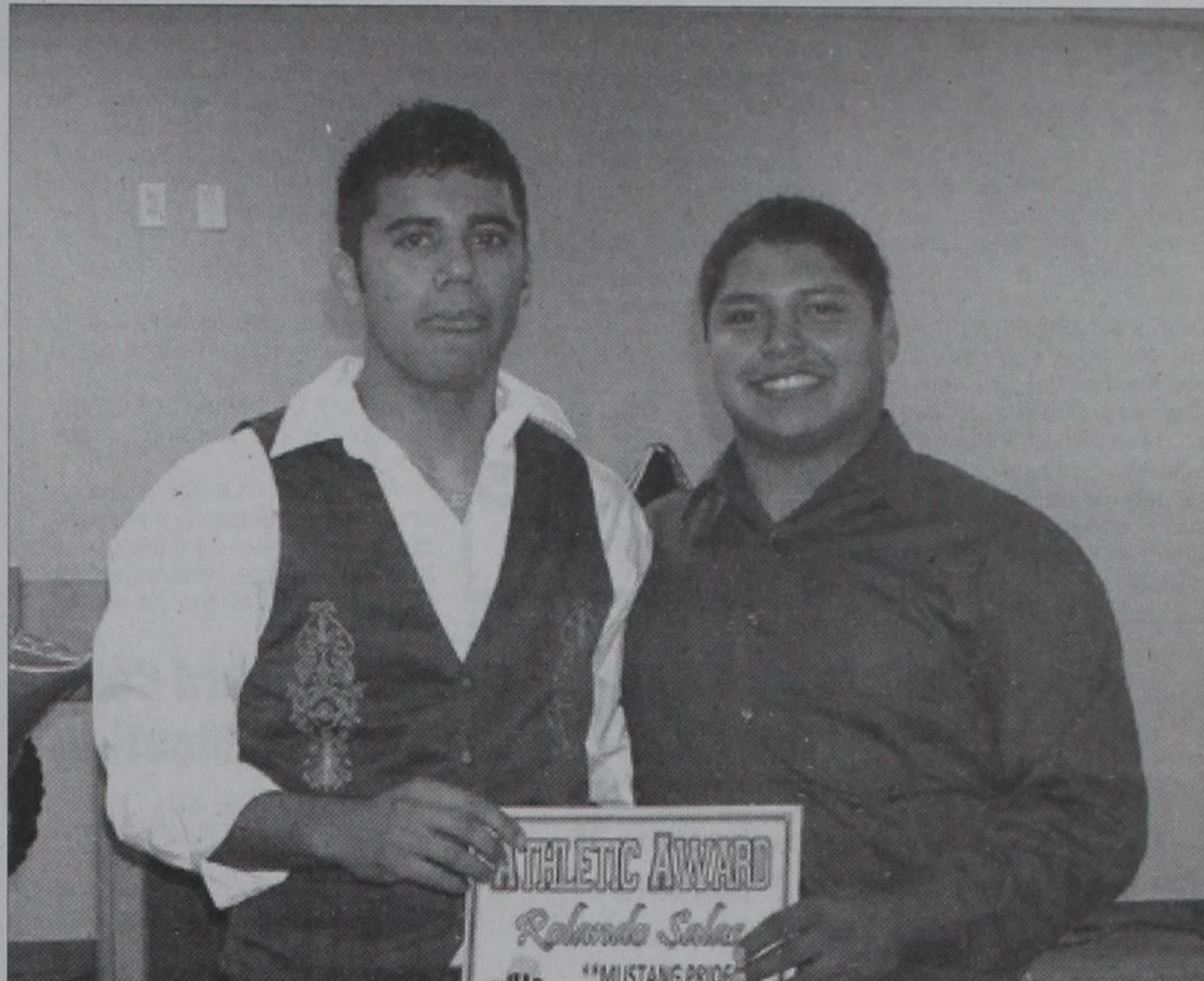

Randy McCurley made a motion to approve the March minutes as presented. Lanette Lewis seconded. Motion carried.

