These funds come primarily from public contributions.

This year's Bike-A-Thon is dedicated to Brian McCollister, a Louisiana native who was diagnosed with leukemia in 1984 and underwent chemotherapy at St. Jude's. Today in remission, Brian is a living example of the progress and success of St. Jude's.

Members of an accreditation team from the Texas Education Agency will be available Tuesday, April 4, to meet with parents and patrons who have an interest in expressing their views and opinions about the Wheeler Independent School District, according to Doyle Wilson, school superintendent.

Interviews will be conducted by team members beginning at 9 a.m. - 3 p.m. in the board room of the administrative offices located at Wheeler School.

Every school district in the state is required by law to be visited by an accreditation team from the Agency to evaluate the quality of its educational programs and to determine what progress the school district has made since the last visit.

During the interviews, emphasis will be given to the quality of instruction and community support present on each campus in the district. Areas to be evaluated by the team include planning, curriculum, instruction, services to students, instructional resources, personnel, governance, community conditions, and physical facilities.

Brandon Chick ran a 2:22 in the 800 m dash to also claim a third place finish.

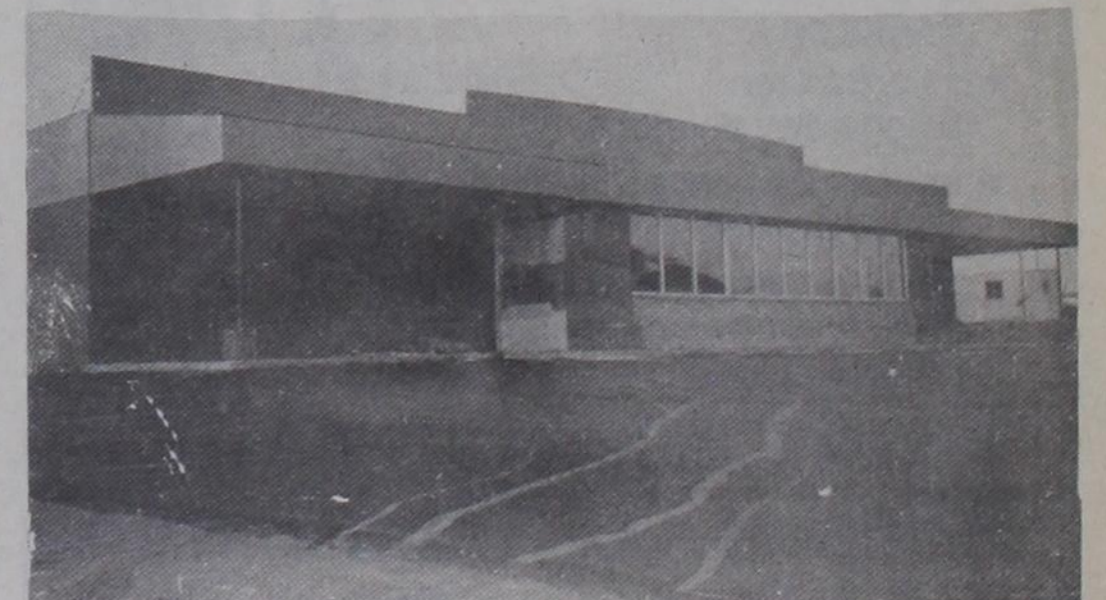
Mack Marshall ran a 12.0 in the 100 dash to pick up the gold medal. Bobby McNeil placed fifth with a 12.6.

Michelle Thompson was on the Honor roll at OCC this past semester. She is the daughter of Bob and Lori Thompson.

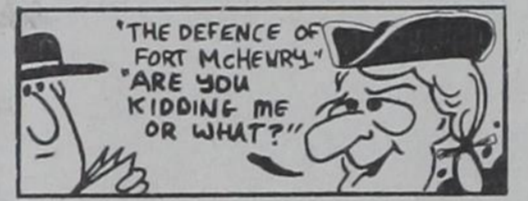

What Is Farm Bureau?

Farm Bureau through the years has become a voice for most of the producers in agriculture. More than four out of five farmers and ranchers are members of the Farm Bureau.

