WHEREAS, The Nicholson family has given the Nicholson Memorial Building to the City of Wheeler:


WHEREAS, The Wheeler Public Library, the Over-Sixty Club, and youth organizations are located in the building;



'DR. NICK", H. E. Nicholson, Sr. 1889-1965, built this bu which served as the hospital for the Wheeler community from 1933 to 1961 and was later given to the city. Born in Alabama, he attended Baylor University School of Medicine and served in France as a major in the Medical Corps during World War I. He then came to Wheeler County and served the Wheeler community in many capacities and as its physician from 1920 until

"DR. HAROLD" E. Nicholson, Jr., 1917-1961, attended school in Wheeler, Texas A & M, and Baylor School of Medicine. He served as a cap tain in the Pacific in the Medical Corps in World War II and returned to Wheeler to practice medicine and surgery from 1946 until his untimely

Removing Price Tags, Labels-Sticky Work

Removing price tags and labels from household items can be sticky work, but it's far from hopeless.

Several precautions will prevent damage to metal, plastic or wood items.

A bit of "trial-and-error" may be necessary in finding the best method in each case, so is one procedure doesn't work, try another one.

Don't use strong abrasives or solutions until you adequately test them on the material in question, since they might soften, scratch, discolor or a damage the item.

Here are suggestrions for removing four of the most common kinds of labels:

Pressure-Sensitive Adhesives Stickers or labels that are peeled from a backing or roll and pressed in place on a

One way to soak the labelwithout soaking the preduct is to saturate a sponge or several layers of paper towels with warm water and place it over the label.

This method works effectively on water-soluable glue, but if used mistakenly on pressure sensitive adhesives, it can make them more difficult to remove.

Appliques Appliques are decal-like products sometimes placed on the bottom of a bathtub or showers for more slip-resistant surfaces. Through use, appliques show signs of wear or discoloration, and then it's necessary to remove them.

Often the applique and all its adhesive can be pulled up easily. More often, the top layer of the applique will separate, leaving a thin film of adhesive on the tub or shower

To remove the film, get a grip on the edge with your fingernail, or get underneath it with a sharp-edge scraper. If the adhesive tears, try another edge, working toward the center until all traces of the applique are removed.

If the film is too thin to scrape or peel off, try working a generous amount of commercial prewash spot remover underneath the film to work on the adhesive. Allow the solution to soak through the adhesive for about 30 minutes,
