From the Minister's Desk:

In the third chapter of John is recorded one of the most popular statements that Jesus ever spoke about salvation. This statement is: "For God so loved the world, that He gave His only begotten Son, that whoever believes in Him should not perish, but have eternal life." (verse 16)

While this statement is extremely popular, it is often misunderstood. To correct this misunderstanding, it is helpful to divide this statement into three phrases. These three phrases are: "...God So Loved..."

The salvation of man began with God and His infinite love. Because of His love, God made man in His image and "...breathed into his nostrils the breath of life..." (Genesis 2:7) And when man sinned and separated himself from God, the love of God did not cease. Rather God continued to love man, activating a plan for the salvation of man.

"...He Gave..."

This plan was consistent with God's nature. Since God is just, His plan was just. And since God is merciful, His plan was merciful.

The fulfillment of this plan clearly occurred when God gave Jesus for the sins of man. When Jesus died for the sins of man, it satisfied the demands of God's justice. But His death also allowed God to mercifully forgive and forget the sins of man.

In the fifth chapter of Romans, the Apostle Paul described the gift as a "...free gift...". He wrote: "...The wages of sin is death, but the free gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord." (Romans 6:23) Since a free gift cannot be meritoriously earned, it should be obvious that salvation is by the grace of God.

Salvation by the grace of God is basic New Testament truth. The Apostle Paul wrote: "God, being rich in mercy, because of His great love with which He loved us, even when we were dead in our transgressions, made us alive together with Christ (by grace you have been saved)..." And then he added: "For by grace you have been saved through faith; and that not of yourselves, it is the gift of God; not as a result of works, that no one should boast." (Ephesians 2:4-5, 8-9)

The free gift of God—salvation—is the result of the grace of God not the meritorious work of man.

"...Whoever Believes..."

But will the grace of God save every man? No! It will only save the man who believes.

For years, man has debated whether or not faith saves. Such a debate is futile because the Bible plainly states that faith saves. (John 1:9-13, Romans 5:1-2) The real issue is not whether or not faith saves, but the type of faith that saves.

And according to the New Testament, the faith that saves is a faith that expresses itself in obedience. For example, Jesus said: "He who believes in the Son has eternal life; but he who does not obey the Son shall not see life, but the wrath of God abides on him." (John 3:36) In the same sentence, Jesus used the terms "...believes..." and "...obey..." interchangeably.

To be saved, man must have a faith that is expressed or demonstrated in obedience. In the second chapter of his letter, James asked an important question when he asked: "What use is it my brethren, if a man says he has faith, but he has no works? Can that faith save him?" (verse 15) The implied answer to these questions is no. A faith that saves is a faith that obeys.

John 3:16 consists of twenty-five words which constitute a promise of salvation. But if this promise is to be obtained, it must be properly understood.

ABOUT OUR SCHOOLS

FOR STUDENTS ONLY: SOME STUDY "SECRETS"
By Dave R. Summers

There is an old slogan that salespeople relate which reads, "To be a winner, do what winners do." While selling has never been quite that easy, the thought has some value when we apply it to schoolwork. "Winning" students don't succeed by pure chance. They work at it. But they have a method which makes their work easier--and makes their success more likely.

Teachers spend a lot of time trying to encourage students to develop good study habits, because specific practices are a key to student success. Unfortunately, this advice, just like much adult advice, is often not taken seriously. Yet, the short list of "study secrets" which follow can ensure improvement in schoolwork if they are taken seriously by young people. There is an almost one hundred percent chance that students who are successful have these habits.

*Students should start listening (not merely "hearing") as soon as they enter the classroom. There is no substitute for the basic need for attention.

*Students should keep a small notepad or special place in a notebook where assignments can be written down. It is amazing how this one practice improves memory, helps clarify what is to be done, and saves the student both time and energy.

*Class time which is set aside for working on assignments ought to be used wisely. It provides a time to ask the teacher questions and get the assignment in focus. This practice is much more reliable than asking friends or parents to help.

