## 4-H JUNIOR RODEO BEGINS FRIDAY, 350 ENTER EVENTS

The Wheeler County 4-H Junior Rodeo is shaping up to be one of the best ever. There are over 350 entries for the rodeo which is scheduled for May 25-26 in the Wheeler Riding Club Arena.

The young cowboys and cowgirls will be in action Friday night when the preschool and 6-9 year age groups are scheduled to compete.

Events for preschool include Stick Horse Barrel race, boot scramble, goat ribbon race and sack race.

Boys 6-9 years of age may compete in barrel race, calf riding, pole bending, flag race and golfette. Events for girls 6-9 include barrel race, walking lead, pole bending, flag race and golfette.

On Saturday Night the 10-14 year old and 15-19 year old age groups will compete.

Boys 10-14 can choose from steer riding, breakaway roping, bareback ponies, barrel race & calf daubing, walking lead, barrel race, and pole bending.

In the 15-19 age group, events for boys will be calf roping, ribbon roping, bull riding, bareback riding and calf daubing. Events for the girls will be steer undecorating, calf daubing, flag race, barrel race, and pole bending.

There will be a jackpot steer saddling on Saturday night. The steer saddling will be open to boys and girls of any age through 19 years.

Another Wheeler County 4-H Junior Rodeo is scheduled for August.

## Emergency Care Attendent Course To Begin May 31

The North Wheeler County Volunteer Ambulance Service will sponsor a course offering Emergency Care Attendent certificates. The class is open to anyone interested learning how to treat victims of heart attack or accident. The students will learn CPR, care of accident victims, and bandaging and splinting.

of accident victims and bandaging and splinting. It was first intended to offer both an ECA course and EMT- Emergency Medical Technician-course; this has been changed, however, due to the time factor and the EMT course will be offered at a later date.

Those interested in the course are asked to meet at the Ambulance Barn at 300 Alan L. Bean Blvd. in Wheeler on Thursday morning, May 31, at 8:00. It had been planned to hold the class earlier in the year and meetings were held to determine interest. It is hoped these same people are interested and additional individuals are welcome.

The ECA course involves 40 hours classroom instruction. This will include 1 1/2 hours lecture and 1 1/2 hours practice of skills each week for a period of 13 weeks. At the end of the course, students will be tested with a written test and application of skills. Certificates are awarded upon successful competing of the course; these are good for a period of 2 years at which time a refresher course ECA is required. The completion of the course qualifies you to work with the local volunteer ambulance service.

There is no charge for the course and books will be furnished. Benefits of taking the classes for personal knowledge include the learning of CPR-the action taken when a person suffers complete heart failure, the care

