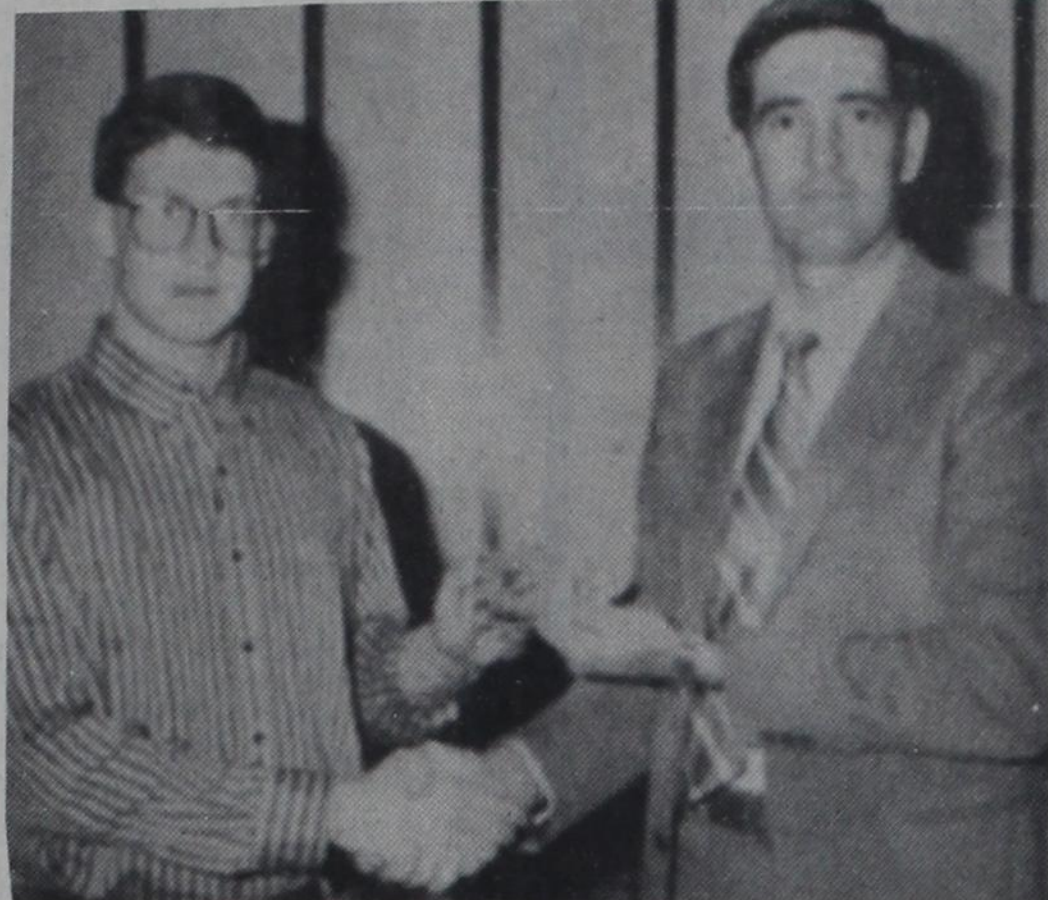

Wheat Producers Will Vote On Change

Texas wheat producers will vote in late February and early March to elect 5 board members. Producers will also decide on a proposal to change the wheat check-off assessment limit to 1 cent per bushel for research, market development, and service.

To learn more about the upcoming election and assessment vote, producers in Wheeler and surrounding counties will want to attend an informational meeting sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service on February 1, at Tulia, says Don King, County Extension Agent. The meeting will be at the Extension meeting room and will start at 1:30 p.m.

Producers will hear from an Extension economist regarding the current wheat situation, outlook and changing wheat production trends in the state, says King. Also, the mechanics and timing of the voting process will be presented.

Following these discussions, Texas Wheat Producers Board representatives will report on the current use of assessment funds and plans for the future, says King. There will be ample time for questions and input from producers regarding the program.

