Wheeler Volunteer Fire Department was called to a grass fire in southwest Wheeler County on Wednesday, May 25, 2011. The cause of the 12:48 p.m. fire was downed power lines; the fire had started at the west end of Co. Rd. M.
Fighting against high winds at 8:30 p.m. after approximately 1,000 acres of pasture had been destroyed, the fire was brought under control.
There were no injuries, but a Wheeler fire truck suffered major damage in the fire when ashes were apparently sucked under the

hood, resulting in a fire, which burned the wiring and air filter and may have resulted in the destruction of the engine.

Input received will allow the Local Work Group to make recommendations on resource concerns to be addressed, eligible practices, and ranking for county based funding. These recommendations will be used in implementing the Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP) and other conservation programs offered by NRCS.
The 2008 Farm Bill stipulates that conservation programs must continue to be locally led. Through stake holder meetings, the public is given an opportunity to help local conservation leaders set program priorities. These meetings are open to the public.

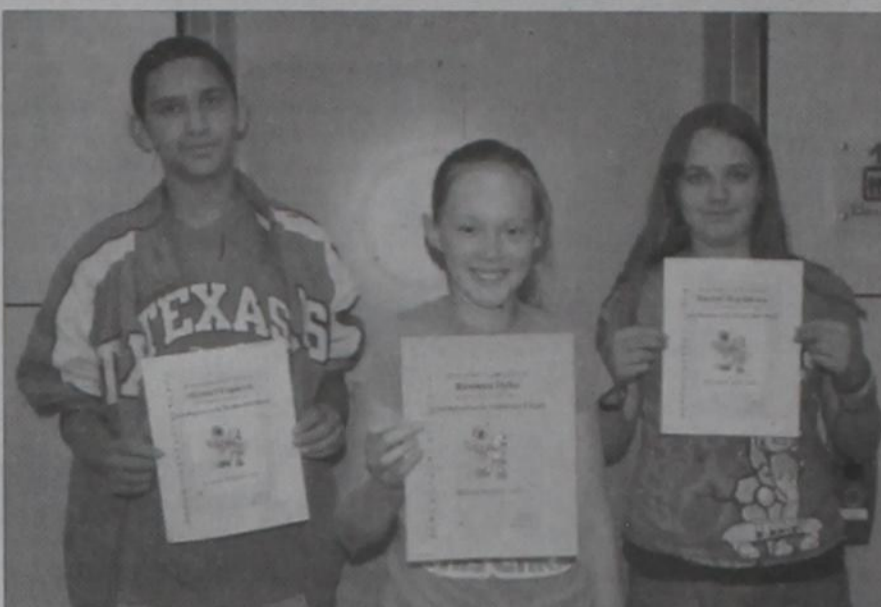

OLD TIMES NOT FORGOTTEN

Go-Devils & Wiggle-Tail Cultivators

I've always been fascinated by old, horse-drawn farm equipment, but I came by this honest... my dad, was too.

I'll attempt to explain what these two plows looked like and how they worked. The "Go-Devil," was the one I was most familiar with, because a lot of farmers had taken them to the blacksmith shop (where I liked to hang out some) and had them adapted to fit the three-point hitch on a tractor. They were essentially a two-row sled, with two runners made of 2x6's. There were two boards on each side that would straddle the rows of usually, cotton or maize. Behind the boards was a metal fender that could be raised or lowered, to keep the dirt from covering up the small plants. On each side of the fenders was a small plow that could also be adjusted to furnish the correct amount of dirt to the fenders.

Most of the farmers who had one adapted to a tractor, usually left the seat on it, making it right in the center between the rows...

almost forgot, there were some flat, sharp, knives that attached to the boards and would slide along just under the dirt and would cut the roots of weeds, killing them. This was a really precision piece of machinery. As usual, I've probably "over-explained" a little on this, so I'll try to do better on the "wiggle-tail cultivator." This was a two-wheeled, one-row plow, with a seat right above the row. Seems like there were two "sweeps" on each side, to move some of the dirt towards the row and to kill weeds. The reason it was called a "wiggle-tail," was because it had a foot pedal on each side of the row. If needed, you could move the plows sideways a few inches with your feet.

