Allison will mark the first anniversary of the '95 tornado that moved across Wheeler County on Saturday, June 8. The 7:45 worship service will be held at the ball park. The storm skipped across the county, but missed Allison after destroying several homes in the country as it approached

"Part of the reason we're having a worship service is to thank the people from surrounding communities that helped us," said Mike Dyer, one of the organizers. "Canadian, Wheeler and Briscoe were the main town that helped, but it seems like people came from everywhere. We really got a good show of people from Canadian.

"The other reason is to give thanks that nobody died in the tornado," Dyer added. "They measured the tornado at 1.3 miles wide where it crossed the highway, so I'd say we're lucky that nobody was killed."

The program will include prayer, music and testimonials. Anyone wishing to attend is invited. The ball park is located on the highway on the north end of town.





From The Minister's Desk:

The Amarillo Goble News recently contained an editorial that was written by Katherine Dowling, a professor at the University of Southern California School of Medicine. This exceptional editorial was entitled, "Quality Of Life Difficult To Gauge" and it said: ---

One in five nurses who care for the terminally ill, according to a recent article in the New England Journal of Medicine, have decided that they know best when life should end.

"Interesting concept we have here. I'm sure glad that one in five wasn't on duty when I admitted Mr. X, a centenarian, to the hospital recently. Mr. X lay in bed, unresposive to anything but the nastiest pinches, tongue hanging out of the corner of his slack mouth. Anyone seeing him would have been positive that he was in the process of dying a not very dignified death. But we gave Mr. X some antibiotics for his pneumonia and by next morning a little miracle had occurred. "

"Our patient had pulled himself back from the brink, regained his former impressive dignity and was carrying on a jovial conversation with the nurses, once again proving that we humans "know not the hour nor the day" when natural death will visit."

"The Declaration of Independence champions our right to life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness, but society increasingly is seeking to put a percentage sign on the "life" part of that contract. As in, President Clinton may have a 100 percent right to life, but little Jenny, born with Down syndrome, only has a 50 percent relative life value, and old, crippled, diapered Mrs. Dowd has a 2 percent claim to life, at best."

"We also fail to see the process of dying as having any intrinsic value in the life cycle. We think the life process should go from running the L. A. Marathon to stone cold, without any intermediate steps. And should those nasty in-







Emergency Farm Loan Applications Available

Applications for emergency farm loans for damages and losses caused by excessive high temperatures, drought conditions, unseasonably cool temperatures, and an early freeze, which occured from August 1 through December 31, 1995 are being accepted at the Farm Service Agency (FSA) office located in Clarendon, Larry Goetze said today.

Wheeler County is one of twenty in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Dan Glickman eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the di-

As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss to be eligible for an FSA emergency loan," Mr. Goetze said. Farmers participating in the PIK or Federal Crop Insurance program will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

FSA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U.S. citizens and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U.S. citizens hold a majority interest.