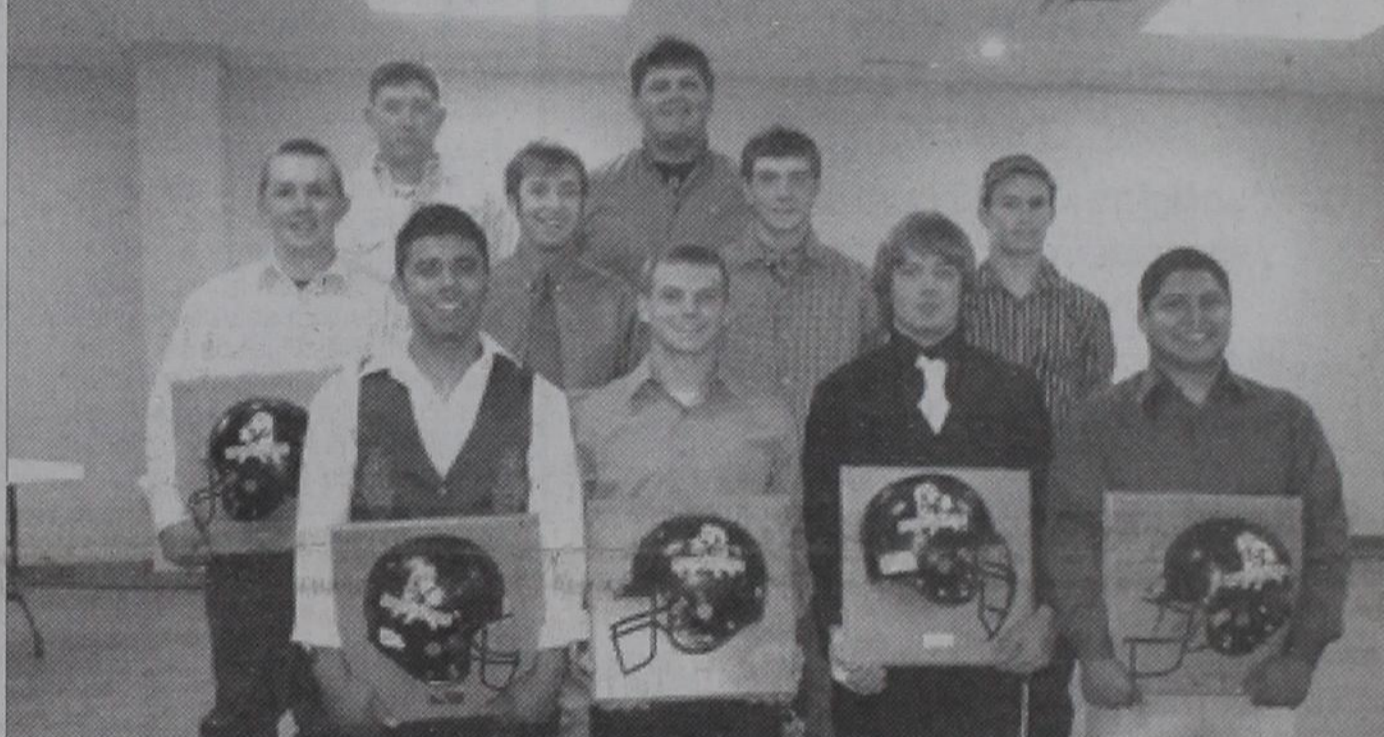

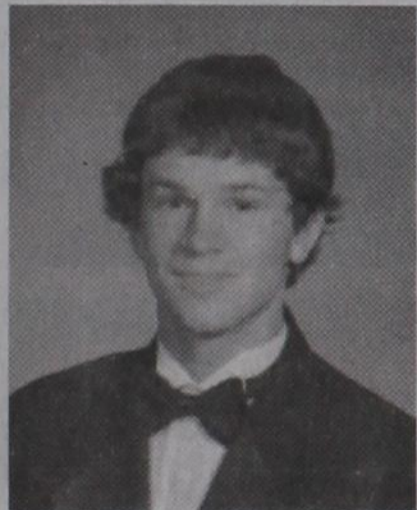
Wheeler Ex-Students and Teachers Association Bi-Annual Reunion Saturday, June 11, 2011