All this isn't just about the plows, but also, about the people. This was my grand-parents generation...and back. I can't imagine what it would be like to get up in the morning, harness up the horses, hook them to the plow, then face an eighty acre field. I don't know how much they could have plowed in a day, but I'm sure it wouldn't be much more than five acres. I think our ancestors must have been a lot tougher than me, but since that was the way life was at the time, to them...it was just normal. Back then, families could survive on eighty acres in cultivation, along with a few cows, hogs and chickens. A "well" to draw water from, or a creek near by. Old dead tree's for firewood, or even the dried cow patties would do. The out-house not far away with different kinds of "make-do" toilet paper. A lantern to get you through the darkest of nights and the list goes on....

It kind of makes me sad to see all the "old farm houses" falling down, knowing there probably were several generations of families raised there...each with a story.

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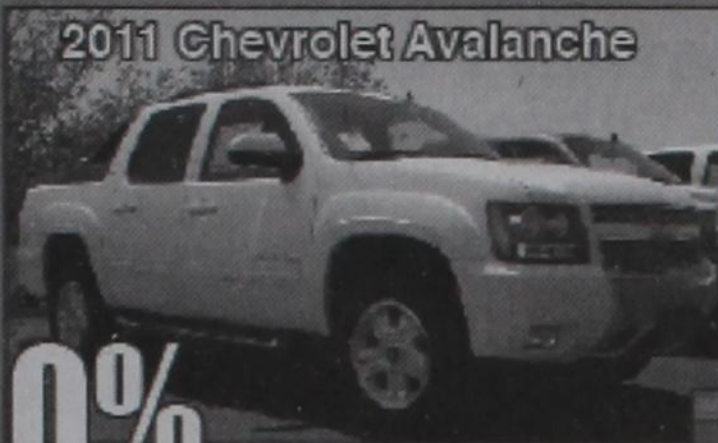

Parkview Artery Like 9-1-1, most people understand what CPR is.

Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation is the one thing that most anyone can do to help save a life.

As a lot of people have been taught, it was ABC (airway, breathing, chest compressions). This was the standard used over the last few decades. But now the new line of defense against someone that has collapsed, or who does not appear to be breathing is the chest compressions, airway, breathing, or C-A-B. New science indicates the following order:

- Check the patient for responsiveness.
 - Check for breathing or no normal breathing.
 - Call for help.
 - Check for pulse for no longer than 10 seconds.
 - Give 30 compressions
 - Open airway and give 2 breaths.
 - Resume compressions
- Compressions should be initiated within 10 seconds of recognition of the arrest. Compressions should be given at a rate of at least 100/min. Each set of 30 compressions should take approximately 18 seconds or less. Compression depths are as follows:
- Adults: at least 2 inches (5cm)
 - Children: at least one third the depth of the chest, approximately 2 inches(5cm)
 - Infants: at least one third the depth of the chest, approximately 1 Ω inches (4cm)

Also something that most of us know is the tune "Stayin Alive" from the 70's. Humming the song helps keep pace with the compressions. Both the message of the title and the mechanics of the music support the CPR message.

