EXPANSION OF TWO-WAY TOLL FREE LOCAL CALLING AREA
The City of Wheeler, Texas is petitioning to have the following exchanges included in our local calling area:

- ALLISON/BRISCOE
 - MCLAN
 - PAMPA
 - CANADIAN
 - MIAMI
 - SHAMROCK
 - LEFORS
 - MOBEETIE
- The Mobile Utility Commission of Texas ("PUC") recently approved new rules which facilitate the expansion of local calling areas in accordance with Senate Bill 632 which was passed by the Texas Legislature.

This ruling will enable rural communities to call surrounding communities which are now long distance calls as local calls if request is approved.

EXAMPLE: Calls made from Wheeler to the following exchanges will be considered a local call: Allison/Briscoe, McLean, Pampa, Canadian, Miami, Shamrock, Lefors, Mobettie, and Shamrock.

The cost for this service will be \$3.50 per residential line and \$7.00 per business line. This is a non-optional service which means if this service is approved all customers will be charged the monthly fee, but no long distance charge will be billed when calling the areas listed in your exchange.

THE FIRST PHASE OF THIS PROCESS IS THE SIGNING OF A PETITION BY THE CUSTOMERS OF THE WHEELER EXCHANGE. Only one person from each household or business may sign the petition.

A copy of the petition will be at City Hall for anyone who wishes to sign it. **DEADLINE FOR SIGNING PETITION WILL BE MAY 5, 1995.**

Sunday, April 23 will be R. ST. JOHN APPRECIATION DAY at First Baptist Church of Mobeetie.

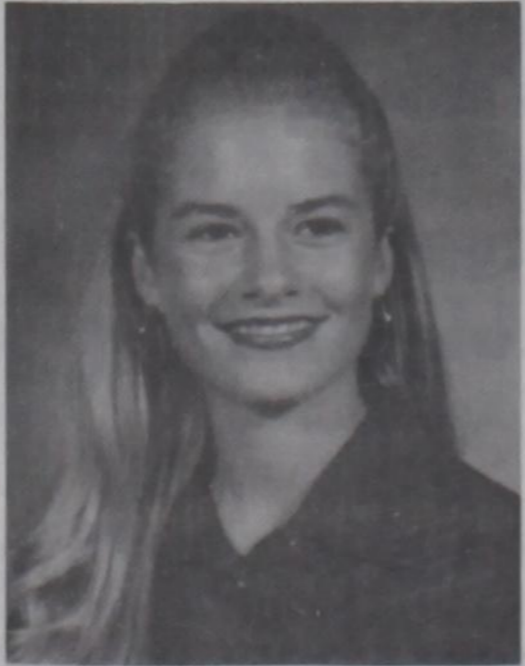
Most of the activities centered around Mr. St. John will take place at the Sunday Eve service, beginning at 7:00 P.M.

City Council Ordinance On Over Due Library Books

At the March 20 meeting of the Wheeler City Council an ordinance was passed making it unlawful to fail to return a library book.

Ordinance #169 reads: An ordinance of the City Council of the City of Wheeler, Texas, making it unlawful for any person to fail to return materials borrowed from the Wheeler Public Library within thirty (30) days after the materials are due, providing for a penalty not exceeding \$200.00, and for the severability of any portion thereof.

Wheeler Kindergarten Visitation Dates Given

Any child five years old on or before Sept. 1, 1995, will be eligible to attend Kindergarten this fall. If your child will be attending Kindergarten this fall, you and your child are invited to attend the visitation in the Wheeler I.S.D. South Kindergarten Room. The South Kindergarten is the one which is across the hall from the Cafeteria. The following schedule has been set:

- Last names beginning: A B C D E F, Mon., April 24, 2:00 to 3:00 P.M.
- Last named beginning: G H I J K L, Tue., April 25, 2:00 to 3:00 P.M.
- Last names beginning: M N O P Q R, Wed., April 26, 2:00 to 3:00 P.M.
- Last names beginning: S T U V W X Y Z, Thur., April 27, 2:00 to 3:00 P.M.

Feel free to come on another day of the week of visitation if you cannot come on your child's day.

The state of Texas requires the following before your child can be enrolled this Fall:

- 1. Birth Certificate — certified copy, not hospital copy.
- 2. Immunization records verified by a valid clinic or physician.

The Wheeler school requires your child's Social Security number for accounting and record keeping purposes.

You must have these documents in order to enroll your child in the Fall. Some of them take time to be processed, so it is a good idea to apply for them immediately.

On the day of visitation, please bring a copy of your child's immunization records to leave at the school. If you don't have a copy, stop in the superintendent's office on the way in, and they will make a copy for you. The nurse needs these records to review before school starts. Leave your child's other records at home. Bring all records when you come to enroll your child in the Fall.

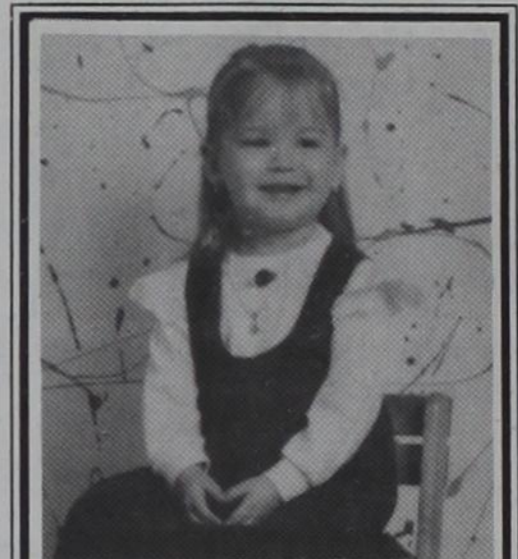

From The Minister's Desk:

Randy Fenter, the minister of the Golf Course Road Church of Christ, recently wrote an article that taught a needed lesson. This article was entitled, "Lowell's Syndrome" and it said:—

"At the turn of the century the world was convinced there were canals on Mars, an incontrovertible sign of intelligent life. The greatest champion of this theory was one of the world's imminent astronomers, Sir Percival Lowell."

"Lowell, who was highly esteemed for his study of the solar system, had a personal fascination with the Red Planet. His interest blossomed in 1877 after that an Italian astronomer, Giovanni V. Schiaparelli, had seen straight lines crisscrossing the Martian surface. Using his giant scope in Flagstaff, Arizona Lowell mapped the lines. He was convinced that the lines were canals designed and constructed by a race of intelligent beings whose culture predated the earth's. What other explanation could there be? Lowell's sterling reputation and widely popular books guaranteed wide acceptance."

"Things are different today, of course. Unmanned U. S. spacecraft began exploration of the planet in 1965. Viking 1 and Viking 2 landed

on the surface in 1976. Guess what? No lines. No canals."

"How could Lowell have seen what was not there? There are two possibilities: First he saw what he wanted to see—and he saw it over and over again. And, second, we now know that Lowell suffered from a rare eye disease which caused him to see the blood vessels in his eyes. The "canals" which he was seeing were simply the bulging veins of his eyeballs. Today the malady is known as "Lowell's syndrome."

"It's a common spiritual disorder. We see faults in others because we see what we want to see—over and over again. We see "the speck of sawdust" in the eyes of other people. Our problem is more significant than bulging veins; we are blinded by rough planks. (Matthew 7:1-3) We think we have a clear view of other's shortcomings when in fact our vision is distorted by our own disease. When Jesus warned that "in the same way you judge others, you will be judged," could he have been warning against the spiritual equivalent of Lowell's syndrome?"
