### New Arrival

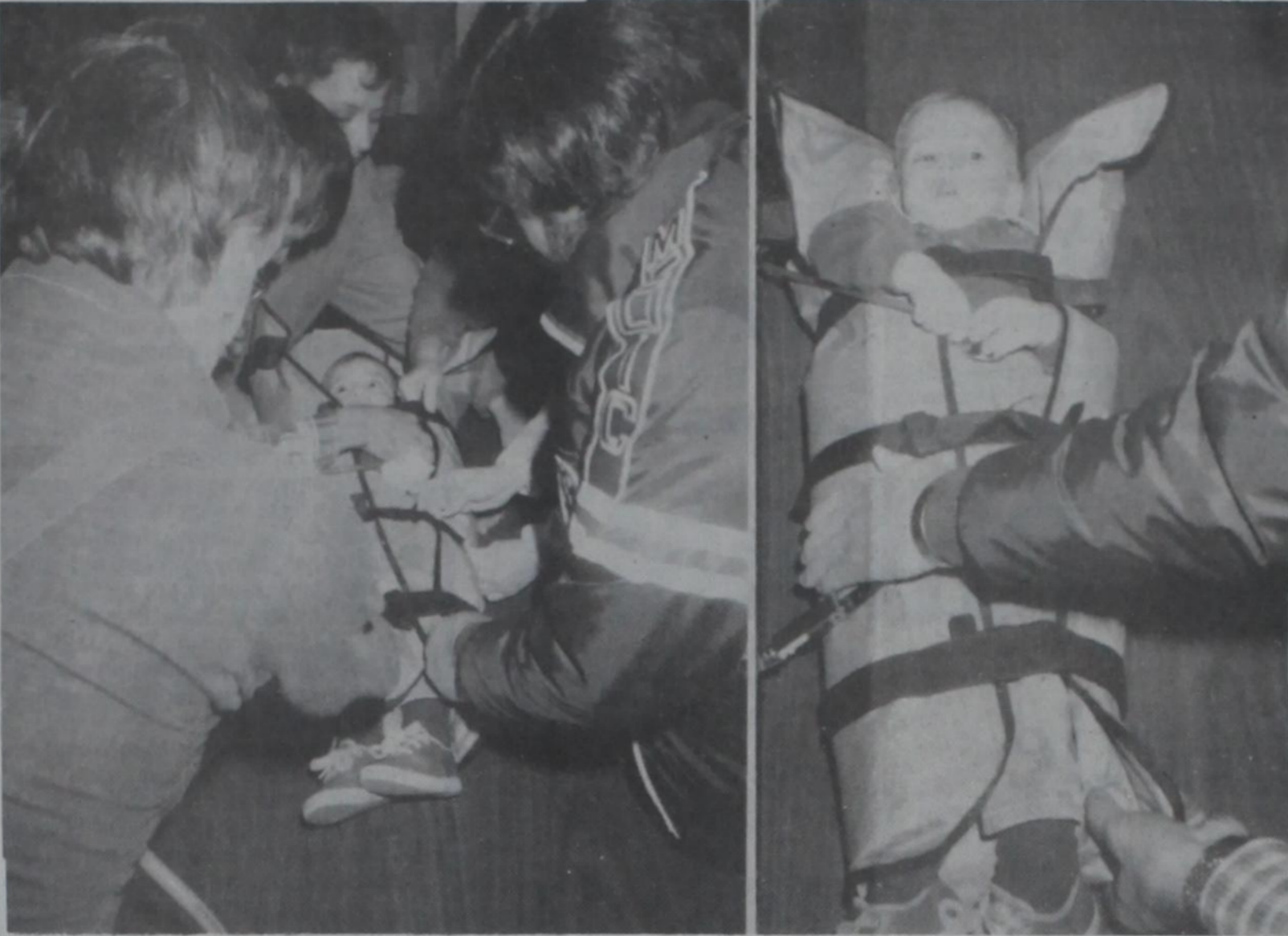

**Extension Update**

During National Nutrition Month 1995 EAT RIGHT AMERICA "Discover Nutrition Anytime, Anywhere" campaign, a brief look into consumer attitudes and behavior about nutrition and diet is based on the recently published Food Marketing Institute (FMI) "Trends '94" study which began in the early 1970s. After over 2000 supermarket shoppers were interviewed, the following results were obtained:

- \* 66 percent felt diet could be healthier
- \* 62 percent were concerned about the nutritional content of food they eat
- \* 59 percent since 1986 are more concerned about fat in food
- \* less concern about cholesterol, sugar and sodium in foods
- \* 94 percent say eating habits to help ensure a healthful diet have changed
- \* trend of eating more fruits and vegetables to achieve a healthful diet
- \* 33 percent eat less fat and oil
- \* few reported dietary changes of eating more fish and fiber and less salt.

What this report really tells us about consumers is that they still have desire to improve the nutritional quality of their diets. Many consumers are indeed making dietary changes by increasing fruits and vegetables while decreasing fats and oils. Besides these points, consumers seem to be less concerned and are making fewer changes in their dietary behavior.

