

# Petersburg Is Mustangs Bi-District Opponent

With the zone championship trophy safely in their hands, the Wheeler Mustangs face their second playoff opponent, the Petersburg Buffaloes, Friday night at River Road in Amarillo.

Being in the playoffs is nothing new to the Wheeler Mustangs but this will be Petersburg's first venture past district play since 1977. Petersburg has been playing in Class AA up until the new alignment and it will also be the first time the Mustangs and the Buffaloes have squared off in any athletic contest.

Friday night's bi-district game will pit two teams with similar offensive schemes as the Mustangs' and Buffaloes choose to stay on the ground for their basic attack. Petersburg will run from the I formation and a split back

set while the Mustangs will pound you from the I.

Similarity is also evident on defense as both clubs use a four man front with three linebackers. The Mustangs operate with a four deep secondary whereas the Buffaloes use a three deep with a rover.

Petersburg brings a 7-3 season and a 6-1 district record into the contest with their only loss in district being to ranked Sudan. Sudan and Sunray clash this week also which should give some idea to the relative strength of the two areas. Sudan whipped the Buffaloes 17-7.

The Wheeler Mustangs broke open a close ball game with a time consuming drive in the fourth quarter and whipped the Vega Longhorns last Friday night at White Deer and claimed the zone championship.

The 14-0 victory was the second over the Longhorns this year and the third win in the past two seasons. Wheeler shutout Vega in the playoffs last year 22-0 and won 21-0 in non district play in '86 so they kept the shutout jinx going over the Longhorns.

The win propelled the Mustangs into bi-district play this week against the Petersburg Buffaloes at River Road in Amarillo.

Wheeler's win at Vega earlier in the year was helped by big plays and this was the case again as the Mustangs scored their first touchdown on a 69 yard pass play from Augie Hennard to David Jones.

The Mustang coaching staff felt like the Longhorns were vulnerable to the pass and they were as the Mustangs plundered the Longhorn secondary for 115 yards on just three completions in four attempts.

Jones sprinted into the secondary just behind the Longhorn linebackers and snared Hennard's pass and there was no catching the Mustang wayout and the Mustangs were up by a 7-0 score at 7:14 of the first quarter following Richard Smith's successful PAT kick.

Vega's lone threat of the first half was squelched when Hale Hughes recovered Klay Waters fumble at the Wheeler 36. This proved to be the

Longhorn's deepest penetration of the game as both team's defenses were hard to crack.

Waters, incidentally, was injured in the third quarter and this took out a lot of the Longhorns offensive punch and threw the load on quarterback Lynn Pulliam's shoulders.

Wheeler blew a big chance to pad their lead as the seconds ticked off the clock in the first half. Vega chose to go for the first down on fourth and 1 from their 45 but Waters was stacked for no gain.

Grayson Benson picked up a yard and then Wheeler was penalized 10 yards for holding on second down. Hennard passed to Benson for 9 and hit Cody Wiggins on the perimeter and the Mustangs tailback was knocked out of bounds on the 8. Not choosing to stop the clock, the Mustangs ran Wiggins for 3 to the 5 and on the next play, Hennard's pass, intended for Jones in the end zone, was picked off by Lawren Mason near the goal line and returned to the 10 with less than 30 seconds remaining in the half.

The Mustangs disdained the pass on their clinching touchdown as they pounded out the 78 yards on the ground with Wiggins capping the drive with a 1 yard punch up the middle. Smith added the extra point and the Mustangs had some breathing room.

Time after time, Charlie Miller led the blocking that opened the holes on the long, 17 play drive. Miller also had an outstanding game on defense as he

## Deputy "Corky" Guthrie's Name Added To American Police Hall Of Fame & Museum

Deputy Marion "Corky" Guthrie's name will be added to the American Police Hall of Fame and Museum in North Port, Fl. Corky will be killed in 19-- while answering the call to a possible burglary of a drug store in Canadian; he was a deputy with the Hemphill County Sheriff's Department. Guthrie's name is one of 2,500 names of officers who have been killed in the line of duty posted in the museum.

