PROTECT YOUR RIGHTS—

RENDER YOUR PROPERTY

A rendition is a report to the appraisal district that lists all the taxable property you own or control on January 1, 1989. The form is available at your local appraisal district or you may draft a similar

You must file a rendition if you own tangible personal property used to produce income—such as the machinery and equipment used by a business. The appraisal district may require

any taxpayer to file a rendition by sending the taxpayer a written notice and a rendition form.

The advantages of filing a ren-

 You give your opinion of your property's value. If the appraisal district places a higher value on your property, it must notify you in writing of the higher value and explain how you can protest that value to the appraisal review board.

 You record your correct mailing address so your tax bills will go to the right address. If your bill is mailed to the wrong address, the

law still holds you responsible for paying your taxes on time or paying extra charges for late payments.

· You can also file a report of decreased value, to notify the appraisal district of significant depreciation to your property in 1988. The district will look at your property before assigning a value in 1989.


