rows must have a State Validation tag to be eligible to show in the major stock shows in the spring of 1996 (Fort Worth, San Antonio, Houston, Ect) according to Don King, County Extension Agent.

4-H members who plan to validate lambs and hogs must order tags now from the County Extension office. Lamb exhibitors must call the County Extension office (826-5243) by 5:00 p.m. Thursday, August 17. Barrow exhibitors must call by Friday, Sep-

Lamb tags will cost \$2.00 each and hog tags \$2.50 each. There will be no refunds or extra tags so orders should be as accurate as possible.

Lambs will be validated during the month of October and hogs during the month of November. This will be done at the same time lambs and hogs are tagged for the Wheeler County Junior Livestock Show.

Information on the validation sessions will be released later.



Asthma Is No. 1 Cause Of School Absenteeism

Crowded school hallways might keep some students from getting to class on time, but a different type of obstructed passageway can prevent some kids from getting to school at all.

Asthma is the No. 1 cause of school absenteeism, according to Dr. Benjamin Interiano, an assistant professor of medicine at Baylor College of Medicne in Houston. Recurring coughs, wheezing, and shortness of breath can result in missed school

Parents can prevent absenteeism by making sure their children use medication regularly before school starts, Interiano said. And they can use a peak-flow meter, an inexpensive plastic device that measures breath strength, to monitor how well the asthma is being controlled.

"During the summer, most kids with asthma tend to have fewer attacks, so they slack off on taking their medication," he said. "When they start back to school in the fall, they will be exposed to more allergens, so their bodies need to be prepared for the onslaught."

Asthma attacks occur when muscles in the bronchial walls contract, causing partial obstruction of the bronchi, the two main tubes entering the lungs, and their branches. The obstructed airways can cause difficulty breathing and other symptoms.

Because dust and mold allergies can trigger contraction of the bronchial walls and asthma attacks, students with asthma might have a reaction to chalkboards, dusty carpet, chemicals used in art and science classes, and other potential allergens at school. Some children also de-

velop asthma when they exercise. Short-term and longer-lasting drugs are available to suppress asthma attacks. A physician will consider the child's age, allergies, and severity of asthma when deciding which medication to prescribe.

Interiano, who is medical director of the Baylor Asthma Institute of Houston, advises parents to talk to their children's teachers and school nurse about the symptoms of asthma and the medications their children use to control this chronic illness.

"A team effort among the child, parent, and teacher can create a positive learning environment and decrease absenteeism," he said.

Extension Update By Joan Gray, CEA-HE

Through the past decades, persons with diabetes have been given a variety of rules about what they can and

In the 1920's they were told to eat high fat, low carbohydrate in their diet. Then they were told to reduce fat and eat more complex carbohydrate, but to avoid any candy or sugar-containing products. Now the last word from the "experts" is that the diabetes diet is not that different from an ordinary, healthful diet or eating plan.

Recent research conducted by the Diabetes Care and Complications Trial has emphasized the need to individualize the care for persons with diabetes, which includes lifestyle changes such as increasing exercise, monitoring glucose, eating healthfully and drinking plenty of fluids. These lifestyle changes can prevent the onset of debilitating complications of the eye, kidney and nervous system.

These new recommendations by theAmerican Diabetes Association and the American Dietetic Association include:

Looser rules that move away from any rigid single diabetes diet to a more individualized meal plan of reduced fat content and increased complex

carbohydrates. Sugar is no longer the villain if eaten within the context of a normal diet. Sucrose as well as other sugar sources such as fructose or honey should be less than 10 percent of total carbohydrate calories. Studies proved that sucrose had no more effect on increasing blood glucose levels than did fructose. So both fructose and sucrose are allowed in reasonable

amounts.

Monounsaturated fatty acids such as olive, peanut or canola oils have been shown to control blood sugar levels better than the fat recommended by the conventional diabetes diet while lowering insulin and triglyceride levels. The trick is to not increase total calorie intake when increasing consumption of monounsaturated fatty acids to prevent weight gain. Also, persons with diabetes still need to limit their total fat intake, particularly saturated fatty acids, since they are prone to coronary artery disease.

Overweight persons with diabetes should still try to work towards a healthy weight to improve blood sugar control. So take in fewer calories and start increasing your activities.

Increase antioxidant nutrient such as vitamins E and C that help to neutralize the cell-damaging free radicals and help to reduce the risk of diabetic complications. Lat at least "5 A Day of fruits and vegetables.