Seems like everybody comes into the Rocking Horse Cafe sometime during the day and I recon that is the reason we don't have a Daily Paper here in town, you can get all the news first hand. Any day now I been expecting Charles Kuralt of T.V. fame to come into the place with his men cause it would be fun for him I bet. Many of these folks are related and have been in the community all their lives and all their ancestors lives.

I keep forgetting that Freedom used to be a growing Town with a Depot, Hotel, two General stores, doctors and all sorts of things but a few years ago the school was moved and the different stores closed or burned to the ground and the Railroad closed many of the Depots and the River got silted in so there was no barges to navigate up and down the River so slowly but silently the Village sort of wilted but Die, no way. Have three churches and two stations and two stores and one filling station run by Marie Boyer who has run the business for 55 years and in the past few years she has run it all by herself. 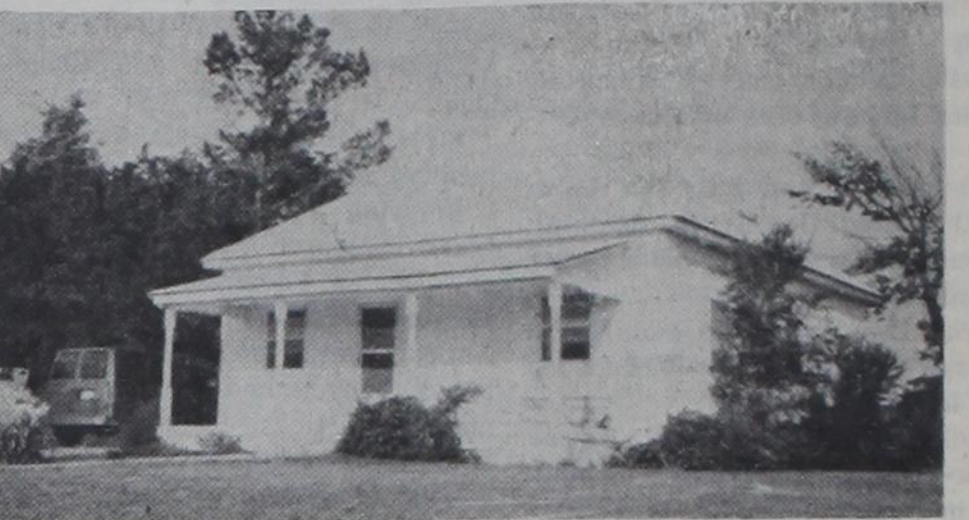
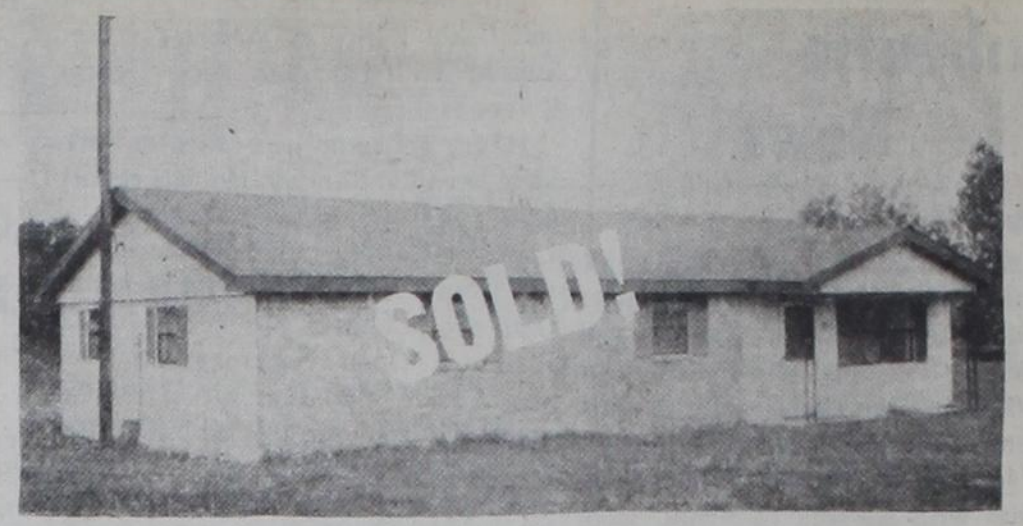
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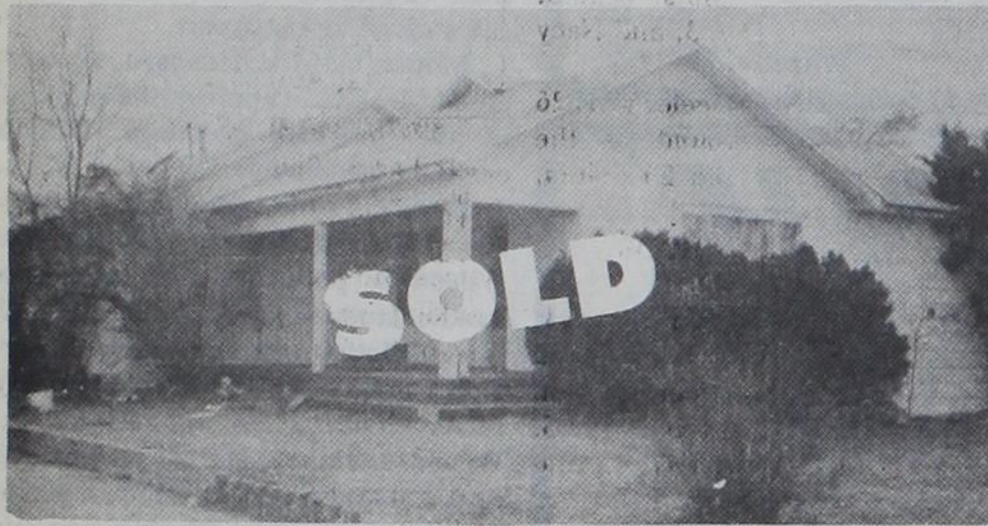

