HOW NOT TO GAIN UNWANTED POUNDS THIS HOLIDAY SEASON

The Thanksgiving to New Year's eat-a-thon is upon us. The average weight gain over the holiday season is seven pounds. But let's be realistic. Most people find it can become all but impossible to stick to sensible eating when faced with tempting high-fat and high-calorie entrees, gooey appetizers, thick sauces, creamy dips and rich desserts.

To prevent weight gain, plan holiday menus wisely. Holiday menus usually include too many meats, cheeses, sweets, nuts and sauces. Start by using the Food Guide Pyramid, the USDA's illustration of a balance diet, as your menu planning guide.

Learning to trim recipes of needless ingredients can save your calories. and at the same time allow you to eat

hearty portions of foods that are tasty and nutritious.

Because fat is so densely packed with calories, the key to adapting recipes to make them less fattening lies in reducing or eliminating butter, margarine, oil, mayonnaise, lard and salad dressing.

Contrary to popular thought, regular margarine is just as fattening as butter. In fact, all fats have about 100 calories per tablespoon. However, you can save calories by using lowfat margarine. Try whipped diet margarine for greasing baking dishes. It also can be successfully used in rice mixes and on vegetables, and adds only half

Reduce calories by shaving fat from desserts. In adapting your favorite recipes, start by experimenting with cutting fat by a third or a half. If a muffin recipe suggests one cup of oil, try three-fourths cup. If that works, use only two thirds cup the next time around.

the calories of regular margarine.

Purees of fresh or dried fruit can become standard stand-ins for fat in baked goods, but some work best in certain recipes. In most cases, you can replace up to seven-eights of the butter or shortening called for in a traditional recipe with one of these substitutions:



**Make raisin "paste" to replace butter or oil in dense, chewy cookies like oatmeal or chocolate-chip. Mash raisins in a food processor until they have the same consistency as butter.

**Prune puree works especially in

chocolate cake, brownies, cookies, muffins and fruit cakes. It's not suited for light-colored cakes like lemon chiffon and angel food cake. Of course, you have to like prunes because baked goods have a noticeable prune flavor.

**It may take some trial-and-error to

get your favorite recipe to suit your taste, but it will be worth it. Half a cup of butter has 91 grams of fat, while fruit purees have none, and only a fraction of the calories.

**When making crumb crusts for pies and other desserts, start with half the margarine your recipe calls for, then add only as much fat as you need to moisten the crumbs.

**Before cooking meat, trim the fat. Fatty, calorie-laden meats include bacon, sausage, many cold cuts and fat-marbled cuts of beef, lamb and pork. Try substituting skinless poultry, veal, fish and lean cuts of meat. All of these protein foods can be stretched in recipes by slicing them thinly and adding more vegetables.

**When roasting a turkey, baste it with chicken broth or vegetable juice instead of its own drippings. Before roasting or broiling any meat or poultry, place it on a rack in a pan so it doesn't soak in its own fat.

**Fat-less methods of browning meats, fish and poultry include placing them under the broiler or panbroiling them in no-stick pans. Once cooked, chill graves, soups and casseroles. Let them stand overnight in the refrigerator, if time allows. The fat will harden and can be easily removed before reheating.







From The Minister's Desk:

Mark Twain, the humorist, once made this observation: "What I understand about the Bible gives me a lot more trouble than what I do not understand." I think that the validity of this observation could be illustrated by several Biblical texts, but the best illustration may be Proverbs 22:6 This text says: "Train up a child in the way he should go, even when he is old he will not depart from it."

This is a very familiar Biblical text.

Do you correctly understand it? It is a text that is often read and quoted to emphasize the responsibility that parents have for the training of their children. However, there are some people who interpret this text to mean that children who are properly trained by their parents will always be faithful to God. The premise of this interpretation is: "Parents must properly train their children. If parents properly train their children, they will always be faithful to God. Therefore, if children are not always faithful to God, their parents did not properly train

Is this interpretation correct? In my opinion, it is not correct because it cannot be harmonized with two Biblical truths. These truths are:-

1. The Bible teaches that a person's practice of the will of God will always be imperfect. James says: "-We all stumble in many ways." (James 3:2) So will parents! Even the most conscientious and dedicated parents will "-stumble in many ways-" in the training of their children. Regardless of their age or Biblical knowledge, parents are fallible and their practice of the will of God will always be imperfect.

2. The Bible teaches that the will of God is accepted or rejected by personal choice. Children, like every other person, have the privilege of choice which gives them the right to accept or reject the training of their parents. According to the text, parents are to train their children "-in the way-" that they "-should go-", suggesting that children may choose not to go that way. Please do

not misunderstand. Parents should and must train their children, but children can choose to accept or to reject that training. Proverbs 22:6 states a principle

not a law. It is a principle that warns and comforts parents. It warns parents: "Train your children. Live your faith before them. Encourage them to choose to imitate your faith then when they are old they will not depart from it. "But this principle also comforts parents:" Do not assume guilt that does not belong to you. You can train your children. You can pray for them. You can cry for them. But you cannot obey and serve God for them. It is their choice."

Study Proverbs 22:6 again. Does it teach what you believe that it does.

In a recent issue of a religious magazine that I receive there was an article that clearly emphasized the principle of Proverbs 22:6. While the magazine did not give the name of the author of the article, it gave the title of the article.

This article was entitled, "To My Child: Things I Can And Cannot Do" and it said:-

I can share your life, but I cannot live it for you. I can teach you things, but I can-

not make you learn. I can give you directions, but I cannot always lead you.

I can allow you freedom, bu I cannot account for it. I can take you to church, but I cannot make you believe.

I can give you love, but I cannot force it upon you. I can teach you to share, but I

cannot make you unselfish. I can teach you to be a friend, but I cannot make you one.

I can teach you to obey, but I cannot make you obedient. I can teach about Jesus, but I cannot make Him your Savior.
