

FILING DEADLINES NEAR **Three Have Filed For School Board**

Two positions will be open on the Wheeler I.S.D. Board of Trustees. The election to fill Positions 4 and 5 will be Saturday, April 6. Candidates have until midnight, March 6 to file applications for a place on the ballot.

Three individuals have filed to have their names placed on the ballot. Bobbye Hill and Shari Porter have both filed for Position 4. Delbert Thomas has filed for Position 5.

Mrs. Bobbye Hill is presently completing her first 3 year term on the school board; having occupied position 4 since 1982.

Cecil Pierce was elected to position 5 the school board in 1982, Pierce does not intend to seek re-election.

Applications may be obtained from the School Business Office or the Board Secretary, Mrs. Vida Brown.

Three places are to be filled on the city council in the April 26 election. Any qualified voter residing within the city is eligible to file for any of the three seats on the council; filing opened on February 4 and will continue through March 6. Places 1, 3, and 5 are each open for 2-year

terms. The positions to be filled are presently being served by Bobby Vanpool, Berniece Hall and Jimmy Hill; places 1, 3 and 5 respectively. Vanpool has been in charge of transportation while on the council is completing an unexpired term, having been appointed by the council.

Mrs. Hall will be completing her seventh year on the council; she was elected in 1978 to fill an unexpired term and re-elected in 1981. She has been working with the park and swimming pool.

Jimmy Hill was appointed to the council in September, 1980 to fill an unexpired term; he has been over-

An update of new legal decisions brought about by the recent passing of House Bill 72 last summer and Sorry about your defeat at currently undergoing final readings before the State Board of Education and the Legislature in Austin were discussed. Topics included: new procedures for student discipline; career ladder appraisals, compliance of School Boards for Employee grievances; local School District Litigation efforts involving asbestos; and remediation and Teacher Nonrenewal Hearings after House Bill 72. All school districts in Texas must have policies addressing these issues in place before the 85-86 school year as well as having the career ladder in place before the term ending for the 84-85 school year.

> Under the new program, farmers who are having trouble meeting their FmHA payments, may have their loans rescheduled or have up to 25 percent of their loans, up to \$200,000, set aside for five years with no interest. Farm loans held by commercial banks and other lenders that are classified as "problem loans," can be reduced by ten percent in exchange for an FmHA guarantee.

"We already know where qualified potential staff people are," Futch said, "and we hope to put them to work as soon as possible. Most of them are familiar with our loan processing requirements, and a minimum of new training should be required."

The additional personnel will be assigned to FmHA offices where the work Load is greatest," Futch Said. "The new temporary employees will include both loan specialists and Clerical staff.'
