

Mustangs Are Champs Again! Win 43-0

The Wheeler Mustangs are sitting in the district crown room once more and are state playoff bound for the fourth year in a row via their 43-0 win over the Phillips Blackhawks last Friday night.

The Mustangs were assured part of the District 1-1A North zone championship if they beat the Blackhawks but stood a chance of having to stay home from the playoffs if a three way tie occurred but Mustangs and

fans alike erupted into cheering when it was announced late in the game that the Follett Panthers had upset the Booker Kiowas 18-13.

After Phillips put a momentary scare into the Mustangs by driving to the Wheeler 11 following the opening kickoff, tailback Cody Wiggins broke off his left tackle and cut back to his right and sped 85 yards for the game's opening score.

Hale Hughes had recovered a Blackhawks fumble to stop the Phillips threat and the outmanned Blackhawks could only reach the Wheeler 26 late in the first half for their only other mild threat of the game.

About the only thing that slowed the Mustangs down during the game were flags as the Mustangs amassed 427 yards on offense and the number two backfield was on the gridiron the final two quarters.

The Mustangs even put the ball in the air 12 times and completed five. Really they aired it out 13 times but a

COLTS CLOSE SEASON UNDEFEATED

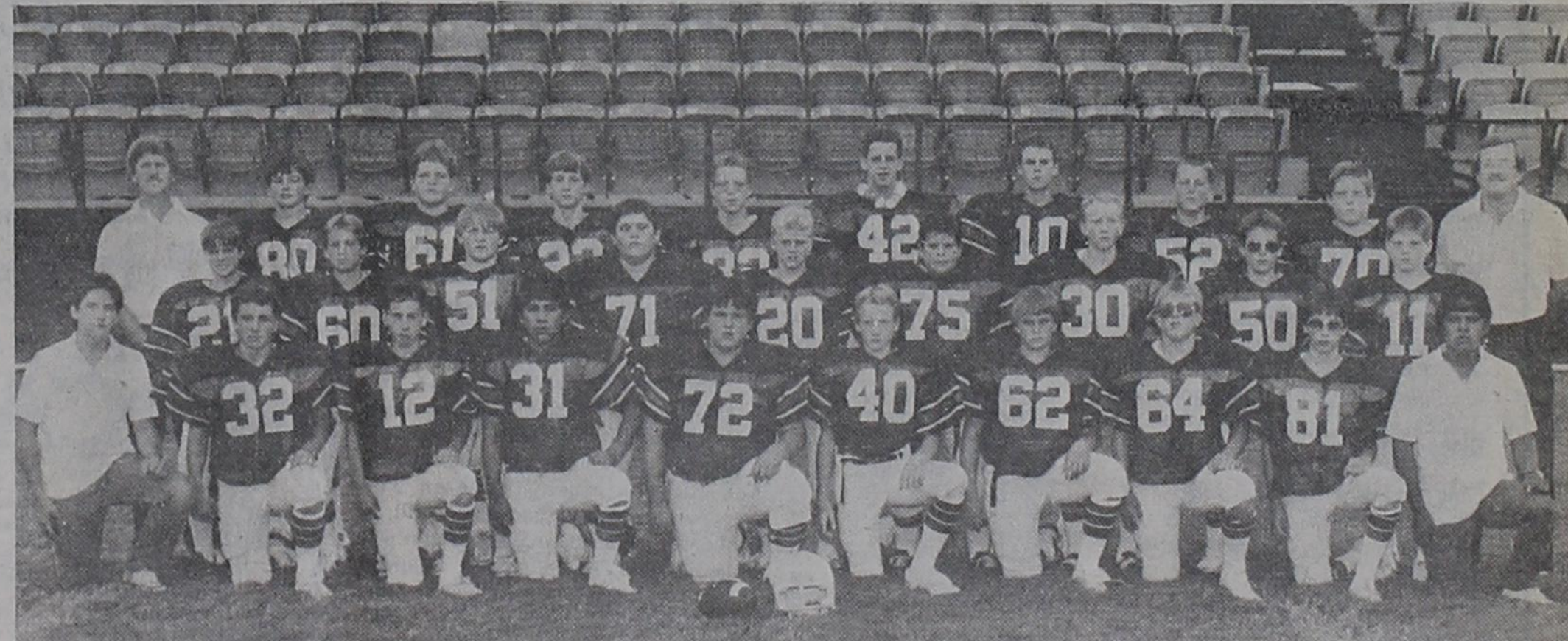

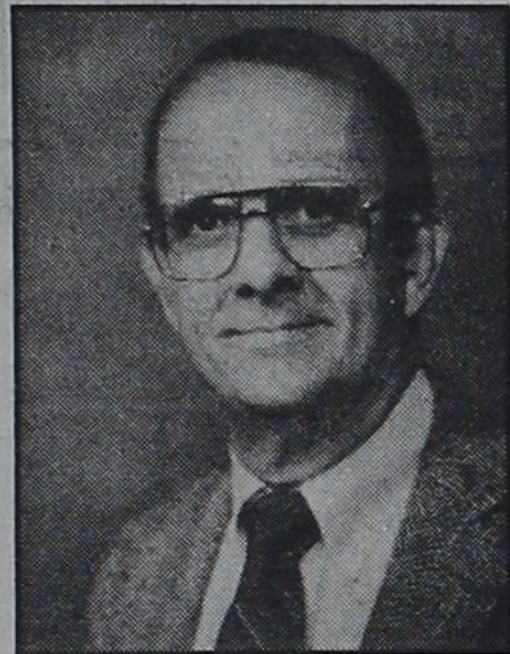

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NOTICE OF PROPOSED REDUCTION IN AT&T's TEXAS RATES

The Public Utility Commission of the state of Texas has entered orders in two recent cases that would substantially reduce the charges which AT&T pays to the state's local telephone companies and which could allow AT&T to reduce prices for most of AT&T's customers on calls placed within the state of Texas.

The total amount of the reduction to AT&T's customers is expected to be between \$115.3 million and \$120.6 million. This is in addition to the \$19.8 million reduction in AT&T's Texas basic long distance prices that went into effect on March 1, 1986 and is in addition to the approximately \$2 billion in AT&T interstate price reductions that took effect earlier this year.

If the changes are approved, all of AT&T's direct dialed long distance, directory assistance, WATS and 800 service customers would be affected, and would experience a decrease in their prices for these services when calling within the state of Texas. The following tables show the anticipated impact of the changes on AT&T customers by service category.

The matter was discussed at length and it was decided to have a meeting with the Councils of Mobeetie and Shamrock at a future date.

