



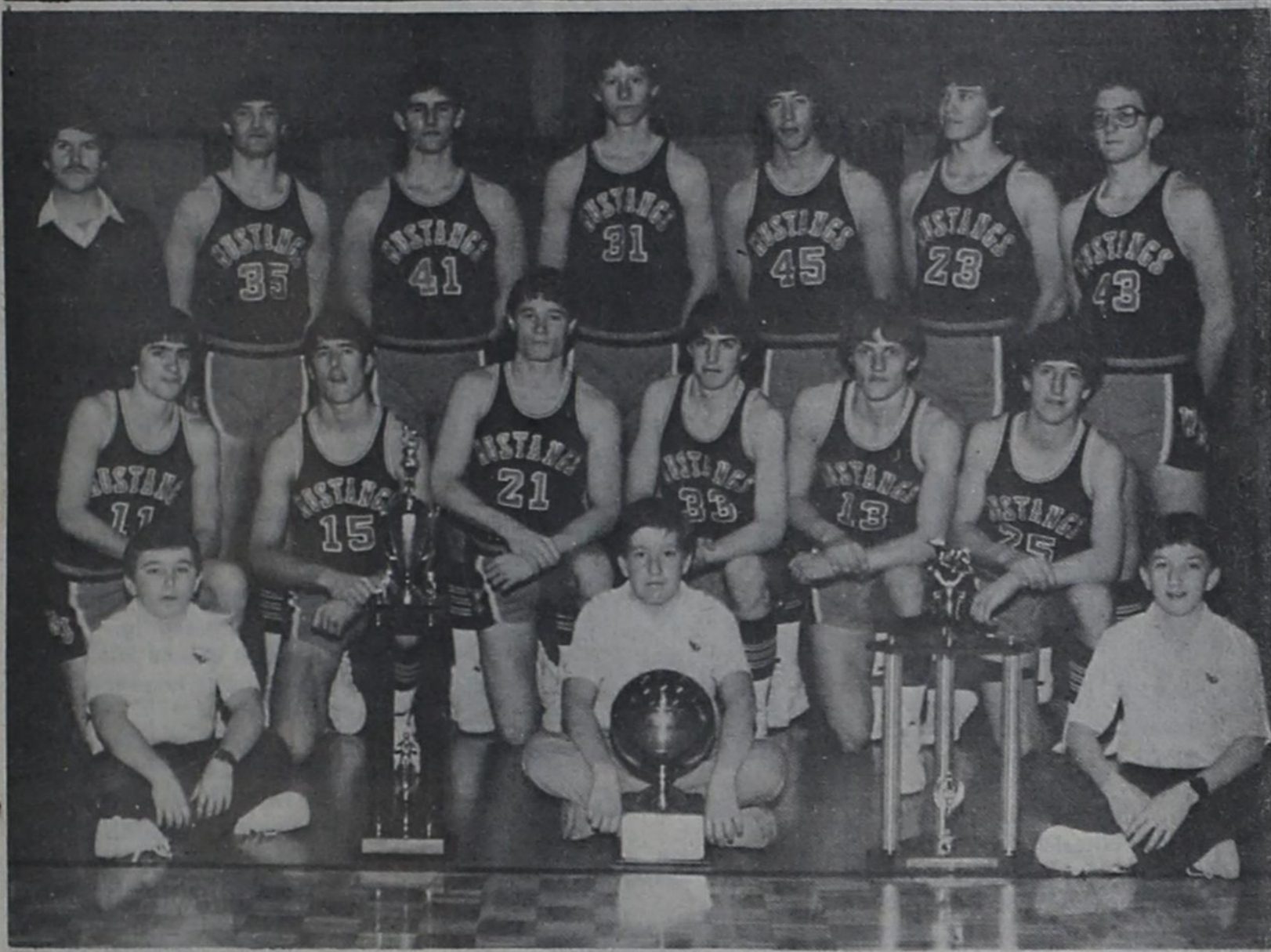

Cattleman's Club Schedules Meeting

The Eastern Panhandle Cattleman's Club will hold a meeting Thursday Feb. 28th, at Maxey's Steakhouse at 7:00 P.M.

