## WHEELER COUNTY COMMISSIONERS COUBT <br> A RESOLUTON PROHIBTING OUTDOOR BURNING

On this 22 nd day of April, 1996, the Commissioners Court of Wheeler County, Wheeler. Texas with aquorum presont, and among proceedings, had the following Resolution passed, by unanimous vote: WHEREAS, as a result of the extreme drought and excess wind conditions which have plagued Wheeler County for the preceding eight
months the county has sutfered an inordinate number of grass fires; and WHEREAS, weather forecasters offer little promise of a change in the hot, dry and windy conditions in the near future;
WHEREAS, such fires have the potential of WHEREAS, such fires have the potential of endangering lives and damaging property on a large scale; and
WHEREAS the continued protection citizens of Wheeler County against wildfire during the existing condions, necessitates the declaration of a state of disasister in Whesler County and a prohibition against outdoor burning; and
WHEREAS, the Texas Disaster Act of 1975, authoriz state of disaster "If the threat of disaster is imminent"; and
WHEREAS, the authrity tor sich WHEREAS, the authority for such declaration of disaster authorizes the likelihood of wildires: and WHEREAS, such controls, once implemented have the potential of protecting lives and property by mitigating the threat of dangerous fires;
NOW, THEREFORE, be it RESOLVED AND ORDERED that, until further resolution by the Wheeler County Commissioner's Court, Wheeler
County is declared to be in a state of disaster as a result of the existing County is declared to be in a state of disaster as a result of the existing drought conditions; Be it FURTHER RESOLVED AND ORDERED that in an attempt to mitigate the potential for wildfires, all outdoor burning of any substance or
material, for any purpose, by any person or entity within the confines of Wheeler County is hereby prohibited in the absence of written permissio granted by the Wh
provisions: 1. LIABiLITY.

The authority to conduct outdoor burning as set forth hereinabove does
not excuse the responsible person from any consequences, damages or injuries resulting from the burning.
2. ENFORCEMENT PROCEDUR
(a) The person conducting a permilted outdoor burn must, prior to
commencing such burn notify the Wheler County Sherifts of commencing such burn, notity the Wheeler County Sheriff's Office Dis patcher at (806) $826-5537$ for placement on a daily controlled burn $\log$. County may monitor the permitted outdoor burn for compliance with the above regulations and other st
burning not specified above.
3. PENALTIES.

## WHEELER COUNTY COMMISSIONERS COURT <br> A RESOLUTIOW PROHIBTING OUTDOOR BURNING

On this 22nd day of April, 1996, the Commissioners Court of Wheeler
County, Texas, convened in open session at the Courthouse of Wheel County, Wheeler, Texas, with a quorum present, and among proceedings, had the following Resolution passed, by usanimous vote:
WHEREAS, as a result of the extreme drought WHEREAS, as a result of the extreme drought and excess wind months the county has suffered an inordinate number of grass fires; an WHEREAS, weather forecasters offer little promise of a change in the hot, dry and windy conditions in the near future;
endangering lives and WHEREAS the on a large scale; and
itizens of Whe continued protection of health, safety and welfare of the Onditions, necesssitates the declaration of a state of disaster in Wheng County and a prohibition against outdoor burning; and
state of disas, the Texas Disaster Act of 1975, authorized
state of disaster "If the threat of disaster is imminem""; and WHEREAS, the authority for such declaration of disaster authorizes the
impositionof limitations and controls on activities which tend to increase likelihood of wildfires; and
WHEREAS, such crontrols, once implemented have the potential of
protecting lives and property by mitioation the protecting lives and property by mitigating the threat of dangerous fires;
NOW, THEREFORE, be it RESOLVED AND ORDERED that, until further resolution by the Wheeler County Commissioner's Court, Wheeler County is declared to be in a state of disaster as a result of the existing drought conditions; RESOLVED AND ORDERED that in an attempt to mitigate the potential for wildfires, all outdoor burning of any substance or
material, for any purpose, by any person or entity within the confines of material, for any purpose, by any person or entity within the confines of
Wheeler County is hereby prohibited in the absence of written permission granted by the Wheeler County Commissioners' Court upon the following provisions:

1. LABILITY.
The authority to conduct outdoor burning as set forth hereinabove does injuries resulting from the burning.
2. ENFORCEMENT PROCEDURE
(a) The person conducting a permitted outdoor burn must, prior to commencing such burn, notity the wheeler County Sherift's Office Dis (b) In every case, a Volunteer Fire Department authorized burn $\log$. County may monitor the permitted outdoar bum for compliance with the burning not specifie
3. PENALTIES.
(a) If it appears that a violations or threat of violation of these
egulations has occurred or is occurring, Wheeler County may bring suit to injunctive reliet, civil penaltios, or both, is committing, or is threatening to commit the violation; and
(b) A person who violates this prohibition against outdoor burning is subject to a civil penalty of a fine of not more than $\$ 1,000.00$ and/o
continement in the Wheeler County Jail for a term not to exceed 180 day or each act of violation.