From The Minister's Desk:

Do you remember John Evans? He was one of the last men to be executed in the electric chair by the state of Texas. Mr. Evans was given due process within the legal system of this state and when this process was exhausted, he was executed for his crimes.

Before the execution of Mr. Evans, the media throughout the state carried many protests about the cruelties of capital punishment. But these protests were probably the strongest after the execution of Evans because of the difficulties that occurred during the execution. For some unexplainable reason, it took ten minutes and three jolts of 1,900 volts of electricity to execute Mr. Evans.

Following the execution many newspapers across the state printed stories about it, describing the execution in vivid detail. For example, the *Avalanche Journal* in Lubbock printed a description which read: "The 33-year old condemned man appeared calm as he was strapped in the brightly painted electric chair and the death warrant was read. A skull cap of electrodes was fitted on his head, his chin was strapped tight to the chair back and his face was covered by a black mask that draped over his chest. The first thirty second surge of 1,900 volts of electricity came at 8:30 P.M. Evans tensed and the electrode on his left leg snapped off. The second jolt came at 8:33 P.M. Evans did not move, but a puff of smoke and a small tongue of flame burst from the leather strap on his left temple. Doctors said he still was not dead. The third surge of electricity was administered at 8:40 P.M. and Evans was declared dead four minutes later."

I do not doubt that it would be

horrible to witness an execution. And I have no simple answers for the complex question of capital punishment. But I am curious why many of the editorials which condemn capital punishment are silent about the more than one million abortions that annually occur in this nation.

Where are the vivid descriptions of human beings who are made in the image of God -- not mere fetal tissue-- and who are placed in a poisonous, scalding solution or who are torn to pieces by suction instruments? I realize that there can be sound, practical reasons for some abortions. Perhaps a choice must be made between the life of a mother and that of the unborn. But the frivolous taking of life, which is encouraged by a national culture and sanctioned by the Supreme Court, is a sin of staggering proportions.

In an attempt to justify this sin, some people will say: "A woman has the right to control her own body." True! But the unborn is not the woman's body!

Consider these facts. The genetic code of the unborn is different than the woman's. The unborn may have a different blood type than the woman. And the unborn may not even be the same sex as the woman.

As these facts clearly suggest, the unborn is a separate and distinct human being who lives in the woman's body until birth. And when people can be incensed by the legal execution of a man who was convicted for his crimes, but they can be silently indifferent to the murder of the unborn, the morality of those people is warped.

