BOARD, COUNCIL ELECTIONS SET

CITY OF WHEELER

The voters in the City of Wheeler will go the polls Saturday, May 7, 1988, to elect a mayor and two councilmen. The mayor and one alderman are seeking re-election to their offices.

Mayor Wanda Herd is seeking her second term as mayor. Also on the ballot, seeking election for the 2-year term, is Louis Stas. Both names appeared on the ballot in 1986, when Herd unseated Stas from the office he had held for four years.

Don Rose, an incumbent in Place 2, is unopposed in his bid for re-election. Rose was elected to the council in 1986.

Two names have been placed on the ballot for Place 4 on the council. The position is presently held by Robert Jones; Jones received a job transfer and is not seeking re-election. Mark Frankenbery and Bob McCain on the ballot in Place 4. Frankenbery has served on the council previously. This will be McCain's first bid for the council.

CITY OF MOBEETIE

The voters in the city limits of Mobeetie will elect three members to their city council. Three places are to be filled and three names are on the ballot.

Don Moore, Marilyn Copeland and Jimmy Selby filed with the city office to have their names placed before the voters in the May 7, 1988, election.

WHEELER SCHOOL

The voters in the Wheeler Independent School District will go to the polls Saturday, May 7, 1988, to elect the individuals to the board of education. Two of the places open are for 3-year-terms and the third is for a 2-year unexpired term.

Bob Wills, former high school principal, filed with the board to seek position 4 on the board. Greg Smith expressed his interest in serving in this position, but withdrew his bid for the seat. Shari Porter is not seeking re-election to the board.

Richard Wallace and Mark Gill are seeking a place on the school board. Their names will appear as candidates for position 5. Delbert Thomas is not seeking re-election.

The 2-year-term on the board of trustees is being sought by Bill Morrison, minister of the Church of Christ. Mike Smith, an appointee to the board is not seeking election to the seat.

KELTON ISD

The Kelton I.S.D. Board of Education has called an election for Saturday, May 7, 1988. The election is to be held in the Kelton School Cafeteria with the polls open from 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. J. R. Hefley will serve as the judge for the election.

Two positions are to be filled for full three year terms, and two people have filed for the positions. Currently,

Billy Buckingham and Champ Davis hold the trustee positions; however, Buckingham has decided not to run for the place again. Champ Davis has filed for re-election, and Frank Allen has filed for the other position.

Absentee voting by personal appearance will be conducted in the Superintendent's Office at Kelton School beginning April 18, 1988 and continuing through May 3, 1988, from 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. Applications for absentee voting by mail may be obtained by writing to the following: Kelton I.S.D.

ALLISON SCHOOL

Voters in the Allison Independent School District will have the opportunity to elect four members to the board of trustees. Three full terms on the board are to be filled and a one-year unexpired term is open.

Seven individuals have filed to have their names on the May 7, 1988 ballot as candidates for the three full-terms. The incumbents in the election are Hiram Bogert, Bevard Dukes and Vance Boydston. The four other individuals wishing an opportunity to serve on the board are Winston Rainey, John Huff, Cletes Green and Dean Keyes.

Three names appear on the ballot for the one-year position. They are Jim Donaldson, Danny Miller and Richard Kiker. This place is open following the resignation of Bob Dukes.

BRISCOE SCHOOL

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Wheeler Mustangs Win 6th Consecutive District Meet

The Wheeler Mustangs won their sixth consecutive District Championship in track this past weekend in Booker.

The Mustangs totaled 208 points to runner-up Follett's 115 points. Booker totaled 99, Higgins 51, and Kelton 17.

Eight individuals qualified for Regional competition by placing either 1st or 2nd in 17 qualifying places.

Richard Smith scored 42 points in the meet by claiming 2 gold, 2 silver, and a bronze medal. Richard won the 110 m. HH with his personal best of 15.3, won the high jump competition with a leap of 6'2", placed 2nd in the discus and shot put with throws of 148'3" and 49'5½", and placed 3rd in the pole vault, with only 1 jump in the

competition at 9'.

Bubba Smith scored 41 points, by winning the discus competition with his personal best of 176'10", a new district record. Bubba also won the shot put with a toss of 52'4¼".