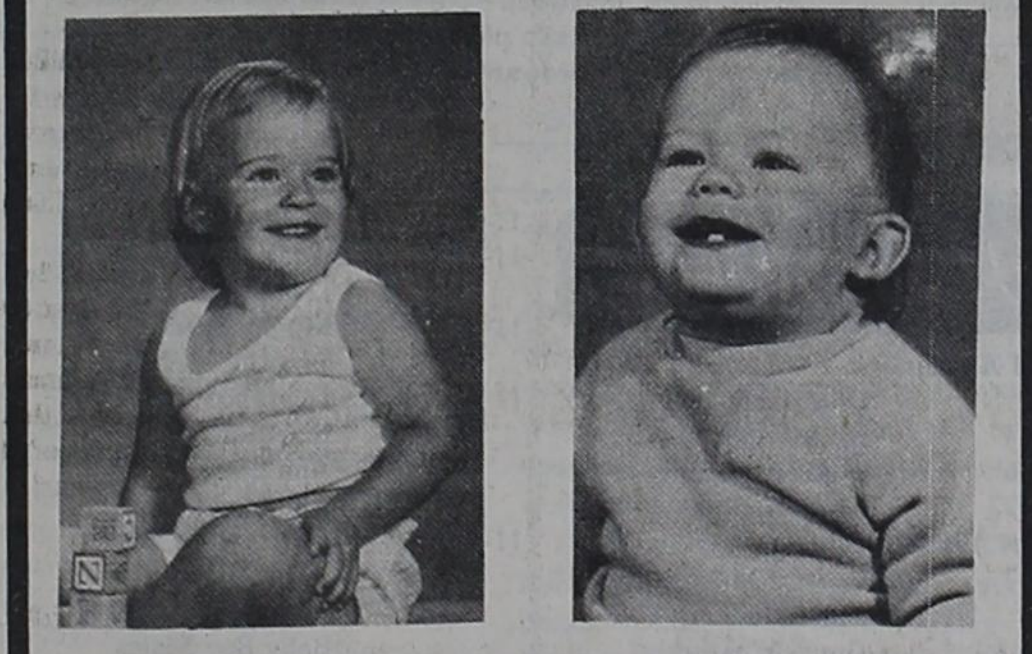

EMERGENCY FARM LOAN Applications Being Accepted

Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by severe storms and flooding which began September 26, 1986 are being accepted at the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) office located in Wheeler, FmHA County Supervisor John D. Wolf III said today.

Wheeler County is one of four in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Richard E. Lyng as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the storms and flooding.

Wolf said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business or \$500,000 whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest rate on the first \$100,000 borrowed is 5 percent; the interest rate is 8 percent on the balance borrowed over that amount.

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FmHA emergency loan," Wolf said. Farmers participating in the PIK or Federal Crop Insurance programs will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

"Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until June 29, 1987 but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly over into the new farming season," Wolf said.

FmHA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U.S. Citizens and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U.S. citizens hold a majority interest.

The FmHA office in Wheeler is open from 8 a.m. to noon and 1 p.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday.