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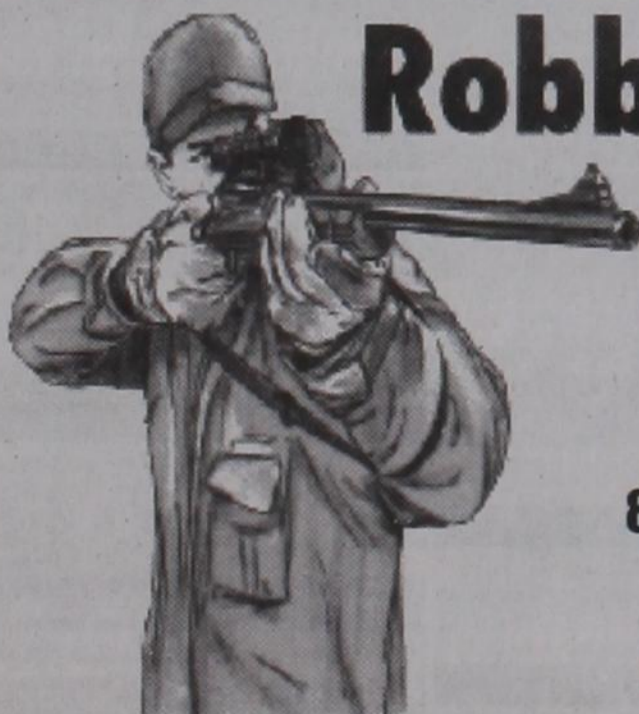

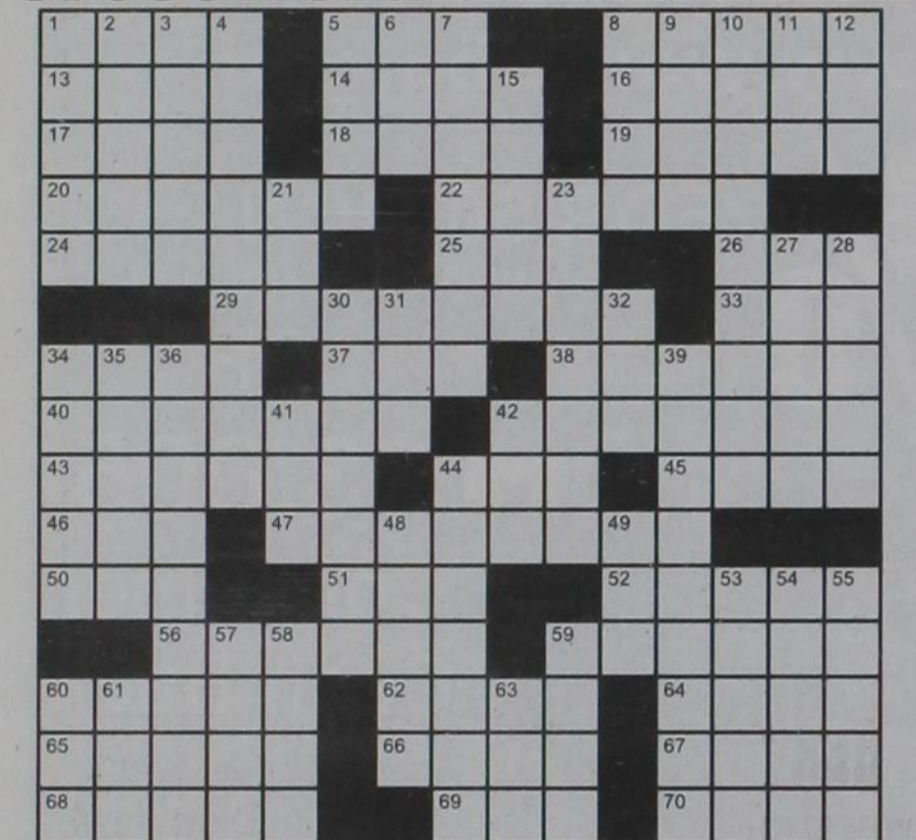

April 27, 1961. And, two half-gallon cartons of ice cream was \$1.

The Wheeler swimming pool was preparing to open according to the May 4, 1960, edition of the paper. "Thomas Helton has decided not to manage the pool this year." The manager for the summer of 1960 was not named at that time.

At that time, Wheeler was trying to secure a dentist and a pharmacist.

Farmers' Home Administration announced housing loans to farmers who produced at least \$400 worth of commodities for sale or home use, based on 1944 prices.

The final edition of "The Corral", the school paper for 1960-61, listed Corral staff as Bill Pearce, editor; Dot Hall, Fran Borden, Francis Cole, Ray Owens, Mary Ann Bradstreet, Kelley Bowles, Bill Green and Jerry Burgess as reporters; Kitty Hibler, Barbara Barton and Carolyn Sims as typists and Mrs. Davis and Mr. Killingsworth as advisors.

