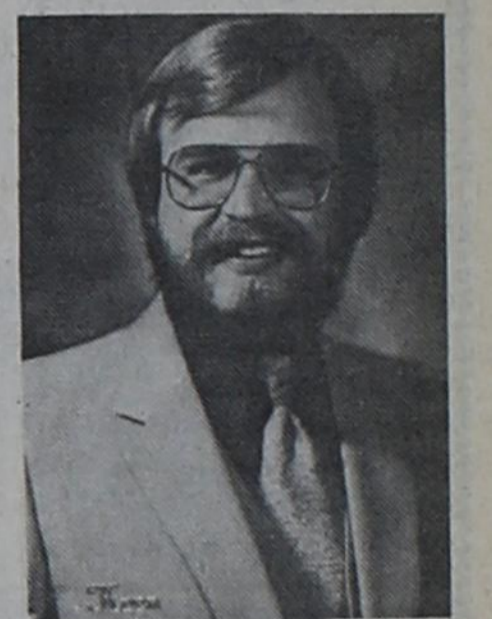
GROUP GATHERS TO DISCUSS PLANS, TO OPPOSE SWEETWATER CREEK DAM

A portion of the citizens opposed to the Sweetwater Creek Project met Monday evening in the auditorium. The purpose of the meeting was to bring those in attendance up to date on the progress being made in fighting the planned reservoir. Tommy Puryear chaired the meeting with Stephen Dalrumply of Amarillo reporting on activities and plans for continuing the fight. Dalrumply is with Culton, Morgan Brittain and White and was accompanied by David Thomas; the firm will represent the resisting group. Facts of interest given the group included the failure to act by the Texas Legislature of the \$10 million grant to help with the construction costs. Applications for the grant cannot be made again for two years with the next session of

the state legislature. A "Protest" to the permit for the project has been filed with the Texas Water Commission on behalf of the property owners, the State of Oklahoma, and Luggart-Altus Irrigation District. The protest brought about a delay of the hearing which was scheduled for Thursday, June 9, in Austin. This will give the gathered group time to collect information and prepare for the hearing in an effort to sway the hearing officer, who will hear the evidence and report to the Texas Water Commission. An effort is being made to move the hearing from Austin to Amarillo to make it more convenient for those involved to testify. The length of time required for the hearing is not known but Dalrumply believes it will last "at least a week".

The Texas Water Commission consists of three men, appointed by the Governor of Texas. These men receive the evidence and present their opinion on the situation. The decision of the commission is not final; it may be appealed. The first stop would be District Court in Travis County; next would be Court of Appeals and finally the Texas Supreme Court. These requests "can take several years to finalize", stated Dalrumply. County voters will go to the polls in 60 days to decide the fate of the Wheeler County Water Supply District. Voting to create the water district will not mean the dam will be built; it will give the voters of Wheeler County control of the water in Wheeler County. The board governing the water district would be appointed; two by the Wheeler County Commissioners, one each by Wheeler, Shamrock and Mobeetie. Appointed to the temporary board was Kent Sims and Dan Macina, representing the county; Pete Burton, Woodrow Sims and Melvin May, representing Wheeler, Shamrock and Mobeetie respectively. The water district, if created, would be able

to levy taxes only if bonds are voted by the people. The water district without the dam would keep the control of Wheeler county water in Wheeler county but could not levy taxes unless there was a bond issue voted by the people. The water district would not have any control over water (above or below ground) unless given that power by the voters. The citizens in attendance at the meeting were given the opportunity to sign a petition, protesting the construction of the dam.



