Public Hearing-Revenue Sharing Funds: No taxpayer attended.

Budget Adopted: 1985-1986: Commissioner Henderson motioned, seconded by Commissioner Hanner to adopt the budget as submitted by Wendell Morgan, County Judge and Ron Gowdy, County Auditor. A unanimous vote was recorded.

Consideration: Rent on I.O.O.F. Building: No action was taken.

District Attorney: David Hamilton, Assistant D. A. met with the Court to discuss the possible increase of the fee charged by Dr. Ralph Erdmann for autopsies. The Commissioners and County Judge decided to check with other Counties that are in the same population category as Wheeler County before making any decision.

Salary Adjustments: Effective 7-1-85: Commissioner Atherton motioned, seconded by Commissioner Harrison to reduce Gary Davis' salary to \$1,250.00. (longevity dissolved) Motion carried.

Bill Atherton motioned, seconded by Elmer Harrison to increase the salary of Gary Davis and Jon R. Sullivan to \$1,290.00 per month. Motion carried. (Note: Mr. Sullivan has 1 year longevity to be added.)

Elmer Harrison motioned, seconded by Clois Hanner to set the monthly salaries of the dispatchers at the County Jail as follows: Janice Blocker—\$966.00; Mary Huckert and Twyla Owens—\$916.00 each. Motion carried.

Elmer Harrison motioned, seconded by Ernest Henderson to increase Agatha Johnsons' salary to \$835.10 per month. Motion carried.

Commissioner Harrison motioned, seconded by Commissioner Hanner to increase Ted Boedeckers' salary to \$1,317.97. Motion carried.

Dean Smith, Deputy Sheriff Retires: Elmer Harrison motioned, seconded by Ernest Henderson to remove Dean Smith from the payroll, effective 6-30-85. Motion carried.

Deputy Sheriff Added to Payroll: Clois Hanner motioned, seconded by Elmer Harrison to add Robert Judd to the payroll, effective 7-9-85 at \$1,267.97 per month. Motion carried.

Salary Adjustments: Effective 10-1-85: Commissioner Harrison motioned, seconded by Commissioner Henderson to increase the salary of all Elected Officials, EXCEPT: The County Attorney and Constable Precinct #1—\$200.00 per month; Road hands and Deputy Sheriffs' to a Top salary of \$1,555.00 per month. All other County Employees a 5% SALARY INCREASE. The vote was: Henderson, Harrison, and Hanner—For, and Atherton—Against. Motion carried. In a letter dated July 3rd, 1985, from the District Judge, addressed to the Wheeler County Commissioners Court, states in part: The new salary for the Court Reporter will be increased by 10% TO \$594.64 per month.

OUR TOWN AND SCHOOL — BRISCOE, TEXAS 1928-1985

The town of Briscoe was established in the Fall of 1928, with the coming of the Santa Fe Railroad. Williams-Miller erected the first quarters and started selling lots to men interested in opening a business in the new town, on the Santa Fe Railroad, ten miles north of Wheeler. The town was first called "Conrad". A car load of pipe came to the depot to be unloaded one morning, with no one knowing who had ordered it. The town was then renamed Briscoe, after J. B. Briscoe, an official of the Santa Fe Railroad in Amarillo.

The Tindell gin was moved from Zybach with O.D. Perryman as manager. Chickasha put in a second gin, managed by Newt Trout, Webb, W.D. Douthit, J. R. Morrow, B.F. Holland and Lenord Fulks in later years. Two lumber yards were built. One by Dascom Daniels on the north side, with Weaver Barnett as manager, and Cicero Smith on the west side, with Tom Scott as manager.

Three grocery stores were built, Dr. H. E. Nicholson, M. McIlhany and Ivy Morris were some of the first to erect new red brick buildings on the north side. These buildings housed groceries, dry goods, drug store, variety, hardware, feed store and barber shop run by Floyd Hunter.

Some of the other early owners and managers were Paul Brannon, Alvin and Loleat Richardson, Ivy Morris, Floyd and Trula Morris, and Clint and Irene Wofford. Also, there was a beauty shop run by Cordy Gill. Raymond Waters was manager of the New elevator along the railroad tracks. Robert Jackson had a grist mill in the east part of town.

