Trust Fund Establised for Children of Officer

Randall Joe Rowell, a reserve police officer from Fritch, died Sunday in a one-vehicle rollover, north of Amarillo. He was alone in a 1994 Chevrolet pickup truck when it left the road about 1:35 am, the DPS said. He was northbound on the Fritch HWY when his truck left the roadway on the left side, traveled 200 feet to the ditch, crossed the ASARCO, Inc. plant entrance and went into a broadside skid, rolling at least five times, states the DPS. He was pinned in his vehicle and died at the scene.

Mr. Rowell, 38, was employed by the Amarillo Police Department for 23 years, as an officer, and was a member of the scuba diving team. After retiring, he was self-employed and worked as a reserve officer at Fritch.

Rowell is survived by a son, Brandon, 16, a daughter, Laura, 13, both of his home. Four brothers, Perry Rowell, Jimmy Carr, both of Borger, Huey Carr, of Fritch, and Charles Carr of Odessa. He also had four sisters, Pam Hibler and Judy Carr of Wheeler, Kathy West of Buck Eye, AZ, and Earline Bowman, of Tulsa, OK. He is also survived by his parents, Joyce and Earl Carr of Wheeler, and Truman and Pat Rowell of Pampa. He is preceded in death by one sister, Cindy Carr. 

Flyin' High; Tweedy Bird Travels In Space

Tucked in Astronaut Shannon Lucid's baggage for her March 21 space mission is a soft green ribbon attached to a one-inch lapel pin of Tweety Bird.

The Looney Tune creation is hitching a ride into space in memory of Nathaniel Hillhouse, 10 month old son of Ben Ed and Lee Ann Hillhouse of

Wheeler, Texas. Lucid is a cousin of Nathaniel.

Nathaniel died October 1994 of meningitis. With the parents permission, Nathaniel's organs were successfully transplanted into two other critically ill patients.

A stuffed Tweedy Bird was with Nathaniel at the hospital when he died. The infant had big round cheeks, much like his last toy. That gave the Hillhouse family the idea of distributing the Tweedy pins.

The green ribbon is a symbol of organ donor awareness.

More than 1,500 pins have been distributed, a total which exceeds the population of Wheeler. "There isn't a school child in Wheeler who doesn't know what organ donation is," Lee Ann Hillhouse says.

Ben Ed and Lee Ann Hillhouse will be at Cape Canaveral for the launch along with Nathaniel's two brothers, Samuel.

According to LifeGift Organ Donation Center more than 43,000 seriously ill people in the United States are awaiting an organ transplant. They

are dying at a rate of nine a day. There are not enough potential donors to meet the need.

The Hillhouse family is working to promote organ donor awareness.

LifeGift Organ Donation Center is a non-profit statewide organ procurement organization located in Houston, Lubbock and Fort Worth.

LABELS CAN HELP YOU SHOP

Many processed items in a grocery store have a food label. Two parts of this label can help you make healthier choices by choosing foods with less

The Nutrition information panel gives you the actual amount of fat in a serving listed in grams. Four grams of fat is about one teaspoon. To compare two foods, look at the grams of fat on each label. Then choose the one with less

A list of ingredients can also give you information about the amount of fat in food. This part of a food label has ingredients listed in order of their weight-in descending order. If fat or oil is listed near the beginning of the list, the food may contain much fat. If fat or oil is listed near the end of the list, the food probably has less fat in it. So start letting the labels on food help you make the right decisions about the foods that you and your family can eat for making the most healthful choices.

We, the taxpayers who oppose the implementation of any new extra-curricular programs, would like to thank Mr. Holland and the school administration for allowing us to present the reasons we oppose any such programs. We are here to present facts and figures, not that we are opposed to the sports of baseball or volleyball or any other sport, but we simply do not feel that this is the time to add 2 new extra-curricular programs to our

system. The facts and figures presented will probably be redundant to the board and we certainly are not trying to hold ourselves out to possess any knowledge or facts not known by the board. We certainly respect the fact that there are others who support the implementation of 2 new programs and our presentation is not intended to offend anyone in the room.

We want to begin our presentation with some historical facts and figures in the form of a chart presentation. The 1st chart is a chart that depicts the rise in tax rates over the last 10 years. In 1985, our tax rate was .66410 per

\$100 of valuation; In 1995 it has risen to 1.33312 or a 200% increase in 10 years. It is estimated by taxing officials that the tax rate for this school district will max to \$1.50 per \$100 valuation in the next 2 years. A \$1.50 tax rate is the highest rate allowed by law for the maintenance and operations fund for school districts and can only be changed by vote of the State Legislature, which is not going to happen. The next chart is a chart that depicts the fall in valuation of our school district since 1988. In 1988, our valuation was \$110,784,162, in 1995 it has fallen to \$89,628,321 or a 20% decrease in 7 years. The purpose of the 2 charts is to demonstrate the problem in depending on and projecting tax revenues for this school district. If the current trends continue in falling valuations, in the year 2000, our school district will have a valuation of about \$68,000,000. With a \$68,000,000 valuation and \$1.50 tax rate our tax revenues will be about \$1,000.000 as compared to 1995 tax revenues of approximately \$1,300,000 or a decrease in tax revenues generated by our school district of approximately \$300,000 in the next 5 years.