The topic for this meeting will be on Agriferon-C. Agriferon-C is an effective antiviral treatment which allivates clinical symptoms (loss of appetite, fever, and poor performance) of the Bovine Respiratory Disease Complex in cattle. Cattle treated with Agriferon-C have significantly less weight loss, shorter duration of fever, lower peak fever, faster antibody production and show improved levels of performance and feed efficiency during periods of respiratory infection.

Cattleman in the area who annually receive cattle to graze summer pasture and wheat should especially be interested in this program.

Members of the Eastern Panhandle Cattleman's Club invite anyone interested in the meeting to attend.

Hill Attends TASB Legal Workshop

Bobby Hill, Wheeler School District Board member attended the Texas Association of School Board Legal Workshop in the Sheridan Hotel in Amarillo, Tuesday, February 26. An update of new legal decisions brought about by the recent passing of House Bill 72 last summer and currently undergoing final readings before the State Board of Education and the Legislature in Austin were discussed. Topics included: new procedures for student discipline; career ladder appraisals, compliance of School Boards for Employee grievances; local School District Litigation efforts involving asbestos; and remediation and Teacher Nonrenewal Hearings after House Bill 72. All school districts in Texas must have policies addressing these issues in place before the 85-86 school year as well as having the career ladder in place before the term ending for the 84-85 school year.

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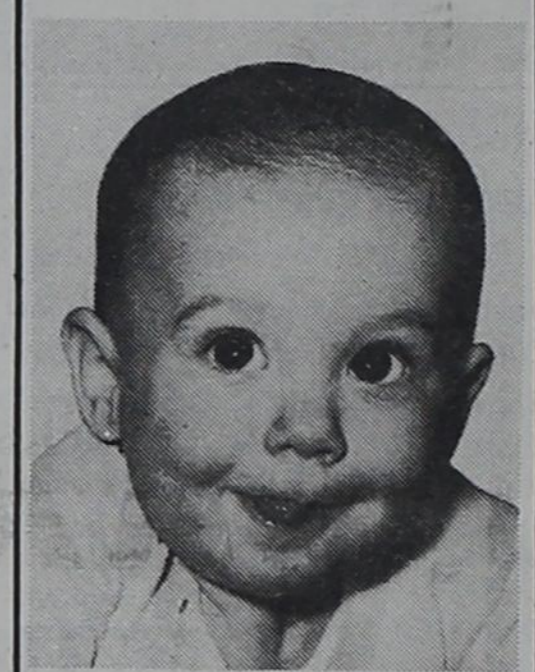
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CARE CENTER VALENTINE KING AND QUEEN

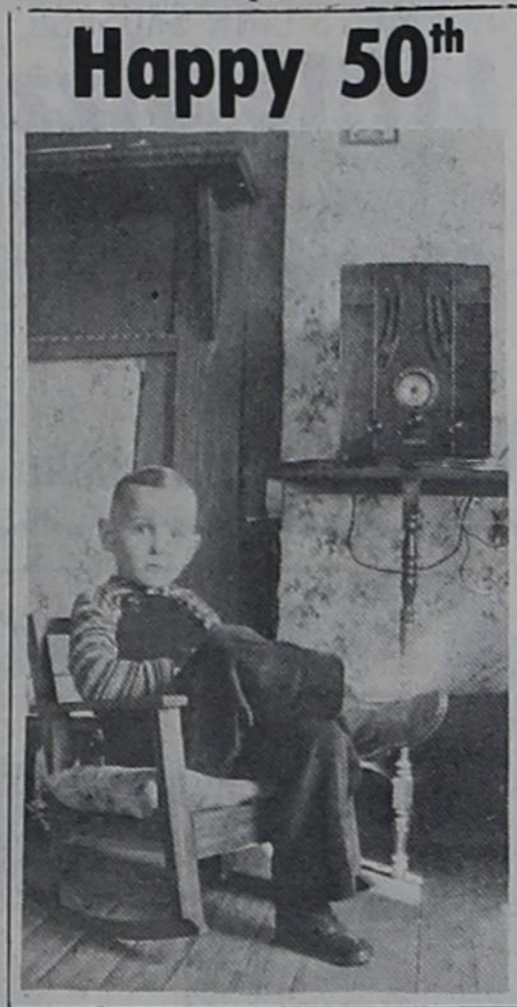

Employees To Help With FmHA Loans

The Farmers Home Administration will hire additional temporary employees to help process farm loan applications in Texas FmHA State Director J. Lynn Futch said today.

