Her presentation appeals to the men who see themselves from another perspective and to the women who can relate and empathize.

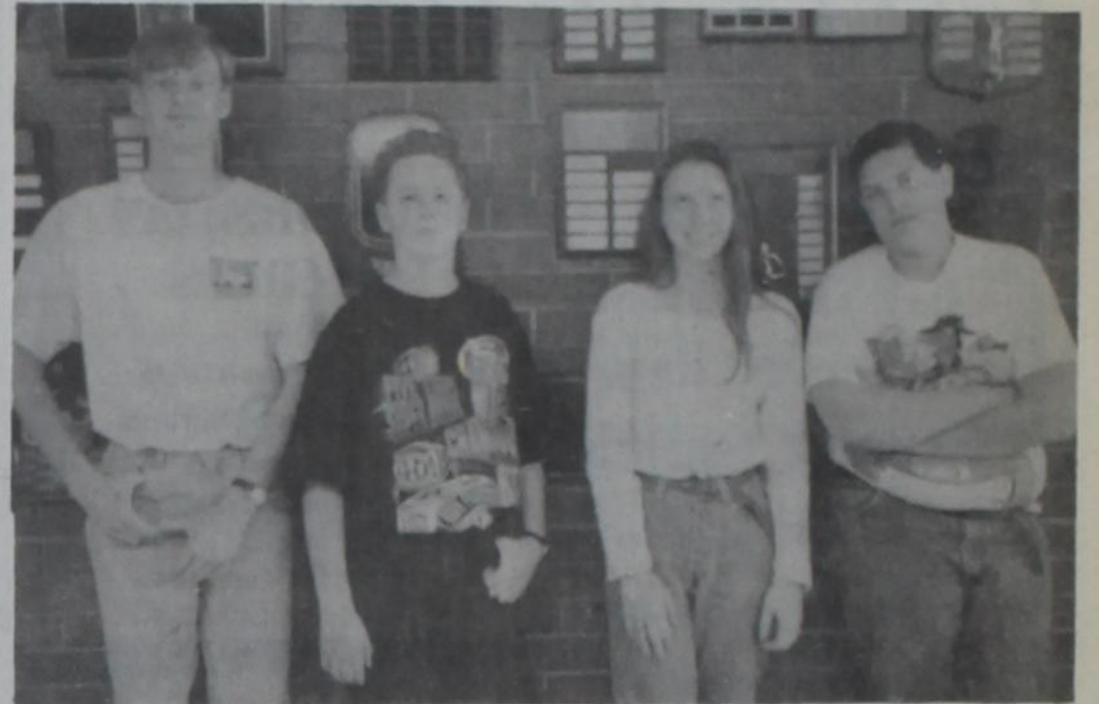

Ila Layton Byers, 86, Is Buried in Wheeler Wed.

Ila Layton Byers, 86, of Wheeler, died Saturday, February 4, 1995, in Amarillo. Services were at 2 p.m. Wednesday in Country Chapel in Wheeler, with the Rev. Rodney Weatherly, pastor, officiating. Burial was in Wheeler Cemetery under the direction of Wright Funeral Home.

Mrs. Byers was born Oct. 14, 1908 in St. John, Kansas. She attended the University of Colorado and taught at the Nolva School near Perryton. She married Raymond N. Byers on July 18, 1929 in Beacer, Oklahoma. He died October 15, 1983. The couple came to Wheeler County in 1949 from Ochiltree County. Mrs. Byers was a housewife, but helped her husband with ranching operations in Ochiltree, Wheeler, Gray and Collingsworth counties. She was a member of the Progressive Study Club and a volunteer at the Wheeler Care Center.

She was preceded in death by a son, James N. Byers, in 1988.

Survivors include a daughter, Nona Ann Faulkner of Longview, a stepson, Raymond N. Byers, Jr. of Sarasota, Florida; a brother, David Layton of Carmel, California; five grandchildren; and eight great-grandchildren.

