JUNIOR LIVESTOCK SHOW SCHEDULED

Two hundred forty-four animals are entered in the 1995 Wheeler County Junior Livestock Show which gets underway on Friday, January 13 when all animals will be in place at 7:00 a.m. Members of Wheeler County 4-H Clubs and FFA Chapters have been feeding and fitting their animals for several months in preparation for the show.

Eleven steers will be weighed beginning at 7:00 a.m. and the steer show will begin at 9:00 a.m. on Friday followed by the heifer show with six heifers.
Forty-nine lambs are entered in the market lamb show, which will begin at

12:00 noon on Friday, January 13. One hundred seventy-eight hogs are entered in the market hog show beginning at 8:30 a.m. Saturday, January 14.
One hundred of the top placing animals will sell in the premium sale at 7:00 p.m. on Saturday, January 14.

Gary Hardcastle, president of the Wheeler County Livestock Show Association and general superintendent of the show, invites everyone to attend the show and auction sale. He said public support and recognition is very important to the youth who have invested so much money and effort preparing for the show.

Many local individuals are giving their time to make the show a success. Richie Kiker and Bret Begert will be in charge of the beef cattle show, Danny Hardcastle and Kyle Adams will serve as superintendent and assistant superintendent of the lamb show and Clifton Morgan, Jackie Sparlin, Russell Gaines and Jim Verden will direct the hog division.

Canadian Production Credit Association is furnishing the awards for the lambs and hogs and the Wheeler County Farm Bureau will supply the beef cattle awards.

LAND IS NEEDED FOR TURKEY HUNTERS

The Wheeler Chamber of Commerce is seeking farmers, ranchers or land owners willing to lease their land for the hunting of turkeys. The project has been an annual event for the past 6 years and offers the individuals an opportunity to earn extra money for the use of their land.

Turkey season this year is April 8 thru May 14. The turkey hunt is kicked off with the Wheeler Volunteer Fire Department Breakfast.

Landowners receive payment for each hunter on his land. The hunters are screened and sign liability releases. The number of hunter on an individual piece of land is determined by the bird population. Eight farmers and ranchers participated in the hunt last year, representing 10,000 acres of land.

The Wheeler area has an abundance of wild turkeys and the annual turkey season draws the attention of hunters from over the nation. Wheeler

hosted 38 hunters from over the nation last year and has received national coverage over the past six years through magazine and newspaper articles. The number of hunters has grown each year.

At the present time 40 hunters have registered for this year's hunt. More hunters are expected to register between now and turkey season. Several

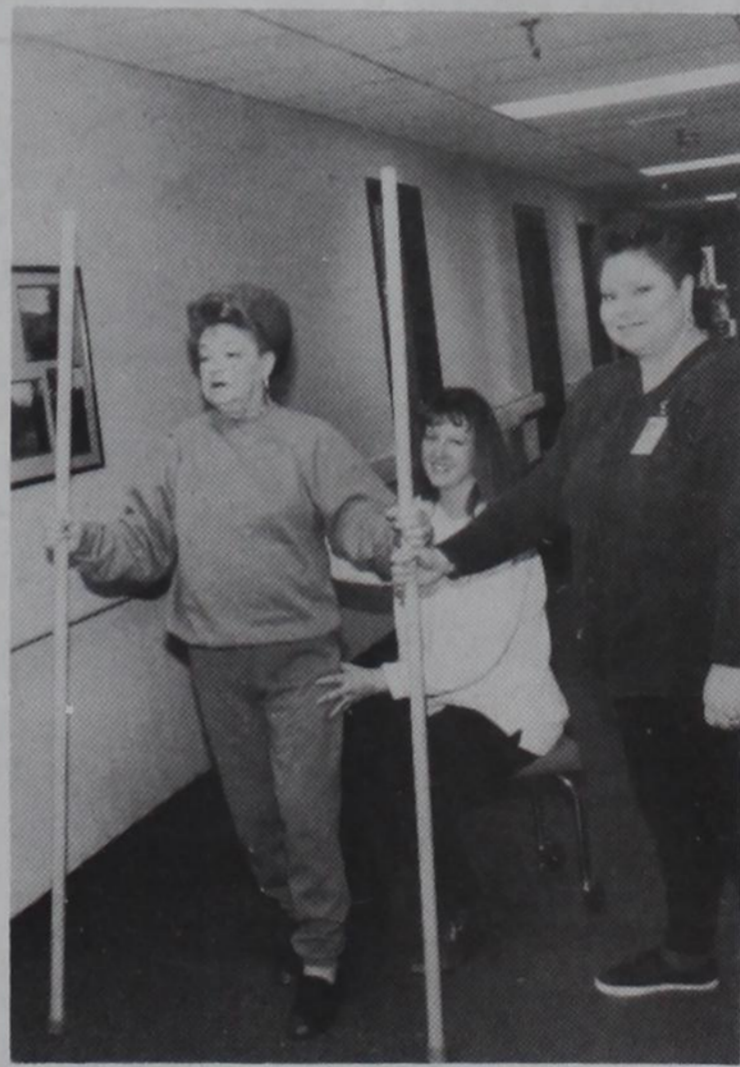

THE STATE OF TEXAS COUNTIES OF POTTER AND KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS: WHEELER

INTERLOCAL AGREEMENT FOR CONDUCTING HEARINGS AND PROCEEDINGS FOR COURT ORDERED MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES

