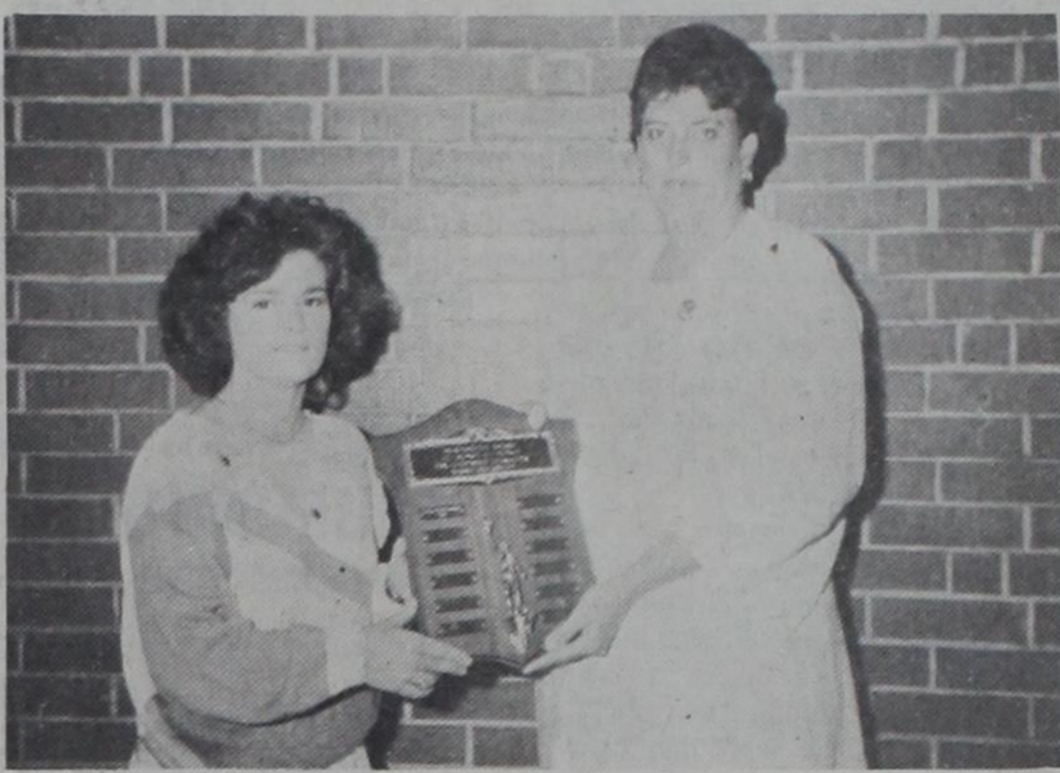

Last names beginning: F G H I & J Tuesday, May 9, 2:15 to 3:15 p.m.  
Last names beginning: K L M N & O Wednesday, May 10, 2:15 to 3:15 p.m.

Last names beginning: P Q R S & T Thursday, May 11, 2:15 to 3:15 p.m.  
Last names beginning: U V W X & Z Friday, May 12, 2:15 to 3:15 p.m.

Feel free to come on another day of the week of visitation if you cannot come on your child's day.

The state of Texas requires the following before your child can be enrolled this fall:

1. Birth certificate-----certified copy, NOT hospital copy.
2. Immunization records verified by a valid clinic or physician.

- a. MMR-15 months of age or older.
- b. DPT and Polio-on or after 4th birthday.

**PLEASE BRING YOUR CHILD'S IMMUNIZATION RECORD ON THE DAY OF VISITATION SO OUR SCHOOL NURSE CAN REVIEW THESE RECORDS AT THIS TIME.**

If you have a certified copy (not a hospital copy) of your child's birth certificate, bring it so that it may be duplicated. This will save time in the fall.