Stamp Cancellation Design To Be Selected

The Old Mobeetie Texas Association is sponsoring an art contest to select two pieces of art work. One selection will become a special pictorial United States Postal Service stamp cancellation for Sweetwater City Station that will be open for one day only on July 1, 1995, at the Old Mobeetie Texas Association Jail Museum. A

second selection will become the cover of a historical booklet that will be available on July 1, 1995 during Wheeler County Heritage Day. The art work chosen will commemorate Sweetwater City, the original name given to Mobeetie, Texas, between 1875 and 1879 before Wheeler County was organized. The art work must be black and white, pen and ink, and 5 x 7 inches in size. The subject matter should reflect the life and purpose of Sweetwater City which was to accommodate Fort Elliott and the settlers that rapidly began to fill the empty territory protected by the soldiers at Fort Elliott.

Sheryl Estes Named To Olympic Selection Comm.

Wayland Baptist University Flying Queens Head Coach Sheryl Estes has been appointed to the Player Selection Committee for USA Basketball. As the committee's NAIA representative, Estes will be involved in the selection of the 1996 United States Olympic women's basketball team.

Estes replaces Karen Stromme of Minnesota-Duluth and will begin her term of service by attending the organization's business meeting during the Women's NCAA Final Four in Minneapolis, Minn. In May, Estes will travel to Colorado Springs to begin the selection process for the U.S. Sports Festival teams.

Committee members are Carol Callan (chair), representing the National Federation of State High School Associations; Ceal Barry, Women's Basketball Coaches Association; Evelyn Blalock, National Junior College Athletic Association; Charlene Curtis, NCAA; Lin Dunn, NCAA; Jim Foster, NCAA; Cindy Hauserman, athlete representative; Lea Henry, athlete representative; Caren Horstmeyer, NCAA; Trudi Lacey, athlete representative; Flo Valdez, National Federation of State High School Associations; Jane Williamson, Amateur Athletic Union; and Estes.

Estes is in her sixth year at Wayland, where she has a record of 149-49 with four NAIA National Tournament appearances, including a trip to the championship game in 1992.

The 32-year-old Mobeetie native has been named NAIA District 8 Coach of the Year four times and is currently vice president of the NAIA Women's Basketball Coaches Association, a member of the Kodak All-American Selection Committee, and a Texas Fellowship of Christian Athletes Advisory Board member.

Going into Sooner Athletic Conference games in Plainview Thursday and Saturday, the Flying Queens are 18-4 and ranked seventh in the nation.

Old Mobeetie To Celebrate Black History

The Old Mobeetie Jail will celebrate Black History Month with a pictorial display of Lt. Henry O. Flipper, West Point's First Black Graduate and America's First Black Officer who was stationed at Fort Elliott, Texas in 1879. The display will begin February 10, 1995. Henry Ossian Flipper was born a slave on March 21, 1856, in Thomasville, Georgia. He began his education in a woodshed where an old slave taught him the alphabet. After the Civil War, his father, a skilled shoemaker and carriage trimmer, prospered and hired the wife of a former Confederate captain to tutor Henry and his other three sons. In the fall of 1872, Henry learned about a vacancy at the West Point Military Academy. After passing the qualifying examination, Flipper received his appointment on May 25, 1873. Flipper became the first black graduate from West Point on June 14, 1877, after enduring four years of loneliness and isolation among the predominantly white cadets who from time to time harassed and mistreated him. When Flipper was handed his diploma, he received a standing ovation from his

classmates and the spectators for his four years of dedication and courage. Major General John Schofield, West Point's Superintendent, gave a tribute to Flipper's bravery against isolation and exclusion by his classmates. He stated, "No white cadet had ever been burdened with the hope of an entire race on his shoulders. Anyone knows how quietly and bravely this young man—the first of his despised race to graduate from West Point—has borne the difficulties of his position; how for four years he has had to stand apart from his classmates as one with them but not of them..." Henry O. Flipper became the first black officer in the