OLD TIMES NOT FORGOTTEN

"DONKEY" BALLGAMES

It would be my guess, not many people nowadays, have ever heard of "donkey ballgames." There really was such a thing. Some people made a living, traveling around the country with their donkeys that they would furnish to a school, or group who wanted to try playing basketball, or baseball while riding them. I remember them coming to Wheeler two different times. The first time, we were going to have a donkey basketball game. Since I was about fifteen or sixteen at the time, this seemed to be right down my alley. How hard could it be to just shoot in a basket while riding a donkey?

First of all, they required us to get a parent to sign a release form in order for us to ride. That wasn't really much of a problem, I just got one of the girls in my class to sign it for me.

When the night arrived for the game, we were each issued a donkey to ride. The rules were that you had to be on the donkey to shoot at the basket. If the ball fell to the floor, you would get off, pick up the ball, get back on your donkey and ride toward your goal. You could either shoot, or pass to a team mate.

Getting back on while holding the basketball in one hand, wasn't easy. For one thing, the donkeys were getting pretty tired of that game. Every time I tried to get on mine, it would crow-hop a little. The only way I could get back on, was to jump on with the ball in one hand, my belly on his back, then try to swing my leg over. Consequently, the next day my belly felt like I'd been run over by a truck!

The following year, we had a donkey "baseball" game. As I remember... when batting, you'd hit the ball, then get on your donkey to ride around the bases. The fielders had to be on their donkeys when they threw the ball. It was a lot easier to get "aboard" with a baseball in your hand, than a basketball.

I don't expect to see this sport make a "come back" in the near future, but I sure would like for it to. It was a lot of fun and entertainment.

New State Law To Help Get Doctors

A new Texas law recently passed by the Legislature and enacted by Governor Rick Perry on Thursday May 12, 2011 will assist with the recruiting of more physicians into much of rural Texas. The new law removes a 100 year old barrier to employing physicians and will now allow most rural hospitals, including Parkview Hospital the option of making a physician an employee of the hospital.

Texas is one of six (6) states remaining in the country with a strict rule against physicians being employees, except in certain circumstances such as in the medical schools. With more and more physicians wanting the financial stability of being an employee with a steady paycheck, insurance, and retirement, the antiquated law has deterred some physicians from rural Texas who historically have chosen larger urban areas with greater financial comfort. Many of the physicians are not interested in operating their own medical practice and assuming the risk that goes with it, especially with the lower patient volume experienced in many rural communities.

The demand from physicians for employment will also grow in the future. In fact, a survey of Texas medical students revealed that as many as 75% of the future Texas doctors in the areas of Family and Internal Medicine desire to be an employee rather than operate their own medical practice.

Ann Fagan Cook, RN, BSN, Chief Executive Officer of Parkview Hospital said "this new law is a great step in enhancing access to health care in our community. The option to offer financially secure employment at the hospital is one more tool to recruiting more doctors. This will clearly put us on a more level playing field with larger cities in Texas."

"Of course, not all physicians will want to be an employee of a hospital and will still have the option to have their own independent medical practice" added David Pearson, CEO and President of the Texas Organization of Rural & Community Hospitals. Pearson further said "recruiting young doctors to rural Texas can be very challenging and we need to give them the options they want — even employment. Removing the old antiquated law will help. This is not the ultimate solution but it is a big step forward."

Don McBeath, also with the Texas Organization of Rural & Community Hospitals, worked extensively on the new legislation and stated "This new law also holds protections to assure that the employed physician's independent medical judgment is maintained as well as the doctor-patient relationship. The point of the new law is to give physicians the working environment they most prefer to get them to rural Texas and to work with our rural hospitals in a way that enhances health care access."

