

The city provides a place located behind City Hall to put all types of yard waste at no cost to the customers.

NOTICE

In the near future, anyone residing outside the city limits using the city dumpsters, will be required to have a bumper sticker supplied by the city. This must be placed on the rear bumper of vehicle in order for the city employees to identify the "paying customers." Anyone residing outside the city limits caught putting trash in the city dumpsters without a sticker could be subject to a fine.

HOLIDAY EATING CAN BE

Holiday foods are among the many pleasures of the season. But for many, this presents a special challenge. During this time of the year people sometimes wonder how can they enjoy the holidays and still manage to maintain a healthful diet.

There's no need to panic. Most foods, even the traditional family favorites, can fit into a healthy eating plan. The secret is moderation and

Dinner invitations away from home could mean eating at a friend's or relative's home or perhaps at a restaurant, a hotel or country club for the company bash. In either case, the meal is already planned and there is no menu choice

If you're bringing a dish to a friend's or relative's table, make a lowfat version of a family favorite. Once the food is on the table, you will have some healthful choices.

If possible, choose two appetizers instead of an entree or share an entree with a friend.

If second helpings are mandatory with your host or hostess, make your first helping small. That way, if you're enticed to take seconds, at least the total amount of food you eat may equal a normal - sized portion.

Choose skinless white meat or poultry. It has fewer calories and fat than

Eating a roll is O.K. If it's fresh, you will not miss the butter or margarine. The excitement and festival atmosphere of holiday parties can really take your attention away from what you are eating.

Here are some effective tips for holding the line at holiday stand-up

\*\*Eat small, lower-calorie meals during the day so you can enjoy a special treat later. Eat a healthy snack right before the party. A hungry stomach can sabotage even the strongest

\*\*Boiled shrimp or scallops and thin slices of lean roast beef are good choices. Choose cocktail sauce or lemon and horseradish as a condi-

It's good to have celebration strategies, but be realistic. Trying to lose weight during holidays may be a selfdefeating goal. Striving to maintain your weight, however, is a reasonable expectation. Forget the "all or nothing" mind-set. Depriving yourself of special holiday foods or feeling guilty over a particular food choice is not part of a healthful eating strategy. And, certainly not a part of the holiday

Remember to have fun. Sharing food is an important way to spend holiday cheer. Enjoying a traditional meal or celebrating with family and friends need not destroy the healthy food habit you have nurtured all year.



On this coming Thursday, November 23rd, you and I will observe the holiday of Thanksgiving. Therefore, I thought that I would share with you an article that is entitled, "Thanksgiving." This article was written in No-

vember of 1994 by Randy Fenter, the minister of the Golf Course Road Church of Christ in Midland, and it says:-"After 66 days of a frightening

gut-wrenching, stormy voyage across Atlantic, the Mayflower reached Plymouth on December 2, 1620. The shore was crustled with ice and the wind was severe. Before spring more than half of the Pilgrims would catch cold, then develop bronchitis and finally die from pneumonia. All of the Pilgrims would have certainly died that first year without the help of Squanto, a Wampanoag native who was a Christian believer even though he had been once enslaved by Europeans. He taught them which berries were good to eat, how to catch eels in the shallows and how to prepare them. When spring came he introduced them to the native American plant of corn and he taught them how to plant it (each kernel with a fish for fertilization) and when the corn ripened, how to prepare it." "The Pilgrims knew that God had

preserved their lives. Even though the pain of loss they praised their God for his blessings. who started the custom of setting aside a day of Thanksgiving to Almighty God for their manifold blessings? They had no homes and no housing administration to help them build homes. They had no means of transportation but their legs. They had only the little clothing they had been able to bring with them on the Mayflower. Their only food came from the sea and the forest and they had to get it for themselves. They had no money and no place to spend it if they had had money. They had no amusements except what they made for themselves, no neighborsno means of communication with their relatives in England, no social security, minimum wage law, or socialized medicine.' "Makes you think, doesn't it?" Then

Sollitt observes, "But anyone who had called them underprivileged would probably have ended in the stocks, for they did have four of the greatest of all human assets: initiative, courage, a willingness to work, and a boundless faith in God."

"We must claim more than the heritage of the holiday, we must reclaim the heritage of the heart. America needs the heritage of Thanksgiving. The Pilgrims could have chosen a day of mourning instead of a day of Thanksgiving. They could have, but they didn't. Their faith and example remain the best part of ourselves. Let us joyfully claim it."


### **Keep Safety In Mind While Driving Over Holiday**

When traveling this Thanksgiving weekend, Trooper L.B. Snider, Public Information Officer for the Texas Department of Public Safety, asks you to consider that we have some of the best roads in the country and motor vehicles today have much better safety features than vehicles most of us started driving in. Snider states that fatal accidents are lower than a few years ago, however, the number of

injury accidents continue to climb. Trooper Snider advises that nearly all traffic accidents are caused by one or more driving errors, which often offset vehicle safety features. Common errors by drivers are: Failing to yield right of way, Following too closely, Wrong side of road, Speed to fast for conditions, and Cutting in too close when passing along with numerous other hazardous errors which too often result in traffic accidents. Many of these errors are a result of Fatigue, Alcohol and other drugs (including

prescription and over the counter), Trying to "make" time and Inattention. Motorists should be aware that D.P.S. Troopers along with local and area agencies will be alert to hazardous driving errors in effort to curb the rising number of injury causing acci-

Precaution tips suggested by Snider are to: (1) Schedule adequate time for travel (even within the neighborhood), (2) Be rested and alert, (3) Be clear of effects from medication, if using medication or alcoholic beverage have a designated drug free driver, and (4) Have all occupants (you too) use available safety belts.