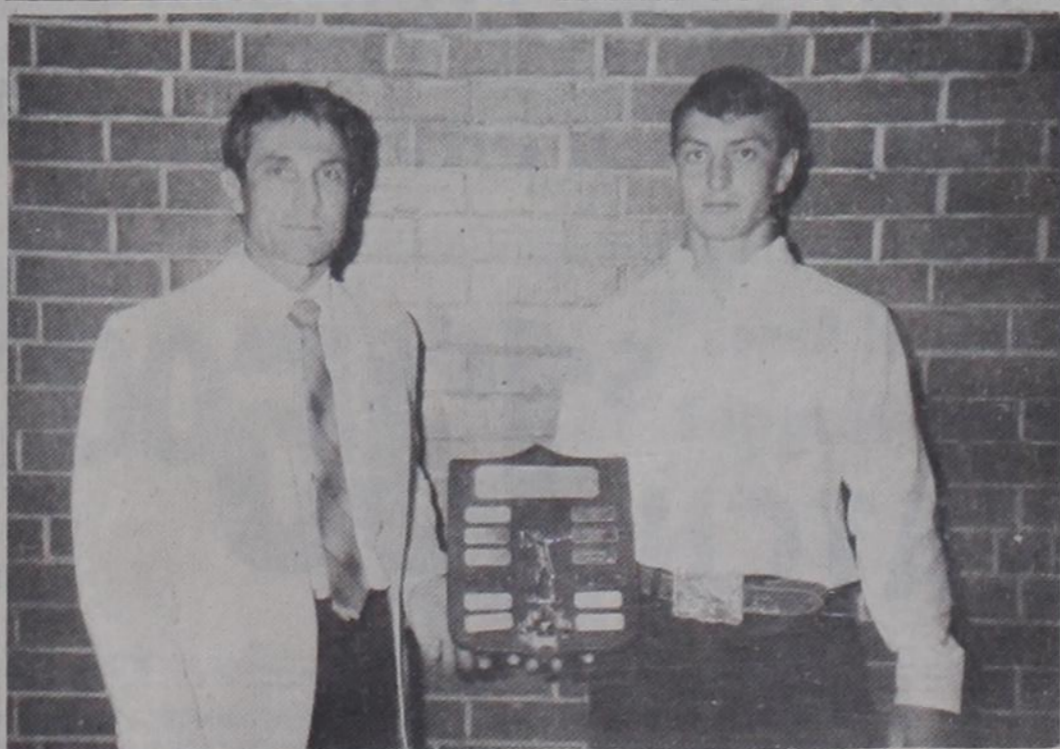

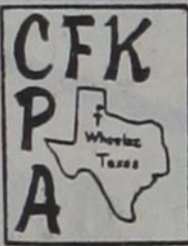

There was a mother-daughter social held at the Coin and Copper Room on May 3, 1989. It was a recipe swap, with the daughters doing the recipes and cooking.

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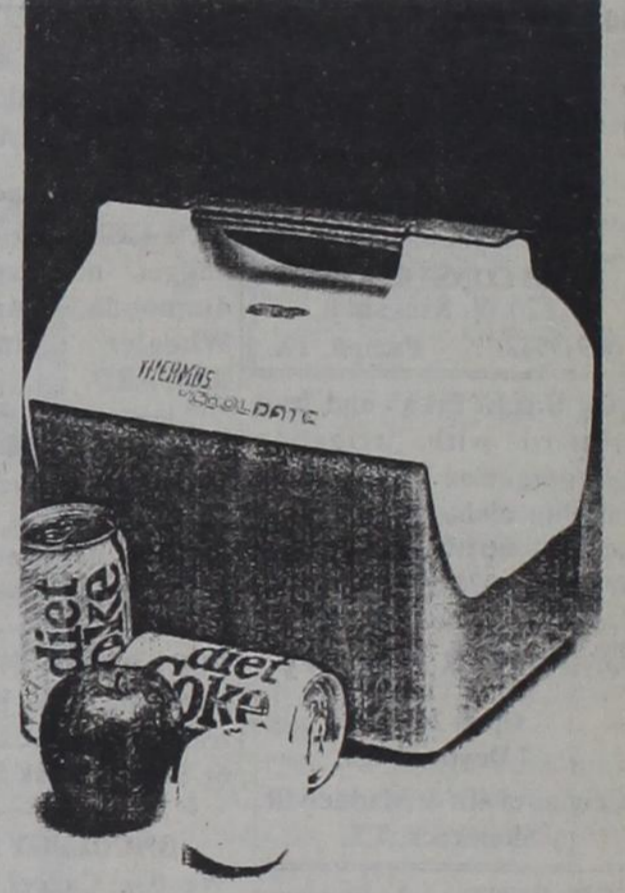

