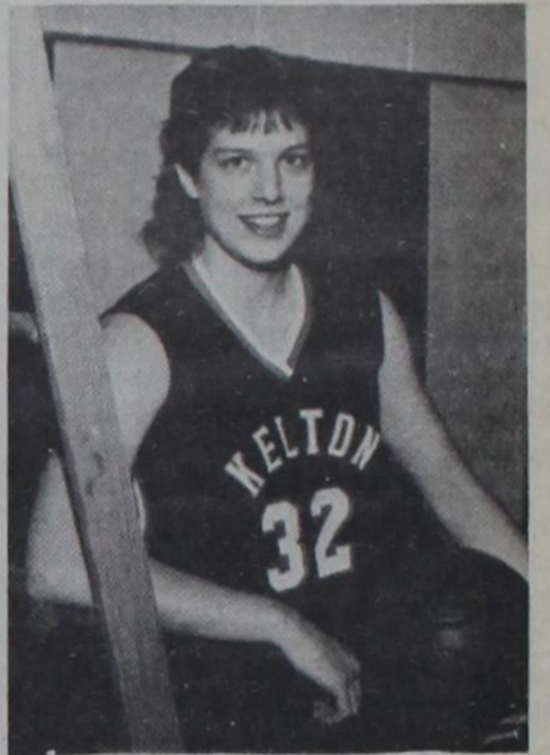
KELTON CAGERS NAMED TO ALL-STATE TEAM

Dean Johnson recently announced his resignation as superintendent of schools at Kelton. After 17 years at Kelton, Johnson will be leaving to assume superintendent's duties at Nazareth, effective June 30, 1989.

Johnson came to Kelton when the school only offered grades k-8. In 1981, the school expanded to offer grades 9-12. The first 10 years at Kelton, Johnson also served the school as Basketball coach.

Johnson was active in the community as well as the school. He served as scout master for a number of years, receiving the "Silver Beaver" award—highest award for volunteer workers. In the Kelton Lions Club, Johnson has held all elective offices. The family attends the Church of Christ in Shamrock.

Agatha Johnson, Dean's wife is also involved in the community. She is a member of numerous charity organizations, including the American Cancer Society. She served several years as secretary to the county attorney.

Dean and Agatha have three children. The oldest, Leslie, is attending Frank Phillips College in Borger. Noel is a sophomore and one of the school's top basketball players. Nicky, the son is in the seventh grade.

In reference to the move, Johnson commented: "It's hard to leave all our friends in Wheeler county, but we are looking forward to the new opportunity."

The board of trustees at Kelton will be taking applications for a new superintendent through April 25th. It is hoped to have the vacancy filled by May 8th.

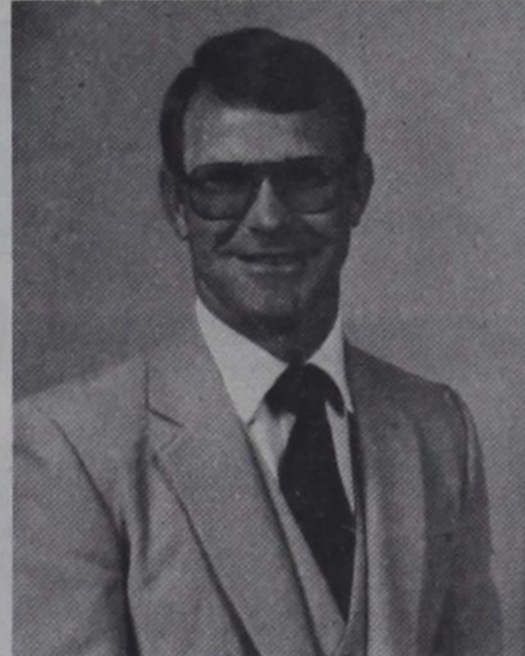
Positions to be filled on the board will be one 1-year unexpired term, one 2-year unexpired term and two 3-year terms. Each of the positions are contested races.