GRADUATES WEST TEXAS STATE: Kelly Howard, son of Mr. and Mrs. W.F. Howard Jr., Mobeetie, was among those graduating from West Texas State Univ. May 11, in services conducted at the Civic Center in Amarillo. Receiving a Bachelor of Science Degree with a major in math. Kelly graduated Magna Cum Laude, having an overall grade point average for all college work in the range of 3.7 to 3.9 on a 4.0 scale. He was listed on the President's Honor Roll for the third successive semester with a 4.0 grade point average on a 4.0 scale. The President's Honor Roll requires that a student be enrolled in at least 12 semester hours. For the past four years, Kelly has received a University Interscholastic League Scholarship from the Carl B. and Florence E. King Foundation. This is one of the scholarships available to students who compete in academic UIL competition at the state level. One of the qualifications for this scholarship was that the student be enrolled in and pass 16 semester hours every semester. Kelly will be returning to West Texas State University to work on his Masters Degree in Math. He has been granted a teacher assistantship which consists of teaching two freshman-level math classes at West Texas State while going to graduate school.

New Program Announced
District Conservationist Lanyon Williams announces a conservation program that is now available to treat large gullied areas on private land. Williams stated that the Resource Conservation and Development (RC&D) Program has aided counties in treating gullies along county roads and that this program is now available on private land. Williams reviewed several requirements of the program. The main method used to treat the gullied areas is by the construction of dams. The dams are normally built with a pipe outlet for grade control. The dams are vegetated and usually fenced. Dams are planned for erosion control and generally do not hold large amounts of water. The hole in front of the dam is filled with soil. Water flows to the dam without crossing any earthen fall. This helps prevent future erosion above the dam. Water is released from the dam through the pipe. Fill material for the dam is normally obtained from below the dam. Any gullied area the dam is filled or shaped. This aids in reducing future erosion and allows seeding of grass on the gullied area. Williams also stated that diversion terraces could be used to divert water from the gullied area rather than building a dam. When this is done, the gullied area below the terrace is shaped and vegetated. Williams emphasized that the RC&D program could pay for construction of these practices. Cost-share payments are about 80 percent of construction cost, however, the exact status of funds is not known at this time. The Wheeler County Soil and Water Conservation District would be the RC&D sponsor for treating gullied areas on private land. An RC&D Measure Plan could be developed for several gullied areas needing treatment in the district. These gullied areas could be in a community with common problems or could be scattered in the district. All gullied areas would have preliminary designs and cost estimates made before including in the Measure Plan. Contact the Wheeler Soil Conservation Service Office for additional information on the RC&D Program.

ALL DOGS AND CATS MUST BE VACCINATED
The City of Wheeler will sponsor a Rabies Clinic Saturday, June 11, at the Fire Station. The station is located behind the city office. At this time dog licenses will be on file by the city; the clinic will be from 2 to 4:30 in the afternoon. A state law, HB 1323 passed in 1979, requires all dogs and cats be vaccinated against rabies. The law reads: "the owner of each dog or cat shall

Rites Read For Former Citizen
Ruby Carver Brazil passed away in the Genesee Memorial Hospital in Batavia, New York on May 29, 1983. Mrs. Brazil made her home with her daughter, LaNoel Brazil for several years. Her health had been failing for sometime but she had been able to keep up limited activities until one week before her death. Ruby Carver had lived in the vicinity of Wheeler when quite young. She married Rufus Brazil soon after attending Wayland College in the early Twenties. School teaching was their main profession, but in the early 30ties they came to Wheeler and purchased the local 5 cent to a \$1.00 store. They made friends and became substantial citizens. They had three children, Lombr, LaNoel and Basil. Soon after leaving Wheeler, Mr. Brazil died at their home in Tucumcari, N.M. Ruby remained in New Mexico for several years where she taught until her retirement. Her daughter states that she "was always a teacher, by example rather than by lecture." She was the sister of Reverend Douglas Carver who was the pastor of the Pampa First Baptist Church for many years. She has a cousin in Wheeler, Watson Burgess.