Ira Elmer Byars was appointed Briscoe's first postmaster. He opened the new post office and grocery store on the south side, July 28, 1930. It is the last post office to be opened in Wheeler County. He was followed by Elmer Luttrell in 1931. In 1939 N.M. Tipps was acting postmaster until Bertha Steen was appointed postmaster in 1940, a position she kept until 1960 when she changed to the Rural Route. Lucille Tipps was acting postmaster from 1960 to 1962. LouDean Douthit, Dorothy Walker, and Lois Hudson were appointed postmasters in later years, with Winnie Gilmer, Officer-in-charge until Lou Dean Douthit returned as our present postmaster in 1981.

The bulk of the mail was received from the daily trains coming through Briscoe. Ross Hoosier was the first temporary carrier when the route was organized April 1, 1931. W. B. Sparks was appointed rural carrier on July 6, 1931. He was followed by Lee Barry, Bertha Steen, LouDean Douthit and Wilbur Lyons. Sub carriers were Si

Mason, Lucille Tipps, Kenneth Douthit, Henry Lee, Georgia Tipps and Helen George.

Many a car load of cattle, grain and cotton were shipped from the depot. Depot agents were Cecil Mix, Kenneth May and L.S. Price.

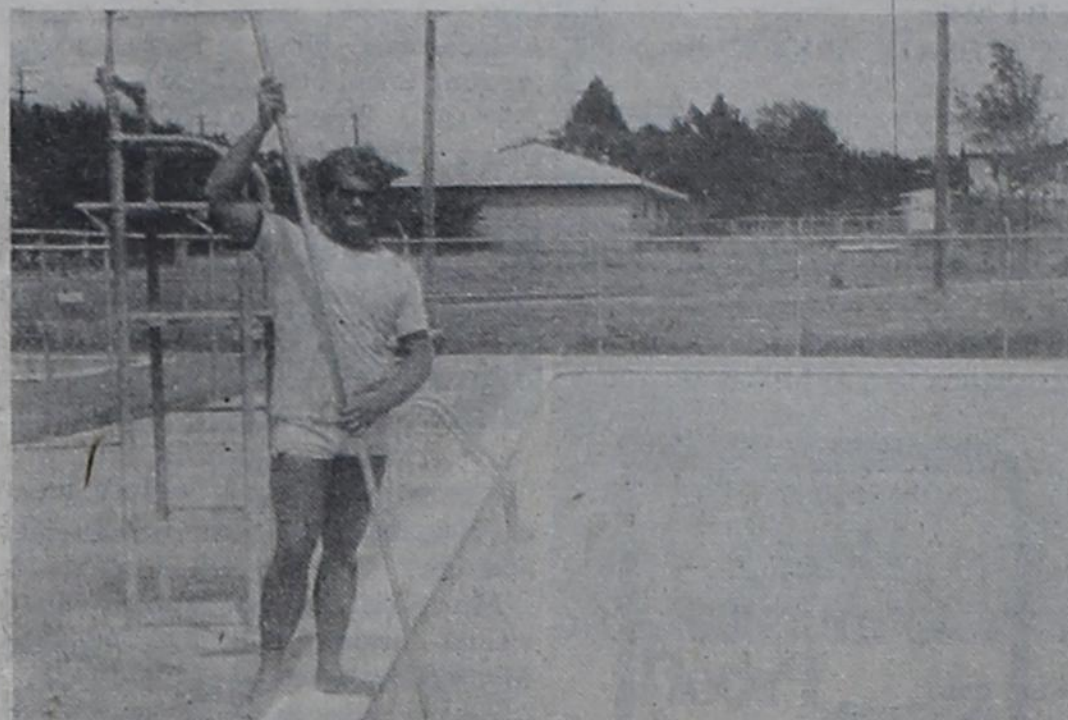
Three churches were established. The Assembly of God Church was torn down in Zybach and rebuilt in Briscoe. Guy Shields was Presbyter of the district and helped organize the new Church, with Brother Gore holding the first services. Brother Browder from the Zybach community was the first pastor of the Methodist Church, and Rev. E. M. Dunsforth of the First Baptist. In later years Church of Christ established a church and had services many years. The Assembly of God is the only remaining church.

The first blacksmith was built by Mr. Green on the northwest side of the street. Two blacksmith shops sprang up on the south side, one with a store on one side of it. The blacksmith was run by Mr. Shackelford and a man named Waggoner ran the store. The other by Mr. Reeder. A large herd of cattle owned by Tom Scott roamed the townsite, and would eat the cotton seed hulls from the gins. Some of the cattle developed rabies and went wild. A large dog chased one in the blacksmith shop, across from the gin office and one of the Reeder boys made a door in the north side of the shop where there wasn't one. Some of the cattle had to be destroyed and the others shipped to market, much to the relief of the townspeople. Dick Dickerson was also an early day blacksmith.