**Decision of the Commissioner
Statement of the Case**

Petitioner Donna Jo Nall appeals the decision of the Allison Independent School District board of trustees, Respondent, to deny her grievance.

Respondent filed a Plea to the Jurisdiction, alleging that Petitioner's Notice of Appeal was untimely filed. This Proposal for Decision will be based on that Motion and Petitioner's response. Joan Howard Allen is the Hearing Officer appointed by the State Commissioner of Education. Petitioner is represented by James C. Fling, Attorney at Law, Shamrock, Texas. Respondent is represented by Joe B. Hairston, Attorney at Law, Austin, Texas.

On December 9, 1988, the Hearing Officer issued a Proposal for Decision recommending to the State Commissioner of Education that Petitioner's appeal be dismissed for untimely filing. Exceptions and Replies were filed.

Findings of Facts

After due consideration of the evidence and matters officially noticed, in my capacity as State Commissioner of Education, I make the following Findings of Fact:

1. Respondent denied Petitioner's grievance on September 8, 1988. (Record.)

2. Petitioner filed her Notice of Appeal and Petition for Review on October 17, 1988. (Record.)

3. Agency rule requires that a copy of the date that Respondent communicated its decision to Petitioner. (19 TAC #157.43).

4. Petitioner was not represented by her attorney at the time of the decision. Her attorney was told by someone at the Texas Education Agency that there was no time period for filing an appeal to the Commissioner. Further, a copy of the Texas Administrative Code was not available for 300 miles. (Pet. resp. to Plea).

Discussion

Petitioner asserts as good cause for the untimely filing of the Notice of Appeal and Petition for Review that her attorney had not yet been employed at the time of the board's decision, that someone at the Agency had told the attorney that no timeline existed for filing and that there were no available copies of the Texas Administrative Code. The first and third reasons do not constitute good cause for untimely filing.

The second reason gives some cause for concern. Although Petitioner's attorney was apparently misinformed by an unidentified staff member at the Agency, there is no evidence that he spoke to the Hearings Division. Had he done so, he would have been correctly informed of the filing timelines and would have been promptly provided with a free copy of the Agency's procedural rules. Such failure notwithstanding, Petitioner is still charged with knowledge of the law and regulations as duly published by the State. Therefore, it cannot be found that failure to obtain correct information constitutes good cause for untimely filing.

Respondent's Plea to the Jurisdiction should be granted and Petitioner's appeal should be DISMISSED.

Conclusions of Law

After due consideration of the record, matters officially noticed, and the foregoing findings, in my capacity as State Commissioner of Education, I make the following

conclusions of Law:

1. Petitioner did not timely file her Notice of Appeal as required by 19 TAC #157.43.

2. Petitioner did not state good cause for the untimely filing of the Notice of Appeal.

3. Respondent's Plea to the Jurisdiction should be GRANTED.

4. Petitioner's appeal should be DISMISSED for untimely filing.

ORDER

After due consideration of the record, matters officially noticed, and the foregoing findings of Fact and Conclusions of Law, in my capacity as State Commissioner of Education, it is hereby:

ORDERED that Petitioner's appeal be, and is hereby, DISMISSED for untimely filing.

"LEFTY" PENDLETON HALL OF FAME INDUCTEE

William "Lefty" Pendleton accomplished a lot of things during his lifetime.

Aside from being a well-respected football and track coach at Cerritos College for 27 years, the former Artesia resident was involved in amateur boxing on both local and national levels for over 20 years.

He has had the responsibility of working with dozens of promising young boxers, accompanying teams to places like Poland and New Zealand to compete in matches. In fact, he was selected as an assistant boxing coach for the country of Conga during the 1984 Olympics.

But it wasn't until last December, about a year following his untimely death from a heart attack, that Pendleton was posthumously awarded one of the most prestigious honors in all of amateur boxing.

By a near unanimous vote, Lefty Pendleton was inducted into the National Amateur Boxing Hall of Fame.

