Muleshoe United Fund Goes Over The Top

*Cotton Acres Increase Here For Next Year

According to figures released this week Bailey County's 1964 Cotton Allotment has been increased over that of 1963.

Cotton allotment reports received from the Texas State Stabilization and Conservation Committee offices reveal an increase here of 834 acres for the coming year.

This years original cotton planting allotment was 94,855 acres. Next year the county will be allowed 95,-689 acres, according to the report.

Increases were also granted Parmer, Deaf Smith, Lamb and Castro counties as well as others over the High Plains.
