The Wheeler Mustangs were defeated last Friday night by the Memphis Cyclones 13 to 3 at Cyclone Stadium. The Mustangs were hoping to continue a winning trend after last weeks emotional homecoming victory but were stopped short by a tough Memphis defense and breakdowns in the Mustang offensive machine.