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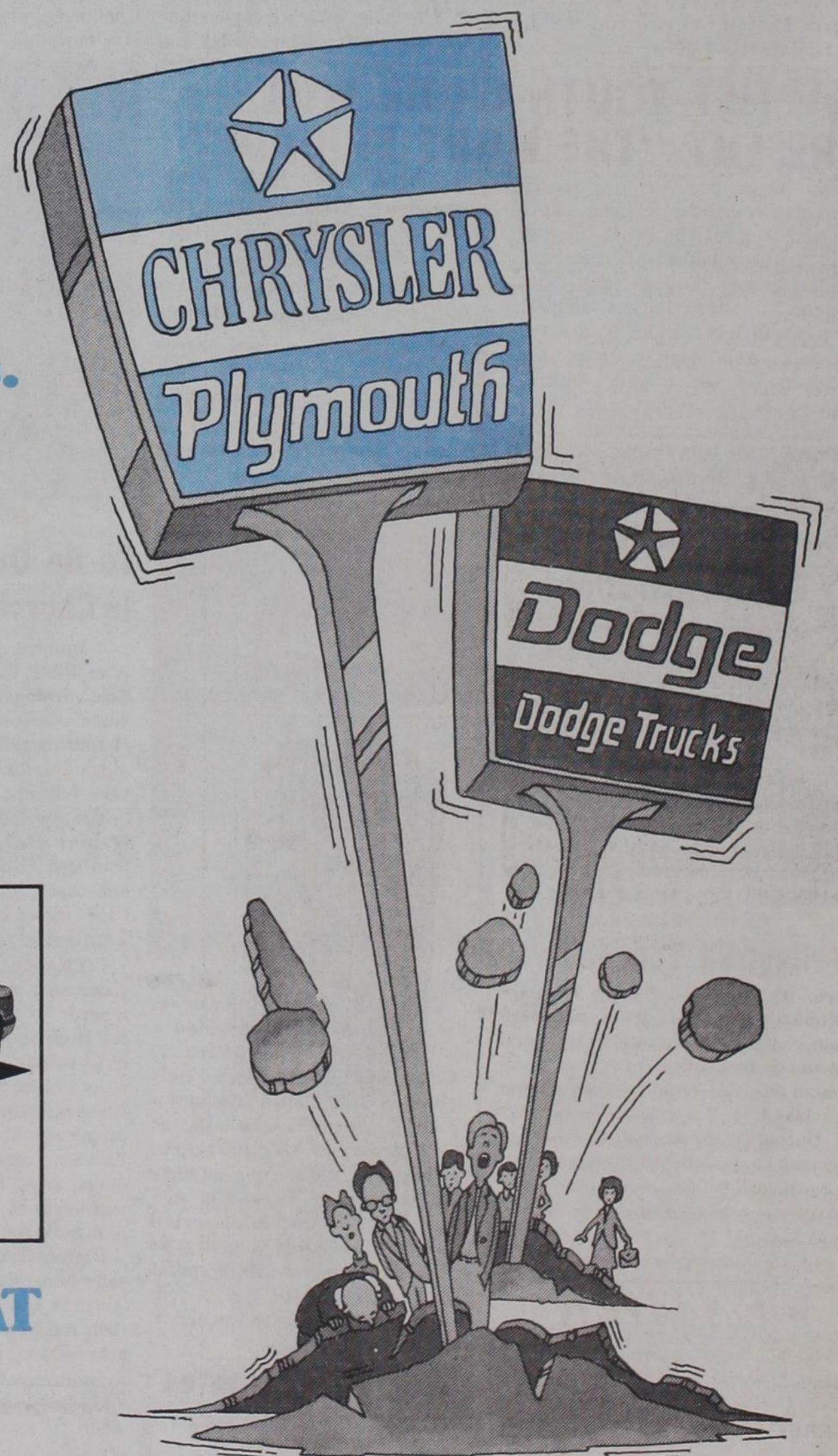

A popular hymn is **The Old Rugged Cross** whose first stanza says: "On a hill far away stood an old rugged cross, The emblem of suffering and shame; And I love that old cross where the dearest and best, For a world of lost sinners was slain."

what we deserve for our deeds; but this man has done nothing wrong. And he was saying, Jesus, remember me when you come in your Kingdom! And He said to him, Truly I say to you, today you shall be with Me in Paradise."

It is not unusual for someone to say: "This man was saved without being baptized." True! This man lived and died under the Old Covenant which did not mandate baptism. But the new Covenant, which came into effect when Jesus died, contains this admonition: "He who has believed and has been baptized shall be saved..." (Hebrews 9:15-17, Mark 16:16)

While the hymn testifies about the crucifixion of Jesus, it is not entirely accurate. For example, the New Testament does not state that the crucifixion of Jesus occurred on a hill. And it does not state that the crucifixion of Jesus was characterized by only one cross.

Luke 23:32-33 reports that Jesus was crucified between two criminals, "...one on the right and the other on the left...". Rather than one cross, the crucifixion of Jesus was characterized by three crosses. And three crosses pinpoint important lessons about the redemption of man.