**ABOUT OUR SCHOOLS**

**TELEVISION: AT HOME AND AT SCHOOL**

It has been determined that by the time children finish grade six they have spent more hours watching TV at home than they have spent in the classroom with teacher's. Criticism about the amount and kinds of programs young people watch started when television was first introduced into the home, and it continues today. This generation of parents grew up with TV; they have heard ample debate about it's pros and cons.

In truth, it's the amount of time spent watching television that is crucial. Excessive TV viewing interferes with children's social and physical development. That's because TV watching is a passive, often solitary activity that does little to help children form friendships with other people or to improve physical fitness. Constant and unsupervised viewing can subtly distort their impressions of reality. Likewise, the values and attitudes communicated may not be ones that parents want their children to acquire. Worse, the values parents try to instill in their children may be opposed and contradicted on the television screen.

At school there is another dimension of television. In many places, it is known as ITV (Instructional Television) simply because it's carefully planned and selected viewing with a purpose. Although some schools have had access to instructional television for some time, only in recent years has ITV begun to be used with the planning that any learning tool demands.

This has come about largely as the result of the videotape recorder (VTR). With the VTR, selected programs of significance may be recorded and played back to students at the teacher's direction and convenience. Where public television is used, schedules and details of programs are available to local teachers to aid their preparation of lessons for students.

The VTR can also be used when the school produces its own programs for assemblies or special events. Sometimes, a field trip can be videotaped and this way shared by a larger number of students and, of course, it may be reshowed in part or whole in the future. The application is limited only by the creativity of teachers and students.

Instructional television is not cheap. However, when it is compared to the cost of other equipment, ITV is surprisingly reasonable. A videotape recorder, camera, and TV set to serve as a monitor are the basic equipment. To this other sets can be added. The tape itself can be used over and over, just as audiotape can be erased and reused.

ITV is no panacea. Rather, it's one more teaching and learning tool in the educational treasure chest. It deserves planned and careful use.

Parents and their children could benefit from a similar approach to TV in the home. Wise and sensible program selection, even for entertainment, could be a first rule. Then, the TV becomes a positive servant and not negative master.

