## 4-H JUNIOR RODEO ENTRY DEADLINE IS FRIDAY, JULY 31

The Wheeler County 4-H Junior Rodeo is scheduled for Thursday, Friday, and Saturday, August 6-8, at the Wheeler Riding Club Arena, Wheeler, Texas. The rodeo, which is sponsored by the Wheeler County 4-H Clubs and 4-H Texans Horse Club, is open to all youth who have not passed their 20th birthday at the time of the rodeo.

Entries are now being taken at the Wheeler County Extension office, Box 448, Wheeler, Texas 79096 (806) 826-5243. Books will close at noon Friday, July 31 and no late entries will be accepted. For entry blanks or other information, contact Don King County Extension Agent.

Stock for the rodeo is being furnished by Bill Hext of Glazier, Texas. Trophies will be awarded for first through third place in each event and buckles will be awarded for All-Around in each division. Contestants must enter two events to be eligible for All-Around.

The Pre-School and 6-9 divisions will compete on Thursday night and all other divisions will compete Friday and Saturday nights.

## Open House Scheduled At Second Largest Oil Rig

The governors of Texas and Oklahoma and U. S. senators from both states are being invited to an "open house" tentatively set for August 21 at the second largest drilling unit

in the nation. The \$12.8 million rig owned by Petra Drilling Co. of Edmond, Okla., is capable of drilling to 35,000 feet. It is set up on the Vaughn Lister farm

at a site six miles south and seven miles east of Wheeler.

Jay Thompson, president of the Wheeler Chamber of Commerce and local manager for Southwestern Public Service Co., said other political dignitaries are being invited and the company will provide balloons and other favors for visitors, who will have an opportunity to get expert information on operations of the unit.

Complete details on the program, expected to start at 5 p.m., will be announced later, Thompson said.

Location of the monster rig on the Wheeler County drilling site is part of the booming oil and gas development in the county which has reversed traditional economic patterns, Thompson said.

Although the Arden Unit No. 8 is capable of drilling to a depth of 35,000 feet, the well on the Lister farm is scheduled to go to 19,500 feet.

The population of the town of Wheeler has risen from 1,100 to about 1,600 in the past 10 years and the boom has brought a number of new oil-related businesses, along with construction of some good homes and a shortage of rental housing.

The shortage is being remedied by bringing in mobile homes. The drilling unit was one originally built for use in Egypt, but shipment to Egypt his political snags and Petra bought the rig for use in this county.

The 19,500-foot Lister well will not be the deepest in Wheeler County. A 32,000-foot well near Kelton holds the record thus far.

But the drilling unit is unique, and the open house will give Wheeler residents and visitors a chance to see the latest in technology used in development of domestic oil resources.

He always gave me the best (most expensive) Christmas and birthday presents . . . . from New York's finest toy store. In his will he left me his gold watch and chain (from Tiffany's) and \$5,000, on the basis of which I felt financially secure enough to get married in the middle of medical school in 1927 . . . . Sincerely, Ben Spock"

I doubt that Dr. Spock's "Guy McLane" was any kin to my dad, but I appreciated getting a reply from his just the same. I think it would be nice if every little kid had a friend like that, don't you?

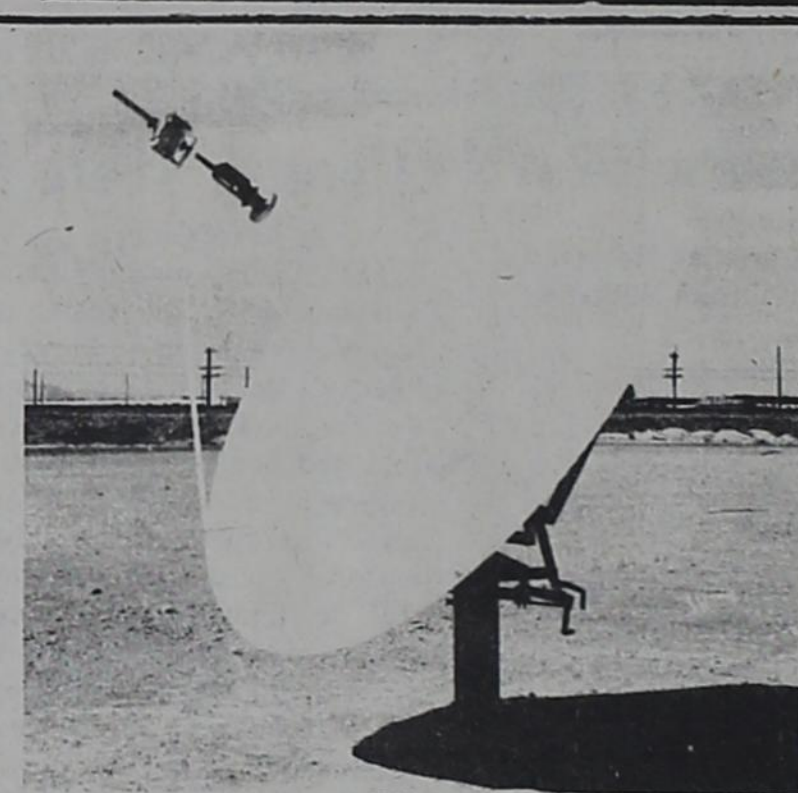

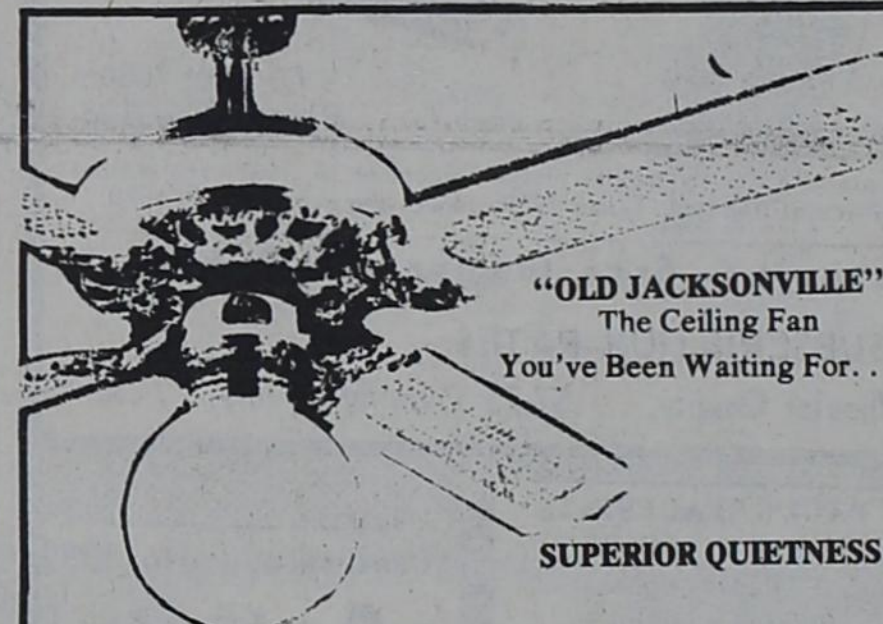