Five filling stations, two garages, and two cream stations were soon in operation. Hub Green, Glad Irwin, Ewell Steen, Hugh West, Harold "Pee Wee" Eichorn, Roy Waters and Mrs. W. D. Douthit were some of the first owners and operators.

Doe and Steve Stevens opened the first cafe. In later years, W.D. Douthit built a new building on the southeast corner, run by Floyd and Trula Morris. Welma D'Spain also had a cafe in the late forty's.

John Erney, a wirey little man, owned and operated a tourist court on the north side. He was also the town constable. He wore two six shooters, and was called "two gun Pete". One day, while chasing some boys on horses, he fell down, and shot himself in the leg, then he was called "one gun Pete". When highway 83 came through in 1931-1932, by-passing the old road from Wheeler to Canadian by one mile. The sticky Brothers were the contractors for a thousand dollars a mile. The sticky Brothers were shipped in by bulk, on the railroad for .03c a hundred. Some of the road workers shot dice in the middle of the

road in town before starting to work in the mornings. The constable tried to stop the game. They took his guns away and set him up on tip of the grocery store porch. After that he by-passed the main street, always coming around the back way.

A bootlegger was known to be making wild grape wine North of town. A group of boys found his wooden barrel of wine in a water hold on Gageby Creek. They rolled it all the way to town to the cotton dock along the railroad tracks, where they had an all night party under the docks.

James Funston built and managed the first telephone exchange, later run by Lester "Flutie" Johnson until it was destroyed by fire.

The first school at Briscoe began in the Fall of 1930, with consolidation of Zybach, Wagner, Gageby No. 2 (Nubbin Ridge) and Gageby No. 10 of Wheeler and Hemphill Counties. During the construction of the new building in 1930, the first classes from the 5th grade up had classes in the Baptist Church building. From the 4th grade down, the classes were held in the Dascom-Daniels Lumber Company building. Some of the grades stayed at the Gageby and Wagner schools until the school buildings were completed. In September, 1931 school started in the new buildings.

The first Superintendent was C.B. Witt, the first teachers were; Miss Maude Hicks, Mr. J. W. McCord, Mrs. C. B. Witt, Miss Tamsey Riley, Miss Ethel Welch, Miss Rachel Askey, Mr. Bill Sparks and Garland Martin.

Miss Tamsey Riley planted the large shade trees still shading the playgrounds, fifty three years ago. They have been enjoyed by hundreds of school children through the years.

The first School Board members were: John McCarroll, P. A. Clepper, Edison Sorenson, W. H. Taylor, Joe Hefley, Ivy Morris and N. M. Tipps. The first elected School Board members, in 1931, were: Wm. Lohberger, B. F. Crossland, John McCarroll, John Francis, Charlie Candler, Milt Wilson and Edison Sorenson.

Due to the fact that the school was not fully accredited with the State until 1932-1933, the first graduating class was in 1933. The school enrollment in the early years was over 330 pupils. Due to records being destroyed by fire in later years graduates or members of the 1932-1933 school year: Jack Hayes, Doris (Aderholt) Hayes, Choice (Durham) Scott, Lawrence Vaughn, Iris (Spud) Wood, Mary (Gudgel) Wood, Ada McCray, B. F. Crossland, Jr., Charly Austin, Tamsey V. Riley, Charles Taylor, Earl Helton, Earl Sivage, Vetha Carver, Mamie Word, Mary Lambert, Clifford Hefley, Hoyle (Young) Helton, Lenord Fulks and Susie (Vaughn) Fulks.