They will serve for four months to help with the seasonal loan peak and to process loans for hundreds of farmers who have requested a review of their debt situation to see if they qualify for the new debt restructuring program."

Under the new program, farmers who are having trouble meeting their FmHA payments, may have their loans rescheduled or have up to 25 percent of their loans, up to \$200,000, set aside for five years with no interest. Farm loans held by commercial banks and other lenders that are classified as "problem loans," can be reduced by ten percent in exchange for an FmHA guarantee.

"We already know where qualified potential staff people are," Futch said, "and we hope to put them to work as soon as possible. Most of them are familiar with our loan processing requirements, and a minimum of new training should be required."

The additional personnel will be assigned to FmHA offices where the work load is greatest," Futch said. "The new temporary employees will include both loan specialists and Clerical staff."

We are all proud of our young folks. We've been here some forty years and as far as I know they have all turned out well. Brought honor to their school and families.

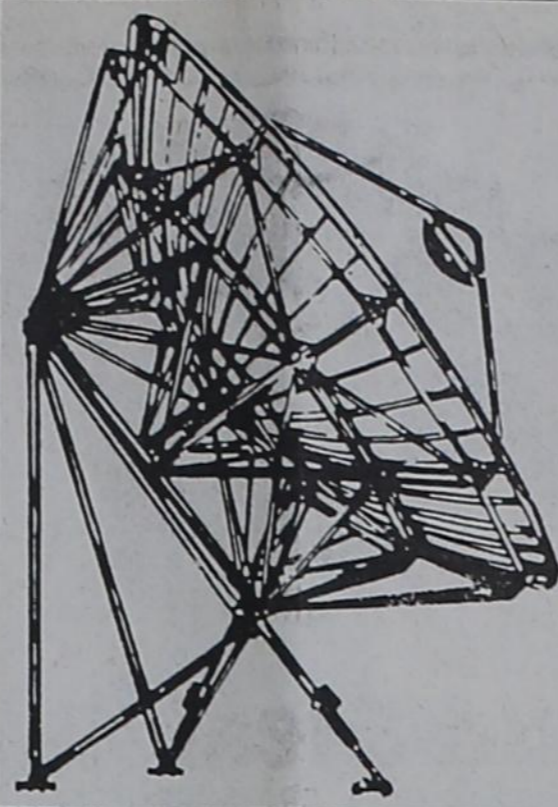

The possibility of passing an ordinance to regulate smoking in public places was discussed. The Council could not see any way of enforcing such an ordinance at this time.

An ordinance amending chapter 16, article I of the code of ordinances of the City of Wheeler, Texas, entitled "Streets, Sidewalks, and Other Public Areas," by abolishing section 15-11 and substituting therefore the following section 15-11, limiting the use of a portion of the streets, avenues, and public places within the City of Wheeler, Texas, to public parking purposes in the designated spaces from 8 o'clock a.m. until 7 o'clock p.m. on all days.

