. During warmups, though, Steed was a little worried about his curveball.

"But sure enough, it was working just about every time I threw it," said Steed, the school's salutatorian. "That gets your confidence up."

And he had plenty of help from a defense that came up with three gems to keep the one-hitter intact. Shortstop Clint Coley made a diving catch on a line drive hit by Muleshoe's

Jorge Barron, while second baseman John Henderson redeemed a previous error with a pair of nifty grabs in the fifth and seventh.

"We showed a little glove today," said Childress coach Richard Olson, whose team advanced to the regional semifinals last season. "We made some plays in the field that we needed to make."

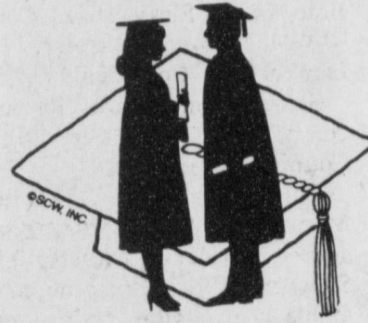
Muleshoe's Rodney Reynolds (6-6) held his own on the mound, yielding only four singles to the hard-hitting Bobcats, but he also allowed two runs to score on wild pitches. Childress' other run came on an error by first baseman Chad Freeman, who muffed a grounder that allowed designated hitter Nick Dowd to score.

"Errors killed us," said Muleshoe coach Paul Davis, whose team finished the season

at 10-14. "Neither team hit the ball well, but we had a respectable game and had a chance to win it, and that's all I can ask for."

All four of the game's runs scored on wild pitches or errors, and all five hits were singles. No player had more than one hit.

Muleshoe center fielder Galin Latham scored his team's only run in the second after reaching base on a dropped third strike. He made it home on an error.

Brian Bush gave a report on the traveling bake sale. SCAC made \$186. He also asked that the members who did not participate in the bake sale to donate \$5 to the club.

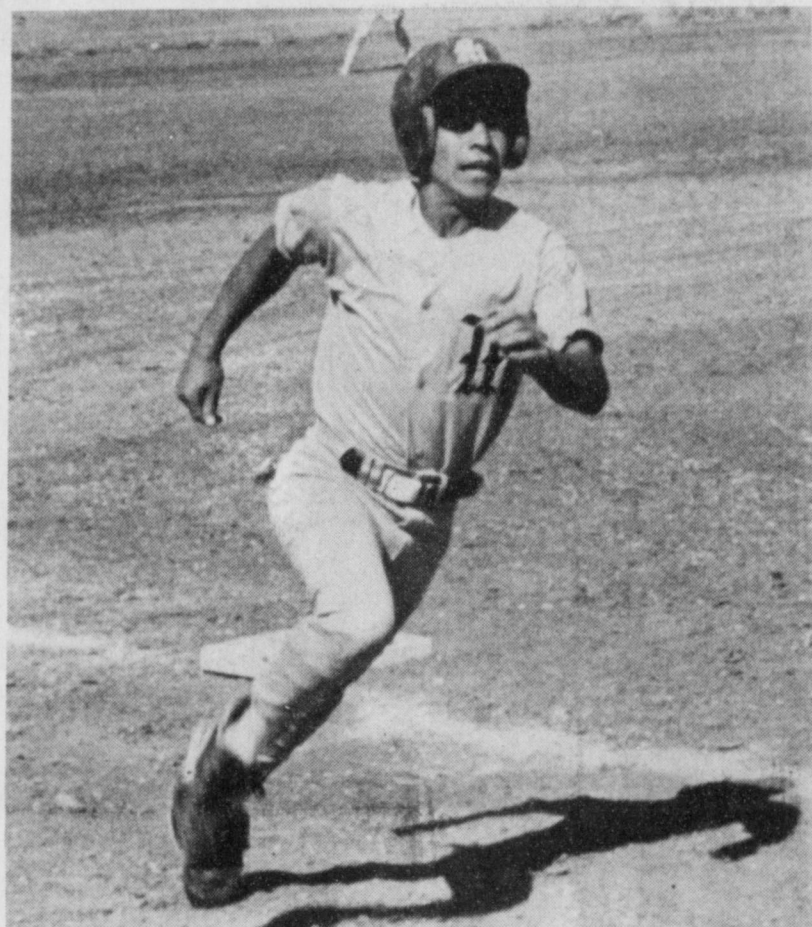
Mrs. Barbara Milburn was our special speaker and our "Citizen of the Month" of April. Mrs. Milburn is a