The crosses and their lessons are--

There is probably no Biblical subject more misunderstood than baptism. Baptism is not a church or a work of human merit. Rather it is an act of faith that brings people into contact with the blood of Jesus, climaxing the new birth which makes every baptized believer "...a new creature..." (Romans 6:4-7, II Corinthians 5:17)

When Christ died, only one person showed any appreciation. And he showed it through a penitent attitude.

Cross of Redemption
The crucifixion of Jesus is the price that God paid for the salvation of mankind. Sin had separated mankind from God and the penalty for this separation was death. (Isaiah 59:2, Romans 6:23) And Jesus paid this penalty.

When Jesus died on the cross, He became a sin-offering, allowing man to be reconciled to God. The Apostle Peter forcefully explained when he wrote: "...Christ also died for sins once for all, the just for the unjust, in order that He might bring us to God..." (I Peter 3:18)

Redemption is not the result of human effort or achievement, but it is freely given to people who obediently accept it by faith in the death of Jesus.

There were three crosses on Calvary when Jesus died. On the center cross was Jesus who died for the sins of mankind. The response of mankind is represented by one of the two other crosses, a cross of rebellion or a cross of repentance.

Which of these two crosses best characterizes your response to the cross of Jesus?

Cross of Rebellion
Luke 23:39 says: "...one of the criminals who were hanged there was hurling abuse at Him, saying 'Are You not the Christ? Save yourself and us!'" This man was dying in rebellion. He was "...hurling abuse..." at the one who could save him.

There are countless numbers of people in our present world who are like this man. They are rebelling against the sacrifice of Jesus which offers them the forgiveness of their sins.

In the second chapter of Ephesians, the Apostle Paul described such people as "...being darkened in their understanding, excluded from the life of God, because of the ignorance that is in them, because of the hardness of their heart..." (verse 18) Notice that the Apostle Paul said that these people are "...excluded from the life of God..."

To rebel against the sacrifice is a serious mistake. It causes people to be "...excluded from the life of God..."

Cross of Repentance
Luke 23:40-43 says: "But the other answered, and rebuking him said, Do you not even fear God, since you are under the same sentence of condemnation? And we indeed justly, for we are receiving

