Eleventh Annual

4th of July Celebration Is Thursday

The Eleventh Annual 4th of July Celebration will be held this year under the sponsorship of the Wheeler chamber of Commerce. The activities start early with breakfast and end with the street dance downtown until 1:00 A.M. Park activities begin at 10:00 A.M. and continue to dusk with the free fireworks display. The Fun Run/Walk and Punt, Pass & Kick will be at the courthouse square and the track respectively before 10:00 A.M.

Tuesday morning will open with breakfast at the Masonic Lodge beginning at 6:30 A.M. You do not have to get up that early, serving will continue for some time. This breakfast is a must in your day of activities.

The Fun Run will be under the supervision of Robert and Marla Ford. Starting time will be 8:00 A.M. Individuals are being asked to sign up for the run in advance and the cost will be \$9.00. Each participant will receive a t-shirt commemorating the event. Forms are available at the

Swimming Pool, Thriftway, Appearances and Speedi-Mart. It is not necessary to run, many just walk and enjoy the fellowship of fellow participants. The starting point for the run will be the west side of the courthouse square to avoid the crossing of Highway 152. Male and Female participants will be divided into three groups: 12 and under, 13-17 and 18 and over; ribbons will be presented.

Punt, Pass and Kick will be at 8:30 A.M. at the Park. Coach Bailey has been asked to chair this activity. The event will be at the track, north Highway 83. This event is open to any youngster wishing to participate; the group will be divided by ages. Ribbons will be presented winners at the track.

At 10:00 the activities at the park will begin. This year the chamber is offering a \$50 prize to the group with the most patriotic booth; judging of the decorations will be conducted by an appointed committee.

The park activities will kick-off with the raising of the flag and the singing of the National Anthem. Scheduled for the day will be the turtle Races, Balloon Toss, Swim Meet and many other activities.

Food and activity booths will be operated by non-profit groups throughout the day.

Justin Hefley Attends Sum. Camp for Diabetics

A unique camp eight miles east of this North Texas community now has a special connection to Wheeler. Justin Hefley of Wheeler has joined some 550 campers ages 6 to 18 at Camp Sweeney, a safe, active, and educational environment for kids with diabetes.

Camp Sweeney's 80 member staff offers medical attention around the clock, as well as training in such vital needs as blood-sugar monitoring and insulin injections. In this monitored setting on 340 wooded acres, children feel free to enjoy the camp's activities: horseback riding, soccer, crafts, swimming and canoeing on Lake Dealey. Campers also learn about exercise and nutrition, and perhaps most importantly, they meet other children learning to cope with diabetes.

"Before I came to Camp Sweeney," a veteran teenage camper says, "I was scared to be away from home. I thought I might have a reaction, and I didn't want anyone to know I had diabetes. I was afraid that my friends wouldn't like me anymore. But now, Camp Sweeney has taught me how to take care of myself, and I feel more independent."

Summer camps often turn away children with diabetes because of their medical and dietary needs. But to attend Camp Sweeney, the only requirement is that the child have diabetes. Founded in 1950 by endocrinologist Dr. J. Shirley Sweeney, the summer camp proves to youngsters that diabetes is manageable, and that by taking responsibility for their health, they can enjoy a full and active life.

Camp Sweeney is funded by donations from individuals, foundations, and the United Way. About 95 percent of campers receive scholarship aid to defray summer-camp costs. Camp Sweeney is operated by the Southwestern Diabetic Foundation, Inc., P.O. Box 918, Gainesville, TX 76241, (817) 665-9502.