It is an independent organization of farm and ranch families who united to analyze their problems and act together to solve those problems. Farm Bureau is totally controlled by its

members through majority decision and is financed by voluntary dues.

The Texas Farm Bureau has 326,167 member families in 216 organized counties. It is affiliated with the American Farm Bureau Federation which has a membership of 3.7 million member families in more than 2,800 counties.

Policies that guide Farm Bureau originate at the grass-roots level with each producer-member given an opportunity to participate. They are adopted after discussion and exchange of ideas at county, state and national conventions each year.

The structure assures membership control. Members originate policies, and through their delegates, control state and national policy formulations, and election of officers and directors.

Members get action on policies by expressing their desires to their elected political representatives. Legislative staffs in Austin and

Washington, D.C., keep lawmakers informed on Farm Bureau's policy, and call for membership action when necessary.

What Is Farm Bureau?

--Exemption for livestock, poultry and farm machinery from ad valorem taxation.

--Limitation on ad valorem taxes on agricultural land.

--A farm-to-market road system in Texas that is best in the nation.

--Exemptions from state sales tax for machinery, feed, seed, and fertilizer.

--Refunds of both state and federal taxes on farm-used gasoline.

--Reform of inheritance and gift tax laws.

--Improved feed, seed, fertilizer, and insecticide laws.

--Better animal health programs to help reduce losses from brucellosis, hog cholera, and screwworms.

--Price support programs designed to assist in orderly marketing of crops.

--State and federal funds for agricultural research and education.

--Alleviation of some burdensome regulations on health, safety, and environmental standards.

Farm Bureau Successes On National Issues

The Farm Bureau in 1988 was successful on a number of important national issues relating to agriculture, including the following:

--Helped to fully restore agriculture's diesel fuel tax exemption.

--Helped to repeal so-called "heifer tax."

--Helped to enact a massive federal drought-relief law.

--Helped to enact Omnibus Trade Reform Law.

--Removed federal requirements for farmers and ranchers to have commercial driver's licenses.

--Helped stop the federal ban of leaded gasoline.

--Stopped federal wilderness designation legislation and expansion of Big Thicket National Preserve.

--Successfully opposed changing federal rules which would have prohibited farmers from transporting anhydrous ammonia on highways.

--Defeated increased federal minimum wage bill.

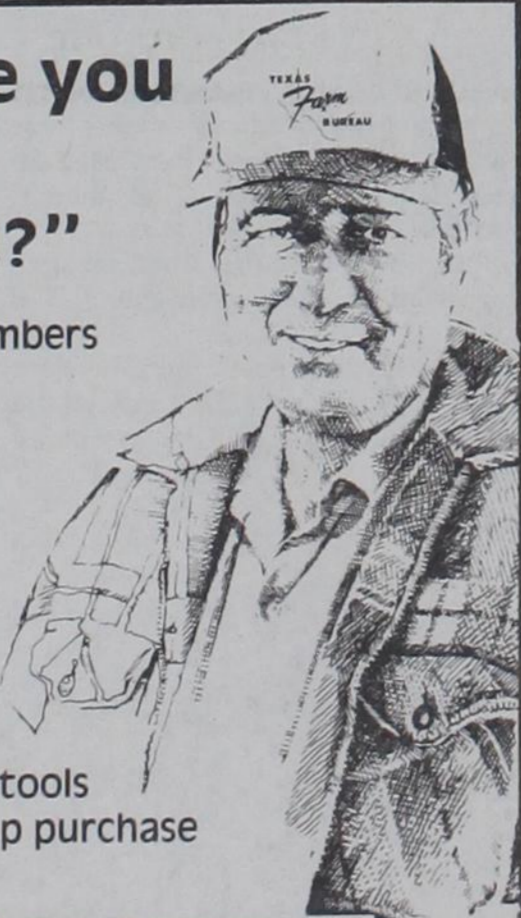
New Satellite Dish

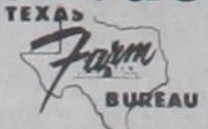

Farm Bureau Goals

The Farm Bureau on the state and national level is still working to implement some of its policies that are

designed to bring a better life for farmers and ranchers and the American public.