1961-62 Student Council officers were installed. Officers are G. C. Baker, president; Richard Hampton, vice president; Kelly Bowles, secretary and Carol Gandy, chaplain.

LaVera Ann Lewis became the bride of Jerry Killingsworth.

Wheeler Drive-In Theatre opened for the season with a free movie, "Dog's Best Friend".

H&B Appliance offered a "Mobile Maid" dishwasher for \$199.95.

Property Tax Protest and Appeal Procedures

The law gives property owners the right to protest actions concerning their property tax appraisals. You may follow these appeal procedures if you have a concern about:

- the market or appraised value of your property
- the unequal appraisal of your property
- the inclusion of your property on the appraisal roll
- any exemptions that may apply to you
- the qualification for an agricultural or timber appraisal
- the taxable status of your property
- the local governments which should be taxing your property
- the ownership of property
- the change of use of land receiving special appraisal
- any action taken by the chief appraiser, appraisal district or appraisal review board that applies to and adversely affects you.

Review by the Appraisal Review Board

If you can't resolve your problem informally with the county appraisal district (CAD) staff, you may have your case heard by the appraisal review board (ARB).

The ARB is an independent board of citizens that reviews problems with appraisals or other concerns listed above. It has the power to order the CAD to make the necessary changes to solve problems. If you file a written request for an ARB hearing (called a notice of protest) before the deadline, the ARB will set your case for a hearing. You'll receive written notice of the time, date and place of the hearing. If necessary, you may request a hearing in the evening or on a Saturday or Sunday. Prior to your hearing, you may ask to review the evidence the CAD plans to introduce at the hearing to establish any matter at issue. The CAD might ask you for a copy of the evidence you plan to present. The law provides that before a hearing on a protest or immediately after the hearing begins, you or your agent and the CAD shall each provide the other with a copy of any written material intended to be offered or submitted to the ARB at the hearing. To the greatest extent practicable, the hearing will be informal. You or a designated agent may appear in person to present evidence or you may send notarized evidence for the ARB to review at your hearing. The CAD representative will present evidence about your case. You may cross-examine the CAD representative. The ARB will make its decision based on the evidence presented. In most cases, the CAD has the burden of establishing the property's value by a preponderance of the evidence presented.

In certain protests where the owner has submitted an independent appraisal before the hearing, the chief appraiser has the burden of proving the property's value by clear and convincing evidence. You can get a copy of a protest form from the appraisal district office at

Note: You shouldn't try to contact ARB members outside of the hearing. The law requires ARB members to sign an affidavit saying that they haven't talked about your case before the ARB hears it.

Review by the District Court or an Arbitrator or SOAH

After it decides your case, the ARB must send you a copy of its order by certified mail. If you're not satisfied with the decision, you have the right to appeal. If you choose to go to court, you must start the process by filing a petition within 60 days of the date you receive the ARB's order. In certain cases, as an alternative to filing an appeal in district court, you may file, not later than the 45th day after you receive notice of the ARB order, a request for binding arbitration with the county appraisal district. In certain cases originating in certain counties, as an alternative to filing an appeal in district court, you may appeal to the State Office of Administrative Hearings (SOAH). An appeal to SOAH is initiated by, not later than the 30th day after you receive notice of the ARB's order, filing with the chief appraiser of the county appraisal district a notice of appeal with the applicable filing fee.

Tax Payment

You must pay either the amount of taxes due on the portion of the taxable value not in dispute or the amount of taxes due on the property under the order from which the appeal is taken.

Deadline for Filing Protests with the ARB*

Usual Deadline

On or before May 31 (or 30 days after a notice of appraised value was mailed to you, whichever is later).

Late protests are allowed if you miss the usual deadline for good cause. Good cause is some reason beyond your control, like a medical emergency. The ARB decides whether you have good cause.