Notification of the honor was received by the deputy's widow, Lydia Guthrie, recently. Mrs. Guthrie, who now lives in Pampa, was issued a lifetime membership card for "Survivors of Law Enforcement Officers Killed in the line of Duty" and received an emblem to be displayed as a reminder to the community of the

sacrifice made for law and order.

The American Police Hall of Fame and Museum is the nation's only memorial to honor those who died in the line of duty. The Hall was founded in 1960 and now has some 2500 names with the number increasing each year.

By an act of Congress, May 15 is "Police Memorial Day". A memorial service is held each year at the American Police Hall of Fame and Museum.

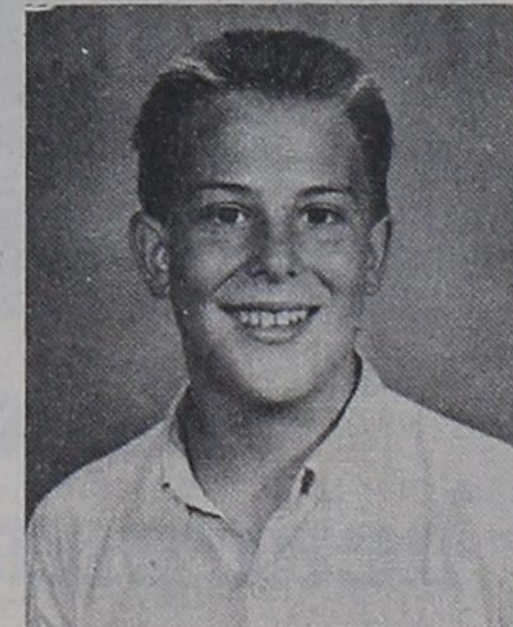

## NOTICE OF PROPOSED REDUCTION IN AT&T'S TEXAS RATES

The Public Utility Commission of the state of Texas has entered orders in two recent cases that would substantially reduce the charges which AT&T pays to the state's local telephone companies and which could allow AT&T to reduce prices for most of AT&T's customers on calls placed within the state of Texas.

The total amount of the reduction to AT&T's customers is expected to be between \$115.3 million and \$120.6 million. This is in addition to the \$19.8 million reduction in AT&T's Texas basic long distance prices that went into effect on March 1, 1986 and is in addition to the approximately \$2 billion in AT&T interstate price reductions that took effect earlier this year.

If the changes are approved, all of AT&T's direct dialed long distance, directory assistance, WATS and 800 service customers would be affected, and would experience a decrease in their prices for these services when calling within the state of Texas. The following tables show the anticipated impact of the changes on AT&T customers by service category:

Long Distance	9.2	\$ 68.4
Directory Assistance	20.0	1.0
WATS	29.1	29.7
800	19.9	21.5

The rate reductions are presently anticipated to occur in two phases on or about October 22, 1986 and November 12, 1986. The matter has been assigned as Docket Nos. 6926 and 7113. Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in these proceedings should notify the Commission as soon as possible. A request to intervene or participate or for further information should be mailed to the Public Utility Commission of Texas, 7800 Shoal Creek Blvd., Suite 400N, Austin, Texas 78757. A complete copy of the tariffs reflecting the potential rate reductions will be on file with the Commission on or before October 23, 1986.