Bubba placed 2nd in the 110 HH with a time of 15.5, and tied for 2nd in the high jump with a jump of 5'10". A leap of 20'3" placed 3rd in the long jump.

David Jones scored 30 pts. by winning the 400 m dash in 52.9, a personal best, and as a member of the 1st place 1600 m relay, 2nd place 400 m relay, and a 4th place finish in the long jump, with a leap of 20'¾".

Chad Bentley scored a total of 23 points, by winning the 800 m dash with a best of 2:07 placing 2nd in the 1600 m run with his best of the year 4:57. Chad also ran the anchor leg of the 1600 m relay which placed 1st.

Grayson Benson placed 2nd in the 200 m dash with a personal best of 23.2, and ran legs on the 1st place 1600 m relay and the 2nd place 400 m relay.

Freshman Kelly Aderholt had a good day, by placing 2nd in the 400 m dash, with his personal best of 53.6, and running also a leg on each of the relays.

Alfredo Gonzales qualified for Regional in the 3200 m run, with a time of 11:42, and placed 6th in the 1600 m run with a time of 5:21.

Jeff Morrison brought home the bronze medal in the 3200 m Run with his personal best of 11:50, and placed 5th in the 1600m run with a time of 5:30.

Travis Hughes won the 3rd place medal in the 800 m dash with a time of 2:22.

Justin Hughes, placed 4th in the 300 m. hurdles, with his personal best of 44.

Jason Sheets had a personal best of 37' in the shot put, to place 6th, and placed 5th in the discus with a throw of 108'6".

Shawn Bradstreet ran his personal best of 11.9 to place 5th in the 100 m dash.

Michael List ran a 12:14 in the 3200 m run to place 6th in that event.

The 1600 m relay team of Jones, Benson, Aderholt, and Bentley ran their best of the year, a 3:35.7 to capture 1st place.

The 400 m relay also ran their best of the year, with a time of 46.3. Members of the relay team are Shane Guest, Jones, Aderholt, and Benson.

The Mustangs will compete in the Elk City Relays this Friday in preparation for the Regional Meet to be held in Levelland on April 29 and 30. The Elk City Relays begin at 2:00 p.m. with the finals run later in the evening.

Instruction In Beef Referendum Vote

Following instructions when voting in the upcoming Beef Referendum is important, particularly regarding absentee voting.

Voting in the referendum will take place in county Extension offices during normal business hours on May 10, points out Don King, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the Texas A&M University System.

However, producers and beef importers who are unable to vote in person may request an absentee ballot from Dr. Milo Shult, Beef Referendum State Extension Coordinator, System Building 105A, Texas A&M University, College Station, Texas 77843; telephone: 409-845-7907.

Absentee ballots will be available through April 29 and must be marked and returned to the county Extension office serving the county of voter residence by the close of business on May 3, says King.

When requesting an absentee ballot, an individual must provide his or her name or name of company if voting for a business, mailing address, telephone number and county of residence or the county where the business headquarters is located.

Once the absentee ballot is received, it's important to read the accompanying instructions and to follow them properly. King emphasizes. The absentee voter must return the ballot to the county Extension office in the county of residence or location of business headquarters. The ballot must be in the special envelope that is provided and the voter must put his or her name and address on the outside of that envelope. Failure to follow these procedures will make the vote invalid.

Eligible voters are all producers and importers of cattle who owned for acquired cattle, beef or beef products during the period of October 1, 1986 through March 31 of 1988. This includes 4-H, FFA and other youth who owned cattle during the designated period of time, King points out.

Ballots will be counted by the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service. The ASCS also will determine eligibility of challenged voters and ballots, and report referendum results.