The new law, known as Senate Bill 894, was sponsored in the Texas Legislature by State Senator Robert Duncan of Lubbock and Representative Garnet Coleman of Houston.

The new legislation was also supported by the Texas Hospital Association and the Texas Medical Association.

Comm. Court Holds Reg. Meeting Mon.

The Commissioners' Court of Wheeler County, Texas, met in regular session on Monday, May 23, 2011, at 9:00 a.m. in the Commissioners' Courtroom of the Wheeler County Courthouse, 401 Main Street, Wheeler, Texas, to consider prior bills and discuss matters of mutual concern.

At 10:00 a.m., the court addressed 13 items on the agenda.

The hourly payroll time sheets were approved for payment as presented.

The court voted to pay the bills as approved.

No action was taken on the budget.

There was no action on the burn ban, which remains in effect.

No county office reports were presented for the court's approval.

Brittany Hernandez, representing Cross Country Transmission, met with the court to report on the progress of the line across Wheeler County. The materials have been received and construction is set to start in September of this year and completion is set for 2012. Court hearings are set for the last of May or the first of June.

Marty Smith with Texas Department of Transportation met with the council to inform the commissioners of the replacement of a bridge on CR 14. The bridge qualifies for the government's bridge replacement program; the federal government will pay 80% of the cost, the state pays 10% and the county pays 10%. The county is to pay or do "in-kind" work in the amount of the 10%.

Precinct 1 Commissioner, Daryl Snelgrooves, asked for the place-

Parkview Artery Over The Counter Pain Killers

When a headache, fever or muscle pain strikes, what do you do? Chances are, you open the medicine cabinet and reach for a painkiller or fever reducer like acetaminophen (Tylenol), ibuprofen (Advil) or acetylsalicylic acid (aspirin). These over-the-counter (OTC) analgesics are widely available, relatively inexpensive and, in many cases, they work wonders in relieving minor aches and pains. In fact, aspirin, acetaminophen, and ibuprofen are the three most commonly used drugs in the United States. Let's look at acetaminophen. Statistics reveal that almost 500 deaths per year occur as a result of over-dosage of acetaminophen.

Just to inform, let's look at the liver and the effect certain drugs (like acetaminophen) have on it.

Your liver is one of the most important organs in your body, and the largest in your abdomen. Its reddish color is due to its ability to contain a pint of blood at any one time. Every time we eat, breathe, drink or absorb anything, the liver is responsible for detoxifying, integrating, secreting, storing, digesting and many other processes to provide a homeostasis or balance to the rest of your body.

When your liver fails, all of the many wonderful things it does for your body fails too; the body goes out of balance, out of whack, and you could die. Several diseases lead to chronic liver failure, the major one being alcohol abuse. However, sometimes your liver becomes sick and dies suddenly. This is known as acute liver failure.

The most common form of acute liver failure is Tylenol overdosing. A longer, but more scientific name for Tylenol is acetaminophen. The longer name is important as most drugs which contain Tylenol, do not contain the word Tylenol, but Acetaminophen; therefore, it is important to be accustomed to this longer, but more prevalent word. Eight billion pills are sold annually to Americans, and it continues to be the most popular pain killer in the United States. However, not all is "Rosy" with this seemingly innocent drug. Statistics reveal that almost 500 deaths per year occur as a result of over-dosages, and 50,000 visits to the emergency room happen. Over 50% of these overdoses are accidental. They occurred as the person had absolutely no idea of the dosing limits per day of this drug.

Of heightened concern is that Acetaminophen may now be produced in 750 mg tablets, and also be mint flavored. How many more cases of liver failure which may result from this seemingly innocuous drug is unknown at this time; but more deaths are likely. Children are at higher risk, as their livers are smaller, and the amount of Acetaminophen ingested is also smaller. Therefore, extreme caution is needed when administering this drug to a child (Never give Acetaminophen to a child under 2 years old without a doctor's order!).

