## BOYS IN BLACK DEFEATED PANHANDLE PANTHERS, 22-12

It was a wark and stormy night as the Wheeler Mustangs hosted the Panhandle Panthers at Nicholson Field last Friday night. The boys in black were defeated 22-12 in a contest that was decided in the last half of play. Mistakes, especially those even costly turnovers again seemed to prevent the Mustangs from racking up their first win for the season. The Mustangs fumbled the ball seven times, losing 5 of them for the night, kept the Mustangs out of the game. Also, special team miscues really damaged the Stangs and provided Panhandle easy scoring opportunities and better than average field position.

In the first quarter the Panthers took a quick 7-0 lead after a Mustang fumble, however, overcoming adversity, the Mustangs fought back on the ground and in the air as Travis Stevens connected on a 16 yard pass to T. A. Taylor to make the score 7-6. The Mustangs extra point attempt failed.

In the second quarter, again due to fumbles and a lack of mental tenacity, the Mustangs were able to move the ball down the field and again score on a close 4 yard pass from Stevens to Jeremy Davis. Again, the extra point failed taking the Mustangs into halftime with a 12-7 lead. Through the first half the Mustangs lost 5 fumbles and the Panthers lost two. The boys in black were fortunate to be where they were at in the game and knew that they had had to play every free football to stay in the game.

In the 3rd quarter the Mustangs defense began to falter as the Panthers ran at will. Panhandle had entered the game as a formidable passing team but the Panthers moved the ball down the field and scored twice in the third quarter taking the score to 16-12. The Mustangs on the other

The Panthers were held to 215 yards offense only 25 of that in the air. Travis Stevens was 14-31-0 for 197 yards. Keith Rose caught the ball 5 times for 88 yards, Davis had 4 receptions for 61 yards, T. A. Taylor 1 catch for 16 yards, Bryan Judd 2 catches for 17 yards, Jason Porton 1 catch for 6 yards and Dusty Case, 1 reception for 9 yards.

Andy Francis rushed the ball 11 times for 64 yards, Judd 4 for 14, Davis 8 for 20 and Stevens 13 times for 39 vards.







### Jr. Varsity Game With Childress Ends In Tie, 14-14

The Wheeler JV Mustangs were tied by the Childress freshman in an exciting game last Thursday. The first half was dominated by defense as neither team could find the end zone; however, the second half was a big play extravaganza as each team tallied fourteen points.

The Wheeler defense did a super job in the first twenty minutes limiting the Bobcats to only 46 yards offense and forcing two punts. Other drives were stopped by turnovers. Drew Hillhouse and Kirt Boedeker intercepted passes and Will Woollard recovered a Childress fumble.

The Mustang offense managed 119 yards in the first half but could not find pay dirt. Running back Juan Salas had 57 yards on nine carries. Hillhouse completed a 30 yard pass to Boedeker to get the Mustangs deep in Bobcat territory but Wheeler could not score before time expired.

The second half opened with a bang as Childress completed a 57 yard pass to score with only seconds gone. On the ensuing conversion run, the Mustang defense stiffened and trailed only 6 to nothing. That deficit would last only seconds as Aaron Dunnam zigged and zigged behind dandy blocks by Andy Bradstreet and Zac Smith to score. The kick off return covered 76 yards. The try for two was stopped short. The rest of the third quarter was relatively quiet as neither

team was able to mount much of a

In the 4th quarter, Boedeker picked off his second pass of the day to set the Mustangs up at the Bobcat 24 yard line. Five plays later, Smith bulled in from the three yard line. 



### **Extension Update** By Joan Gray, CEA-HE

BUILDING HEALTHFUL EATING PATTERNS FOR KIDS

Parents can help children set healthful eating habits by offering a variety of foods and creating balance in their own eating patterns.

As children grow, they learn from what they know and by taking hints from parents, siblings, teachers and friends about making the right food choices. Also, research has shown that healthful eating patterns and active lifestyles that begin in childhood and continue through adult years may help prevent or postpone the onset of chronic diseases such as diabetes, heart disease and some cancers. When planning a meal, parents should use the pyramid idea of building a healthful diet. At the base of the pyramid, start building a strong foundation to a healthful diet by selecting six or more servings of the breads, pastas, cereals and rice group and at the middle select at least "5 A Day" of both groups -vegetable (three to five servings) and fruits (two to four servings). On the next level above the middle pyramid balance with the recommended servings of two 3-ounce servings of the meat, poultry, fish, dry beans, eggs and nuts group and two to three servings of milk, yogurt and cheese group. At the pinnacle of the pyramid are the fats, oils and sweets group, which is recommended only in small servings and only if you can afford the extra calories.