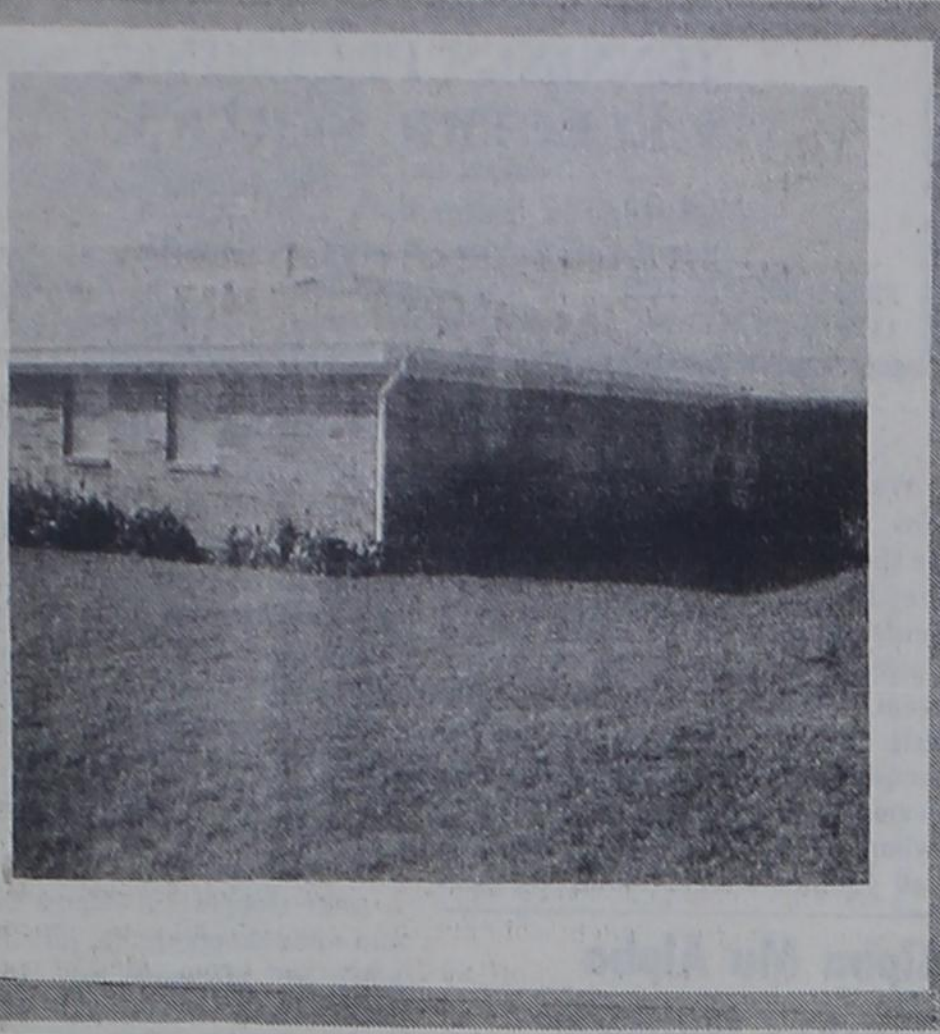

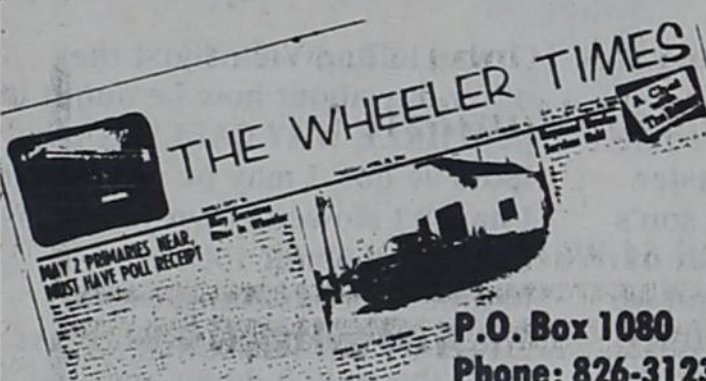

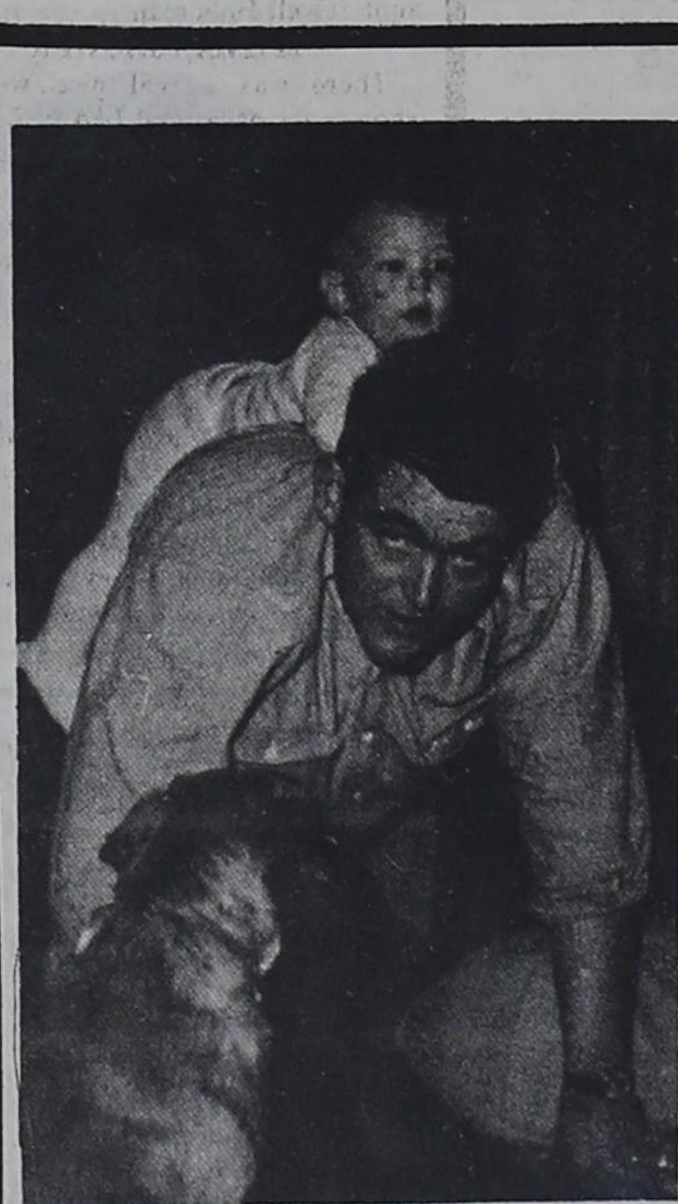

**PANHANDLE COMMUNITY SERV. PROJECT SELF-SUFFICIENCY**

Helping People Help Themselves is the motto for Panhandle Community Services, a human service delivery system headquartered in Amarillo and serving the people in the 26 counties of the Texas Panhandle with a multitude of services. The agency's slogan has taken on a vital new meaning with its special new program, PROJECT SELF-SUFFICIENCY. This demonstration project assists single men and women who are raising minor dependent children in our area. Project Self-Sufficiency aids them in achieving independence, a SELF-SUFFICIENT standard of living and a more meaningful and productive place in our community.  
Sometimes, "Pulling yourself up by your own bootstraps", requires a little help. Panhandle Community Services, (PCS), administers the locally designed demonstration project, directly providing section 8 rental assistance funded through the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development. A vital component of this project is the identification of and referral to other community resources for which the participant may also be eligible. These resources may include; grants, loans or scholarships, child care, transportation services, job search and placement opportunities. In addition, PCS strives to utilize as many of the other possible services available through the agency in order to assist the eligible applicants in successfully attaining their goal of SELF-SUFFICIENCY.  
The project is scheduled to conclude in April, 1988. All of the housing certificates awarded to PCS for this special demonstration project, which is the largest awarded nationally, must be issued by the end of January, 1987. It is the goal of PCS, PROJECT SELF-SUFFICIENCY, staff and Task Force members to serve as many eligible participants as possible.  
Throughout the entire Panhandle many men and women who are single parents with young dependent children are being aided in many ways to become more SELF-SUFFICIENT. Two (2) of the current participants are enrolled in Clarendon College. Additionally, another 75 are enrolled in local and regional universities, colleges, and vocational institutions such