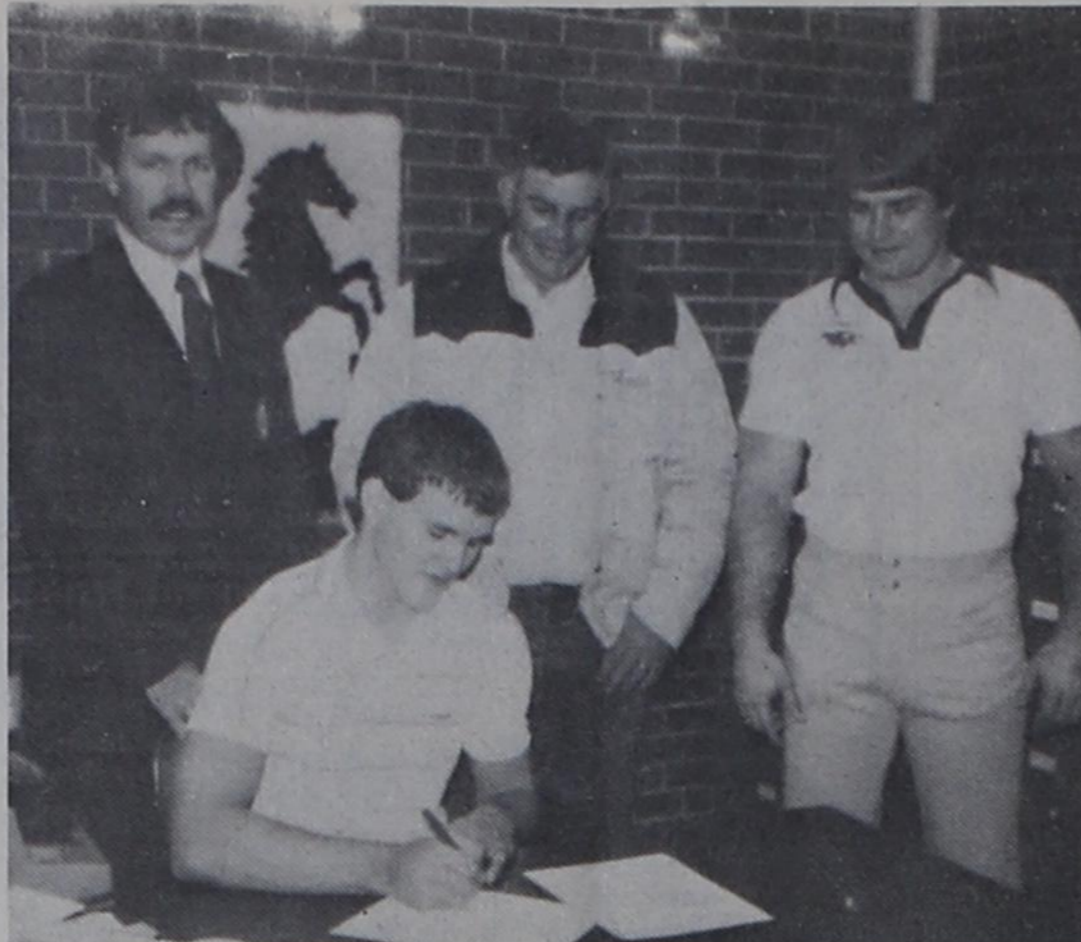

The Wheeler County Soil and Water Conservation District announces that the time for ordering windbreak trees and pecans is NOW!! The deadline for taking orders has been set for March 8, 1985. The Wheeler County SWCD still has a good supply of Ponderosa Pine, Austrian Pine and Eastern Red Cedar. These are containerized and the minimum order is 30 trees of any specie and the price is \$50.00 per order. There is also still a good supply of Russian Olive, Hackberry, Honey Locust and Green Ash. These trees are barerooted and come in bundles of 50 and the price is \$25.00 per bundle of any species. There is still plenty of barerooted Cheyenne pecans at \$11.00 each with no minimum order. All trees will be delivered on March 21, 1985 at the County Show Barn north of Wheeler starting at 9:00 in the morning. Contact your local SWCD Director or orders may be left at the Soil Conservation Service Office in Wheeler. The Wheeler County SWCD requires that all orders be paid for when the order is placed.

Emergency Loans Available From FHA

Emergency loans for farmers and ranchers in Wheeler, Hemphill and Roberts counties are available through the county office of the Farmers Home Administration (FMHA) in Wheeler, John D. Wolf III, FMHA county supervisor, said today. Wolf asked that those who need farm credit as a result of the severe freeze December 18, 1983 thru December 31, 1983 make their needs known at the Farmers Home Administration office in Wheeler. As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30-percent loss of production to be eligible for an FmHa emergency loan, Wolf said.

