



Extension Update By Joan Gray, CEA-HE

BE CAREFUL WITH THOSE LEFTOVERS

Once that holiday meal has been enjoyed, the leftovers need to be put into the refrigerator. One of the biggest health problems around the holidays is food that has been left out too long. Extension nutrition specialist Dr. Peggy Van Laanen recommends perishable foods not be left at room temperature for more than two hours. It is not a good idea to do your holiday meal buffet style and leave it sitting on the table all day. Turkey will keep in the refrigerator for three to four days after that the quality diminishes. She suggest cutting turkey off the bone. The smaller pieces will cool better and keep better. It is recommended to store the dressing separate from the turkey since dressing tends to go bad faster. Failing to follow these basic rules could give quests food poisoning. The symptoms of food poisoning are upset stomach, stomach cramping, vomiting, diarrhea and sometimes fever and chills. For the elderly, the very young and the chronically ill, that can be a serious medical problem.

The Wheeler County Extension service is offering two opportunities for pesticide applicators to earn Continuing Education Units (CEU's) toward the renewal of their licenses or certificates. These sessions will provide CEU's for certified private, licensed private, non-commercial and commercial applicators.

A re-certification course for five (5) CEU's is scheduled for Tuesday, December 12 at the Lutheran Church in Shamrock and four (4) CEU courses is planned for Friday, December 15 at the Church of Christ in Wheeler. Registration for both courses will begin at 8:30 a.m. and the training will begin at 9:00 a.m. Those planning to attend should make reservations with the Wheeler County Extension Office (806) 826-5243 by noon the day before the course.

Pesticide applicators who hold an applicators certificate (issued prior to January 10, 1989) must obtain 15 CEU's by December 31, 1995 to have their certificate renewed. Licensed applicators who got their license after January 1, 1990 must get 15 CEU's prior to the expiration date shown on their license. License issued January 10—December 31, 1989 automatically expire on December 31, 1995 and holders must retest and obtain a new







Current Speed Limits 'till New Signs Are Installed

Now that President Clinton has signed into law a bill that repeals that national maximum speed limit, many people are anxious to drive 70 mph. However, Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) and Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) officials say motorists should not get in a hurry. Some roads may stay 55 mph, so until the new speed limit signs are installed, motorists should drive the posted speed.

"With the repeal of the federal restrictions, states have the authority to set their own speed limits, and we are making sure we continue to maintain a highway system that is both safe and efficient," said Bill Burnett, TxDOT executive director.

"The law allows the Texas Transportation Commission to set speed limits lower than 70 mph, but only if the lower speed is justified by engineering and traffic studies for particular sections of highway," Burnett explained. To determine appropriate speed limits, TxDOT engineers have been working since September reviewing the 77,000-mile state highway system, he

The changes will be made in four phases, with interstate highways and divided four lane highways being the first to have the new 70 mph signs installed.

Will Parks, TxDOT's Childress District Engineer said, "The first roadways to be changed in our district will be Interstate 40 in Wheeler County, U.S. 287 which runs through Hardeman, Childress, Hall and Donely Counties and U.S. 82 in King County. Signs along these roadways should be in place by mid-December."

Speed changes on undivided highways of four lanes or more, state and U.S. highways, and farm-to-market and ranch-to-market roads will be made between mid-January and the end of May. Not all of these roadways will be changing to 70 mph, because of safety considerations. The decisions on which roadways will change are based on the information gathered by the engineering and traffic

Counties included in TxDOT's Childress District include: Briscoe, Childress, Collingsworth, Cottle, Dickens, Donley, Foard, Hall, Hardeman, King, Knox, Motley and Wheeler.

I am continuously impressed by the excellent articles that are written by Joe Slater, the minister of the Church of Christ in Augusta, Kansas. For example, he recently wrote an article that was entitled, "An Open Letter To Louis Farrakhan." This article said:---
