The Mustangs won their first game of the season 39 to 14 and had an apparent shutout until the last five minutes of the game when the boys in black let up a little early. If one remembers, this is the way the season began last year for the Mustangs and hopefully will increase the confidence of the players and their abilities.

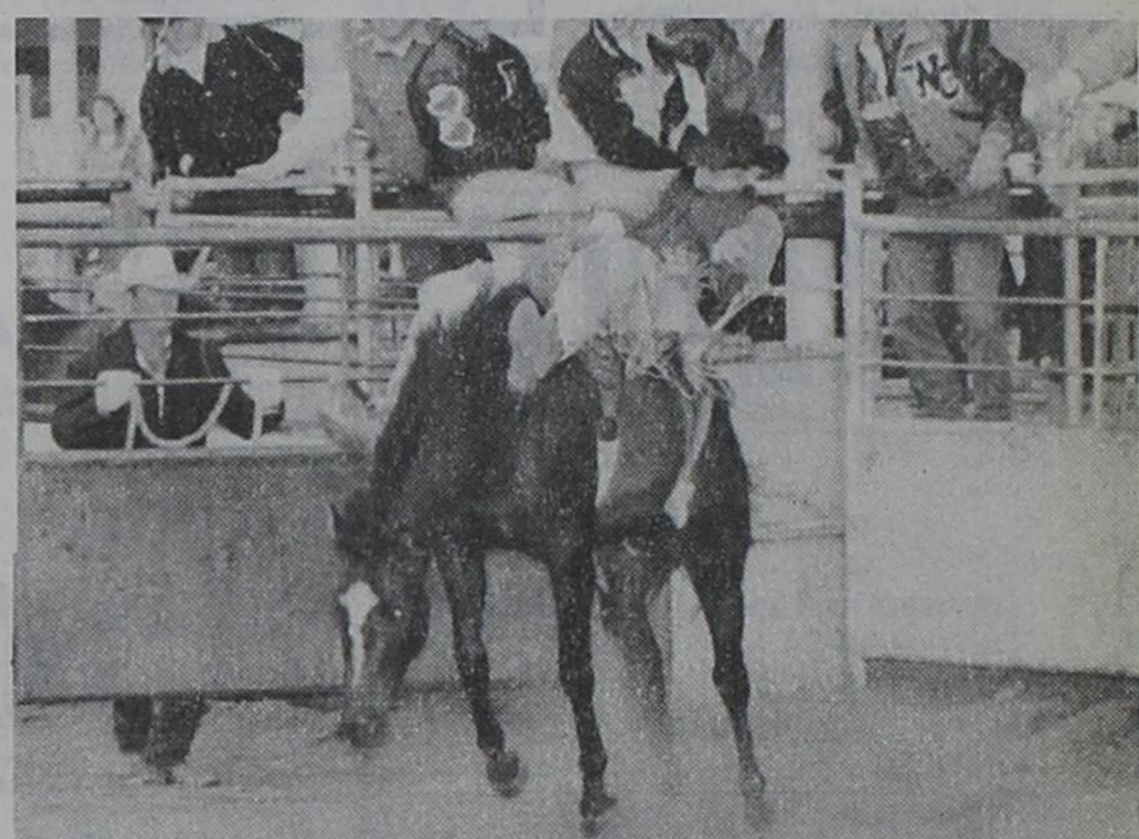
The Mustangs began the game on solid ground and moved the ball effectively against the Skyrockets. A fake punt by Bryan Judd erupted in a 38 yard punt that brought the Mustangs their first score for the night and Travis Stevens added the extra point for the Mustangs taking a quick 7 to 0 lead. This score and the excellent defense played by the Mustangs allowed the Mustangs good field position and with 2:35 left in the first quarter Jeremy Davis bulled ahead for a 5 yard score and again Stevens added the extra point. Throughout the entire second quarter the Mustangs defense played extremely well shutting down Wellington with great plays by the Mustang linebackers and defensive line play. Early in the second quarter Stevens connected on a 30 yard pass to Jason Porton that was caught on the fingertips by Porton and with the addition of yet another extra point the Mustangs took a commanding 21 to 0 lead. The Mustangs were far from through as with 1:44 left in the first half, Travis Stevens connected on a 30 yard field goal bringing the half to a close with the Mustangs ahead 24 to 0. It appeared that the Mustang special teams were a bit more on track as the Mustangs played a near flawless

first half. Andy Francis should also be commended as he did an exceptional job kicking off for the Mustangs later in the game even kicking the ball out of the end zone to keep the ball away from the speedy Skyrocket return men.