From the audited financial statements of Wheeler ISD for the fiscal year ended August 31, 1995, the total revenues for the general operating fund were \$2,536,458 and the total expenditures were \$2,692,192 or \$155,735 more expenditures than revenues. At the close of the fiscal year end, August 31, 1995, there was a carryover fund balance of \$819,676. It is projected for fiscal year end August 31, 1996, that about the same deficit spending of \$150,000 will occur leaving approximately \$650,000 fund balance carryforward for the school year beginning September 1, 1996. A quick calculation reveals that this carryforward will be used in 2 years due to the decrease in tax revenues. The parameters we have to project tax revenues in the future are, our tax rate will be \$1.50, but we do not know

where our valuation will level out. The next chart is a chart that depicts the decrease in our student population for the last 3 school years. In the school year 1993-94, our enrollment was 460 students, in 1995-96 our enrollment had fallen to 341 students, or a decrease of 26% in 3 years. Our kindergarten class has fallen from a class size in 1993-94 of 25 students to 20 students in 1995-96. The kindergarten class through the 4th grade will be under the limit for 6 man ennrollment for participation in that class. Our 7th and 12th grades have suffered the largest decrease in students of 14 each in the same time frame and there are currently 14 students attending pre-kindergarten.

The importance of student numbers come to light in the fact that we all know that the 1995-96 school year is the last year we will receive tax monies from the neighboring school districts. Their money now goes to the state and we will receive our state money on an earned basis. The revenue we receive from the state is based largely on our student population and valuations. As valuations go down, the state increases our revenues, but as student population decreases, our state revenues decrease by more than the increased revenues for falling valuations. Our tax revenue problems are mainly that we will not receive as much money from the state based on an earned revenue ratio, as we did in prior years, and with falling valuation our tax revenues generated are going to decrease. It seems very evident to us that our school district is facing the same money problems that face all other school districts and we know our school administration is facing some tough and critical decisions when the budget cuts start. From our view point, it is not whether these 2 new programs cost \$5,000, 10,000, 25,000, or 50,000, but the real question may be is if they cost \$1 can we really afford them. We certainly do not think that from a taxpayer's point of view that the projection or revenues and expenditures warrant the 2 new commitments. For those involved in and for those who have observed our track program, know that our hurdles are in an ill state of repair. Last year we had to borrow hurdles from Shamrock ISD to be able to run our track meet and we will again do so this year. We notice that hurdles were budgeted for the 95-96 school year, but this expenditure has been put on hold. It is hard for us to understand that if we cannot afford equipment for an existing program, how can we afford the equipment for a new program?

Another area of concern is the presumption that if an athlete enters into one of these 2 new extra-curricular programs, that a scholarship will be likely. We think that this presumption is dangerous and will lead to great disappointment for both parents and the athletes because it is simply not reality. Less than 1/2 of 1% of all athletes who participate in athletics ever obtain scholarships. In discussions with avid Mustangs Boosters, it is estimate that fewer than 20 scholarships have been awarded to Wheeler athletes since the late 1950s. In that period of time, Wheeler produced some of the best athletes in Class A in the State of Texas. We believe that athletes should enter into extra-curricular programs because of their desire for the game and to make themselves better individuals, not based on the anticipation of receiving a scholarship. We feel most parents would like for their children to experience in an extra-curricular program the requiring and developing of sound work ethics, being prompt and present every day knowing that someone else is counting on them to do their job, and develop the discipline and will to prepare. Hopefully, these attributes will carryover for them when they enter into the work force. The Ex-Students

Assn. of Wheeler ISD already has in place a scholarship fund and would welcome contributions to further their giving of scholarships to Wheeler student athletes. We feel that if the same monies that it would take to start any new programs were put into this fund, we could help far more student athletes. As stated by UIL guidelines for booster clubs, booster groups or individuals may donate money or merchandise to the school with prior approval of the administration. These kinds of donations are made to cover the cost of commercial transporatation and to cover cost of out of town meals. It would be a violation of booster groups or individuals to pay for such cost directly. To avoid violation of the UIL Amateur Rule, money given to a school cannot be earmarked for any particular expense. Booster clubs may make recommendations, but cash or other valuable consideration must be given to the school to use at its sole discretion, Coaches and Directors of UIL Accademics, Athletics and Fine Arts may not accept a petty cash fund or a miscellaneous discretionary fund, All funds must be given to the school administrator and spent at the discretion of the school, with the approval of the school board.

There are certainly other areas of concern. On discussions with other school districts who have implemented such progams, many problems has arisen. One being that there are some athletes who want to participate in more than one program. If the athlete participate in more than one program, his studying time was cut short and their grades suffered which led the athlete to make a choice between sports. Another problem is that there is a presumption that an athlete can play baseball if he/she is not capable of playing football, basketball or running track. A lot of coaches have told us that this was the plea to their school boards, but when they implemented the new program the same athletes who were the starters in football, basketball or track were the same starters on the baseball team. This situation led to some uncomfortable confrontations between coaches, athletes, and parents. At Wheeler ISD, we have approximately 40 male athletes and with the addition of another spring sport, there woud be 40 athletes for 4 sports. We feel that this division of athletes between 4 sports would make us far below average in all spring sports. It is certainly a feeling by our group that we may have as many sports programs availabe now that we can handle. Another concern we have about adding any new programs is how would the school board handle another request by a different set of parents for another program such as girls softball. How could you tell this new set of parents no if 2 new programs had been previously implemented? We believe it is time to draw a line and develop and enhance our

existing programs. In closing, we would like to encourage the board not to vote on the implementation of 2 new programs based on emotions, but rather vote no on this issue based on prudence and good business judgment. This vote must be what is right for all of our students, athletes, taxpayers and our entire school district.

Each of the teachers will receive a framed certificate signed by the student who nominated them.


