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WHEELER COUNTY COMMISSIONERS COURT

A RESOLUTION PROHIBITING **OUTDOOR BURNING**

On this 22nd day of April, 1996, the Commissioners Court of Wheeler County, Texas, convened in open session at the Courthouse of Wheeler County, Wheeler, Texas, with a quorum present, and among proceedings,

had the following Resolution passed, by unanimous vote:

WHEREAS, as a result of the extreme drought and excess wind conditions which have plagued Wheeler County for the preceding eight months the county has suffered an inordinate number of grass fires; and

WHEREAS, weather forecasters offer little promise of a change in the hot, dry and windy conditions in the near future;
WHEREAS, such fires have the potential of endangering lives and

damaging property on a large scale; and
WHEREAS, the continued protection of health, safety and welfare of the citizens of Wheeler County against wildfire during the existing drought conditions, necessitates the declaration of a state of disaster in Wheeler County and a prohibition against outdoor burning; and WHEREAS, the Texas Disaster Act of 1975, authorized declaration of a

state of disaster "If the threat of disaster is imminent"; and WHEREAS, the authority for such declaration of disaster authorizes the imposition of limitations and controls on activities which tend to increase the

likelihood of wildfires; and
WHEREAS, such controls, once implemented have the potential of

protecting lives and property by mitigating the threat of dangerous fires;
NOW, THEREFORE, be it RESOLVED AND ORDERED that, until
further resolution by the Wheeler County Commissioner's Court, Wheeler
County is declared to be in a state of disaster as a result of the existing drought conditions; Be it FURTHER RESOLVED AND ORDERED that in an attempt to

mitigate the potential for wildfires, all outdoor burning of any substance or material, for any purpose, by any person or entity within the confines of Wheeler County is hereby prohibited in the absence of written permission granted by the Wheeler County Commissioners' Court upon the following provisions

LIABILITY.

The authority to conduct outdoor burning as set forth hereinabove does not excuse the responsible person from any consequences, damages or

injuries resulting from the burning.

2. ENFORCEMENT PROCEDURE.

permitted outdoor burn must, prior to commencing such burn, notify the Wheeler County Sheriff's Office Dispatcher at (806) 826-5537 for placement on a daily controlled burn log.

(b) In every case, a Volunteer Fire Department authorized by Wheeler County may monitor the permitted outdoor burn for compliance with the above regulations and other statutes and regulations concerning outdoor burning not specified above.

(a) If it appears that a violations or threat of violation of these regulations has occurred or is occurring, Wheeler County may bring suit for injunctive relief, civil penalties, or both against the person who committed, is committing, or is threatening to commit the violation; and

(b) A person who violates this prohibition against outdoor burning is subject to a civil penalty of a fine of not more than \$1,000.00 and/or confinement in the Wheeler County Jail for a term not to exceed 180 days for each act of violation.



We still have an Oil Resovour that you would take a quart can with a nozle on it and go to the oil tank and turn the handle backwards till it quit and then turn it foreward to get your quart of oil. That tank fascinated me as a child hardly able to reach the handle. That was close to 70 years ago and our son Terry has that thing at his home all shiny and still able to

Not long ago, for some reason, our Chey wouldnt start and I figered it would sort of jump start if I could get out our litle battery charger. 



FAMILY PREPAREDNESS FOR DISASTERS

This is Part II of putting together a Family Disaster Supply Kit. The kit includes six basic items: Water (in last weeks article) Food, First Aid Kit, Tools and Supplies, Clothing and Bedding and Special Items.

TIPS FOR FOOD: Store at least a 3-day supply of non-perishable food. Select foods that require no refrigeration, preparation or cooking and little or no water. If you must heat food, pack a can of sterno. Rotate these foods into the regular diet frequently to keep the supply fresh. In a

disaster supply kit include: **Ready-to-eat canned meats, fruits and vegetables.

**Canned juices, milk, soup (if powdered, store extra water). **Staples such as sugar, salt, pepper.
**High energy foods such as pea-

nut butter, jelly, crackers, granola bars, trail mix. **Vitamins, infant food and food

for special diets. **Comfort/stress foods such as cookies, hard candy, instant coffee,

tea bags. TIPS FOR FIRST AID KIT: Assemble a first aid kit for the home and one for each vehicle. An approved American Red Cross kit may be purchased, or one may be assembled with the following items:



What can be learned from long term experience? Plenty, say organizers of the 1996 Ranch to Rail North beef producer conference.

The event will be held on May 7 at the Civic Center in Amarillo. "In addition to updating the 1995-96 information, we're emphasizing interpretation of the data collected through the Ranch to Rail effort," said F. T. "Ted" McCollum, area beef cattle specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. 
