Luckenbach is still the place to get away from it all

LUCKENBACH, Texas—The "sheriff of Luckenbach" stared across the bar, her rattlesnake earrings swaying in the breeze.

"I've stood by Jerry Jeff in the good times and bad," she said. "And there's been some really bad times.

"But I love him, he's like a little brother to me. A blood brother."

Aside from her duties as "sheriff," Marge Mueller has been working as a bartender for Luckenbach onand-off since 1972. She's seen a lot of musicians perform in the dancehall over the past 22 years, but none have had a bigger impact on this tiny Hill Country town than Jerry Jeff Walker.

Several years before Willie and Waylon ever "got back to the basics," Jerry Jeff put Luckenbach on the map with "Viva Terlingua!"-Jerry Jeff's breakthrough album recorded in the Luckenbach dancehall in 1973.

affair with Luckenbach didn't end there. After recording two more albums in the dancehall, and even trying to buy the town once or twice, he still returns occasionally to sing and relax in this scenic town.

"It's a step back in time," Jerry Jeff said in a recent phone interview. "Once you get in there and get your car parked and get walking around ... all the modern stuff leaves you ... the malls and freeways ... and you can relax.

"There's not much to do there without interacting with other people. It becomes a sort of thing where you meet somebody from somewhere else and start having a good time."

The album's name was taken from a bumper sticker in the bar for the Terlingua chili cookoff.

Food exporters should look to World cattle count appears stable Russia for new markets

WASHINGTON (AP)— U.S. food exporters searching for new markets should look to Russia despite that country's recent economic troubles, the Agriculture Department suggests.

The Russian market, while still forming, is largely untapped by U.S. exporters and could offer great rewards, according to an article in the current issue of the USDA publication AgExporter.

In the first five months of 1994, Russia expanded to become the fifth largest market in the world for U.S. consumer-oriented products, surpassing such countries as Korea, Taiwan and Singapore.

Also, the market for imported consumer-ready food in Russia is estimated at \$2.5 billion and predicted to grow as further economic recovery occurs.

Europe currently dominates the Russian import market, most of which con-

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sists of upscale food purchased by the wealthiest 10 percent to 15 percent of the population.

European Union nations alone account for \$1.4 billion of the total, mainly because their proximity to Russia allows for quick delivery of specialty orders.

Still, interest in American products is high and Russian producers provide little competition in the upscale food arena.

In 1993, American exports to Russia rose sharply to \$346 million from \$126 million the previous year. Snack food exports jumped from \$3 million in 1992 to \$82 million last year. Red meat and poultry exports also increased significantly.

For the first five months of 1994, U.S. food exports are estimated at \$206 million, 280 percent ahead of the same period in 1993.

Though European foods crowd most of the shelves at Western-style supermarkets in Moscow and St. Petersburg, U.S. goods are starting to make inroads, particularly in the freezers where American ice cream, pizzas and processed chicken products are prevalent.

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
