

Clyde W. Patton **Clyde Patton Rites** Are Read Nov. 17


Clyde W. Patton, 74, died November 14, 2009. Mr. Patton was born July 29, 1935.




Sorry to hear about Cheryl Fraley's husband, Jeff Fraley, being hurt in an accident and taken to a hospital.

Economic Injury Loans for Small Businesses

Disaster Assistance Available for Small Businesses

Sacramento, CA - Small, nonfarm businesses in 192 Texas counties and neighboring counties in New Mexico and Oklahoma are now eligible to apply for low-interest disaster loans from the U. S. Small Businestdministration (SBA). Small, non-farm businesses, small agricultural cooperatives and most private, non-profit organizations of any size may qualify for Economic Injury Disaster Loans (EIDLs) of up to \$2 million to help meet financial obligations and operating expenses which could have been met had the disaster not occurred.

"Eligibility for these working capital loans is based on the financial impact of the disaster only and not on any actual property damage. These loans have an interest rate of 4%, a maximum term of 30 years, and are restricted to small businesses without the financial ability to offset the adverse impact without hardship," Judd added.

By law SBA makes EIDLs available when the U. S. Secretary of griculture designates an agricultural disaster. SecretaryTom Vilsack declared this disaster at the request of Governor Rick Perry.