Late protests are due the day before the ARB approves records for the year. Contact your appraisal district for more information.

Special Deadlines

(For change of use (the appraisal district informed you that you are losing agricultural appraisal because you changed the use of your land), the deadline is not later than the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

*The deadline is postponed to the next business day if it falls on a weekend or holiday.

For ARB changes (the ARB has informed you of a change that increases your tax liability and the change didn't result from a protest you filed), the deadline is not later than the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

(You may insert deadline for protests concerning omitted property if doing so would avoid taxpayer confusion.)

If you believe the appraisal district or ARB should have sent you a notice and did not, you may file a protest until the day before taxes become delinquent (usually February 1) or no later than the 125th day after the date you claim you received a tax bill from one or more of the taxing units that tax your property. The ARB decides whether it will hear your case based on evidence about whether a required notice was mailed to you.

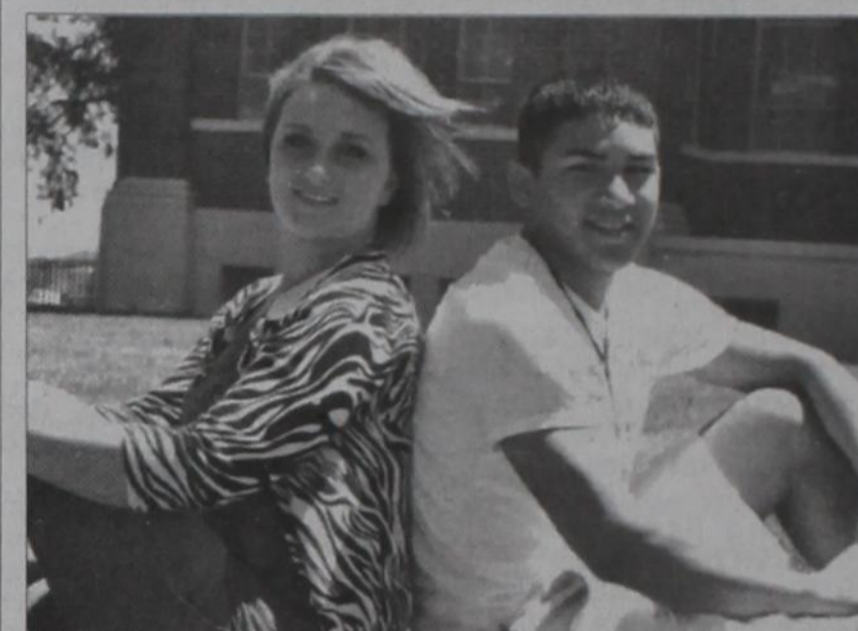

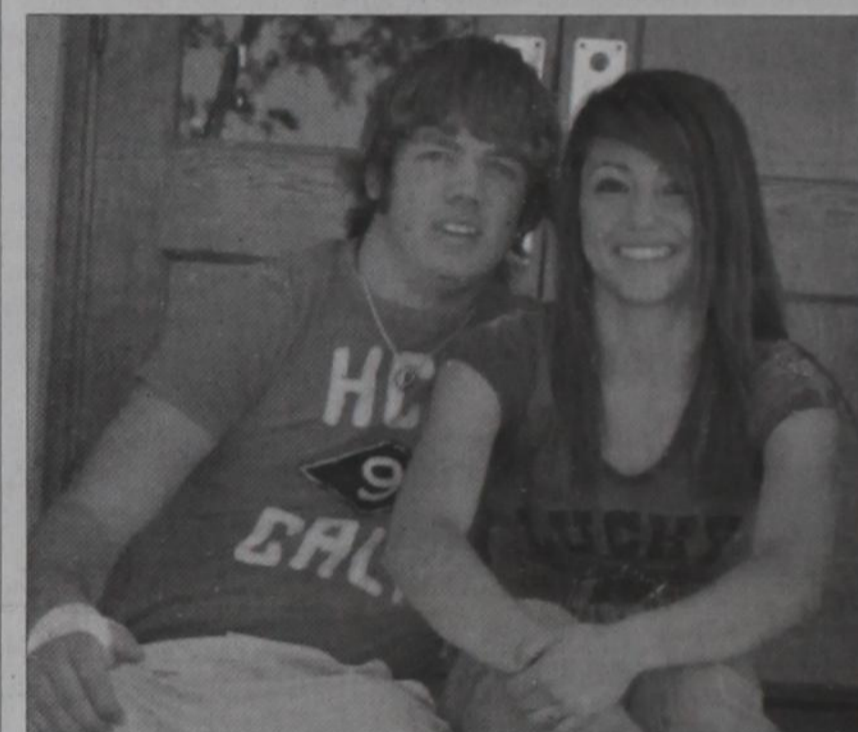

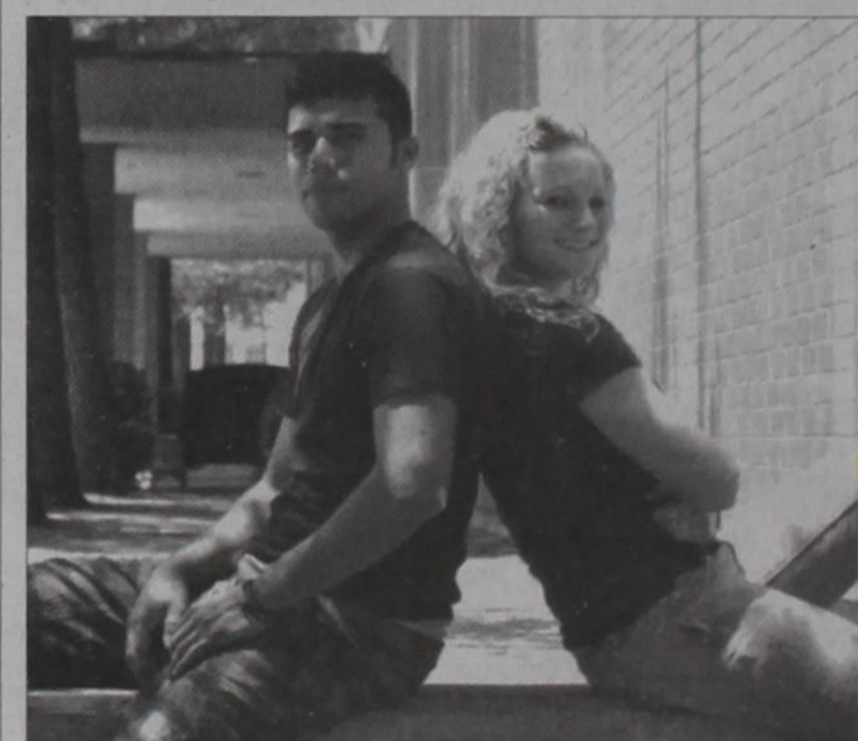

Under state law, the dollar amount of school taxes imposed on the residence homestead of a person 65 years of age or older or of the surviving spouse of such a person, if the surviving spouse was 55 years of age or older when the person died, may not be increased above the amount paid in the first year after the person turned 65, regardless of changes in tax rate or property value.