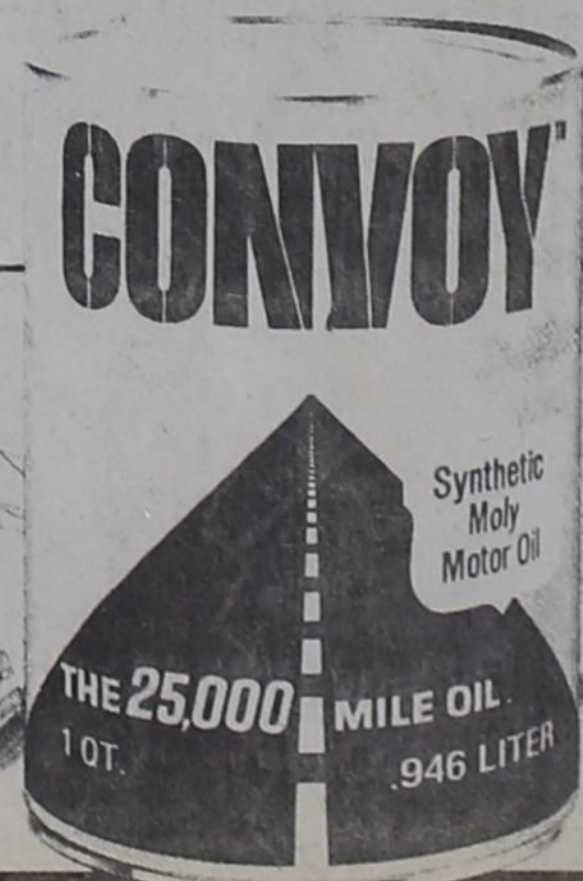

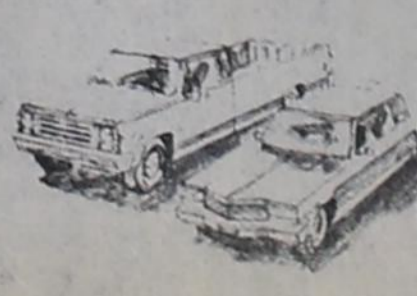

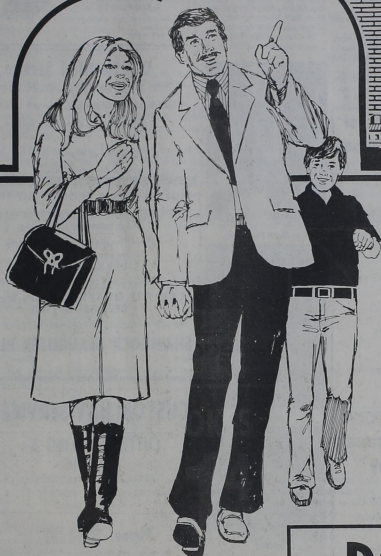

## Keep Cool With Cucumbers

Keep cool with cucumbers as days grow warmer. The pulp temperature of cucumbers from the refrigerator can be 20 degrees cooler than the air outside on a hot day. Cucumbers also make a low-calorie snack for waist-watchers

they have only 55 calories per pound.

An unpared cucumber contains a rich source of iron and vitamins A and C as well as other needed minerals and vitamins.

Cucumbers are available in two classes according to use those used fresh for the table called "slicing cucumbers" and other varieties used for pickling.

Cucumbers are ideal accompaniments to summer meals. For eating raw, slice or dice fresh cucumbers for relishes or salads.

Cut lengthwise into sticks with the skin left on or cut crosswise into discs, they add color to a relish tray.

Also slice them for use in sandwiches or serve with vinegar, salt and pepper. Store cucumbers in the refrigerator.

### Try these recipes:

**Spring Vegetable Salad**  
1 pkg. lemon-flavored gelatin  
1 1/2 cups hot water  
1/2 cup sour cream  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1/4 cup green pepper, diced  
1/2 cup celery, diced  
1/2 cup cucumber, diced  
1/2 cup radishes, sliced  
1/4 cup green onion, sliced  
Dissolve gelatin in hot water. Chill until syrupy.  
Blend in sour cream and salt.

Chill until slightly thickened. Add vegetables and pour into a 5 to 6 cup mold. Chill until firm. Makes six to eight servings.

### Cucumber Salad

1 pkg lime gelatin  
1 cup hot water  
1 cup chopped cucumbers  
1/4 cup stuffed olives, cut up  
1 cup cottage cheese  
1/2 cup mayonnaise  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
Mix lime gelatin in hot water. When gelatin begins to congeal, stir in remainder of ingredients. Makes four to six servings.

### Cucumbers and Sour Cream

2 cucumbers  
1 cup sour cream  
2 tablespoons chopped pecans  
2 teaspoons grated onion  
2 tablespoons lemon juice  
1 teaspoon salt  
Peel cucumbers. Slice thin and chill.  
Mix other ingredients together. Toss all lightly. Maybe served on greens. Makes four servings.

