Farmers, Ranchers Are Offered Iraining for Lic.

Farmers and ranchers who need a Private Pesticide Applicator's License are invited to attend the training and testing session scheduled for Wednesday, April 19, 1995. The session, sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and the Texas Department of Agriculture, will begin at 1:00 p.m. in the Coin and Copper Room of the Wheeler Banking Center.

During the training session, participants will receive training in the safe use of pesticides given by Don King, county Extension agent. They will then take a test administered by Martha Edwards of the Texas Department of Agriculture. Those who pass the test will then be eligible to apply to the TDA for a Private Pesticide Applicator's This license, which cost \$50.00, is

valid for five years. To be eligible to renew the license at the end of five years, the holder must obtain 15 continuing education units (CEU's) by attending other training meetings.

In addition to those who have never had a license, there are others who may want to attend the school.

Those who received Private Pesticide Applicator Certificates prior to January 10, 1989 may want to upgrade their certificate to a license. Certificate holders may purchase and apply restricted use pesticides but while license holders are allowed to supervise application. Certificate holders must get 15 CEU's by December 31, 1995 to be able to renew their certificates. If they do not get the 15 CEU's, they will have to get a license.

Certificates that were issued between Janaury 10 and December 31, 1989 will expire December 31, 1995 and those who held these certificates must get a license.

Anyone in Wheeler County who has a question about the Private Pesticide Applicators License should contact Don King, County Extension Agent at 826-5243.

Extension Update By Joan Gray, CEA-HE

Easter Eggs Safety Should be a Concern During the Holidays

Eggs are hard to beat for easy preparation, great versatility and good eating. But there are some food safety risks associated with the mishandling of eggs, and they need to be recognized—especially around Easter time.

Extension poultry specialist Dr. Sarah Birkhold offers some commonsense advice that can help keep food poisoning from spoiling the holiday. Birkhold says you should inspect eggs before purchasing. Dirty or cracked eggs are more likely to harbor dangerous bacteria. Refrigerate eggs in their original cartons. Never allow the eggs to sit at room temperature for more than two hours. You should cool eggs immediately after cooking with cold water and decorate them promptly. You can store decorated eggs in the

refrigerator for up to one week. If you're planning an Easter egg hunt. Birkhold says to avoid hiding eggs where animals reside and on lawn that have recently been treated with chemicals. Begin any Easter egg hunts shortly after the eggs are hidden, and never leave them hidden overnight. After the hunt, inspect eggs and discard any that are cracked. Although severe illness related to eggs is rare, you can reduce your chances of illness even further by following these precautions.

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

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

> Abuse and neglect was found to be substantiated or indicated in 993,000 victims in 1992. Based on reports from 44 states, 1,100 children died from abuse or neglect. (NCANDS: Child

Maltreatment 1992) Based on 1992 reports of substantiated or indicated maltreatment, 40 percent suffered neglect, 23 percent physical abuse, 14 percent sexual abuse, and 17 percent other forms of maltreatment.

Over the years, the link between substance abuse and child abuse has strengthened. Use of alcohol and other drugs by parents has been identified as a major contributing factor contributing to child maltreatment and death.

Oftentimes child maltreatment has negative short- and long-term effects on children's development and mental health.

Child abuse effects may often be obvious years later. Violence, suicide, delinquency, drug and alcohol abuse and forms of criminality are frequently related to child abuse.

15 to 38 percent of women report experiences of various types of sexual victimization during childhood and adolescence and approximately 10 percent of men report sexual abuse during childhood and adolescence according to studies of adults.

Child abuse occurs in all racial, ethnic, cultural, and socioeconomic groups. However, physical abuse and neglect is more likely to occur among people in poverty.

Because this major organ of communication can be so dangerous, disciples of Jesus will test their words before they speak, asking them-

Hemphill Co. Juvenile **Facility To Expand**

Hemphill-County Juvenile Facility opened its doors on the 27th of March in Canadian with 48 boot camp beds and 12 detention beds for offenders age 13 to 16. The project was the culmination of a near year long effort between Hemphill County and Esmor Correctional Services, Inc. of Melville, New York, owner and operator of the facility. Original plans offered the six month military style training program to Texas counties as an alternative program for juvenile offenders.

Today, a contract has been signed between Hemphill County and the Texas Youth Commission for placement of an additional 100 young male offenders, Esmor Canadian, Inc. has authorized Dinosaur Valley Construction of Glen Rose, Texas, to begin construction immediately on Phase II of the project by adding beds to bring the total capacity to 156 in order to accomodate the TYC placements. It is anticipated that construction will be completed by the first week in May. Phase II will enhance the project by more than \$500,000. bringing the total Esmor investment to over \$2 million in Canadian.

An additional 35 employees will be hired prior to the 19th of April through Job Fairs to be held in Canadian, Lubbock, El Paso, and Mansfield, Texas. Total employment at the facility will be approximately 70. The Canadian Job Fair is scheduled for Saturday, April 15th between 9 a.m. and 4 p.m. at the Canadian City Audito-

Current positions to be filled will be those of Drill Instructors.

Beef for Father's Day - Bonnie Abraham chairman, reported they hoped to do the same thing as last year, but final plans have not been


Anita Brown, Sally Youngblood, Sandra Christner report on the spring convention, and many things are happening, which will be relayed to us by