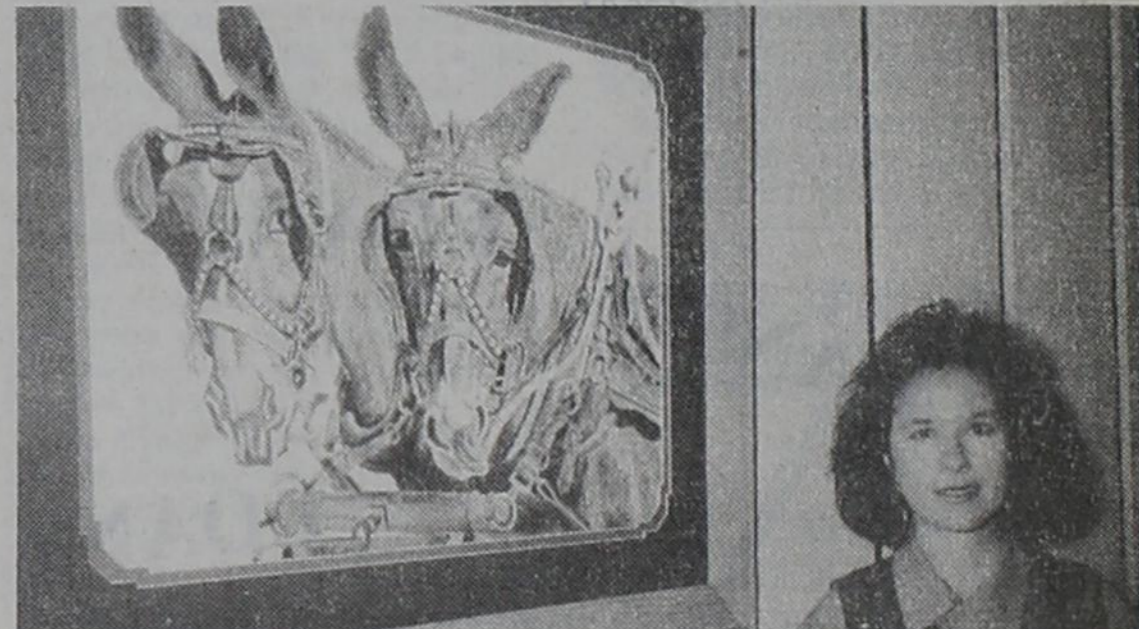

Old Mobeetie Association Given Grant

The Old Mobeetie Texas Association has been awarded a 1995 Technical Assistance (TAG) grant by the Institute of Museum Services. IMS is a federal agency serving the nation's museums. The TAG award is one of the 35 grant awards that was made for the fourth 1995 TAG deadline. The award is in the amount of \$4617.38 divided into an award of 2117.38 for Collections Management Training and \$2,500.00 for implementation of the training. Twelve members of the Old Mobeetie Texas Association will attend a two week training session to

learn: non-profit status and responsibilities; collections management policy; policies of collecting plans, loans, and deaccession; forms involving accession, cataloging, donor loans, and deaccession; registration/cataloging; marking textiles, archival materials, impervious and porous artifacts, and natural history specimens; cleaning; housing and storage including areas, materials/supplies, and storage methods; monitoring environments including lighting, temperature and humidity; and inventories.



