

Ft. Elliott Consolidated Ft. Elliott has three full terms to be filled on their school board. Royce Zybach, Bob Finsterwald, Wayne

Zybach and Wanda Hefley are each seeking election to one of the three places.

Two individuals are to be elected to 1-year unexpired terms on the Ft. Elliott Board. Greg Estes and Clyde Dukes Jr. have filed for these positions.



### Angie Thomas Selected for All-Star Tourney



I feel that maybe the Good Lord has much more to do with man's life than we take time to notice. In the spring, after a rain for the most of us, we are so busy with ten other things that the days and weeks slip by in a dream. Then its hot summer, even August, and by nine-thirty or ten, the thing to do is set in front of the air conditioner with a glass of ice tea. Then comes fall. You mow the lawn hoping for the last time this year. Maybe plow up part of the garden—at your wife's request and plant a patch of turnips.

This is the part I can't get use to. How can anyone like turnips. To me they are worse than beets, if possible. They might make hog feed-only we don't have any hogs.

And then it turns colder and winter has come upon us. It's not too bad most of the time. Like one day this week. Then it's overcast. The wind is 30 mph or higher out of at least six different directions in one day. And 1930's dust storms.

Then to me a week has at least 10 days. What to do? Watch the TV, read the paper again? I've watched TV till I can recite most of the car and AT&T ads, plus Bell Telephone trying to sell you a gaget to shut out unwanted calls, and on and on. Like today the temperature is 38 degrees with a cold north wind somewhere between 20 and 50 mph. So I start looking for something to read. Since I am kinda a history bug, that's what I found. The history of the Great Plains of the Texas Panhandle, about the American Indians, the U.S. Calvary, the cattle ranches that covered thousands of acres, and long ago herds of wild buffalo that roamed even maybe where the town of Wheeler is now.

And about a place north of Wellington, Texas, on Hiway 83, about 13 miles. Years ago there was a highway sign that read "The Red River Plunge of Bonnie and Clyde". I don't know if its still there now or not. I have crossed the bridge for nearly 55 years, but never stopped. Maybe the next time I'll stop and look. However this is about Bonnie Parker, Cylde Barrow and Buck Barrow, his brother. There was construction going on, on the bridge and they missed the road and went into Red River. The year was 1933, June 10th. From their house, Mr. and Mrs. Sam Pritchard and family saw the car go in. They called the Sheriff's Dept. in Wellington for help. When the Sheriff and Police Chief

arrived, they were disarmed by Bonnie Parker. Buck Barrow shot the Prichard's daughter and the Pritchard car was crippled to the point it would not run. They then took the two laws in their police car and left.

Just a little about these 3 outlaws. Bonnie Parker was tiny 4 ft. 10 in. and weighed a whole sum of 85 pounds. Clyde Barrow was 5 ft. 7 in. and 127 lbs. She was 22 and he was 24. Buck Barrow was 28 the night of the shooting and kidnapping. The officer's names were Sheriff Dick Corry and Marshall Paul Hardys. They were taken to Oklahoma, handcuffed together and tied to a tree with barb wire.

In their two year crime span, they robed many small banks, grocery stores, and lumber yards, and killed

But the end finally came when Frank Hammer and many Texas, and Louisiana lawmen shot them to death on a road near Gibsland, Louisana. Maybe if I read a little more winter might not be so bad. At least I might be a lot smarter and learn to like turnips.

### **Local Student Receives Useful Work Experience**

Bobbie Kuehler-Ledbetter, a West Texas A&M University graduate student in biology from Wheeler, is gaining valuable work experience this semester at the Randall County Sheriff's Office through the University's Cooperative Education Program (co-op).

Co-ops are an academic partnership between the University and local employers to provide students with a method of learning which integrates work experience and classroom instruction. Students are employed in practical, paid positions directly related to their educational and career goals.

Hall said many of the employers looking for graduates want graduates with education and experience and, the Cooperative Education Program helps students to achieve this.

To qualify for a co-op placement, students must be enrolled at WTAMU, completed 30 hours of course work, have a grade-point average of at least a 2.5 on a 4.0 scale and commit two semesters to the program.

"This gives students a chance to gain more responsibility during their second semester and enhances their benefits even more," Hall said.

The WTAMU Cooperative Education Office works with me than 30 employers in the area.

"The benefits to the employer include trying out employees without the overhead costs and screening future employees without making a commitment," Hall said. "Often times, the employers receive fresh ideas from students who haven't been with the company for a long time."

Twenty-nine other students are also serving in placements this semester. The Cooperative Education Program began at WTAMU two years ago and has placed 88 students with jobs.

Cooperative Education was founded in 1906 at the University of Cincinnati and is now offered in some version by 1,000 colleges and universities around the country.

CANCER

Over 1.2 million new cancer cases will be diagnosed this year. And while one out of every five deaths in the United States is from cancer, more people are surviving cancer today than ever before. In the early 1900's, few cancer patients had any hope of longterm survival. In the 1940's, it was one in four, and in the 60's, it was one in three. Today, the relative survival rate is over 50%.

WHO WE ARE