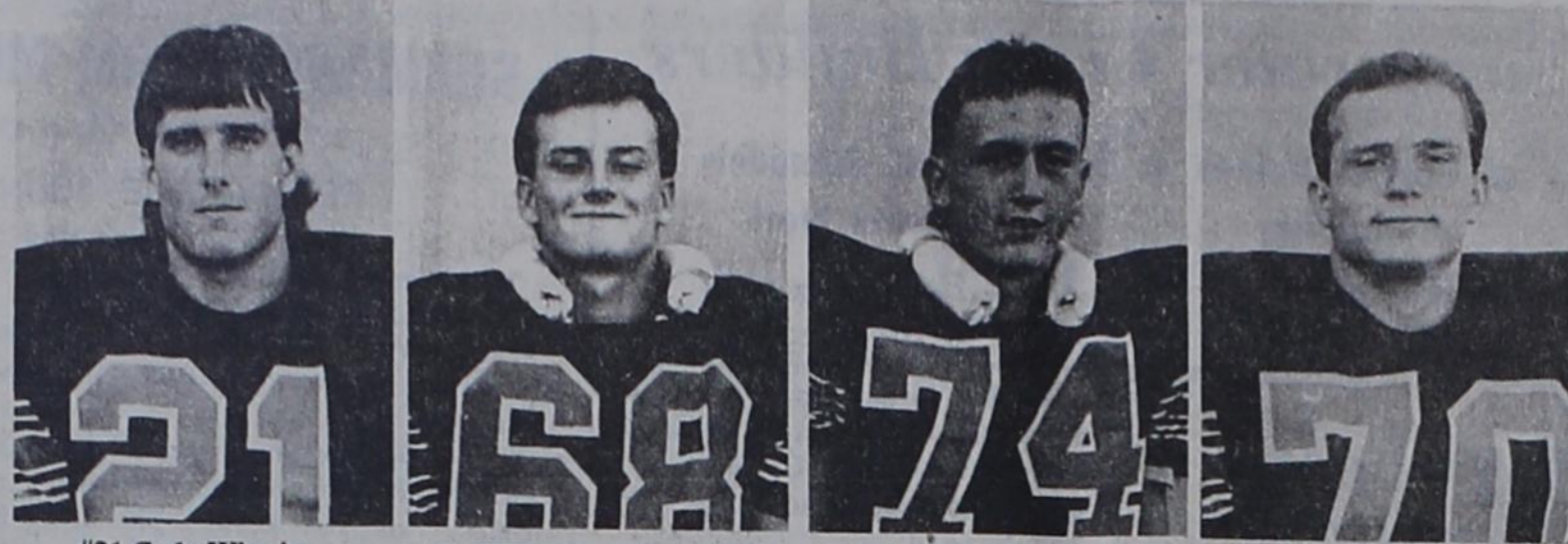

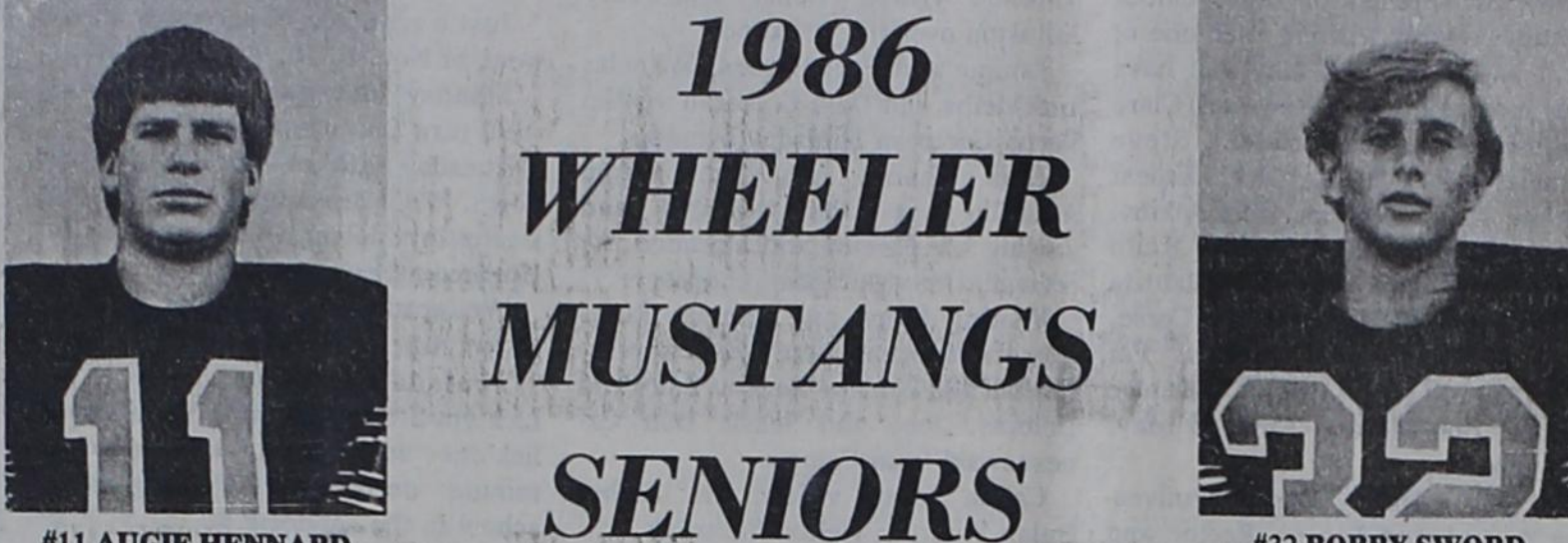

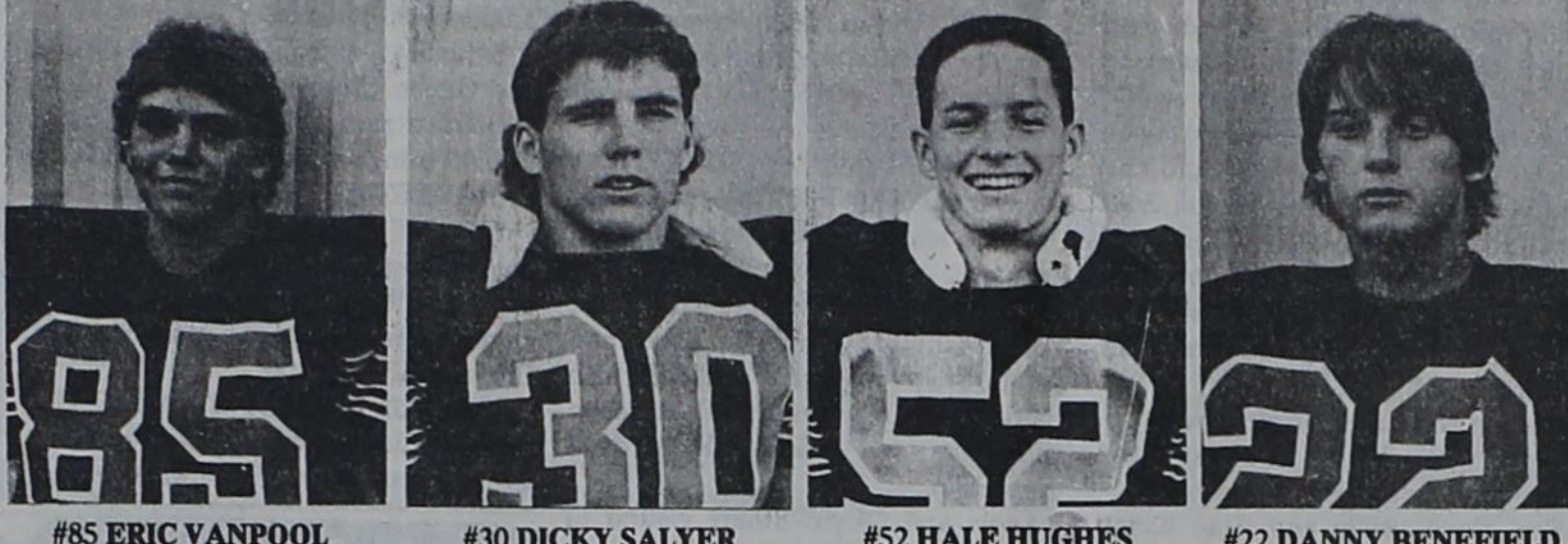
Cody Wiggins gained 130 yards to led Mustang ball carriers and Guest picked up 90 yards.

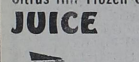

WHEELER COUNTY SOIL AND WATER CONSERVATION DISTRICT 1986 Annual Report

The Wheeler County Soil and Water Conservation District (SWCD) was formed on April 6, 1948, with the protection and enhancement of the available renewable natural resources as its primary purpose. Its boundaries coincide with the boundaries of Wheeler County. It is governed by a board of five elected directors who are resident landowners in the district and are actively engaged in farming or ranching. The current Board of Directors consists of Clarence Zybach (who has served on the Board since its creation), Paul Macina, Jim Batton, Darville Atherton and John Vermilion. The District entered into