With the honor, Pendleton has now joined the ranks of some of the most prestigious figures in all of amateur boxing, including Sugar Ray Leonard and Michael Spinks.

"I feel very proud of my father and the work that he did," said Jim Pendleton, who is one of Lefty's two sons and currently wrestling coach at Bellflower High School.

"He was like a father figure to a lot of the guys he coached. He worked with them on a personal level, and at the same time, he was tough enough on them to help them achieve what they were capable of.

"He was definitely not a Lombardi-type coach. He wouldn't rant and scream and yell... he would just take a player aside and put his arm around them and just talk with them," Jim said.

Dick Juliano, athletic director at Cerritos College and a close colleague of Pendleton's since 1965, echoed those sentiments as he remembered the former coach as a man who loved what he was doing and did it well.

"The guy had infinite patience when it came to his work," Juliano said.

"He was mild mannered, yet at the same time, he was very competitive," he said.

Another former associate, Johnnie Flores, who has been involved as a youth instructor with the Golden Gloves of America for nearly 40 years and knew Pendleton for 15 years, has seen many of the fighters that Pendleton worked with over the years develop into top contenders in the world of amateur boxing and feels Pendleton had a great influence over them which inevitably led to their success.

"He was an incredible teacher when it came to boxing," Flores recalled.

"He was a strict coach. He taught boxing the way it should be taught... there aren't enough teachers of his caliber around anymore," he said.

As a young man, Pendleton was a boxer in high school and in college. He later went on to box in the navy and in the coast guard.

During World War II, Pendleton was a Golden Gloves champion and for a while held the title of Light/Heavyweight Champion in the Texas/Oklahoma National Guard.

"He always wanted to be a professional boxing champion," Jim Pendleton said.

But he never got the chance. So as soon as he got out of college, he began his career as a coach.

After coaching in various places throughout the country, Pendleton settled in Southern California in 1960 and began his long career at Cerritos College.

Among some of the honors he had received in addition to his recent

Rural Mailboxes Are Not Targets

"Using a mailbox for target practice seems like harmless fun," says Marvin Walker Postmaster, Wheeler, "but it's really a serious federal offense.

"Mailboxes and mail are protected by federal law. Anyone caught going through mailboxes and removing the mail or defacing the mailbox itself may be in for some stiff penalties," Walker says.

The actual law reads: "Whoever willfully or maliciously injures, tears down or destroys any letter box or other receptacle intended or used for the receipt or delivery of mail on any mail route, or breaks open the same or willfully or maliciously injures, defaces or destroys any mail deposited therein, shall be fined not more than \$1,000 or imprisoned not more than 3 years."

"That's quite a price to pay for what may seem to be a harmless prank," says Walker.

Postmaster Marvin Walker asks Wheeler customers who observe anyone defacing a mailbox or tampering with another person's mail in a mailbox at the post office and/or the police.

Linda Daughtry RADON PREVENTION IN NEW HOMES

Many of the same techniques used to tighten up homes for energy efficiency also help to reduce the likelihood of a radon problem.

The Environmental Protection Agency and the National Association of Home Builders Research Foundation have produced information that guides a builder in choosing techniques that will reduce the likelihood of radon entering a new home. These techniques focus on closing radon entry points and reducing the air pressure differentials that draw radon from surrounding soil.

Some of the most common measures used in new construction include:

- * placing a continuous, six-mix polyethylene vapor barrier under the slab.
- * Lap seams 12 inches, tape or seal plumbing penetrations and avoid puncturing the barrier during the concrete pour.
- * sealing floor and wall joints and control joints with flexible expansion joint materials that are then covered with a half inch of good quality, non cracking polyurethane caulk.
- * installing drains so they drain to daylight or a sewer.
- * sealing sumps at the top.
- * sealing or capping tops of hollow-block foundation walls.
- * sealing pipe or wire penetrations of below-grade walls.
- * carefully sealing or taping ductwork routed through a crawl space or beneath a slab, especially return-air ducts.
- * placing a continuous six-mil polyethylene vapor barrier on the soil in a crawl space and sealing seams and edges to foundation walls.
- * choosing appliances that use outdoor air for combustion.
