Cyclones Blow Mustangs Away, 13-3

The Wheeler Mustangs were defeated last Friday night by the Memphis Cyclones 13 to 3 at Cyclone Stadium. The Mustangs were hoping to continue a winning trend after last week's emotional homecoming victory but were stopped short by a tough Memphis defense and breakdowns in the Mustang offensive machine.

The Mustangs began the ball game by playing well and were able to take a 3 to 0 lead into half time due to a 37 yard field goal by Travis Stevens. The Mustangs appeared to be able to move the ball fairly well and were playing stingy defense the entire first half. Travis Stevens had two key completions to Jeremy Davis and Andy Francis as well as tough runs by Stevens, Bryan Judd, and Davis. During half time the Mustangs seemed ready to go out and continue their drive and determination to win the game. However, the second half proved a totally different story.

During the second half of play the Mustang offense halted completely. The Mustang offensive line allowed to much penetration in the running and passing game for any real offensive threat to occur. There also appeared

to be several mental errors by everyone on the team that cost the team dearly. This reporter is speechless and will leave it at that.
