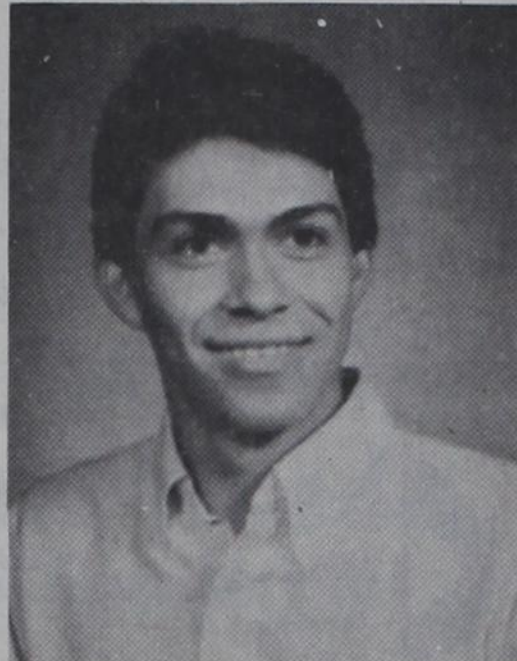

Leona House did not draw an opponent in her bid for an addition term in office.

Roy Stribling, Dennis Hilburn and Dale Corcoran each filed for one of the two positions open on the council.

The Mobeetie city election will be Saturday, May 6.

WHEELER SCHOOL

The voters in the Wheeler Independent School District will go to the polls Saturday, May 7, 1989 to elect two individuals to the board of education. The two places on the board are for full 3-year terms.

Harrison Hall and Velda Miller have filed to have their names placed on the ballot for the position presently held by Bobby Ware. Ware did not choose to seek re-election for a second term.

Gail Ledbetter is asking for the opportunity to serve a second term. He is unopposed on the ballot.

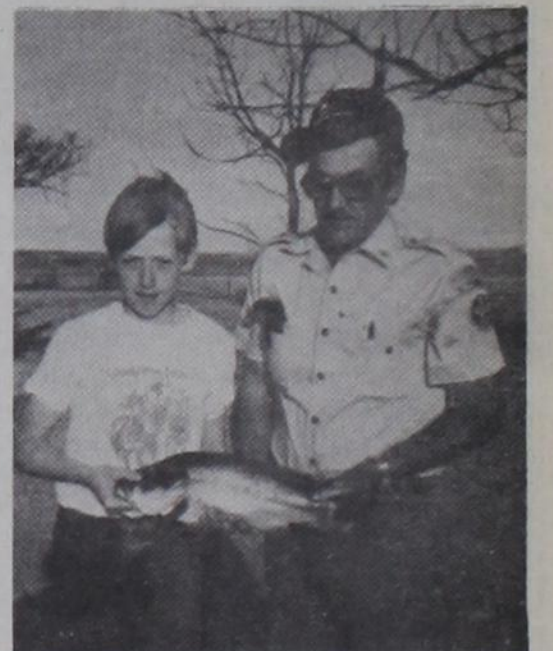

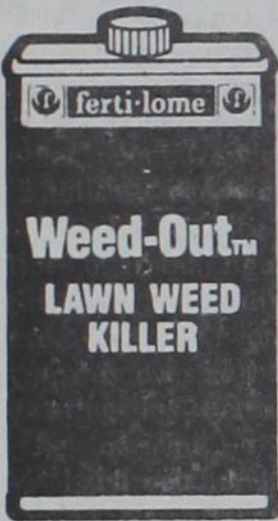

From The Minister's Desk:

In His Ministry, Jesus directed his harshest teaching at religious people who were self-righteous. For example, the eighteenth chapter of Luke records a parable that Jesus told which drew a harsh comparison of a Pharisee and a tax-gatherer.

This parable reads: Two men went up into the temple to pray, one a Pharisee, and the other a tax-gatherer. The Pharisee stood and was praying thus to himself, 'God, I thank Thee, that I am not like other people: swindlers, unjust, adulterers, or even like the tax-gatherer, I fast twice a week; I pay tithes of all that I get.' But the tax-gatherer, standing some distance away, was even unwilling to lift up his eyes to heaven, but was beating his breast, saying, 'God be merciful to me, the sinner!' I tell you, this man went down to his house justified rather than the other; for everyone who exalts himself shall be humbled, but he who humbles himself shall be exalted.' (verses 10-14)

This Pharisee who prayed, 'God, I thank Thee that I am not like other people--', was probably a better person than the tax-gatherer. Yet Jesus said that the tax-gatherer '--went down to his house justified--' rather than the Pharisee. Why? The Pharisee's self-righteousness nullified the righteousness of his life.

Luke reports that Jesus told this parable "--to certain ones who trusted in themselves that they were righteous and viewed others with contempt--" (Luke 18:9)

These two characteristics—self-righteousness and contemptuousness—are closely akin because self-righteous people always alienate themselves from other people by their arrogance. Such a person was the Pharisee.

But consider the tax-gatherer. He does not boast of a sinless life. He does not thank God that he is better than anyone. He merely confesses his sinfulness and asks for mercy. And Jesus says: "--This man went down to his house justified rather than the other for everyone who exalts himself shall be humbled, but he who humbles himself shall be exalted." (Luke 18:14)

There was a sharp contrast between these two men. The Pharisee, who had many righteous qualities in his life, was not justified because of his arrogance and pride. But the tax-gatherer was justified because he openly acknowledged his sins. The lesson is obvious. Self-righteousness can destroy the effectiveness of a righteous life and the penitence of a sinful life can secure the forgiveness of God.

Here is a lesson that every Bible believer must learn. It is possible for a person to fill his life with many righteous deeds, but because of self-righteousness, he can be unjustified. Regardless of how righteous his life may be, a truly righteous man will always pray: "God, be merciful to me the sinner."