These goals include:
--Achieve the kind of economic climate and farm programs that will permit farmers and ranchers to obtain a high net farm income.
--Protect and preserve agricultural water rights.
--Preserve agricultural sales tax exemption.
--Preserve ag use valuation of land.
--Preserve individual freedoms.

Agricultural Goals In Congress

The following issues will be priority items for Texas Farm Bureau with the first session of the 101st Congress, according to Vernie Glasson, TFB public affairs director:

(1) Federal Budget—work for deficit reduction.

(2) Taxes—no new taxes, income averaging restoration, capital gains revision.

(3) Farm Bill—modifications to 1985 law relating to payment limits.

--Promote expanded trade with other nations.

--Work to have economy in government at all levels.

--Emphasize that local government can do it better.

--Reduce costs of production for farmers and ranchers.

--Work to eradicate plant and animal disease.

--Secure more effective research and education in agriculture.

--Reduce ad valorem tax burden.

--Protect agricultural water rights.

--Improve public relations for agriculture.

--Balance the federal budget.

budget, federal crop insurance requirements. Initial work for 1990 Farm Bill.

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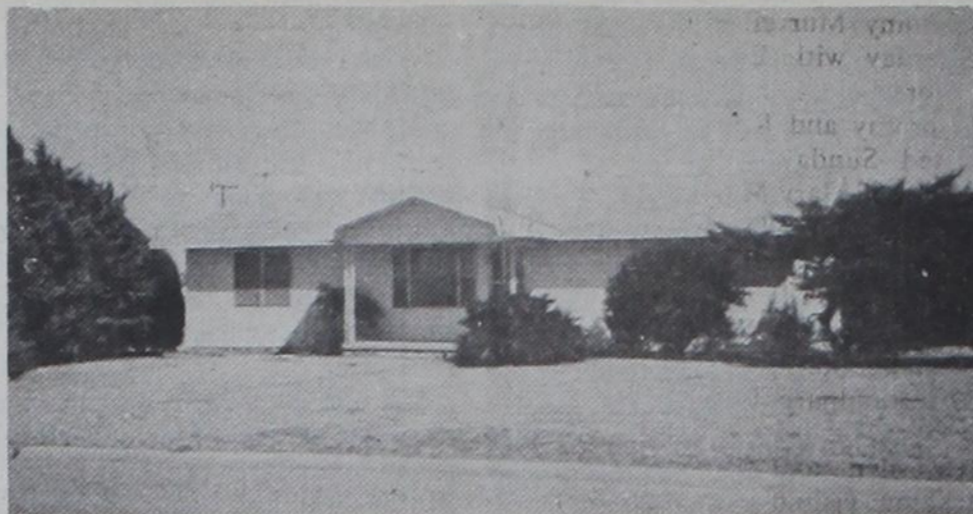

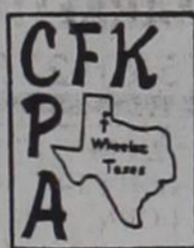

Elmer Gantry is the title of a novel that was written by Sinclair Lewis. The plot of this novel centers upon a golden-tongued evangelist—Elmer Gantry—who rises to power within a denomination, a savior of souls who lives a life of hypocrisy, sensuality, and ruthless self-indulgence.

While the story of Elmer Gantry is fiction, the stories of Jim Bakker and Jimmy Swaggart are not fiction. Both of these popular television evangelists have recently been involved in scandals which virtually destroyed their credibility.

As I have followed these scandals, I have had a twofold reaction. I am glad that the excesses and scams of television evangelism have been exposed. But I am also sad because I realize that these scandals will damage the credibility of people who are sincerely striving to be New Testament Christians.

What can these people do to preserve their credibility? Consider these suggestions.