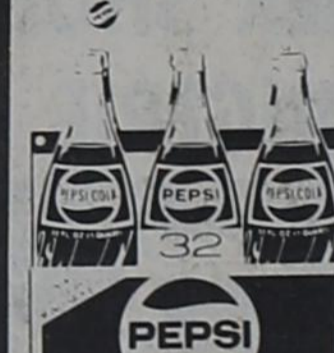

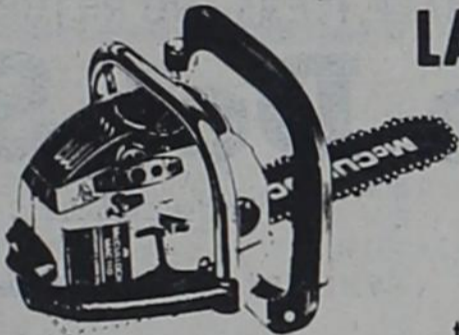

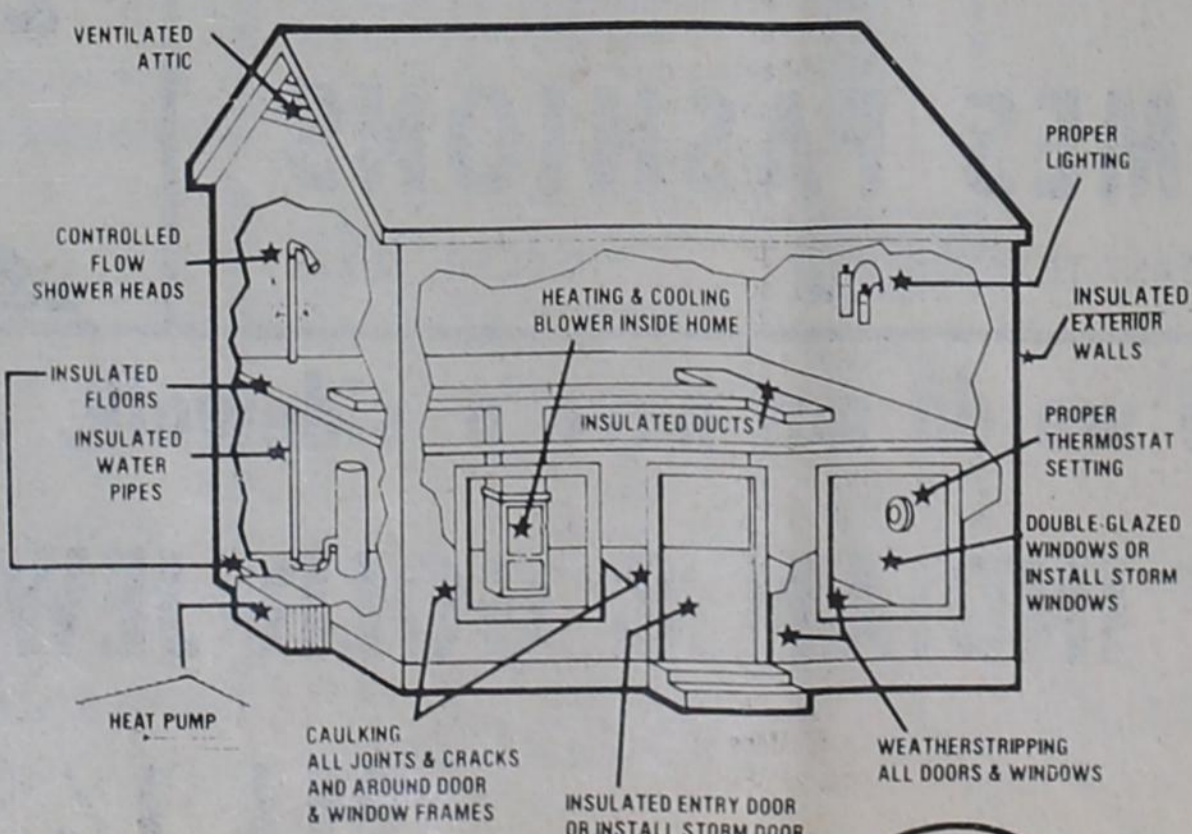

## "SCARED STRAIGHT"

KVII-TV will present "Scared Straight," academy award-win-ning documentary, Friday night, May 25, at 10:45 P.M. This controversial 60 minute show is designed to literally scare the crime out of juvenile delinquents. As part of a crime prevention program, chronic juvenile of-fenders were sentenced to three hours in a maximum security prison with murderers, rapists and armed robbers. The lan-guage is explicit, often crude, and graphic descriptions will offend some, but "Scared Straight" does reveal one means of dealing with juvenile crime.

A cross-section of the local community attended two special showings of "Scared Straight" in the KVII-TV studios--among them, ministers, lawyers, judges, teachers, probation of-ficers, and students--and found in the show an "earthy reality"; "they (the prisoners) tell it like it is."

Will it deter crime? Reactions were mixed, but most agreed

that it is a show that should be seen, and that the program itself is one possible option in the attempt to cope with juvenile crime.