as West Texas State University, Texas State Technical Institute and North American Education Center. These students are pursuing completion of their life-long goals in various occupations such as Licensed Vocational Nursing, medical occupations, business degrees, computer science, mechanics, law enforcement and many more. Concurrently, many are working, soon-to-be working and receiving assistance from various sources in housing, school opportunities and child.  
To be eligible for PROJECT SELF-SUFFICIENCY an individual must be a single head of household raising minor dependent children, quality as having a very low income determined by guidelines established by the Department of Housing and Urban Development and must be currently paying rent without federal assistance.  
Applicants are required to supply verification of marital status, custody of minor children, high school/ or college transcripts or certificates of completion, verification of income and letters of reference from personal acquaintances and employers. All applicants receive a battery of tests which are designed to provide indicators of motivational, achievement and aptitude levels to better determine their potential for success in the Project.  
All applicants are formally reviewed to determine if they can be recommended for enrollment and participation based largely upon the absence of substantial barriers to training and employment success. Participants are interviewed and selected by a Task Force of representatives from their home community. The Task Force which serves Wheeler, Donley, Collingsworth and Hall counties is composed of the following individuals: Judge W.R. Christal, Judge Wendell Morgan, Judge Zook Thomas, Helen Crisman, Tex Selvidge, Donald Smith, Lynn Williams and Woodrow A. Sims.  
Single parents with minor children who are currently in need of assistance to complete their education through college, university, or vocational institutions on or before May 31, 1988, or those individuals desiring additional information about PROJECT SELF-SUFFICIENCY SHOULD contact:

Holiday In The Park will begin at 4 p.m. and will remain open until 10 p.m. most nights. The event will be staged on Friday, Saturday and Sunday evenings only for the first two weeks, then daily through New Year's Eve. The park will be closed both Christmas Eve and Christmas Day.