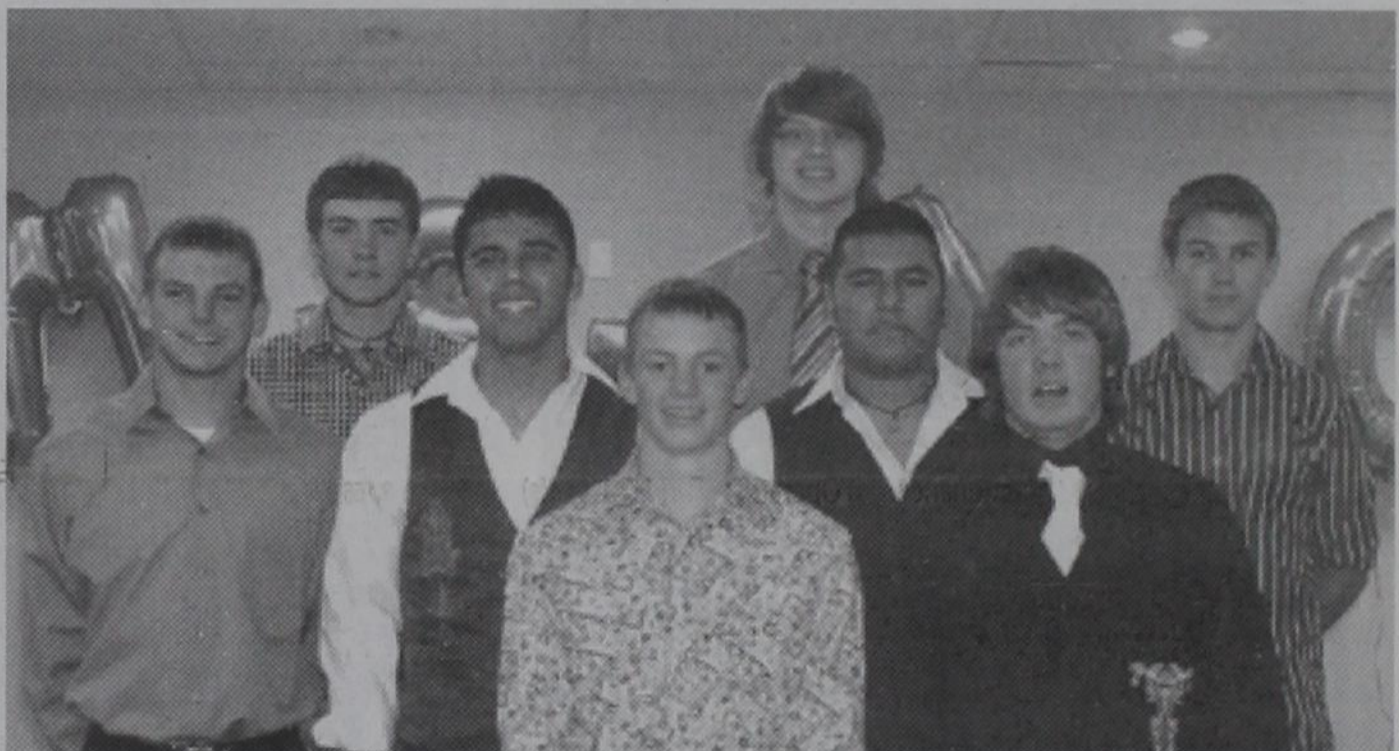

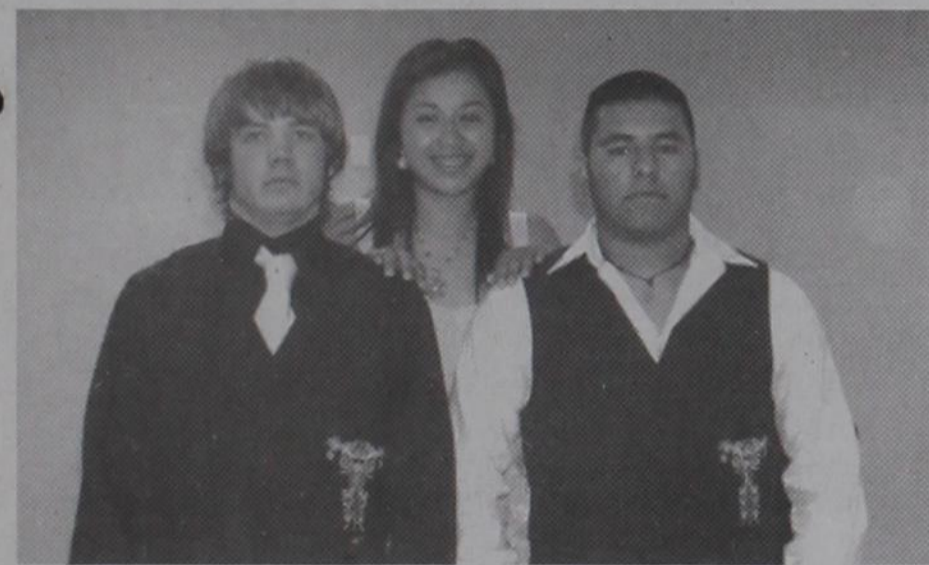

READY, SET, GO!
READY. Prepare for the possibility of a wildland fire before the threat occurs. Take preventive actions to make your home safer from the threat of wildfire by using Firewise and similar principles (firewise.org).
- Remove combustible materials from around your home. Keep grass mowed short.
SET. Elevate your family's

awareness when fire weather occurs or when wildland fire activity increases. Form a family disaster plan.
- Agree on an evacuation plan that includes what to do if you get separated and where you'll go in case of evacuation.
- Pack critical medicines, important documents, family heirlooms to be ready to leave at a moment's notice.
GO. This is the simplest step: Execute your disaster plan by leaving early, well before the fire arrives.
- **If instructed to evacuate, do so!** Your "stuff" isn't more important than your LIFE.

TEN SIMPLE STEPS TO PROTECT YOUR HOME FROM WILDLAND FIRE
Wildfire can strike home if you have not taken some steps to protect your house and property. The actions and precautions listed below are designed to help you prepare your home and lessen the threat of wildland fire damage to you and your property.