Applications for assistance in the disaster stricken counties will be accepted by Farmers Home until August 20, 1985 for physical and production losses.

FmHa loans covering actual physical and production losses may be used to replace installations, equipment, or buildings, (including Homes) lost through this disaster. Funds may be used to buy feed, seed, fertilizer, livestock, or to meet interest and depreciation payments on current real estate and chattel debts.

"Funds can be used for essential operating and living costs", Wolf said.

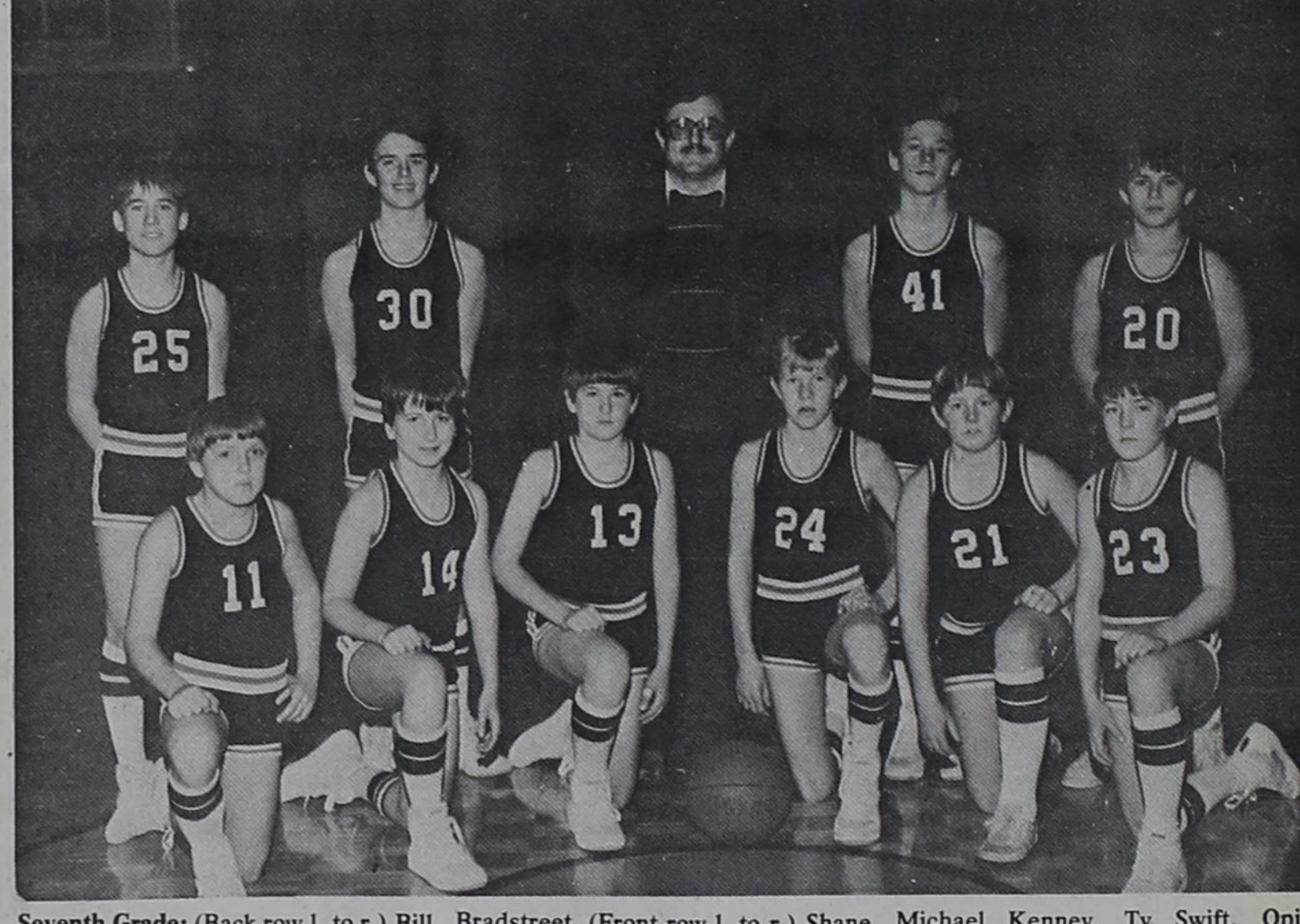

Panhandle Transit, a rural transportation program providing door-to-door transportation to the 26-counties of the Texas Panhandle, is now in operation, according to Ms. Nancy Harvey, Special Projects Director for the Texas Panhandle Community Action Corporation. It is being contracted through the State Department