*Follow directions carefully--and think explicitly about what is expected. Ask questions about that which you do not understand. This saves time and effort.

*Set a regular time for study in a place that means study. Many students work best in a room with soft background sounds and other people. Others need to be alone in complete silence. Find out what works best for you. Remember, good lighting and freedom from distractions are advantageous. When you begin, tackle hardest assignments first, not last.

*Keep up with assignments. They can become like debts (which they are) when they pile up.

*Check before you go to class or prepare to study. Make sure that you have all the tools you need (books, paper, pencils, notes, etc.) before you begin.

*Take notes and keep track of the main ideas, vocabulary, and summaries. All subjects and skills have a basic order and sequence. Be sure that you identify it.

*Use what is called the SQ3-R method. "S" stands for survey, or to skim quickly to get an overview of the total assignment. "Q" stands for question. Ask yourself, "What concepts and ideas should I understand when I've completed this assignment?" The three "R's" are read, recite, and review. This means to read carefully, focusing on the content and keeping "Q" in mind. Then recite the answer to "Q".

making sure you understand them. You may want to take notes at this point. Then, review the whole process.

In a way, the approach summarizes all of the other hints. This technique works -- and successful students who have never heard of it; use it. That's why they're successful!

Post Office Vacation Mail Information

"If work or vacation should ever take you away from home, the Postal Service would like to remind you that there are several options available when determining what to do with your mail," says Wheeler Postmaster Marvin Walker.

"If you'll be away just a few days and don't have time to notify the Post Office, ask a friend or neighbor to pick up any mail from your box," Walker says. "Accumulated mail in a box is an advertisement that the house is vacant."

"Small receptacles such as apartment house boxes have a limited capacity. Your carrier will remove accumulated mail when the box becomes full, and leave a notice to pick up the mail at the Post Office."

"We will be glad to hold your mail at the Post Office for up to 30 days," says Postmaster Walker. "Either stop by the office here, or ask your carrier for a hold mail card. Be sure to specify the dates which you would like your mail held, fill out the card, sign it and hand it to a clerk or your carrier a day or two before you leave."

"The Postal Service does not accept requests to hold mail for one day or requests made by telephone," Walker says.

"When you return, you can either pick up the accumulated mail at the office, or call and ask that it be delivered the next day. Since there may be more mail than will fit in the box, someone should be available to receive it."

"If you expect to be away for more than 30 days, you should consider a temporary address change," says Walker. "Simply pick up a change of address order form from the Post Office or your carrier and fill it out completely, including the effective date and the date you wish to terminate the order."

"This service is commonly used when families travel to vacation homes. It allows them to stay current with bills and correspondence. Again, it's a good idea to call when you return so that normal delivery will resume."

"We want to work with you to ensure uninterrupted mail service," says Postmaster Walker.

At the business meeting which convenes at 9:00 a.m., officers for the 1989-91 term will be elected. PTA Awards in the areas of Cultural Arts, Parenting Programs, and Projects will be presented. At the conference luncheon scheduled for 12:30 p.m. the District 8 PTA Scholarship winner will be announced.

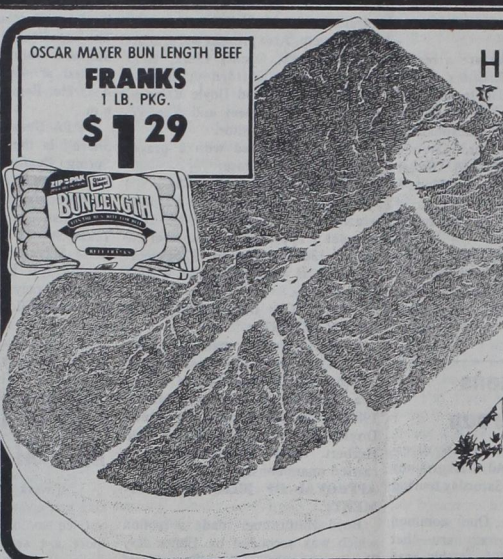