"Scared Straight" will be pre-sented without commercial inter-ruption--Friday, May 25, 10:45 p.m., on KVII-TV.

## EMS Offers Two New Courses

The Panhandle EMS an-nounces two new training in-service courses, "EMERGENCY BURN CARE", a three hour workshop and "HANDLING HAZARDOUS MATERIALS," a twenty four hour course.

Handling Hazardous Materials instructors include, Chief Glen Welch (Amarillo Fire Dept.), Tom Slocum (Amarillo Fire Dept.), Joe Rice (Canyon Fire Dept.), and Elbert Burch (Amarillo Fire Dept.). Total charge for the course is \$12.00 per student for lecture and books. This course provides the knowledge, training and planning assistance to help achieve and maintain a state of readiness for all trans-portion emergencies involving hazardous materials.

Both courses are structured to meet the needs of industrial safety personnel, ambulance, and fire department personnel.

Emergency Burn Care is also available for hospital in-services for nursing staffs. There is no charge for this course; however we do ask for a minimum of 15 participants per class. Faculty includes, Kathy Osler, R.N., and Deborah Davenport, R.N., both consultants for the PEMS burn demonstration project.

These courses in addition to the ones all ready offered, through PEMS including ECA-EMT, Paramedic, Newborn and Maternal Stabilization and Transport, CPR, Respiratory Therapy, Emergency Depart-ment, and Crash Management Extrication are in keeping with the EMS slogan "A System to Save a Life."

to supply its entire fuel need for moving vehicles within the next five years.

I supported these bills and I also supported the addition of \$120 thousand dollars to the budget of the Experiment Station for research on the production of alcohol as a fuel.

The price of gasoline has now escalated to a figure that makes production of gasohol feasible. As the price of gasoline continues to rise, the production of alcohol will look even better.

Presently we have thousands of acres of land standing idle because of government Programs. Production of alcohol from these acres would greatly lessen our dependence on oil from the Middle East.

Considering our dependence on oil from that part of the world and the powder keg situation we have in that area, this gasohol legislation could prove to be the most important legislation we pass this session.

## Gasohol

Two gasohol bills have passed both the House and Senate in the Texas Legislature. H.B. 1803, by Rockdale Rep. Dan Kubiak, passed the House by a vote of 104-23. This bill would provide for loans to individuals and corporations for the production of alcohol. These loans would be made through the Texas Indus-trial Commission.

Fifteen million dollars was provided in the form of a 10 year loan. A group of individuals could obtain up to a half a million dollar loan, while an individual would be limited to a \$25 thousand dollar loan.

H.B. 1986, by Somerville Rep. Bill Keese, passed by a vote of 127-1. This bill cleared any legal aspects pertaining to the produc-tion of alcohol in Texas.

In recent testimony presented before the House Agriculture Committee, we learned that Brazil now produces close to half of the country's fuel needs in the form of alcohol. Brazil's goal is

## Mailbox Improvement

May 21-26 is "Mailbox Im-provement Week," and the Postmaster urged all local cus-tomers to paint and repair unkept or damaged mail receptacles, in town and on rural routes.

"Customers should be sure their boxes provide adequate protection to the mail and are easily reached by carriers to help speed collection and delivery of their mail," the Postmaster said.

The Postmaster recalled that a man named Ira F. Collins was among the first to show interest in improving the appearance and security of the mailbox.

On April 29, 1903, he filed an application with the U.S. Patent Office for a two-part, cylindrical mail receptacle. It consisted of a detachable scoop with a weather proof outer casing, and a metal flag that could be raised to indicate when mail was to be collected.

"Until Collins came along," the Postmaster said, "many makeshift receptacles, including tin cans nailed to trees--were used as mail-boxes, particularly after rural mail service began in 1896."

Today, a variety of approved commercial mailbox designs are available for use with decorative posts, and those who prefer a custom-made mailbox may check with any Post Office to make sure it meets specifications and requirements.

During Mailbox Improvement Week, residents should examine their mailboxes to determine whether they have been damaged by weather or vandalism--particularly those located along rural routes, city curb-lines, and highways and should make nec-essary repairs or improvements.