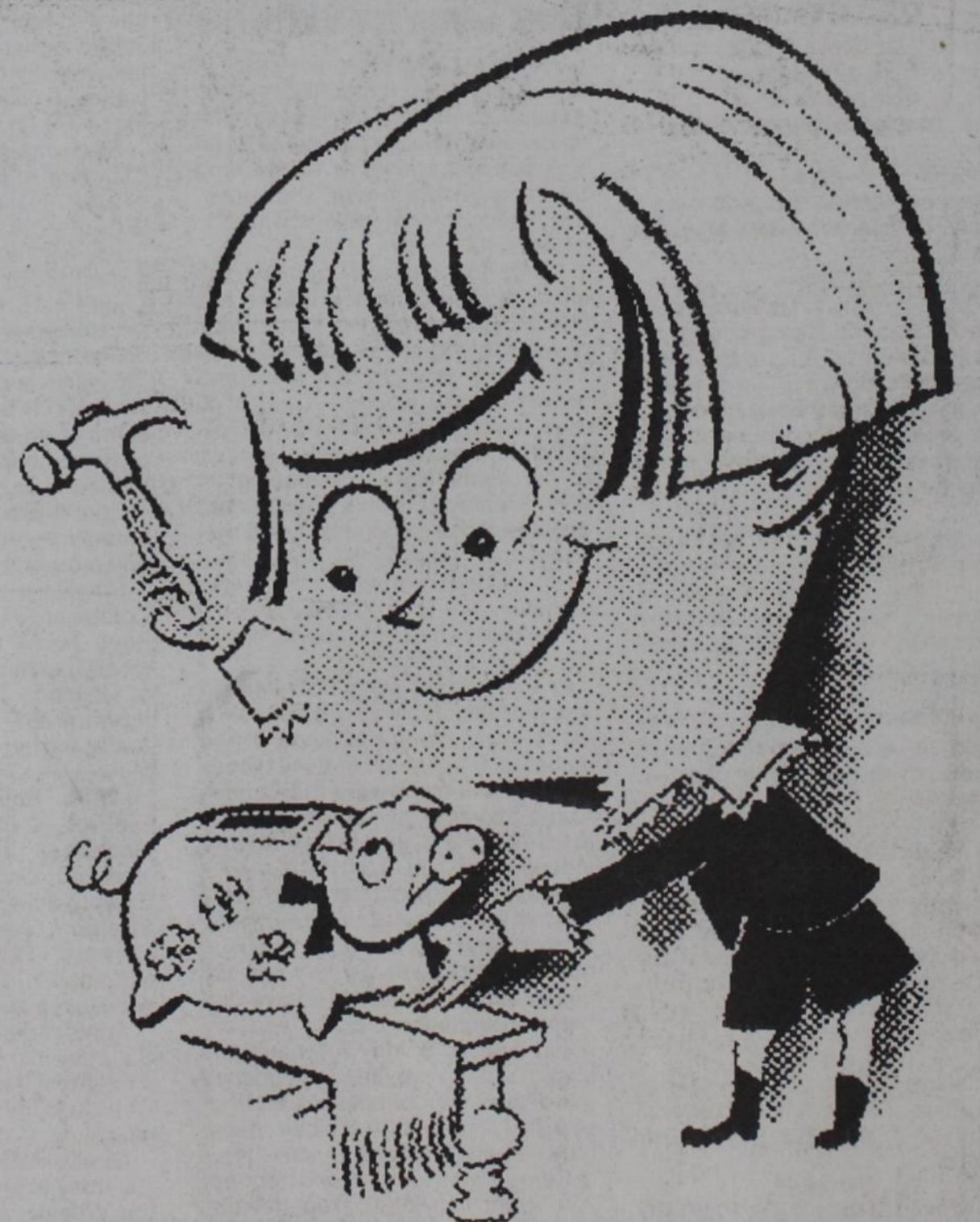

We missed Ken and Linda Daughtry Saturday, but they were in our thoughts.

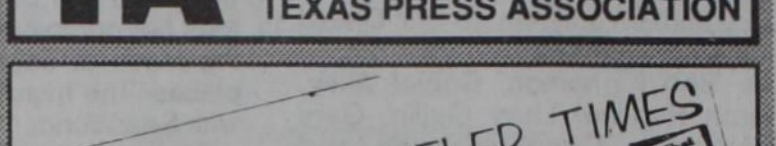
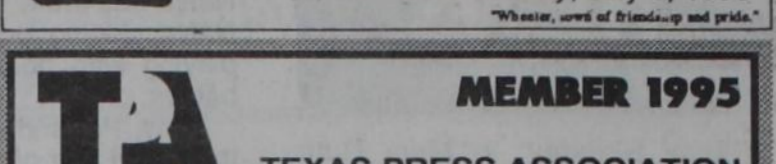

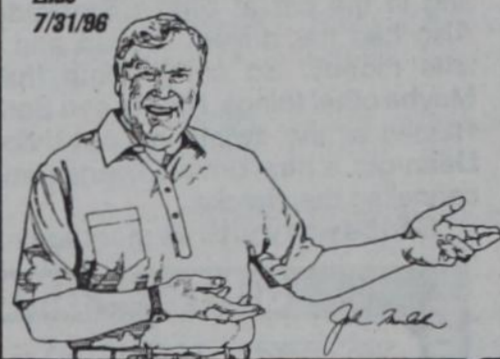

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and sunshine, then the clouds moved in more and it blowed and rain fell in a sheet. I heard we got 2 inches, so good to pay the preacher.