of Highways and Public Transportation with funding through the Urban Mass Transit Administration, and will operate as a non-profit transit system through T.P.C.A.C.

Routine service will be open to the general public and especially suitable for senior citizens and handicapped persons, and will have flexible schedules in order to meet passengers needs.

Regular service will include trips for medical, shopping or essential business purposes, and to visit senior citizens centers and nutrition sites.

A Panhandle Transit vehicle will pick up and return passengers to their homes.

Various purchase-of-service contracts will make possible a cost free service to persons who are eligible for other programs such as: A.F.D.C., Food Stamps, S.S.I., Medic-aide, J.T.P.A., Head Start, housing, and butter and cheese.

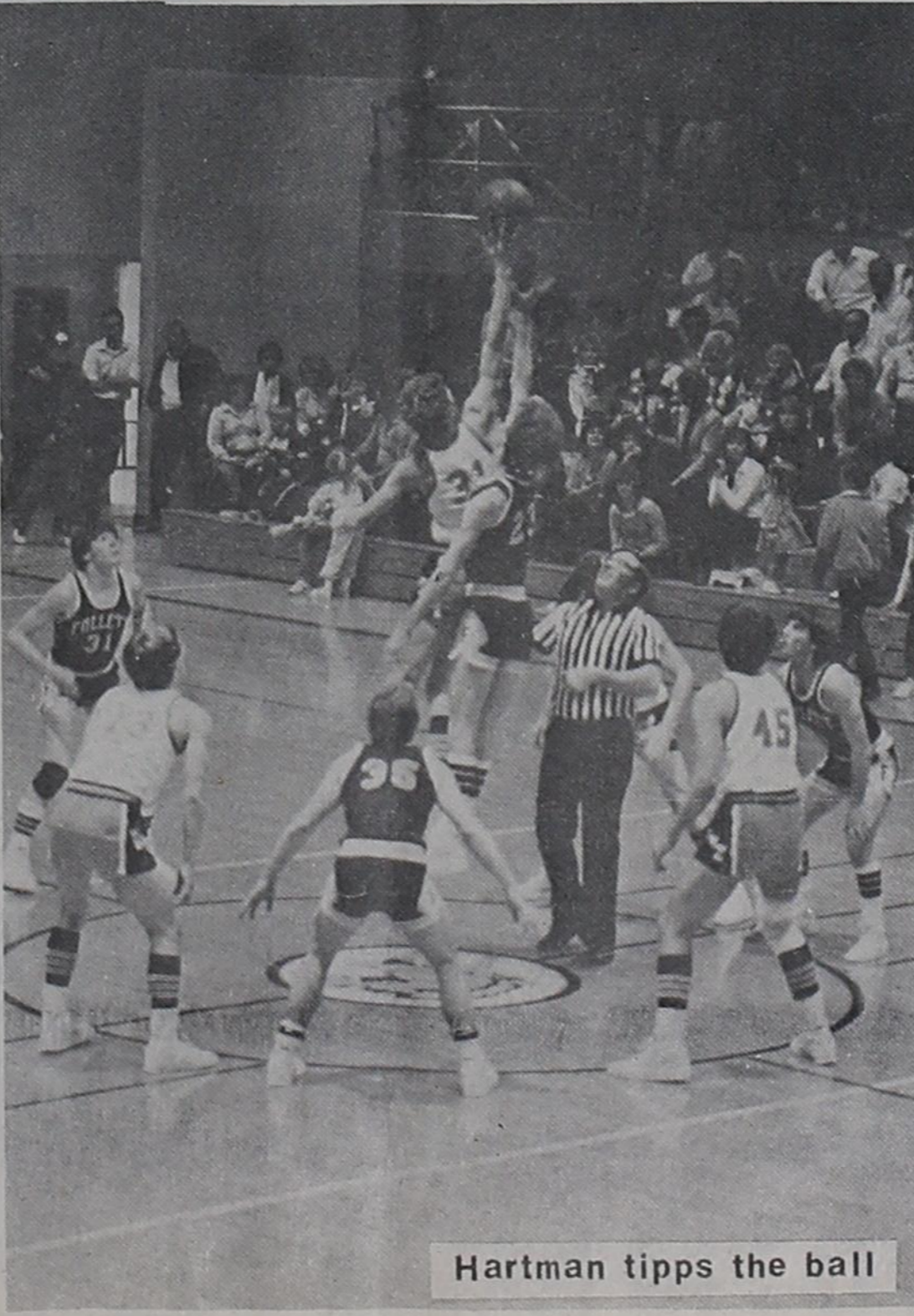
All other passengers will be charges \$.50 for a one-way, in-town service; and \$.25 per mile, one-way, outside of the city limits.

