



Wheat Production Meeting Set for March 7

Wheat producers in Wheeler County and the surrounding area are invited to a Wheat Production meeting, Thursday, March 7. The meeting will begin at 7:00 p.m. in the Coin & Copper Room of the Wheeler Banking Center in Wheeler.

Program participants will include Dr. Brent Bean, Extension Agronomist in Amarillo, Dr. Carl Patrick, Extension Entomologist in Amarillo and Rick Hargrove of the Wheeler County Consolidated Farm Service Agency.

Topics to be covered by Dr. Bean will include Grain & Forage Production of Various Wheat Varieties, Effect of Grazing Pull-Off Dates on Grain Production and Outlook for the 1996 Wheat Crop.

Dr. Patrick will discuss Identification and Control of Wheat Insects and Rick Hargrove will give an update of the Farm Bill.

Those attending the meeting will receive two CEU's toward the renewal of their Private Pesticide Applicator's License or Certificate.

A Forage Production meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, March 12. This meeting is co-sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and the Wheeler County Soil & Water Conservation District.

The Forage Production meeting will begin at 5:00 p.m. in the Multi-Purpose room of the Church of Christ in Wheeler.

Program topics were selected to show producers ways to increase the amount and quality of the forage they produce.

Dr. Don Dorsett, Extension Forage Specialist from College Station will discuss the use of cool season perennial grasses in a forage production operation. He will talk about varieties, production, quality and management.

Land that has been in the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) is beginning to come out of the program. Dr. Jerry Cox, Extension Range Management Specialist at Vernon will ex-



FEBRUARY 20, 1996

The February 20, 1996 meeting of the Wheeler Public Library Board was called to order by Chair, Anita Brown, at 5:30 pm.



From The Minister's Desk: Texas Lone Star is the title of a

magazine that is published by the Texas Association of School Boards. This monthly magazine contains some excellent articles which discuss the strengths and weaknesses of the Texas public school system.

For example, the 1992 October issue of Texas Lone Star contained an article that discussed one of the weaknesses. "Not On Equal Footing" was the title of this article and it was written by J. Ervin Kinzy, a 1992 graduate of Corpus Christi High School.

In his article, Mr. Kinzy suggested that many Texas schools put more emphasis on the athletic achievements of their students than they do on their academic achievements. Mr. Kinzy warned against this inequality in the first two paragraphs of his article, saying: ---

"People often wonder why the United States is falling behind in the academic world. Almost all of the recent studies show us ranking near the bottom in education. Our teenagers know less than teens in other nations. We are no longer at the top in anything except sports."

"While other nations do not focus as much on sports, we adore them. We spend millions of dollars on sports and make the best competi-tors our idols. We love Bo Jackson, Magic Johnson, Andre Agassi, and many others, but our admiration does not stop there. Although the outstanding high school players do not have national fame, everyone in the community knows them. The same blind admiration for athletes seen in the national setting starts at the high school level, while many

scholastic achievers go unnoticed. Sports competitors enjoy fame and fortune, but outstanding businessmen, educators, scientists, researchers, and medical personnel often go unnoticed. I have not heard of many famous businessmen, and neither have my friends. When the United States honors athletes, we tend to leave other important people out-the scholars. It has affected millions of teenagers."
I think that Mr. Kinzy's warning

helps to put into proper perspective a statement that is often made by candidates for the school board. This statement is:"We must do what is best for the kids. "Of course, we must do what is best for the kids! However, what is best for the kids must not be determined by the kids. Rather it must be determined by responsible adults who recognize that very few high school athletes become professional athletes. Therefore, these adults will encourage the kids to be good students not merely good athletes.

A choice does not have to be made between athletics and academics. It is not a matter of eitheror. The Constitution and Contest Rules of the University Interscholastic League clearly says that "--athletics is an intergral part of the educational program.'


Notice that it says:"--athletics is an intergral part of the educational program" not the only part or the most essential part. For this reason parents and school officials will strive to keep athletics and academics on an "equal footing."