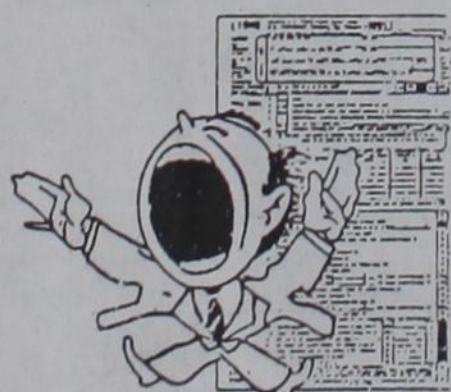

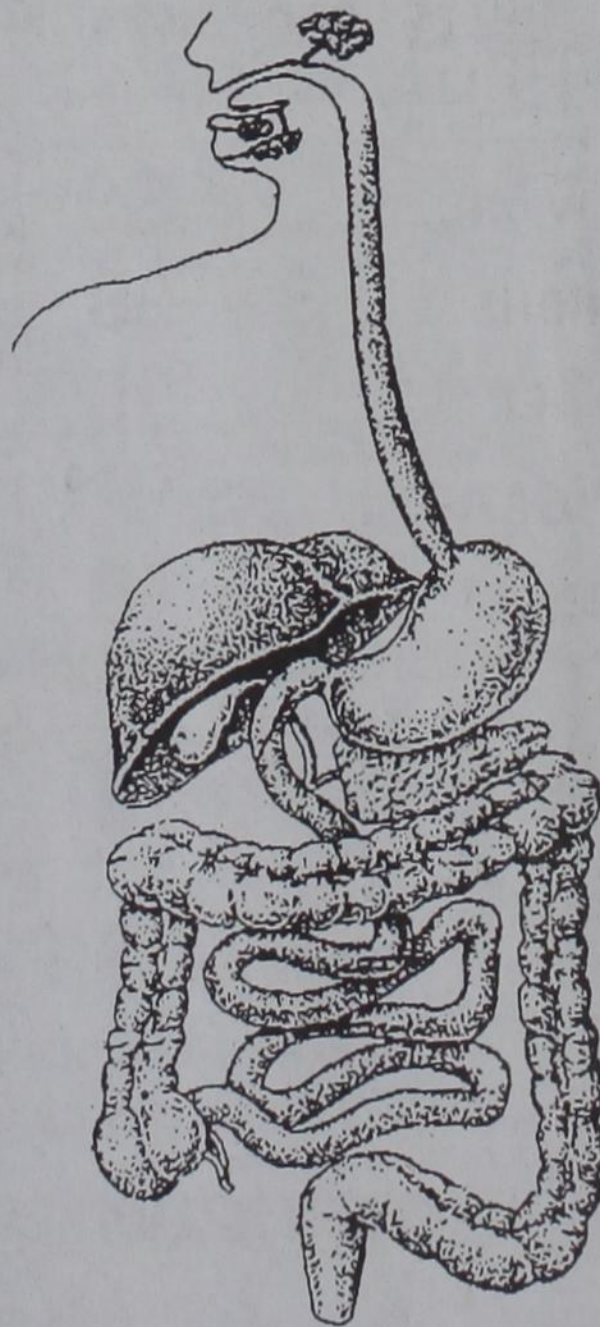



GOOD NUTRITION GOES A LONG WAY FOR OLDER ADULTS

Americans are certainly getting older. In the next 10 years, the largest population growth in the United States will occur in people 85 years old and older. That is because of improved living standards, technology and education. Since good nutrition and exercise are a requirement for health maintenance, then what accounts for the 25 percent of Americans 65 years old and older who still suffer from poor eating habits and irregular activity.

Older Americans have malnutrition because of the following contributors: Poverty or reduced income; loss of appetite due to depression and social isolation; taste diminished due to drugs; lack of taste buds and reduced ability to smell; and poorly fitting dentures.

Senior (and their caregivers) need to ensure that they eat enough food each day by planning ahead and using food dollars wisely. Remember to include enough grain products such as breads, cereals, pasta and rice everyday. If chewing is a problem, choose soft cereals and breads. Remove the bread crust, if present.

Then check to include vegetables whether fresh, canned, dried or frozen everyday. If chewing is difficult, then slice, chop or grate fresh vegetables so you can eat them raw or cooked.

Try a variety of preparation methods when preparing them. Experiment with a variety of seasonings to add interest and variety to the vegetables. Don't forget to add at least 2 servings of fruit. Fruit tastes delicious and certainly contributes minerals and vitamins as well as carbohydrates and fiber in the diet.

Another food group that older adults need at least 2 or more cups of everyday is milk, yogurt or cheese. That's the best known source of calcium in the diet. That is so important of older adults to prevent osteoporosis—porous bones. So try to add extra milk or cheese in your daily food preparation.