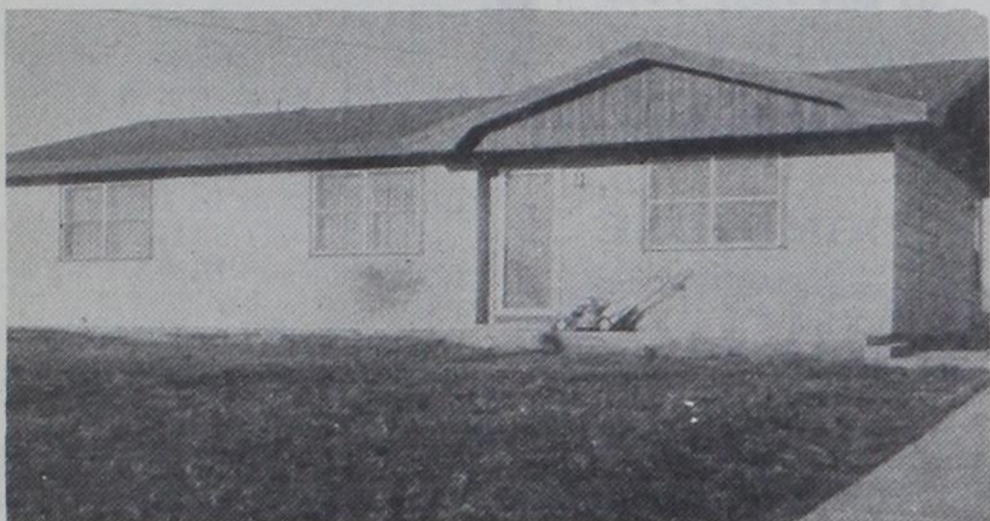

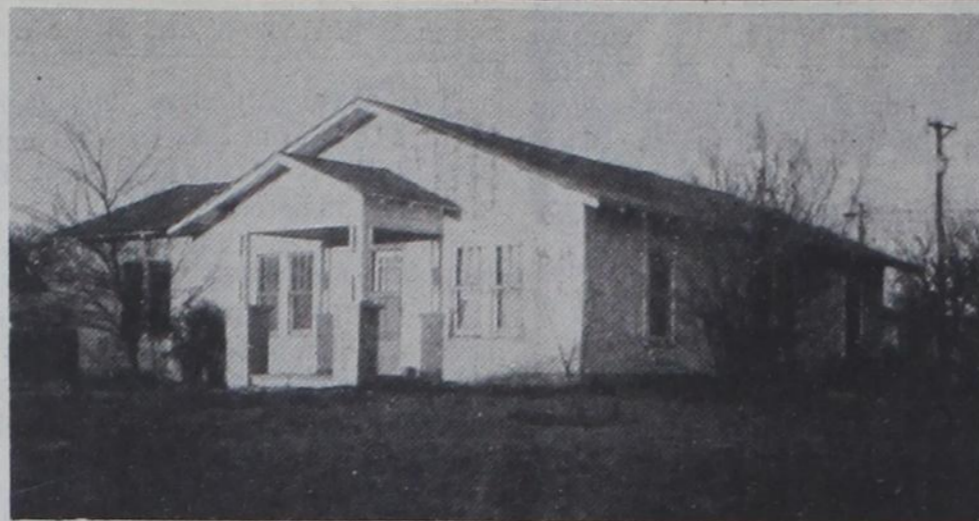

Dr. G. S. Gill and Dr. Craig Phelps of Elk City Community Hospital have passed the certification exam of the American Medical Society on Alcoholism and Other Drug Dependencies (AMSAODD) and are identified by that Society as knowledgeable and expert in chemical dependence.

Five hundred forty-eight physicians throughout the country were certified this year by AMSAODD, the major national and international organization for physicians who specialize in addiction medicine. Including those certified in 1986 and 1987, there are now 1823 AMSAODD-certified physicians.

This is the third year that the innovative examination has been offered to AMSAODD members on a national basis in an effort to

identify physicians who have expertise in this rapidly expanding field. The next examination is scheduled for December 1990.

"The field of alcohol and drug dependence treatment is growing rapidly in response to increased awareness of addiction as a major health problem in this country," said Margaret Ben-Bayog, M.D., President of the Society. "Certification is a way to identify those physicians who, by testing, have been shown a mastery of the body of knowledge that has been amassed in this field."

The six hour examination covers alcohol and all other addictive drugs, including nicotine, with questions equally divided between clinical issues and basic science. Recertification will be required after 10 years in order for the

certification to remain current.

These physicians and their training are a real attribute to the Substance Abuse program at Community Hospital. To our knowledge, Dr. Phelps and Dr. Gill are the only physicians in this part of Western Oklahoma who are certified in the specialty of Substance Abuse.

Gageby Valley Angus Join National Program

Mark S. Meek of Gageby Valley Angus, Briscoe, Texas, Angus cattle breeder, has recently been enrolled in the Angus Herd Improvement Records program of the American Angus Association, reports Dick Spader, executive vice-president of the national organization with headquarters in St. Joseph, Missouri.

Angus Herd Improvement Records (AHIR) is a comprehensive within-herd evaluation program used by cattlemen to help them keep records of reproduction, and growth rate on individual animals. Each year hundreds of Angus breeders use AHIR records to produce more profitable, efficient Angus seedstock.

By weighing calves at 205 days of age and again at a year of age, breeders not only identify the cattle that grow the fastest and most efficiently, they also identify cows that regularly produce above average calves, and bulls that sire outstanding calves.

The American Angus Association in 1957 was the first beef breed organization to offer its members a production records program. Since that date the AHIR program has grown to the point that breeders report more than 250,000 weights each year. This mountain of information is processed and stored in the Association's modern computerized data processing systems.

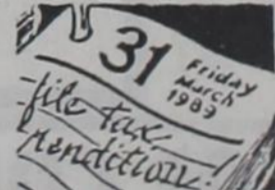

PROTECT YOUR RIGHTS—



RENDER YOUR PROPERTY

A rendition is a report to the appraisal district that lists all the taxable property you own or control on January 1, 1989. The form is available at your local appraisal district or you may draft a similar form.

You must file a rendition if you own tangible personal property used to produce income—such as the machinery and equipment used by a business.

The appraisal district may require any taxpayer to file a rendition by sending the taxpayer a written notice and a rendition form.

The advantages of filing a rendition:

- You give your opinion of your property's value. If the appraisal district places a higher value on your property, it must notify you in writing of the higher value and explain how you can protest that value to the appraisal review board.
- You record your correct mailing address so your tax bills will go to the right address. If your bill is mailed to the wrong address, the

law still holds you responsible for paying your taxes on time or paying extra charges for late payments.

- You can also file a report of decreased value, to notify the appraisal district of significant depreciation to your property in 1988. The district will look at your property before assigning a value in 1989.

The deadline for 1989 renditions is March 31. You can get an extra 30 days if you ask for it in writing before the March 31 deadline.

File renditions with your local appraisal district at the address shown below.

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
