From The Minister's Desk

Jonathan Swift, an English clergyman and poet, wrote his famous book, Gulliver's Travels in 1726. This book immediately became very popular and has continued to be one of the best known satires in the English language.

In the book, Swift describes Gulliver being washed ashore on the land of Lilliput. As he sleeps on the shore, he is discovered by the people of Lilliput who are one-twelfth the size of normal people. To capture Gulliver, these little people tied him down with little threads. Each thread could have been broken by Gulliver, but together they formed a rope that he could not break.

Gulliver was not the first nor the last person to be captured by little threads. There are several things in life which seem little or insignificant, but many people have discovered that these little things are much stronger than they realized.

For example, consider alcohol usage. In all likelihood, no person ever plans to become addicted to alcohol or to be hurt by its usage. Sympathy must be expressed to

the United States.

11,000 death certificates annually list alcohol as the principal cause of death.

One-half of all highway deaths are alcohol-related.

500,000 disabling injuries annually in alcohol-related accidents. 2 million arrests annually are the

results of public drunkenness. 50% of alcoholics are children of alcoholics.

With such statistical evidence, it is, in my opinion, completely inconceivable that adults would encourage the use of alcohol by teenagers. Such people must not realize that medical and health authorities are warning that alcohol usage poses a heightened danger to teenagers. For example, Dr. Larry D'Angelo, chairman of the department of adolescent and young adult medicine at Children's Hospital in Washington, D. C., has said: "Metabolic and neurologic immaturity makes teenagers more vulnerable than adults to toxicity and dependence-and the younger the teenager, the greater the risk." To jeopardize teenagers and their future lives by encouraging their use of alcohol is inexcusable.



The tape itself can be used over and over. just as audiotape can be erased and reused. ITV is no panacea. Rather, it's one more teaching and learning tool in the educational treasure chest. It deserves planned and careful use. Parents and their children could benefit from a similar approach to TV in the home. Wise and sensible program selection, even for entertainment, could be a first rule. Then, the TV becomes a positive servant and not negative master.

CRP Seeding and **Weed Control**

Grass seeding has begun in earnest in Wheeler County, and CRP producers need to make arrangements for their work to be done: It is the responsibility of the CRP producer to get the grass planted. It is not the SCS or ASCS responsibility. Each producer should refer to his contract for the species of grass and the amount of seed required.

Another responsibility of the CRP producer is weed control. Several contracts have already been serviced with weed control desperately needed. The weeds are young and actively growing. The time to spray these weeds is now while they are more sensitive to spray. Do not wait until they become a problem. If a producer has a question, he should consult the SCS office at 826-3565. SOWING GRASS

Much of Wheeler County has received rain recently, and the time is right for sowing grass. Wheat that was planted last fall for a cover crop did not fare very well in most cases, but it is adequate to plant grass into. The litter may need to be killed prior plant. The Soil Conservation Service to planting grass. This can be accomplished by several different methods. The most common method is to spray roundup at the rate of 12 to 16 ounces per acre. Ally is offten included at the periodically for accuracy. rate of 1/10 of an ounce per acre for added weed control. Another method of killing dead litter is to sweep or lightly disc the wheat. This is an effective method pro vided that rain does not fall within a day or two. If rain does fall, the ground may need to be tilled again. Grass will need to be sowed after all tillage practices have been completed. If grass has already been sowed, the wheat will need to be shredded. Shredding should be performed when the wheat is in the milk to soft dough stage. Wheat that is shredded in an earlier stage often needs to be shredded again to prevent seed

The seed to be planted should be purchased from a reputable person or seed company in order to assure quality. Depending on the species of grass to be seeded, a specialized drill may be needed. Regardless of whether the grass seed is drilled or broadcast, calibration is needed to determine the amount of seed to can assist with drill calibrations, but it is the responsibility of the operator to use the correct amount of seed. If is also a good practice to check the drill

After the grass has been planted, weeds need to be controlled. Broadleaf weeds are usually controlled with 2, 4-d or Banvel. The effectiveness of these chemicals can is determined by the plants' stage of growth, weather conditions, and soil type. Older weeds require more herbicide than young, actively growing weeds. Cool weather makes some herbicides inactive. Refer to the herbicide label for optimum temperature ranges. The type of soil can determine the length of effectiveness or it can make a herbicide ineffecttive. The label includes the approved soil types.