4-H & FFA Plan Exhibit
All 4-H and FFA members who plan to exhibit steers in the major stock shows (Dallas, Fort Worth, Houston, etc.) this fall and spring must have those steers validated during the month of June. Validation consists of ear tagging, nose printing, and photographing the steers. This must be done in the presence of the County Validation Committee which consists of the County Extension Agent and Vocational Agriculture teachers. Three validation dates and locations have been set for Wheeler County. They are: June 18-Brashear's Sale Barn in Shamrock June 20-Kiker Ranch in Allison June 30-Clifford Walsler Ranch North of Mobeetie. Anyone having questions concerning the validation program can contact County Extension Agent, Don King or Vocational Agriculture teachers, Don Minkley of Kelton, Jack Morgan in Briscoe, James Moffett in Mobeetie, Monroe Shannon in Shamrock, or Terry McCasland in Wheeler. Educational programs conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension serve people of all regardless of socio-economic level, race, color, sex, religion or national origin.

Rabies From Page 1 have the dog or cat vaccinated against rabies by the time the dog or cat is four months of age or at regular intervals thereafter.

The vaccination will protect the animal for a period of one year. Offered at the clinic for dogs will be rabies, distemper and parvo. Offered for cats will be rabies and feline distemper. All vaccinations will be at a reduced price.

The licenses will cost \$1.00 for males and spayed females and \$2.00 for females.

For those people who have had their dogs vaccinated, but have not purchased a license, it will be necessary to take the animal and proof of vaccination to the clinic to obtain the dog license. All dogs in the City limits are required to be licensed.

Area citizens are urged to bring their animals in at this time to be vaccinated against rabies.

For those owners who are unable to bring their pets to the clinic, call 826-5821 between 8:30 and noon for an appointment to have the animal vaccinated.

UNCLE SAM WANTS 10% OF YOUR INTEREST INCOME - BUT - YOU MAY BE EXEMPT FROM THE NEW WITHHOLDING LAW.

You are probably aware that Congress recently passed a law that will require banks and other financial institutions to withhold 10% of the interest or dividends you earn on your savings and investments. That money will go to the IRS in much the same way payroll withholding deductions are handled.

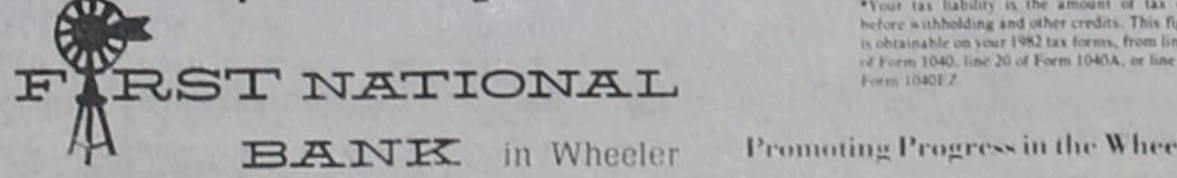
You may claim exemption from the withholding law if you meet any of these requirements:

- Your tax liability* for last year (1982) was \$600 or less (\$1000 for a married couple filing a joint return); or
- You are 65 or older and your tax liability* last year was \$1500 or less (\$2500 for a married couple filing a joint return); or
- You were not required to file an income tax return last year.

Also, there are many complex regulations regarding exemptions for non-individuals. Some of the more common exempt entities are:

- Corporations
- Tax-exempt Organizations
- Individual Retirement Plans
- U.S., State, and Local Governments
- Securities or Commodities Dealers
- Middlemen (including nominee or custodian)
- Financial Institutions

To claim exemption, you need to come by our bank and complete a Certificate of Exemption Form. This should be filed before any anticipated interest payments to insure it is processed before any withholding occurs.

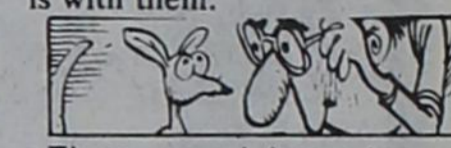

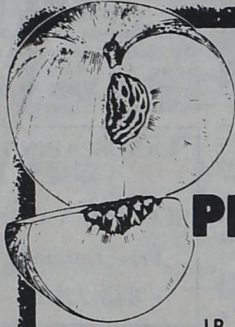