Many elderly have loss of appetite because they are bored with eating, their sense of taste and smell have diminished or feel that food is too bland. Eating alone is also a factor in diminished appetite.

Smart eating daily following the daily food guide recommendations. Call your local county Extension agent today for a copy of the USDA Food Guide Pyramid so you can select foods wisely to prevent malnutrition.

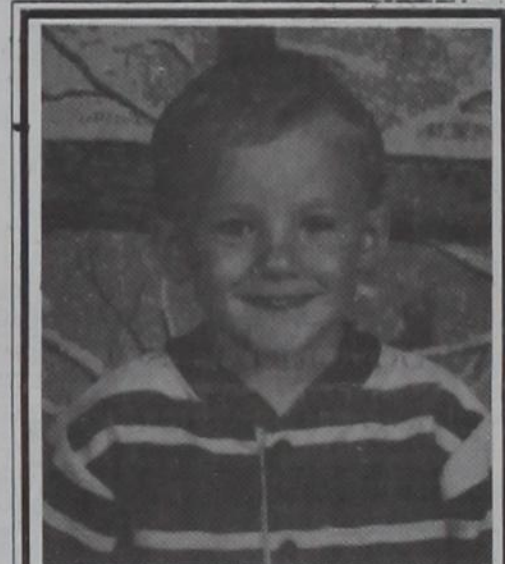

RENDER INCOME-PRODUCING PERSONAL PROPERTY NOW FOR 1995

Business owners are reminded that they must file property rendition forms with the Wheeler County Appraisal District by April 14, 1995. A 15 day extension can be granted if requested in writing.

Anyone who owns or manages income producing personal property on January 1, 1995, must file a rendition statement. Businesses are required to report inventories, furniture & fixtures, machinery, equipment, business vehicles and any other tangible property used in the production of income.

Any taxpayer may voluntarily file a rendition. The rendering of real estate is not required by law, but the act of rendering is a good way to prevent errors.

Property owners with damaged buildings (storms, fire etc.) may also file a special report of decreased value.

Rendition and Report of Decreased Value forms are available at the Appraisal District office, courthouse square, Wheeler, Phone 806-826-5900.

It is a criminal offense to make false statements on these forms. Once completed, the forms are confidential and are not open to public inspection.

Dear Editor:
This month, the U.S. House of Representatives is expected to begin consideration of the "Personal Responsibility Act" (PRA). The welfare reform section of the "Contract With America", PRA would combine 10 federal nutrition programs into "block grants" that would be given directly to states and shift responsibility for America's poor from the federal government to states. The potential negative impacts of block granting child nutrition programs as proposed are staggering.

As parents, we should be opposed to attempts to use PRA to lump funding for education programs like the National School Lunch and Breakfast Programs together with welfare block grants. Child nutrition programs are not, and have never been, welfare programs. Established in 1946, the National School Lunch Act was created by lawmakers concerned about young American men's health and readiness in time of war. Today the program is designed to help keep all of America's children healthy and ready to learn by providing nutritious meals to children of all ages and income groups.

If the legislation is enacted in its current form, the American School Food Service Association estimates that roughly 10 million children could be dropped from the program — either because school administrators find the program is too expensive to be run on a local level, or because children can no longer afford the higher-priced meals likely to be a result of the legislation. Ironically, the PRA, which aims to increase local flexibility, adds more paperwork burden to local school lunch and breakfast programs.

Even more troublesome, federal funding levels under PRA are capped, with no guaranteed allocation beyond 1996. This means that even children

who are eligible to receive free or reduced priced lunches under the new rules may still have to be turned away if state funds run out. What's more, PRA sets no dietary guidelines, and provides for no minimal standards.

And, while the proposed cuts in child nutrition programs will save the federal government less than 0.1 percent of total spending from 1996-1999, the impact on America's school children will be enormous. Studies show that children who suffer from hunger — more than 12 million in America — are more often sick, absent from school and have a much harder time concentrating in class.