1. LPG tanks should be far enough away from buildings for valves to be shut off in case of fire. Keep area around the tank clear of flammable vegetation.
2. Store gasoline in an approved safety can away from occupied buildings.
3. All combustibles such as firewood, wooden picnic tables, boats and stacked lumber should

be kept away from structures.
4. Clear roof surfaces and gutters regularly to avoid build-up of flammable materials such as leaves and other debris.
5. Remove branches from trees to a height of 15 feet or more.
6. In rural areas, clear a fuel break of at least three times the fuel length around all structures.
7. Have fire tools handy such as: ladder long enough to reach your roof, shovel, rake and a bucket or two for water.
8. Place connected garden hoses at all sides of your home for emergency use.
9. Assume that you and your family know all emergency exits from your home.
10. Assume that you and your family know all emergency exits from your neighborhood.

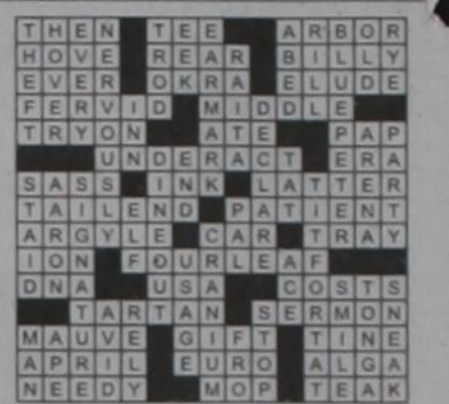

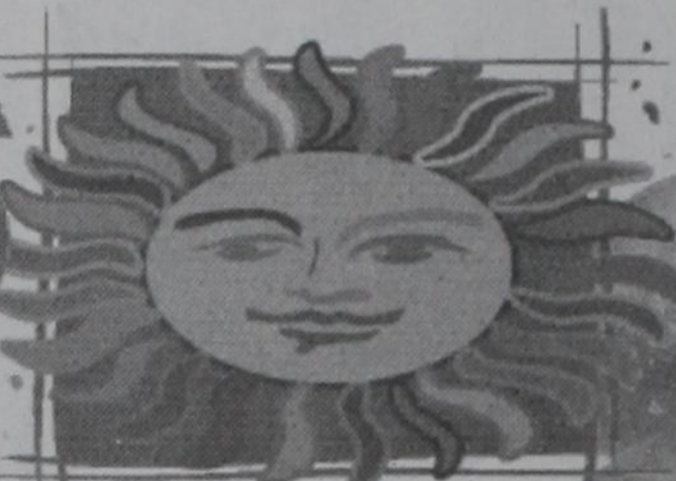