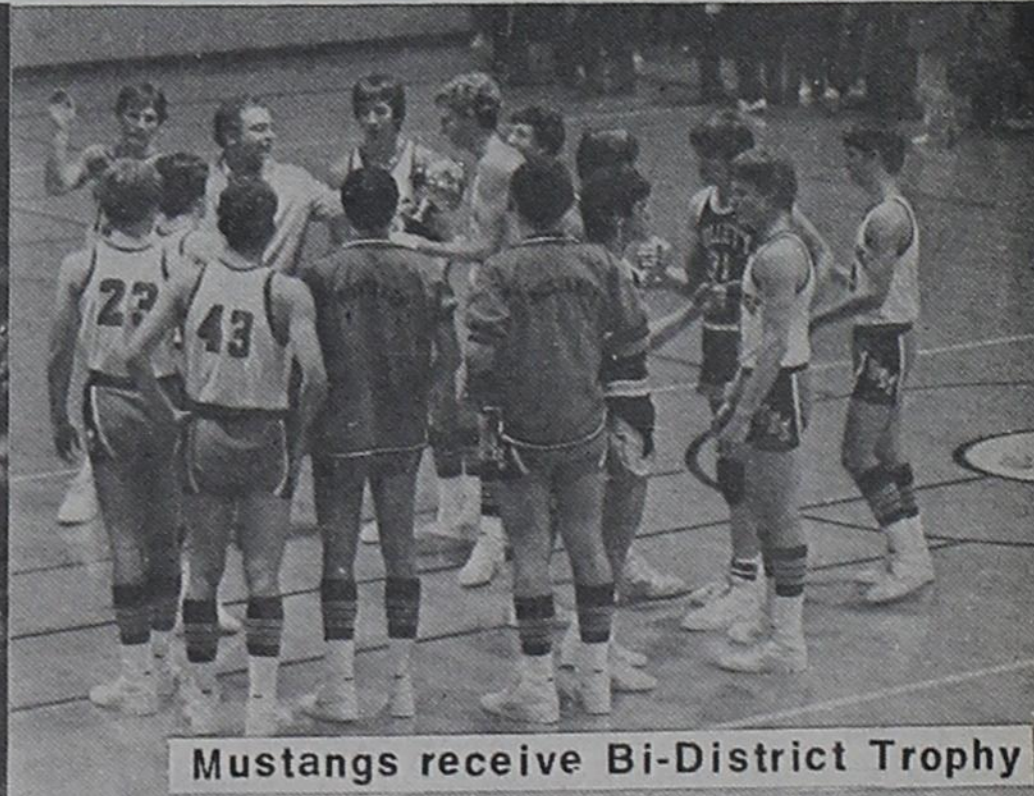