Never in the history of the nutrition programs, established in 1946, has such potentially dangerous legislation been proposed. The American people may want welfare reform, but surely not at the expense of our children's health and education. I strongly urge lawmakers to completely eliminate child nutrition program block grants from the welfare reform bill. Child nutrition programs are not welfare programs. They are educational support programs aimed at building healthy children, ready to learn.

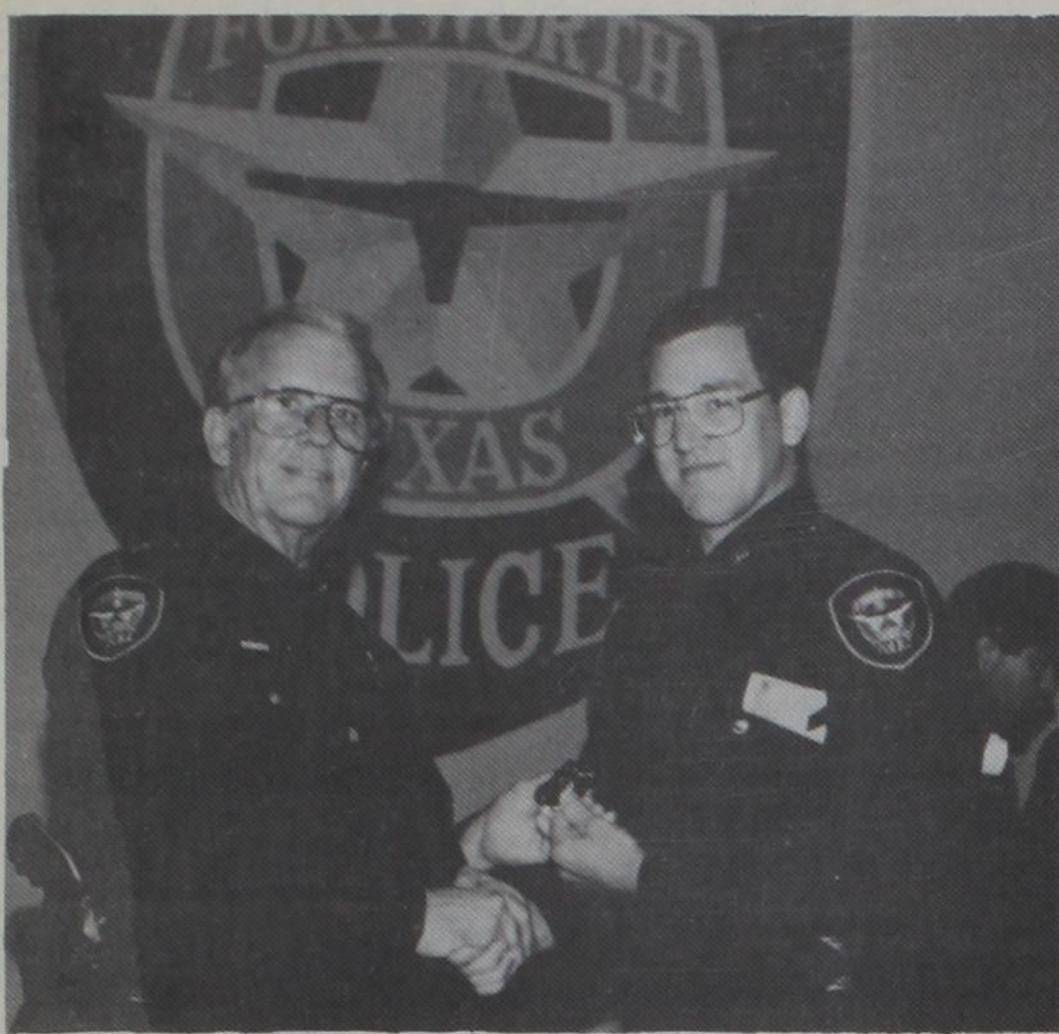

United States Military Service.

Flipper was commissioned a Second Lieutenant and was assigned to frontier duty with the all black Tenth United States Cavalry at Fort Sill, Oklahoma (Indian Territory). The Ninth and Tenth Cavalry and the 24th and 25th Infantry became known as "Buffalo Soldiers." They fought Apache and Comanche warriors and policed rustlers and outlaws. Buffalo Soldiers built new roads and telegraph lines and protected stagecoaches. Perhaps the Plains Indians dubbed them "buffalo soldiers," because their hair seemed similar to a buffalo's or it may have been a term of respect, since the buffalo played an integral role in the life of the Plains Indians.