a memo of understanding with the Soil Conservation Service (SCS) in 1948 to provide personnel specially trained in the field of erosion control. The current SCS staff includes Lavon Williams, Kenneth Reed, and Ben Westmoreland. The SWCD works very closely with the SCS to promote all phases of conservation. Your SWCD is proud to present this report of some of the work and accomplishments during the 1986 fiscal year.

According to an approved conservation plan.

Conservation Compliance—When applying for the USDA farm programs, a farmer must certify that crops are not being produced on highly erodible land without a locally approved conservation plan.

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In addition to the Sodbuster and Conservation Compliance provisions, the 1985 Farm Bill also provides that highly erodible cropland currently farmed must begin actively applying an approved conservation plan by January 1, 1990 in order to be eligible for USDA farm programs. The conservation plan must be fully applied by January 1, 1995.

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Some of the accomplishments of the SWCD-SCS for 1986 include:
New District Cooperators - 29 on 10,679 acres; Conservation Plans updated - 65 on 25,916 acres; Individuals and Units of Government assisted - 425; Individuals applying conservation practices - 204; Applications for long term cost share assistance - 3 on 1,120 acres; RC&D contracts signed - 1 for \$8750.00; GPCP contracts signed - 1 for \$17,530.02; Conservation Cropping System - 125,000 acres; Crop Residue Use - 50,000 acres; Conservation Tillage - 50,000 acres; Conservation Tour - 1; Deferred Grazing - 3,000; Pasture Planting - 1,500 acres; Pasture Management - 35,000 acres; Proper Grazing Use - 160,000 acres; Evergreen Trees Sold - 1320; Hardwood Trees Sold - 100; Pecan Trees Sold - 224.