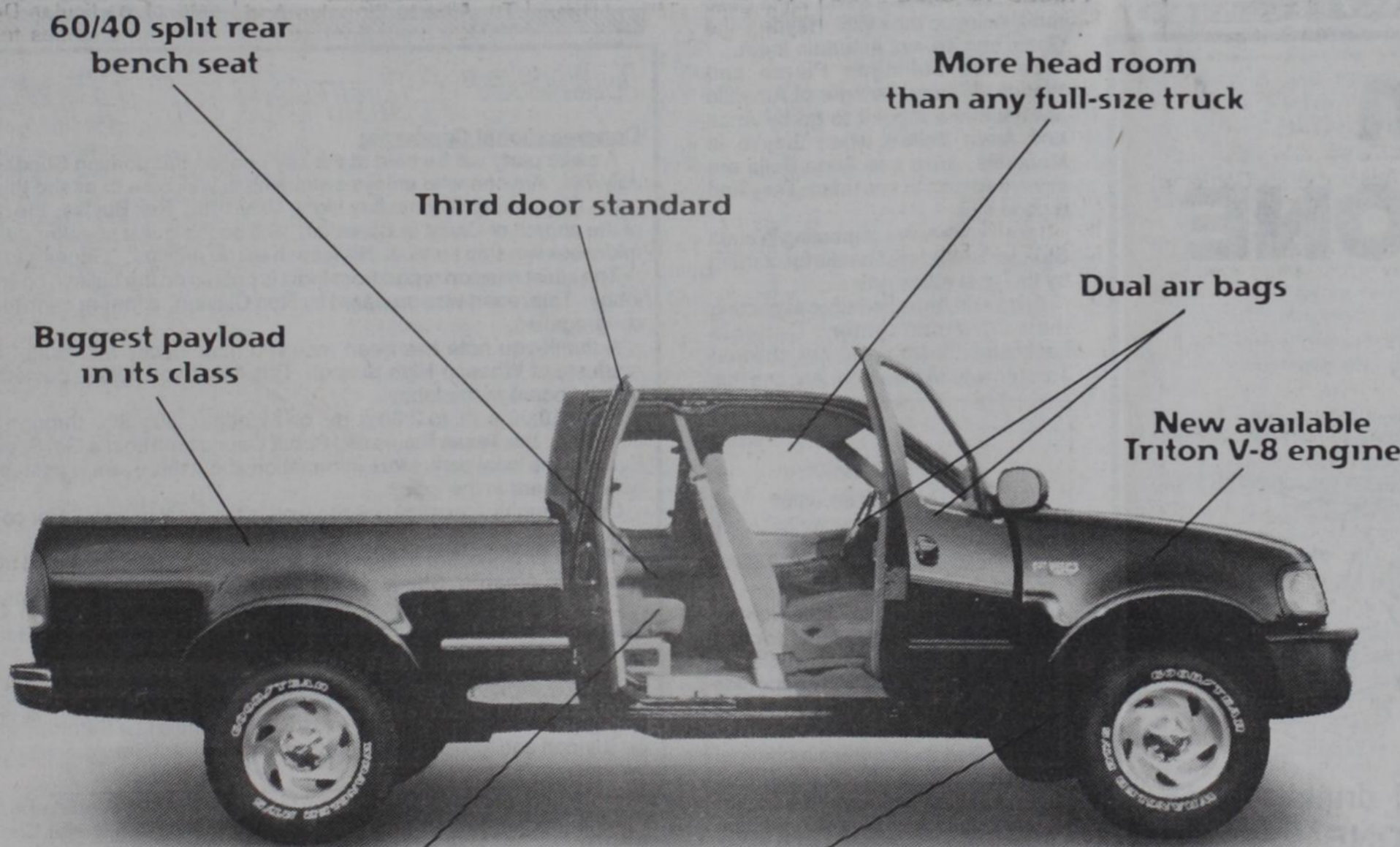

Sympathy must be expressed to the family of Virginia Holderman. Mrs. Holderman, a former member of this congregation, died last week in Guymon, Oklahoma. The funeral service was held last Saturday morning in Guymon and the graveside service was held last Saturday afternoon in Wheeler.