So why all the hype and hoopla with healthful foods? Consumers are demanding foods that they perceive to be more healthful, make them feel better, and make them look better? These dynamic changes will continue to impact the food system. Like the consumers healthful changes mentioned above, start making some of these changes in your lifestyle and nutrition or eating habits. Right now during nutrition month is a good time to start.

## TAX DEFERRAL AVAILABLE FOR ELDERLY TAXPAYERS

Texans age 65 or older can postpone paying delinquent or current property taxes on their homestead residence by signing a deferral affidavit.

This special form of tax relief can also halt a lawsuit already filed to collect delinquent property taxes if the owner files the deferral affidavit with the court in which the suit is pending.

Once a homeowner files an over-65 tax deferral affidavit with the appraisal district, no taxing unit can initiate or pursue a suit for delinquent taxes as long as that person lives in that homestead.

While tax deferral postpones paying delinquent taxes on a homestead, it does not cancel the taxes nor keep delinquent interest from building up. When the elderly taxpayer no longer owns or lives in the home the accrued amounts become due. Taxing units can then sue to collect all tax and interest.

While a penalty may not be imposed during the deferral period, the filing of the deferral affidavit does not forgive penalties already due. Also, an additional penalty associated with referring the account to a delinquent tax attorney may be charged if taxes remain delinquent more than 90 days after the deferral ends.

Forms for filing a tax deferral affidavit are available in the Appraisal District office, courthouse square, Wheeler, phone 826-5900.

### From The Minister's Desk:

A popular hymn is The Old Rugged Cross. The first verse of this popular hymn says: "On a hill far away stood an old rugged cross, the emblem of suffering and shame; And I love that old cross where the dearest and best, for a world of lost sinners was slain."

While this hymn testifies about the crucifixion of Jesus, it is not entirely accurate. For example, the New Testament does not state that the crucifixion of Jesus occurred on a hill. It also does not state that the crucifixion of Jesus characterized by only one cross.

Luke 23:32-33 reports that Jesus was crucified between two criminals, "—one on the right and the other on the left—." Rather than one cross, the crucifixion of Jesus was characterized by three crosses which pinpoint some important lessons about the redemption of people. These crosses and their lessons:—

1. Cross of rebellion. Luke 23:39 says: "—One of the criminals who were hanged there was hurling abuse at Him, saying, Are you not the Christ? Save Yourself and us! This man was dying in rebellion. He was "—hurling abuse—" at the one who could save him.

There are countless numbers of people in our present world who are like this man. They are rebelling against the sacrifice of Jesus which offers them the forgiveness of their sins. In the second chapter of Ephesians, the Apostle Paul described such people as "—being darkened in their understanding, excluded from the life of God, because of the ignorance that is in them, because of the hardness of their heart—." (verse 18) Notice that the Apostle Paul said that these people are "excluded from the life of God—."

To rebel against the sacrifice of Jesus is a serious mistake. It causes people to be "—excluded from the life of God—."

2. Cross of repentance. Luke 23:40-43 says: "But the other answered, and rebuking him said, Do you not even fear God, since you are under the same sentence of condemnation? And we indeed justly, for we are receiving what we deserve for our deeds; but this man has done nothing wrong. And he was saying, Jesus, remember me

when You come in Your Kingdom! And He said to him, Truly I say to you, today you shall be with Me in Paradise."

It is not unusual for someone to say: "This man was saved without being baptized." True! This man lived and died under the Old Covenant which did not mandate baptism. But the New Covenant, which came into effect when Jesus died, contains this admonition: "He who has believed and has been baptized shall be saved—." (Mark 16:16, Hebrews 9:15-17)

There is probably no Biblical subject more misunderstood than baptism. Baptism is not a church ritual or a work of human merit. Rather it is an act of faith that brings people into contact with the blood of Jesus, climaxing the new birth which makes every baptized believer "—a new creature—." (Romans 6:4-7, II Corinthians 5:17)

When Christ died, only one person showed any appreciation and he showed it through a penitent attitude.

3. Cross of redemption. The crucifixion of Jesus is the price that God paid for the salvation of people. Sin had separated people from God and the penalty for this separation was death. (Isaiah 59:2, Romans 6:23) Jesus Christ paid this penalty.

When Jesus Christ died on the cross, he became a sin-offering, allowing people to be reconciled to God. The Apostle Peter forcefully described the results of the death of Christ when he wrote: "—Christ also died for sins once for all, the just for the unjust, in order that He might bring us to God—." (I Peter 3:18)

Redemption is not the results of human effort or achievement, but it is freely given to people who obediently accept it by faith in the death of Jesus.

There were three crosses on Calvary when Jesus died. Jesus died on the center cross and He died for the sins of people. The response of people is represented by one of the two other crosses, a cross of rebellion or a cross of repentance. Which of these crosses best represents your response to the cross of Jesus?