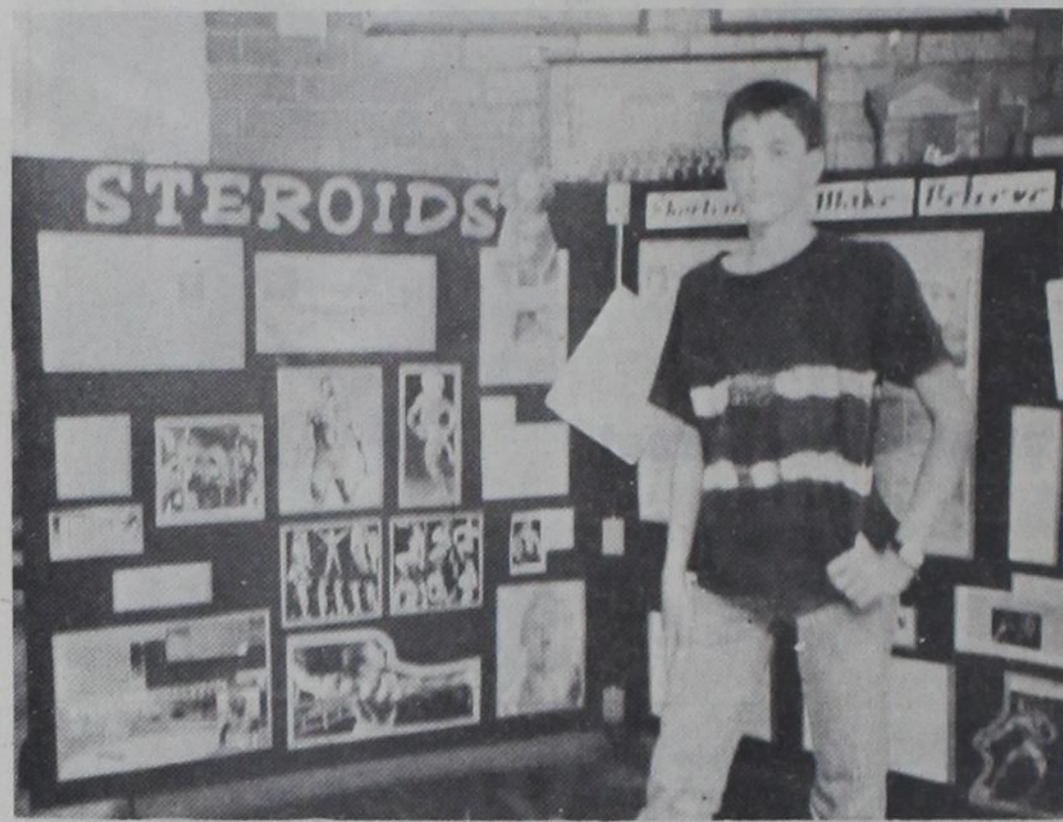
### Wheeler Junior High Science Fair Results