Pursuant to The Interlocal Cooperation Act (Chapter 791, Texas Government Code,) and the Texas Mental Health Code (Title 7, Subtitle C., Texas Health & Safety Code), the counties of Potter and Wheeler, hereinafter referred to as the "Parties", acting by and through their respective Commissioners' Court, for and in consideration of the mutual benefits received by each county through concerted regional cooperation, hereby enter into an agreement under the following terms and conditions:

PURPOSE

The Parties are local governmental units obligated to pay the costs for hearing and proceedings related to involuntary mental commitments under the Texas Mental Health Code. In addition, elected officials of the Parties have responsibilities under the Code in conducting the hearings and proceedings or representing the state in the hearing. Therefore, providing the hearings and related proceedings is a valid governmental function and service which is of mutual concern to the Parties. Potter County is the location of the mental health facility serving the area of the Parties. Therefore, the persons requiring involuntary mental services, and the mental health professionals who provide those services are located in Potter County. Wheeler County desires to have the hearings and related proceedings conducted by Potter County. By this effort the Parties can provide the proposed patients with hearings in a convenient forum.

II TERM

This agreement shall be effective for one (1) year from date of execution unless terminated by the parties as provided in this agreement.

III OBLIGATIONS OF POTTER COUNTY

Potter County, through its County Judge and County Attorney, shall conduct proceedings for court-ordered mental health services for proposed patients who are residents of Wheeler County when:

1) the proposed patient is brought to a public mental health facility in Potter County on an emergency detention pursuant to Chapter 573, Texas Mental Health Code, or

2) when an application has been filed in the probate court of Wheeler County and transferred to the Potter County Court pursuant to rule 255, Texas Rules of Civil Procedure.

The services provided by Potter County shall include the services of the County Judge and County Attorney and other services customarily performed in proceedings for court ordered mental health services.

All procedure and hearings shall be performed according to the provisions of the Texas Mental Health Code.

Potter County shall have no obligation to proceed with a case which the County Judge and/or County Attorney determines is not a case justifying court-ordered mental health services.

The disposition of a case accepted by Potter County shall be at the sole determination of Potter County.

IV OBLIGATIONS OF WHEELER COUNTY

Wheeler County shall pay out of current revenues to Potter County, as consideration for the obligations in Paragraph III., the sum of \$150.00 for each application filed as fee compensation for the services of the Pot-

ter County Attorney; and shall also be responsible for the costs for a hearing or proceeding conducted on its behalf by Potter County. Such costs shall include the patients attorney's fee, court reporter's fee, physician examination fees, compensation for the court-appointed personnel listed under Section 571, 017, Texas Health & Safety Code, and the expenses of transportation to a department mental health facility or to a federal agency.

Wheeler County shall also be responsible for costs if the patient must be returned to the location of apprehension, to his or her residence or to another location under \$573.024 or \$574.028, Texas Health & Safety Code.

V RENEWAL OF CONTRACT
This contract may be renewed annually by an affirmative vote of the commissioners' Court of each Party.

VI TERMINATION
This contract may be terminated by either Party at any time. The termination shall be effective (30) days from receipt of written notice of the desire to terminate by the other party.

VII INDEMNIFICATION
Each Party shall indemnify and hold the other Party harmless for all damages and liability to any person or property resulting from the actions of the Party or any of its employees.

VIII AMENDMENTS

This agreement may be amended in writing by the Parties hereto any times.

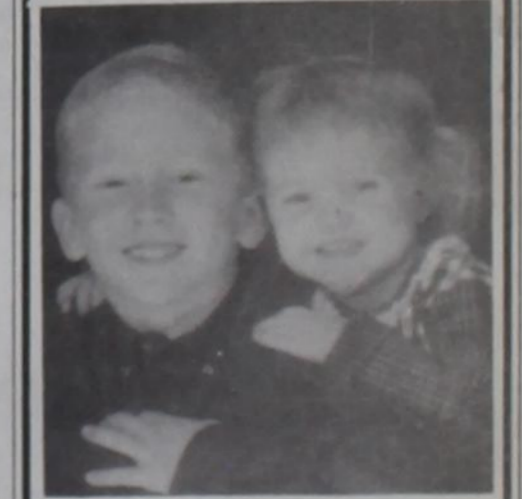

A NEW MOZZARELLA CHEESE TO LOWER FAT IN PIZZA

Americans consume nearly 100 acres of pizza daily. This figure translates to an average of 7.7 pounds of that delicious, stringy mozzarella cheese topping per person per year. Scientists with Agricultural Research Service have developed a type of mozzarella with only 10 percent fat by weight and textural properties similar to those of commercial full fat mozzarella compared to the regular mozzarella with about 22 to 24 percent fat by weight and part-skim with about 17 percent fat. Regular pizza consumed by school-age children has about 20 percent fat cheese. So you can count that 40 percent of the calories in a serving of pizza are contributed by fat. This new cheese will help provide lower fat pizzas that still have similar properties in taste and palatability to those of the full fat mozzarella.

The Lady Cougars and Cougars traveled to Follett to meet the Panthers. The Lady Cougars won 40-26, and the Cougars won a close one 27-23.