Opening day for Holiday In The Park will be November 28. Daily operation will begin December 12.

## Efficiently Needed In Cattle Operation

JOE DON KING

With the annual costs of maintaining a cow running at over \$300.00, it is very important that the cow-calf operator wear as many pounds of beef as possible from his cow herd, according to Joe Don King, County Extension Agent.

One way to do this is to shorten the breeding season. Shortening the breeding season enables the producer to operate more efficiently as a result of more timely labor usage and increased production.

Shorter calving seasons result in heavier weaning weights, higher calf crop percentages, and lower feed costs.

Dr. John McNeill, Beef Cattle Specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, will outline the advantages of and the strategies for shortening the breeding season in a meeting on Tuesday, November 25, at 7:00 p.m. in Maxey's Steakhouse in Wheeler. The meeting is being sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and the Wheeler County Agricultural Committee.

Because the meeting will follow a "Dutch Treat" dinner, those planning to attend the meeting are asked to call the Wheeler County Extension office before 5:00 p.m. Monday, November 24, so that adequate seating can be arranged.

## Beef Promotion & Research Program

As of October 1, all beef cattle sales are subject to the \$1.00 per head checkoff that will fund the Beef Promotion and Research Program which was established by the Food Security Act of 1985 (1985 Farm Bill). The purchaser of the cattle is responsible for collecting and remitting the money; therefore, you are not responsible for any paperwork when you sell cattle.

If you purchase the cattle through an auction market or an order buyer, they will send the money to the Beef Industry Council (BIC) and take care of the paperwork. However, if you buy cattle in the country, you are responsible for collecting the money and sending it in to the BIC as part of a monthly report.

A person buying cattle for resale does not have to pay if the cattle are resold within ten days. The persons must submit a "Request for Non-Producer Status" to the BIC to be exempted from the \$1.00 charge.