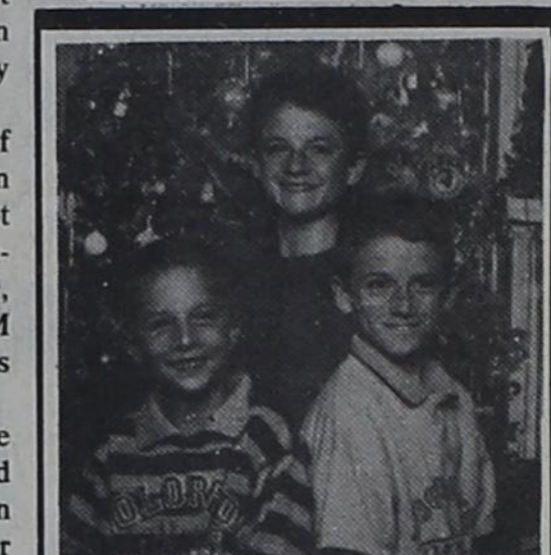

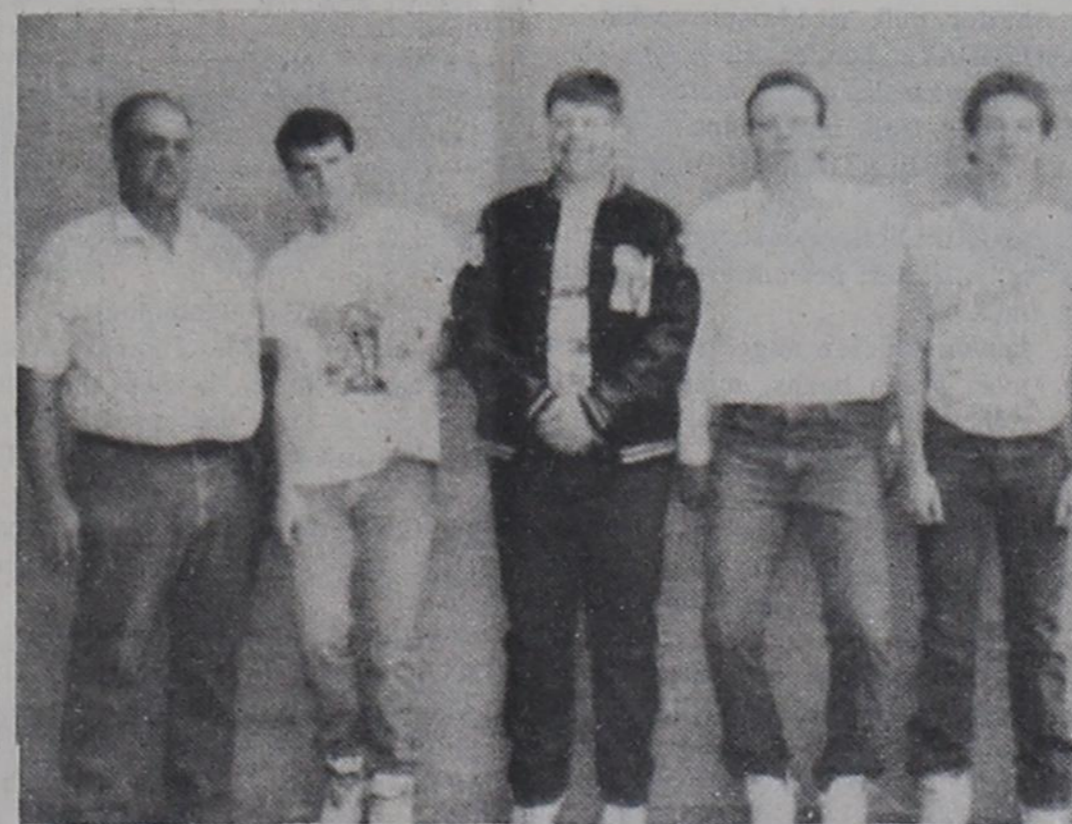

Greenbelt Electric Annual Meeting Apr.22

The 49th annual meeting of the members of Greenbelt Electric Cooperative will be held Friday, April 22, in the Bura Handley Community Center in Wellington. The meeting will get under way at 1:30 p.m. with registration of members and guest.
The agenda for the meeting includes election of three directors, business centering on the financial standing of the Cooperative, and drawing of members' names for attendance prizes.
This year members will elect directors from Districts 3, 6, and 7 to serve three year terms. District 3 is composed of all of Collingsworth County North of the Salt Fork River. District 6 includes all of Donley County West of Highway 70 and District 7 is all of Donley County East of Highway 70.
In early April, each member will receive by mail a notice of the meeting, along with the Co-op's annual report. Everyone is encouraged to look over the report before the meeting since the financial statements in the report will be reviewed during the business session. Directors, management, and employees of GEC will be at the meeting to answer any questions that any member may have concerning the Cooperative.
The annual membership meeting dates back to the very beginning of Greenbelt Electric Cooperative. The founding directors, back in 1938, felt the members should have a specific opportunity each year to learn more about their organization and to participate in a forum in which they could get answers to any questions about the Cooperative. The directors felt the annual meeting was so important to the success of the Cooperative that the bylaws of the Cooperative were written to provide for such a meeting.