From The Minister's Desk:

In the mid 1600's the nation of England was in a state of turmoil because of a conflict between the King, Charles I, and Parliament. The King believed that he should have absolute power over the nation. However, Parliament believed that it should have some control over his authority.

Eventually this conflict led to a revolution against the King and in 1649, Charles I was overthrown and beheaded. Following the revolutions commonwealth was established and Oliver Cromwell was made Lord Protector of the Commonwealth which virtually made him a military dictator.

During Cromwell's five year reign as Lord Protector of the Commonwealth, a silver shortage developed which caused a coin shortage. To correct this shortage, Cromwell sent soldiers to see if they could find any silver in the local cathedrals. When soldiers returned they reported: "The only silver we could find is in the statues of the saints standing in the corners." To which the Lord Protector said: "Good! We'll melt down the saints and put them in circulation."

With this statement, Cromwell unknowingly pinpointed the practical goal of Christianity. Christians should not be merely highly polished saints, but real people who circulate through the main streams of humanity. Think about the Chris-

tians of the first century. Following their conversion, these Christians did not look at their wicked world and then retreat into the safety of a church building. Rather they circulated into the world, teaching and demonstrating the life-changing power of Jesus Christ.

It is true that the scriptures clearly teach that Christians are to be separated from the world. (II Corinthians 6:14-18) But this separation is not synonymous with isolation.

In the hours before His crucifixion, Jesus prayed for His disciples, saying: "I do not ask Thee to take them out of the world, but to keep them from the evil one. They are not of the world, even as I am not of the world. Sanctify them in the truth; Thy word is truth. As Thou didst send me into the world, I also send them into the world." (John 17:15-18) Like Jesus, Christians have been sent into the world. They are separated from the sinfulness of the world, but they are not isolated from the sinful people of the world.

This is a crucial distinction. Christians who are separated from the world are like Jesus. But Christians who are isolated from the world are like silver statues. They are polished to a high gloss sheen and safety out of circulation.

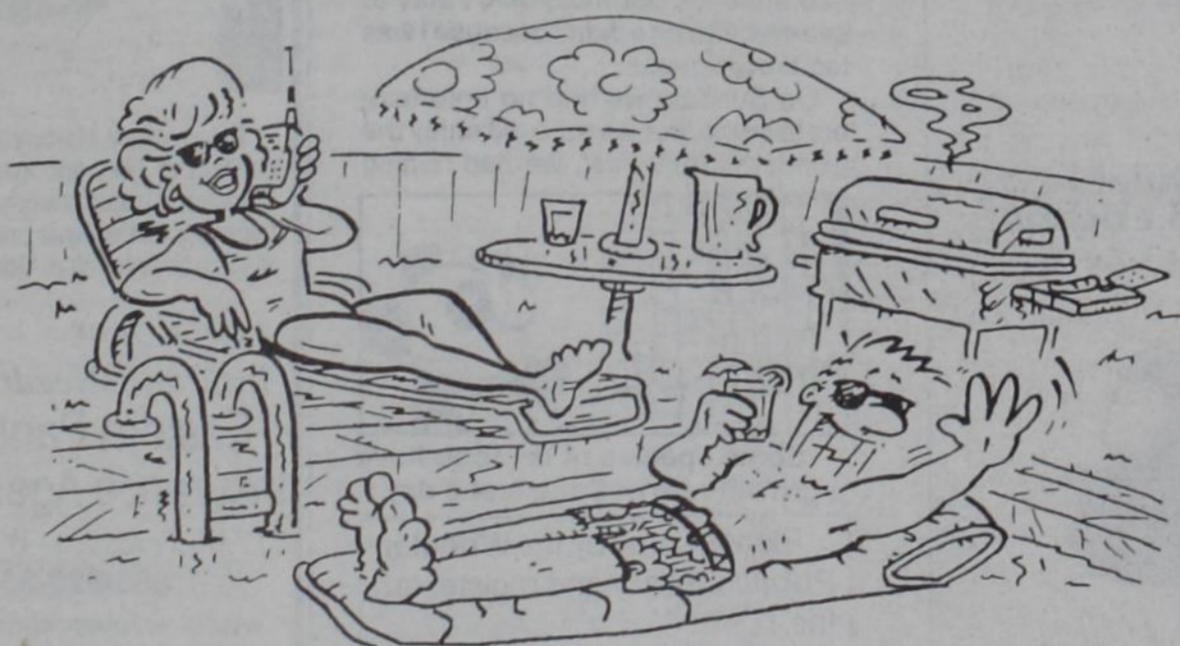

Extension Update By Joan Gray, CEA-HE

SETTING LIMITS FOR CHILDREN

Parents set rules and limits for their child's behavior to show they love and care for their child.