Nutritional contributions at each level are significant. Breads, fruits and vegetables all contribute complex carbohydrates and sugars - valuable energy sources — as well as many vitamins and minerals available for a child's growth and development. Breads, cereals, pastas, and rice are rich sources of the B Vitamins, iron and fiber. Fruits and vegetables also supply vitamins A and C, and folic acid to keep eyes, skin and blood healthy. Meats, poultry, fish, dry beans and eggs provide high quality protein and heme iron - a readily absorbable form of iron — for muscle formation.

Finally, the milk, yogurt and cheese group are eaten for protein, calcium and vitamin D to build strong bones Parents and other role models can

set good examples by enjoying a variety of foods throughout the day and week.

Involve children in the family grocery shopping. Show them the food labels and explain how to use the

important nutrient information to help them build a healthful eating pattern. Explain how the information on the nutrients - fat, saturated fat, total carbohydrate and sugars, dietary fiber, protein, vitamins and minerals will help them make better food choices nutritionally. Also, read the ingredients listing just to get an idea about what kind of food nutrients are in the packaged item. This is especially helpful if a child has an allergy or is sensitive to certain foods.

Children will see the overall picture of planning a varied, healthful eating pattern if involved from the beginning in the entire planning. So help your children get off to the

right start nutritionally during this

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

BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED

**CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS** SPECIAL ELECTION **NOVEMBER 7, 1995** 

#### PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 50 proposes a constitutional amendment providing that the legislature by general law may authorize the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board to issue general obligation bonds of the state in an amount not exceeding \$300 million to finance educational loans to students. The maximum interest rate to be borne by the bonds must be set by law. The legislature may provide for the investment of bond proceeds and may establish an interest and sinking fund to pay the bonds.

on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of \$300 million in general obligation bonds to finance education loans to students."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 36 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation the property of an organization chartered by the Congress of the Republic of Texas if the property is used primarily for the charitable, benevolent, or public service activities of the organization as defined by general law. The Comptroller's Property Tax Division has identified the Grand Lodge of Texas, also know as the Masonic Lodges, as the primary organization which would qualify for this tax exemption.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation property of an organization chartered by the Congress of the Republic of Texas that is used primarily for the charitable, benevolent, or public service activities of the organization."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 51 proposes a constitutional amendment that provides that the farm and ranch finance program fund shall be administered by the Texas Agricultural Finance Authority and not by the Veterans' Land Board, as provided by current law. In addition, the proposed amendment provides that the proceeds of \$200 million of the \$500 million in bonds authorized by the Texas Constitution for the farm and ranch finance program fund may be diverted to the agricultural fund and the rural microenterprise development fund, also authorized by the Texas Constitution, to be used for agricultural and rural economic development programs.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment allowing the use of existing bond authority of the farm and ranch finance program to include financial assistance for the expansion, development, and diversification of production, processing, marketing, and export of Texas agricultural products."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 46 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow an encumbrance to be fixed on homestead property for an owelty of partition. In divorce and probate situations, a piece of property may be owned jointly by two

or more people, and each person owns an undivided interest in the property, as opposed to a specific portion of the property. If one owner wishes to purchase the other person's interest in the property and wishes to obtain a loan to finance the purchase, the lending institution requires all interests in the property to be used as security for the loan; this is called an owelty of partition. Senate Joint Resolution 46 would allow the lending institution to foreclose on the homestead property for an owelty of partition if the purchaser defaulted on the loan. In addition, the proposed amendment would allow the refinance of a lien against a homestead. Fi-The proposed amendment will appear nally, the proposed amendment would allow a purchaser or lender to rely on an affidavit that states that the property to be conveyed or encumbered is not the homestead of the affiant.