First, they can be certain that their acts of service are done for the glory of God and not for their own glory. As disciples of Jesus, these people are "the light of the world" and they are to let their light shine before men through the "good works" that they do. But these "good works" are not to be done for their glory, but for the glory of God. (Matthew 5:14-16)

Second, they can remember that the mission of the church is the evangelism of the world—not the entertainment of the world. And as they seek to fulfill this mission, they must recognize that the methods of evangelism that are borrowed from Hollywood and Madison Avenue are doomed to

Third, they can recognize that spirituality is indicated by qualities of character not by emotional reactions or by outward appearances. It should be obvious from the Elmer Gantry-like scenarios of Jim Bakker and Jimmy Swaggart that fancy clothes, expensive jewelry, pious biblical quotations, and stirring hymns are not evidence of spirituality in an individual's life. Rather the Apostle Paul said that the evidence of spirituality in an individual's life is "—the fruit of the Spirit—" which he listed as "—love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, self-control—" (Galatians 5:22). The individual whose character has these qualities is a spiritual individual.

With the publication of Elmer Gantry, the errant man of God has been the source of much religious skepticism. And the scandals of Jim Bakker and Jimmy Swaggart will prove to be no exception. New Testament Christians must counteract this skepticism, striving to be credible people. And then God and His Kingdom will not be blasphemed.

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You must file a rendition if you own tangible personal property used to produce income—such as the machinery and equipment used by a business.

The appraisal district may require any taxpayer to file a rendition by sending the taxpayer a written notice and a rendition form.

The advantages of filing a rendition:

- You give your opinion of your property's value. If the appraisal district places a higher value on your property, it must notify you in writing of the higher value and explain how you can protest that value to the appraisal review board.
- You record your correct mailing address so your tax bills will go to the right address. If your bill is mailed to the wrong address, the law still holds you responsible for paying your taxes on time or paying extra charges for late payments.
- You can also file a report of decreased value, to notify the appraisal district of significant depreciation to your property in 1988. The district will look at your property before assigning a value in 1989.
- The deadline for 1989 renditions is March 31. You can get an extra 30 days if you ask for it in writing before the March 31 deadline.
- File renditions with your local appraisal district at the address shown below.

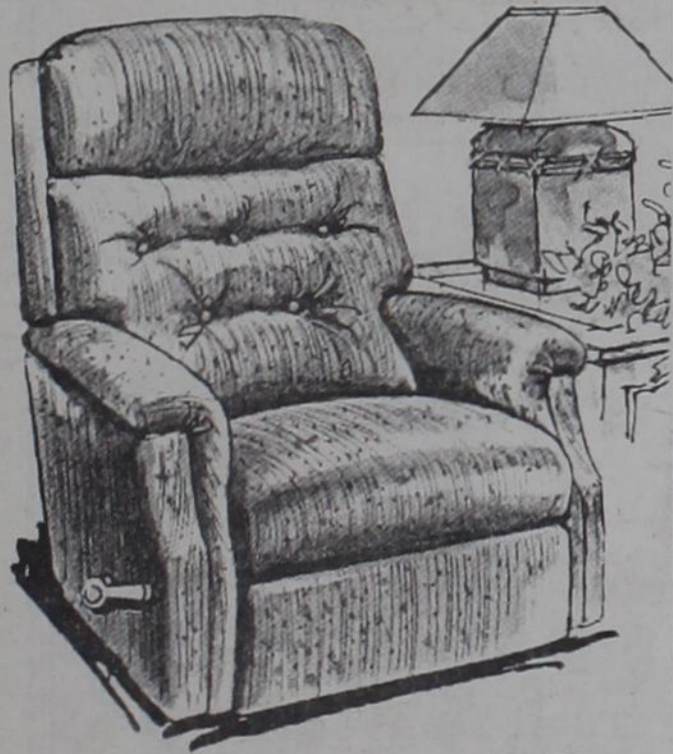

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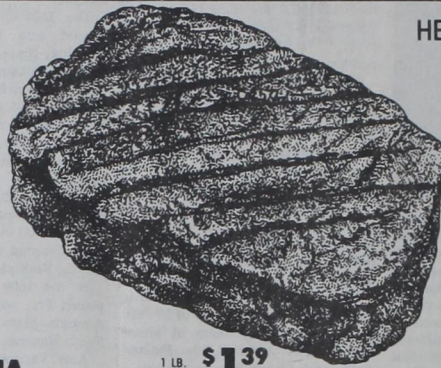
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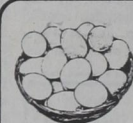