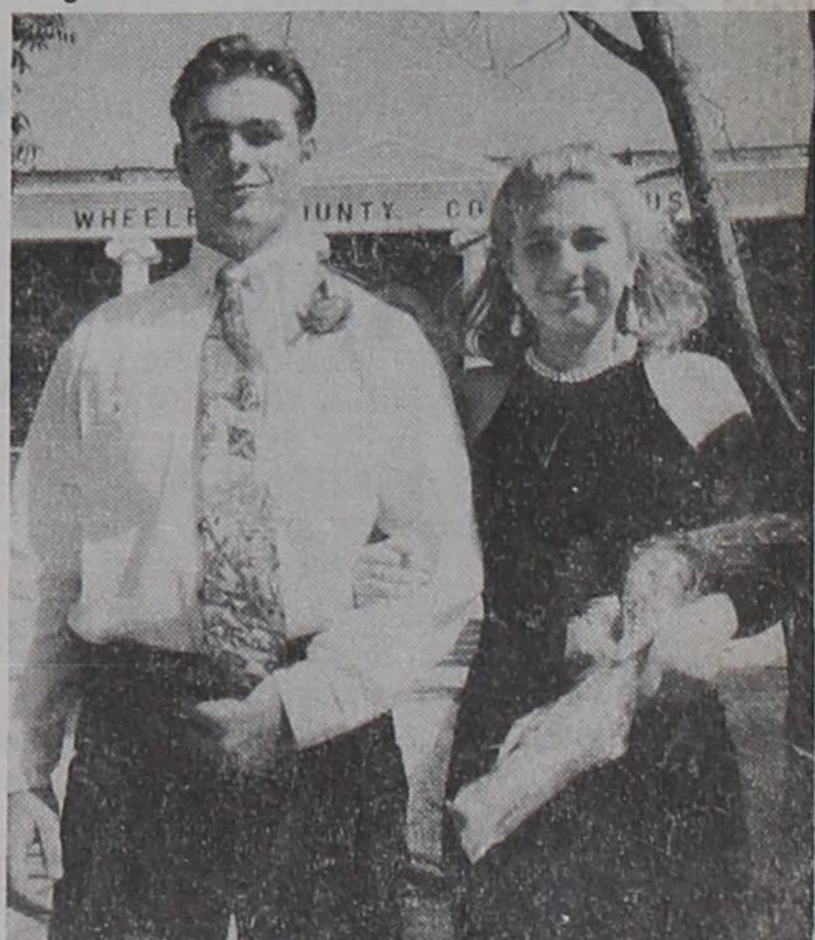

Emer. Farm Loan Applications Being Accepted

Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by flooding, hail and tornadoes, that occurred on June 8, 1995, are being accepted at the Rural Economic and Community Development (RECD) office located at 1224 N. Hobart, Ste. 102, FmHA County Supervisor, Johnny Earp, said today.

Wheeler and Gray Counties were recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Dan Glickman, as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the flooding, hail and tornadoes, that occurred on June 8, 1995.

Mr. Earp said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80% of their actual losses, or the operating loan

needs to continue in business or \$500,000, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest rate is 3.75 percent.

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30% loss of production to be eligible for an RECD emergency loan," Earp said. Farmers participating in the PIK or Federal Crop Insurance programs will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

"Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until 4/26/96, but farmers

should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly over into the new farming season," Mr. Earp said.

RECD is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U.S. citizens and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U.S. citizens hold a majority interest.

The RECD office is located at 1224 N. Hobart, Ste. 102, Pampa, TX. Our hours are 8:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon and 1:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m. Monday through Friday.