Limits are like guard rails on a bridge. They provide protection and security for the child, as well as teach him to take responsibility for himself.

Setting limits requires being positive, firm, consistent and having realistic expectations.

When parents set limits they:

*Teach children to avoid danger *Help children to attain socially acceptable behavior (to have regard for others as well as for themselves) *Show children they care for them *Put children under control themselves *Help a sense of organization into a child's world

*Help themselves and their children know what to expect of each other

A few rules and limits that the child can understand are important to his security.

While the two-year old cannot be expected to stay away from the candy dish within reach, certain appropriate limits can be set, such as "only Daddy can give you candy", or "you may have grapes instead."

As the parent removes the candy away from the child or the child away from the candy, briefly explain why this is not the best thing for the child, and distract him with the grapes, toy or activity.

Parents can deal with the toddler's natural defiance by making most decisions themselves.

Begin to help them learn to make choices on food or clothing—"Do you want apple juice or grape juice?" (not "What do you want to drink?")

or "Do you want to wear this red shirt or this blue shirt?"

When setting rules or imposing limits, parents should try not to become trapped in a battle of wills.

They may win the battle at the expense of the child's curiosity, enthusiasm, and self-esteem, or they may lose to a determined child's tantrums and negativism.

When this new independence comes to the toddler, parents inevitably worry about spoiling. An independent one-year-old is not spoiled, but probably does not understand the rules or limits.

Parents should select and impose as few limits as possible. These limits should be reasonable in relation to the child's age and ability, states positively and imposed firmly and consistently.

Insecurity about the tasks of parenting and parental guilt can cause parents to have low expectations of their child.

Children need well-defined and consistent limits. They forget easily and therefore need many repetitions or answers from their parents.

Parents may become unrealistically patient and hesitant when they need to be firm.

When rules are being established, the child's developmental level and his style need to be considered; the rules should be reasonable, protective, consistent and enforceable.

THE ROLE OF THE JAIL MUSEUM IS EDUCATION

The Panhandle of Texas was the last region of Texas to be developed and Wheeler County was the first county to organize and became the governing body for the 26 unorganized attached counties. Hidetown was a major camp for buffalo hunters who were riding the Plains of buffalo, the major food, tool, and shelter source for Native Americans on the plains. Fort Elliott was the last western frontier fort established by the United States and was to ensure the success of the buffalo hunters and the settlement of the Panhandle by Anglos. Fort Elliott was the first organized settlement in the Panhandle region. Sweetwater, later renamed Mobeetie, is referred to as the "Mother City of the Panhandle." Hidetown, Fort Elliott and Mobeetie began the cultural development of the Panhandle region.

The Jail Museum's goal is to provide: (1) an interpretation of Hidetown that explains the relationship of the buffalo to Native Americans and the impact of the buffalo hunter on that relationship; (2) an interpretation of Fort Elliott and its mission in the development of the Panhandle region of Texas and Indian Territory of Oklahoma, its influence on culture and social life in Wheeler County, and the influence of the soldiers and civilian employees who settled in Wheeler County and related areas; (3) an interpretation of Sweetwater and Old Mobeetie that reflects the business, social, and governmental life of pioneers in the county and region; and (4) an interpretation of the development of county government in the area.

From its beginning on September 14, 1972, nearly twenty-four years ago, the Old Mobeetie Texas Association's purpose has been to foster an attitude of awareness and involvement in the history of Wheeler County, Texas and its role in the development of the Panhandle of Texas. This commitment was inspired by Sallie Harris, a far-sighted lady who turned 92 on February 22 of 1996. Ms. Harris was joined in her commitment by a group of concerned residents of Mobeetie and Wheeler County who formed the Association and worked to acquire a building and adjoining 10 acres to establish a home for the museum.

For the first 12 years of its existence, the Jail Museum operated out of a two-story jail built in 1885-86 from locally quarried lime stone. During this time, Ms. Harris, with single-minded enthusiasm, worked with volunteers and a handy man to build exhibits, organize the collection and enlist additional volunteers. In the 1980s, Ms. Harris acquired additional

Wheeler County, Texas. Documentary objects consisting of governmental records, receipts, warrants, minutes, surveys, letters, maps and ledgers comprise 57.9% of the collection; historical objects comprise 21.8% of the collection; documentary photographs comprise 16.6% of the collection; textiles comprise 2.1% of the collection; musical objects comprise .8% of the collection; and art objects comprise .6% of the collection.