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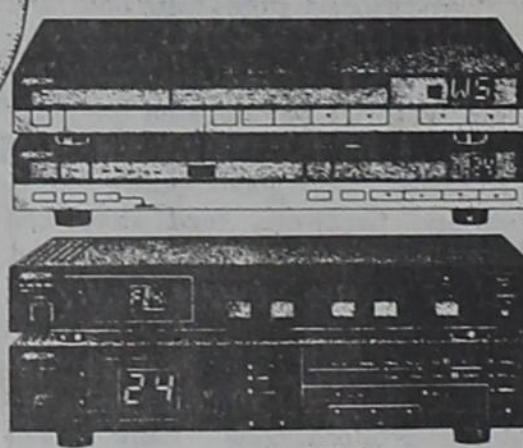
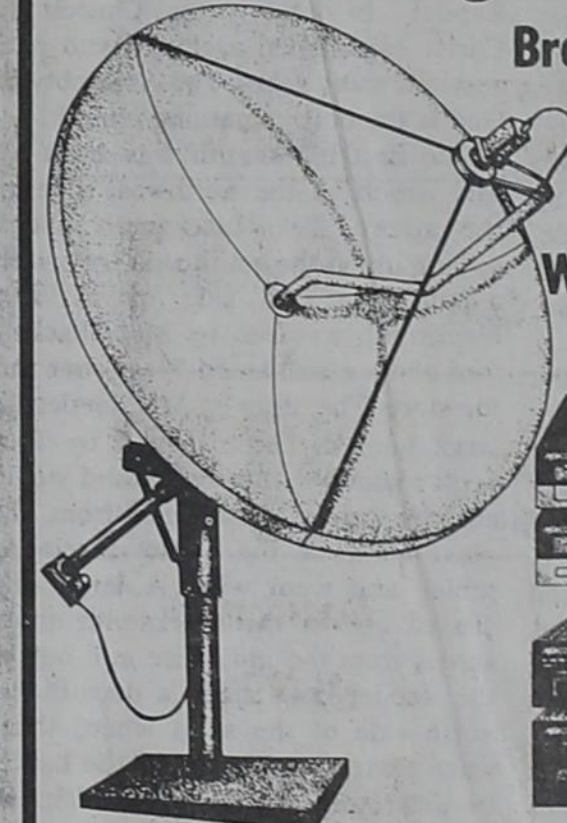

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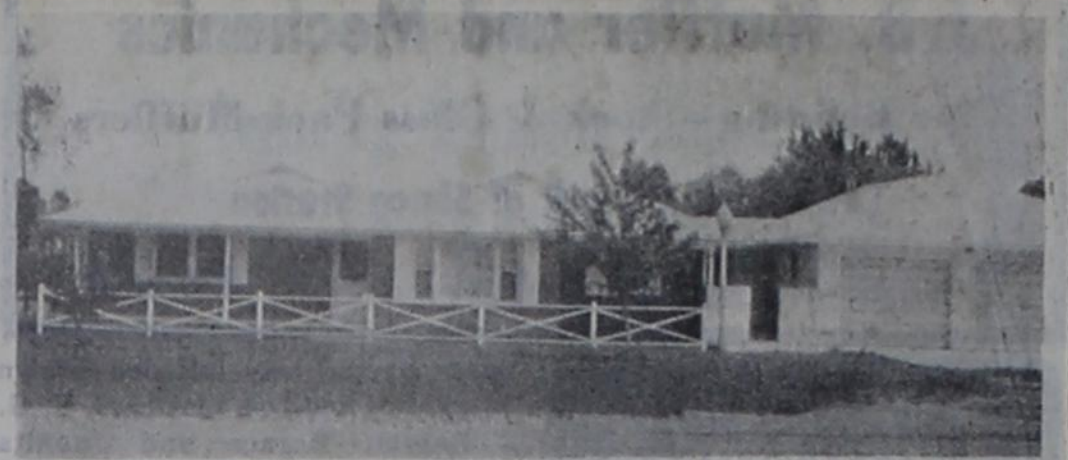

on a dirt court, so everyone was very proud of the new gymnasium built on 1931. It burned in the Fall of 1936. It was replaced that fall and winter with a larger gym. All the original buildings have been replaced with new modern buildings. Lots of new housing has been added for the teachers. The older students will never forget the thrill of the first day of school in the large red brick school building in September of 1932, from seniors to first grade.

Many, Many trophies were won through the years, from basketball, track and interscholastic league events. Three different times, trophy cases had to be enlarged to hold them in the building. Both boys and girls had outstanding teams through the years.

In 1936, the girls basketball team won three invitational tournaments and thus won the right to represent Briscoe at the State Tournament at Plainview. The players were Lorene Treadwell, Dorothy Lohberger, Winifred Barnes, Lois Aderholt, Daphne Young, Joy Bill Riley, Georgia Cain, Vada Vaughn, Geneva McNeil and Mabel Barnes. The team was coached by Varnell Hall.