To be eligible for a refund, producers must file a refund request within sixty days of the transaction. However, refunds will not be made until after the producer referendum on the \$1.00 checkoff, to be held no later than May 18, 1988.

Demand for beef has weakened in the past few years. Since 1979, the retail price of beef has declined 30% (when adjusted for inflation). Funds from this check-off will be used to promote beef and expand the market.

The Texas BIC will use a computer to cross-check transactions and locate those who have not paid. A civil penalty of up to \$5,000 per violation may be assessed and an additional penalty of \$10,000 applies to willful misrepresentation of information submitted.

The necessary forms and information may be obtained from the Texas Beef Industry Council, 6504 Bridgepoint Parkway, Suite 400, Austin, Texas 78730, phone 512-345-3531. Some of the forms and information will be available in the county Extension office.

## Stress Can Cause

### Pneumonia In Calves

Stress can be a major cause of pneumonia in calves, particularly with viruses, bacteria and other germs present.

Stress factors include weaning, hunger, thirst, castration, dehorning, adverse weather, abusive handling, shipping, fatigue, and mixing with other cattle.

Viruses involved are 1BR, P13, BVD, reoviruses, rhinoviruses, adenoviruses, herpes viruses and syncytial viruses. Bacteria include pasteurilla and hemophilum, and other germs are chlamydia, mycoplasma, and rickettsia. Normal calves harbor germs that can cause respiratory infection. Bringing calves together from different sources results in an exchange of these germs.

Stress causes mild infections to develop into clinical disease. Calves with pneumonia are depressed, with head down and ears drooped. The abdomen is tucked up, fever reaches 107 degrees, breathing is difficult, and the nose is dry or has a ropy discharge. Deaths are usually sudden and unexpected.

To minimize the incidence and severity of respiratory infections in the breeding herd; vaccinate calves at 2 to 4 months of age; vaccinate calves again three weeks before weaning or castrate, dehorn, brand, and implant calves up to three weeks before weaning or three weeks after weaning; and wait to co-mingle and ship calves three weeks after weaning.

Producers should keep stress and exposure in calves to a minimum at all times because vaccines are not available for all respiratory germs. Avoid the usual practice of providing a variety of stresses at weaning time; weaning is a traumatic experience to a calf.

## Texas Dept. Health Created New Service

The Texas Department of Health (TDH) has created a new service, the Office of Smoking and Health, to supply guidance and information on all aspects of tobacco use. The Office is funded by the Texas Cancer Council.

The office will serve as a prime resource for individuals, groups, local governments and others needing data about tobacco use. It also offers help in developing community and work-site "no smoking" programs, municipal smoking ordinances, and current research results on the dangers of tobacco use, according to Ron Todd, director of the TDH Public Health Promotion Division.

Texas Commissioner of Health Dr. Robert Bernstein said, "With this central clearinghouse, we can supply comprehensive information about smoking and its effects on individual and public health. This is a most cost effective way to give Texans easy access to reliable information on smoking and smokeless tobacco use."

Persons may request information by calling the office, toll-free, at 1-800-345-8647, from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday.

"Each year more than 45,000 Texans die from heart disease, lung cancer, emphysema and bronchitis," Dr. Bernstein said. "At least 17,000 of these deaths are attributable to smoking tobacco." He said growing public concern over the risks associated with tobacco use is evident in the growing number of Texas cities and towns passing ordinances on smoking.

The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services estimates that 30 percent of coronary heart disease deaths, 80 percent of lung, bronchus and trachea cancer deaths, and 80 percent of chronic obstructive pulmonary disease deaths are caused by smoking.

"We are excited to be able to offer easy access to any information that can help Texans protect themselves, their families, and their communities from the health problems caused by tobacco use," Dr. Bernstein added. Estimated tobacco related deaths in Wheeler County in 1984 were: 8 coronary heart disease, 4 lung Bronshus trachea Cancer and two from chronic obstructive pulmonary disease.