Greenbelt Electric Cooperative was established as a nonprofit organization to bring electricity to rural communities which were lighted by kerosene lamps and heated with wood, places where water was pumped by hand.
Before the Cooperative was established, the existing power companies refused to serve the rural areas because they felt the expense involved in building electric lines would outweigh the return they would receive in electricity sales.
Greenbelt Electric resulted when concerned rural people of the area realized that if they were ever to have electric service they would have to provide it themselves.
Today, as when it was founded, Greenbelt observes basic cooperative principles in its operation.
*Each member, no matter how much electricity he or she purchases, has one vote.
*Nonprofit operation with affordable electric service to members is the primary objective.
All members are encouraged to mark their calendars today to be at this year's annual meeting April 22. Without members' involvement and concern, Greenbelt Electric cannot continue serving as it has since 1938.

SWCD, said that while farmers and ranchers know that good conservation practices help increase yields and improve their profit potential, they also know the importance of passing on well-cared-for natural resources for future food producers. "We could give our children all the money in the world, but it would do them little good unless we also give them a productive soil on which to live," said Zybach.

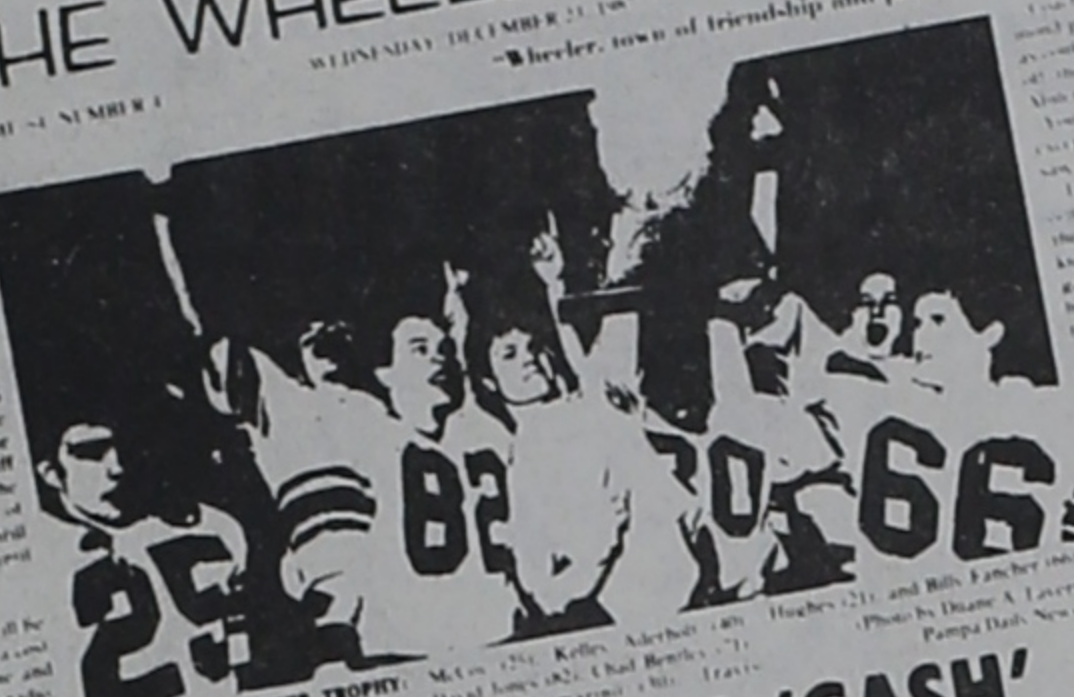

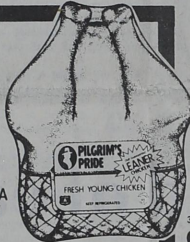