In 1965, the girl's basketball team won the District, Bi-District, and Regional Tournaments to give them the honor of representing this region at Austin in the State Tournament. The team did not win there, but being able to go to state competition was outstanding for a school that only had twelve girls in the whole high school. They were good enough to win all the way to the very last try. The players that year included Mickie Fulks, Patty Hall, Diane Dodd, Lynda Finsterwald, Lou Meadows, Sharon Aderholt, Melody Zybach and Lynn Hefley. The coach was Don Johnson.

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

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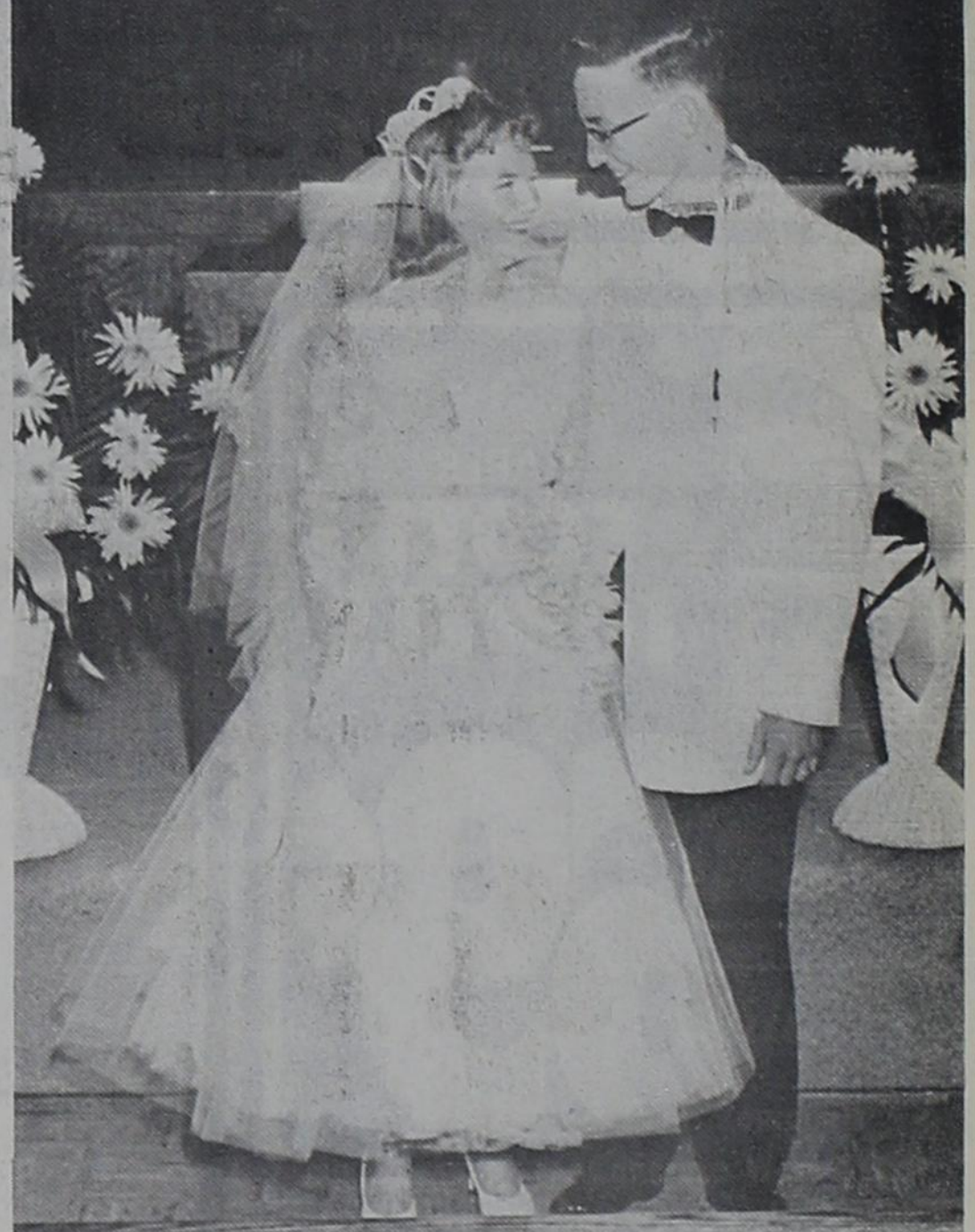