"The constitutional amendment permitting an encumbrance to be fixed on homestead property for an owelty of partition, including a debt of a spouse resulting from a division or award of a homestead in a divorce proceeding, and for the refinance of a lien against a homestead, including a federal tax lien resulting from the tax debt of the

#### PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 34 proposes a constitutional amendment which would increase by \$500 million the constitutional authorization of the Veterans' Land Board to issue and sell general obligation bonds of the state to provide housing financing to Texas veterans. The proceeds from the bonds authorized by this amendment shall be used to augment the Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund II to be administered and invested as provided by law. The bonds authorized by this amendment shall be incontestable after execution by the Veterans' Land Board, approval by the attorney general, and delivery to the purchaser.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to increase by \$500 million the amount of general obligation bonds that may be issued to augment the veterans' housing assistance fund II."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 6

ON THE BALLOT House Joint Resolution 64 proposes a constitutional amendment which would extend the tax exemption under article VIII, section 1-b(b) of the Texas Constitution for the residence homestead of a person age 65 or older to the surviving spouse of a person who received the exemption. The surviving spouse must be age 55 or older when the deceased spouse died, and the property must be the resi-dence homestead of the surviving spouse when the deceased spouse died and remain the surviving spouse's residence homestead. A surviving spouse who already receives an exemption under this section of the Texas Constitution is not entitled to an additional exemption under

The proposed amendment will appear

on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment exempting from ad valorem taxation the residence homestead of the surviving

spouse of an elderly person."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 73 proposes a constitutional amendment that would reduce the amount of general obligation bonds authorized for the superconducting super collider fund from \$500 million to \$250 million.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment reducing the amount of general obligation bonds authorized for undertakings related to the superconducting super collider research facility from \$500 million to \$250 million."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 8 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 80 proposes a constitutional amendment abolishing the office of constable in Mills, Reagan, and Roberts counties. In Mills County, the office of constable is abolished, and the powers, duties, and records of the office are transferred to the sheriff. In Reagan and Roberts counties, the office of constable is abolished and the powers, duties, and records of the office are transferred to the sheriff only if a majority of voters in each of the respective counties favors the proposed amendment.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing for the abolition of the office of constable in Mills, Reagan, and Roberts

#### PROPOSITION NO. 9 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 7 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow investment of money from the Texas growth fund in a business without the business's disclosure of its investments in or with South Africa or Namibia. Currently, such investments are prohibited by article XVI, section 70(r) of the Texas Constitution, which would be repealed.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment allowing investment of money from the Texas growth fund in a business without the business's disclosure of its investments in or with South Africa or

#### PROPOSITION NO. 10 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 1 proposes a constitutional amendment that would abolish the constitutional office of state treasurer effective September 1, 1996. The transfer of specific constitutional powers and duties to the comptroller of public accounts takes effect on that date. The statutory powers and duties and the property and other obligations of the state treasurer are transferred to officers B and agencies of state government as the legislature provides by general law.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment abolishing the office of state treasurer."

### PROPOSITION NO. 11

ON THE BALLOT House Joint Resolution 72 proposes a constitutional amendment requiring that land devoted to wildlife management be taxed on the basis of its productive capacity. The proposed amendment also adds a temporary provision to the Texas Constitution validating the changes to the law made by Chapter 560, Acts of the 72nd Legislature, Regular Session, 1991, which amended the Tax Code to allow land used for wildlife management to be appraised as agricultural land. The temporary provision also provides that a property owner is not authorized to claim a refund of taxes paid unless the tax payment was challenged before the effective date of the proposed amendment. The temporary provision expires on January

#### PROPOSITION NO. 12 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 31 proposes a constitutional amendment providing that the legislature may exempt from ad valorem taxation income-producing personal property and mineral interests that have a taxable value which is insufficient to recover the costs of administering the tax.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation personal property and mineral interests having a value insufficient to recover the administrative costs of collecting the taxes."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 13 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution No. 35 proposes a constitutional amendment authorizing the governing body of a political subdivision to exempt from ad valorem taxation boats and other equipment used primarily in the commercial taking or production of fish, shrimp, shellfish, and other marine life.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the governing body of a political subdivision to exempt from ad valorem taxation boats and other equipment used primarily in the commercial taking or production of fish, shrimp, shellfish, and other marine life.'