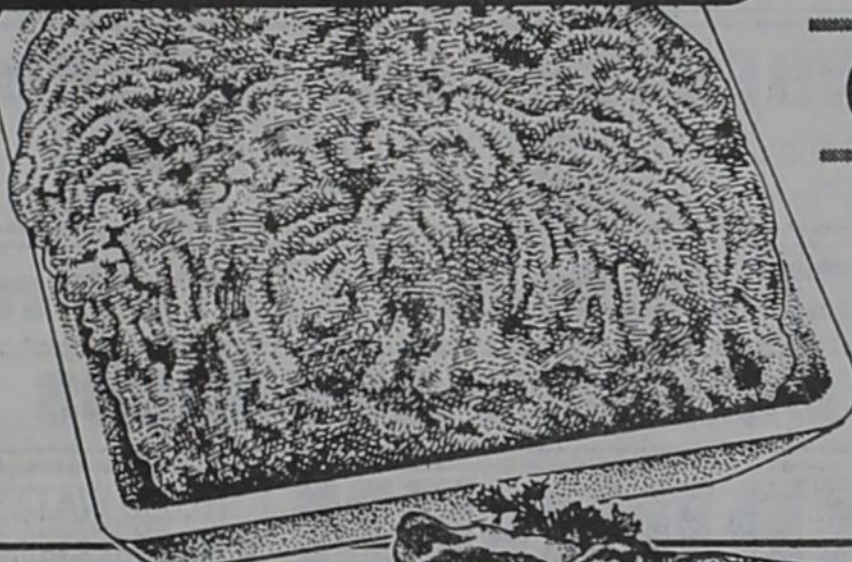

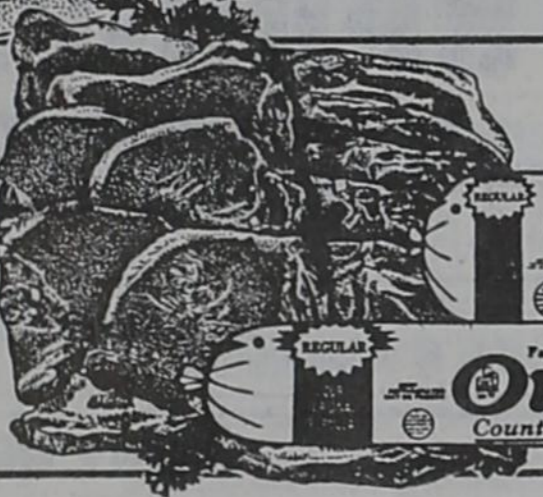

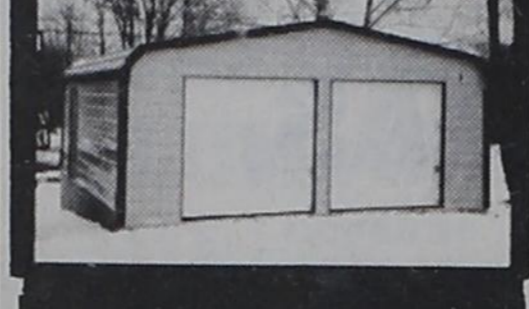

Again, in the 3rd quarter the Mustang offensive line opened up a huge hole that allowed Jeremy Davis to break free into the secondary and just flat out run and break free from any Skyrocket defender for a 40 yard touchdown run. Stevens added the extra point for the final Mustang score of the night. In the fourth quarter the Mustangs let up to much on defense and our own offensive miscues allowed the Skyrockets to score 14 unanswered points late in the fourth quarter. This let down by the boys in black did not set well with the team and should be a reminder as to what can happen at any time on Friday night! So, the Mustangs recorded their first win of the season and their first homecoming victory their reporter has been associated with in the tenure at Wheeler.

Statistically wise, the Mustangs had 15 first downs, 220 yards rushing, 61 passing (they only threw for 9 times), for a total of 281 yards compared to Wellington's 89 total yards on offense. Travis Stevens was 5-9-1, but the Mustangs still fumbled the ball to much as they fumbled four times losing only once, but this has to cease to be effective later on in district. Jason Porton had four receptions for 43 yards and Dusty Case had one reception for 17 yards. In the rushing department, Bryan Judd carried the ball 17 times for 85 yards, Jeremy Davis 9 carries for 95 yards, Andy Francis 7 carries for 35 yards and Stevens had five carries for 5 yards. Other Mustang rushers were Case, Ware, and Dunnam who were all in the minus category for the night. Extension Update

REDUCING FAT CONTENT OF BAKED PRODUCTS WHILE MAINTAINING QUALITY

Fat such as shortening, dairy products, butter and other forms of fat add moisture, flavor and tenderness to the texture in cookies, cakes, quick breads and muffins. Fruit purees such as prune, applesauce, banana and non-fat dairy products like nonfat yogurt, light cream cheese or light or nonfat sour cream provide some of the fat-like characteristics in home-made baked goods without the addition of fat. If you select the fruit purees, you'll also be adding a few more nutrients — vitamins, minerals and fiber. Also, the fruit purees may enhance other flavors in recipes. For example, prunes enhance chocolate, cinnamon and orange. When modifying a recipe, substitute one half as much of the chosen substitute for fat. Use one half cup of pureed prunes in place of one cup of butter. Also, egg whites or egg substitute (instead of whole eggs), and graham cracker or chocolate cookie crumb crust in recipes that call for a higher fat pastry dough crust can help accomplish baked goods with less fat and thus less calories. That's because fat provides one and one fourth more calories per gram than does carbohydrate or protein. Call your local family and consumer sciences county Extension agent to find out more ways to modify recipes to decrease the fat content.

First Graduation Set At Canadian/Hemphill Camp

Graduation Ceremony for the twelve (12) cadets of the 1st Platoon of the Canadian-Hemphill County Juvenile Boot Camp will be held on Thursday, September 28, 1995, at 1:30 p.m. at the facility located at 300 West Purcell. The twelve (12) cadets are the first to have successfully completed the six month program. These cadets were placed in the facility during the spring by probation departments from all over the state.

According to Les Brown, Esmor Canadian Facility Administrator, the program will include recognition of the cadets; keynote address by Reverend Rex Boyles; presentation of Certificates of Appreciation from the U.S. Forest Service; presentation of GED's by Dr. Gene Whitsell, Canadian ISD Superintendent; and talks by two cadets. A marching and drill demonstration will also be given.

In addition to the graduation ceremony, a facility open house will be held until 3:00 p.m. The general public is invited to attend both the graduation as well as the open house.

Opened March 24, 1995, the Hemphill County Juvenile Boot Camp is now home to approximately 70 young men between the ages of 14 and 17. Originally built to house 48 boot camp beds, the facility has been expanded to 148 beds and is managed by Esmor Canadian. More than 60 area residents are currently employed at the facility and more are expected to be hired as the cadet population increases.