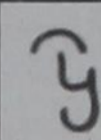

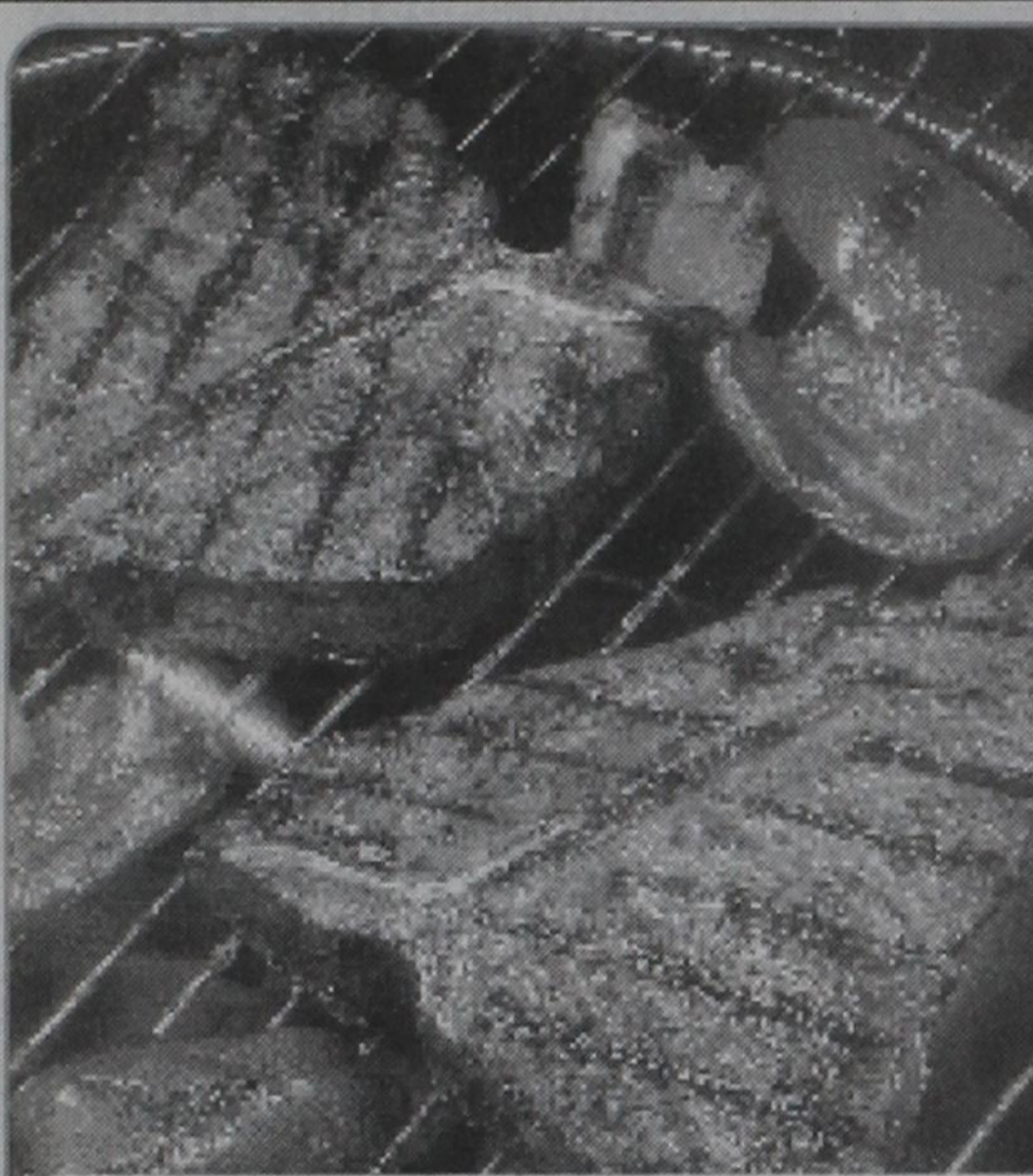