#### PROPOSITION NO. 14 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 68 proposes a constitutional amendment that allows the legislature to raise the current ad valorem tax exemption for disabled veterans and their surviving spouses and minor children. The tax exemptions would be raised based on a veteran's disability rating as follows:

Disability	Maximum Tax Exemptio
0%-30%	\$ 5,000
0%-50%	\$ 7,500
0%-70%	\$10,000
fore than 70%	\$12,000
ge 65 and 10% or higher	\$12,000
oss or loss of use of limb	\$12,000

The spouse and children of any veteran who dies while on active duty may be granted an exemption of up to \$5,000. The amounts of the exemptions provided for in this proposed amendment may be repealed by the legislature by general

"The constitutional amendment relating to raising the limits of the exemption from ad valorem taxation of property owned by disabled veterans or by the surviving spouses or surviving minor children of disabled veterans.'



Watermelon Rind Pickles Use only the thick white part of the rind. Not all melons are suitable. One

large melon usually makes one batch. Wash watermelon thoroughly before slicing. After trimming the red or yellow meat from the inside, trim as close to the white as possible. Some flesh will remain.

Peel all the green off. Dice white rind in 1" or 2" chunks.

7 lbs. watermelon rind 7 c. sugar (granulated)

Soak prepared chunks in salt water. (1/4 cup salt to 1 quart water) Soak for about an hour. Drain. Rinse. Drain cover with ice cubes and let set several hours or over night. Be sure chunks are covered with the ice cubes or ice water. I usually just keep replacing the melted cubes until the water

builds up. Drain. Cover with tap water and bring to a boil. Cook until tender but not soft. Drain and rinse with cold water. Drain.

Bring 7 c. sugar and 2 c. vinegar to a boil and add 1/2 tsps. of oil of cloves and cinnamon. Be sure it's boiling.

Pour boiling syrup over drained watermelon chunks. Let set for 24 hours. Drain and reheat syrup to boiling pour back over the watermelon chunks. Do this for 3 days.

On the third day heat the whole mixture to boiling and seal in sterilized jars.

Makes about 7 pints.

May eat anytime after they cool. But are better after setting about one week. And then chilled.

May add food coloring to original (first) boiling of the syrup.

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

Great Plains Regional Medical Center in Elk City is pleased to announce the opening of its new Behavioral Health Services Gero-Psychiatric Unit. This unit is designed to provide state of the art treatment to patients fifty years of age and older who are experiencing emotional and mental problems. Occasionally, patients younger than fifty may be admitted provided they meet treatment criteria.

Many people suffer from periodic depression, anxiety, confusion, memory loss, disorientation, extreme grief due to the loss of friends and family, and sleep and eating problems. In the elderly, these problems are often common. Most of the causes of these problems can be successfully treated and the symptoms either disappear or are greatly improved.

As a person gets older, they naturally lose some of their physical abilities and occasionally some of their mental abilities as well. As they become unable to perform or enjoy many of the activities they are accustomed to, they become more sedate and less active. This leads to increased problems. Eventually, they often become both depressed and anxious due to the physical and lifestyle changes they are experiencing. Grief due to actual losses of friends, loved ones, and loss of some of their own abilities, does not end in a normal manner as it usually did when they were younger.

Memory loss and confusion are sometimes the result of chemical and physical changes in the brain but are also often caused by the depression, anxiety and lack of stimulation that so often accompany the aging process. These symptoms require different forms of treatment depending upon the underlying cause. A thorough psychiatric and social assessment provides the information that is necessary to plan and begin a course of

As this unit is located within Great Plains Regional Medical Center, it is able to meet many of the medical needs of the patients as well as providing treatment to overcome of the emotional and mental obstacles being experienced. The entire facility and staff of GPRMC is available to meet the needs of all of the patients.

According to Floyd Grant, Administrative Director, "Our treatment is based on the philosophy that all patients will be treated with Kindness, Courtesy and Consideration. We are here to help our patients and their families and we are proud of the comments we have received from former patients and their families. Many have expressed that the improvement in their loved ones has been dramatic.

That is our goal." "Our staff is composed of highly trained and licensed, professional physicians, therapists, nurses and other specialists. Our Psychiatrist is Tad Bowden, MD, and our Gerontologist and unit Physician is G.S. Gill, MD. We are an independent church which believes that the Bible is God's sole authority of faith and life. Thus we teach it without apology.


#### WHAT WE BELIEVE
