* Failure to satisfy provisions of the "sodbuster", "swampbuster", and "conversation compliance" programs (effective immediately) could disqualify farmers from participating in any USDA programs including: price and income supports, disaster payments, crop insurance, Farmers Home Administration loans, Commodity Credit Corporation storage payments, farm storage facility loans, and other programs under which payments are made with respect to commodiles produced.

* SODBUSTER: Farmers must certify that they have not converted "highly erodible lands" to cropland

Comment Period Ends October 25

Public comments on provisions of the 1985 Food Security Act, commonly referred to as the Farm Bill, will be accepted by th U.S. Department of Agriculture until October 25, 1986.

The Act affects farmers if they produce crops on highly erodible land without following an approved conservation plan or if they produce crops on converted wetlands.

The provisions, widely known as "Sodbuster." "Conservation Compliance," and "Swampbuster," deny many USDA farm program benefits under certain conditions.

Sodbuster applies to highly erodible land broken out of grassland or woodland and cultivated for crop production after December 23, 1985.

Conservation compliance, another part of the highly erodible land provision, applies to land that was planted to a crop at least one year during the years 1981-1985.


Sodbuster and Conservation Compliance require farmers who request certain USDA farm program benefits, and who are farming highly erodible land, to plan conservation plans approved by local conservation dis-

There is, however, a grace period for the Conservation Compliance provision. Farmers not using a conservation plan have until January 1, 1990, to develop and begin applying an approved plan. They have until January 1, 1995, to have all provisions of the plan in effect.

The other provision, Swampbuster, does not allow farmers to convert wetlands to croplands and remain eligible for USDA benefits regardless of whether or not they have an approved conservation plan.

The public comment period on the interim rules of the provisions will last until October 25, 1986. Comments should be addressed to Director, Cotton, Grain, and Rice, Price Support Division, ASCS-USDA, P.O. Box 2415, Washington, D.C. 02213, and they must be received by October 27, to be considered.

Additional information can be obtained from the Soil Conservation Service, the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, the Farmers Home Administration, or the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.