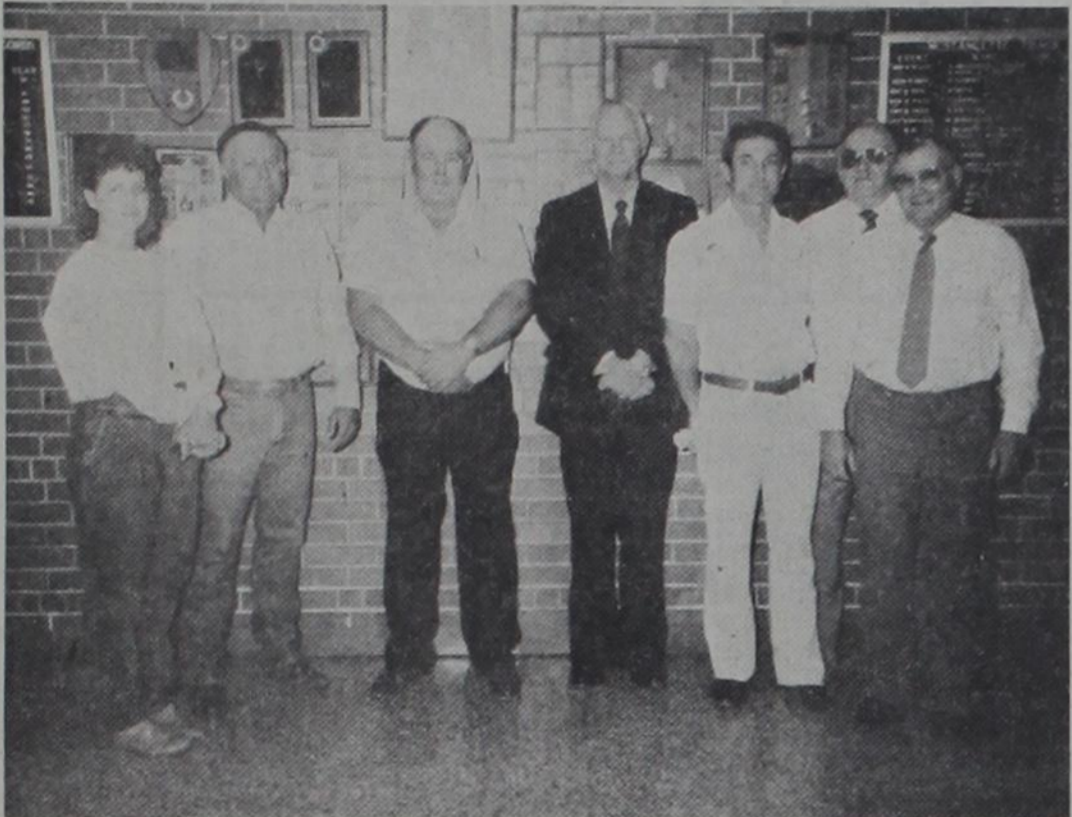

## CRP Seeding and Weed Control

Grass seeding has begun in earnest in Wheeler County, and CRP producers need to make arrangements for their work to be done: It is the responsibility of the CRP producer to get the grass planted. It is not the SCS or ASCS responsibility. Each producer should refer to his contract for the type of grass and the amount of seed required.

Another responsibility of the CRP producer is weed control. Several contracts have already been serviced with weed control desperately needed. The weeds are young and actively growing. The time to spray these weeds is now while they are more sensitive to spray. Do not wait until they become a problem. If a producer has a question, he should consult the SCS office at 826-3565. Office hours are 7:00 to 4:30 Monday through Friday.

### SOWING GRASS

Much of Wheeler County has received rain recently, and the time is right for sowing grass. Wheat that was planted last fall for a cover crop did not fare very well in most cases, but it is adequate to plant grass into. The litter may need to be killed prior to planting grass. This can be accomplished by several different methods. The most common method is to spray roundup at the rate of 12 to 16 ounces per acre. Ally is often included at the rate of 1/10 of an ounce per acre for added weed control.

Another method of killing dead litter is to sweep or lightly disc the wheat. This is an effective method provided that rain does not fall within a day or two. If rain does fall, the ground may need to be tilled again. Grass will need to be sowed after all tillage practices have been completed.

If grass has already been sowed, the wheat will need to be shredded. Shredding should be performed when the wheat is in the milk to soft dough stage. Wheat that is shredded in an earlier stage often needs to be shredded again to prevent seed

The seed to be planted should be purchased from a reputable person or seed company in order to assure quality. Depending on the species of grass to be seeded, a specialized drill may be needed. Regardless of whether the grass seed is drilled or broadcast, calibration is needed to determine the amount of seed to plant. The Soil Conservation Service can assist with drill calibrations, but it is the responsibility of the operator to use the correct amount of seed. If is also a good practice to check the drill periodically for accuracy.

After the grass has been planted, weeds need to be controlled. Broadleaf weeds are usually controlled with 2, 4-d or Banvel. The effectiveness of these chemicals can be determined by the plants' stage of growth, weather conditions, and soil type. Older weeds require more herbicide than young, actively growing weeds. Cool weather makes some herbicides inactive. Refer to the herbicide label for optimum temperature ranges. The type of soil can determine the length of effectiveness or it can make a herbicide ineffective. The label includes the approved soil types.

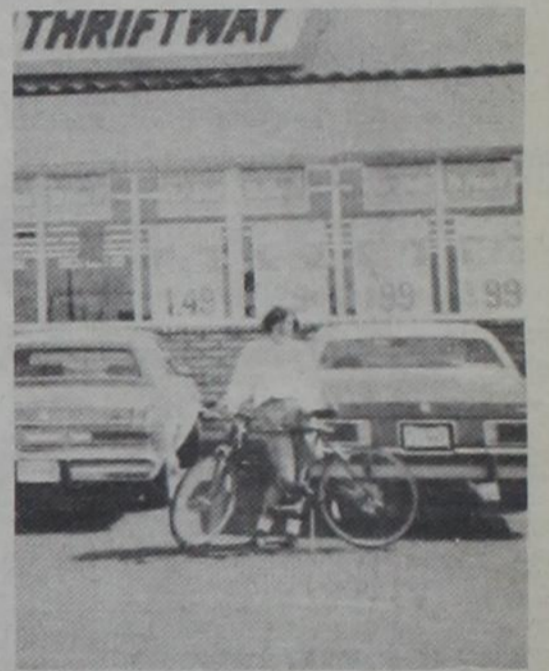