Flipper became a close friend of his troop commander, Captain Nicholas Nolan, and Irishman, who took the young Lieutenant under his wing. When Nolan married, he brought his new bride and her sister back to live on the post. After Captain and Mrs. Nolan insisted that Lt. Flipper board with the Nolan family, Flipper discharged his cook and moved in with the Nolans. He and Miss Mollie Dwyer eventually became close friends and often went riding together.

In early 1879, Troop A was ordered to Fort Elliott, Texas, where Captain Nolan, was made the commanding officer. He appointed Lieutenant Flipper to be his adjutant which was the ranking officer on the Commanding Officer's staff. In addition to his adjutant duties, Flipper found time to map and survey the post and to help build a telegraph line from Fort Elliott to Fort Supply in Indian Territory. Flipper was included in all the social affairs at Fort Elliott. He usually declined invitations to picnics and dances, preferring instead to spend his leisure time riding with Mollie Dwyer. On Sundays, Lt. Flipper and Mollie joined other officers and their ladies chasing coyotes and jackrabbits on the plains. It was

great sport, something like fox chasing in England.

Lieutenant Henry O. Flipper made many contributions to the Forts at which he was stationed with his engineering skills that improved frontier life. The Forts at which he served include Fort Sill, Fort Elliott, Fort Concho, and Fort Davis. He has been honored with a permanent display and a statue in the West Point Library and a "Henry O. Flipper Day" on February 10 with an annual award to be given in his name. Flipper's Ditch, a project designed by Flipper to drain ponds at Fort Sill which caused the spread of malaria from which the soldiers became ill and often died, was declared a National Historic Landmark almost a century later on October 27, 1977. A large bronze marker commemorates Flipper's Ditch at Fort Sill, Oklahoma. A monument to Flipper's Buffalo Soldiers proposed by Gen. Colin Powell opened in 1992 at Fort Leavenworth, Kansas, the birthplace of the 10th Cavalry. General Colin Powell, former Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff kept a painting in his Pentagon office featuring Lieutenant Flipper and his commanding officer, Colonel Grierson on patrol. When Colonel Grierson relinquished command of the 10th Cavalry in 1888, he stated, "The soldiers have cheerfully endured many hardships, and in the midst of great dangers steadfastly maintained a most gallant and zealous devotion to duty. They may rest assured that such valuable service to their country cannot fail, sooner or later, to meet with due recognition and reward."

Though born a slave, Flipper achieved many "firsts" for a black American: West Point Academy graduate, cavalry officer, surveyor, cartographer, civil and mining engineer, translator, patented inventor, editor, author and special agent for the Justice Department. As assistant to the Secretary of the Interior, he was responsible for the planning and construction of the Alaskan railway system. The Jail Museum display will feature the details of the life and court martial of Lieutenant Henry O. Flipper which was reversed on December 13, 1976, almost 100 years after he was unjustly accused of wrongdoing.

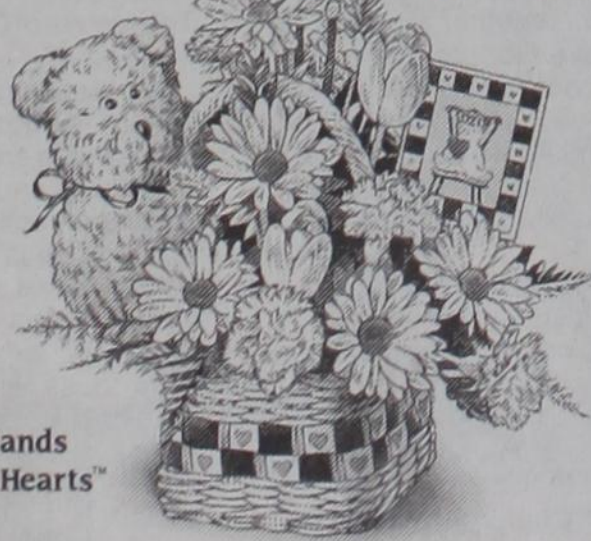