Artifacts from Hidetown, a buffalo hunter's camp located on the Sweetwater Creek prior to the establishment of Fort Elliott and about 1 mile south of the museum, consists of guns, ammunition, skinning tools, and camp equipment. The material from Hide Town explains the importance of the buffalo and buffalo hunters and their relationship to Native Americans. This would include the Plains Indians (Cheyenne, Kiowa, Comanche, & Arapaho) and their culture, tools, clothing and weapons.

One of the most important items in the Fort Elliott collection is the original Fort Elliott flagpole made from two cedar trees cut in a cedar break 70 miles east of the fort in Indian Territory. After the fort was abandoned in 1890, Johnny Long, the teamster who accompanied the soldiers sent to cut the trees, bought the flagpole from the U. S. Land Office and placed it in front of his store in Mobeetie, Texas. The flag pole was moved to the Mobeetie Jail in 1949 where it continues to stand. The fort bell was given to the Jail Museum in 1994 and is mounted near the flagpole. A diorama of the fort is the focus of the indoor Fort Elliott collection. A display of photographs of the fort, officers quarters, barracks, officers and their families, cavalry and infantry troopers, and native American scouts are high lights of the collection. A pictorial display of Lieutenant Henry O. Flipper, West Point's first Black graduate and America's first Black officer, who was stationed at Fort Elliott in 1879, is on display near the diorama. Early pioneer settlers who were former soldiers from Fort Elliott have donated materials including army beds, sables, cannon balls, guns, and ammunition. The material gives a realistic appraisal of "soldier" life, including work and social activities.

The Sweetwater and Old Mobeetie collection includes material which exemplifies Mobeetie's emergence from "wicked" city to proper homes and other "civilized" symbols of change. Exhibits include post office counters, postal sorters, and equipment used in Old Mobeetie. "Uncle" Johnny Long's Store display includes counters and display cases from stores in Old Mobeetie and Wheeler. Displays include items that reflect products purchased and used by settlers during the early days of Sweetwater and Old Mobeetie. A photographic display of the 26 schools that served rural Wheeler County is a point of interest for many visitors. A photographic display of early businesses and merchants draws the attention of many guests as well. Displays of farming

and ranching tools and equipment are of particular importance to area residents and tourists from out of state. Materials belonging to early settlers of Mobeetie and Wheeler County, including the "founding fathers", influential citizens, peace officers, notorious gunmen and other outlaws and entertainers who frequented the Mobeetie dance halls are displayed and are the highlight for many visitors. Materials representative of Mobeetie and Wheeler County depict the transition from "outlaw settlement" to twentieth century community.

The main attraction of the Mobeetie County Seat collection is the 1885-86 jail building, the oldest county government building in the Panhandle area and the only surviving building of Old Mobeetie, Texas. The walls are original and most of the interior walls remain unchanged. Two exterior cells are also original. The second floor houses the Hidetown and Fort Elliott Exhibits. The first floor houses the sheriff's office and government records and documents as well as furniture from county buildings. The first floor has two rooms dedicated to the sheriff's living quarters as was the original plan for the building. Included in this collection are items belonging to the sheriffs and their families as well as a photographic display of all the Wheeler County Sheriffs and Temple Houston, the second district prosecutor for Wheeler County and 26 other counties and the son of Sam Houston.

The Wheeler County Seat collection includes documents, furniture, and photographs of government buildings and officials during the period of time the county seat has been located in the city of Wheeler. The collection is housed in the jail building.

The Jail Museum and its collections are the result of the efforts of one individual, Sallie Harris, during the 1950s who began to collect objects donated to her by private individuals and government entities for a private museum housed in a public building. The Association was given the land upon which the jail building and flagpole sit. The Jail Museum is the facility in Wheeler County and the Panhandle area dedicated to educational exhibits and programs relating to the origins of government and Anglo settlement in Wheeler County and the region.

The Jail Museum's educational programs and displays interpreting the role of Hidetown, Fort Elliott, Sweetwater, Mobeetie, Wheeler, and Wheeler County in the development of the Panhandle region are a major source for local history. Public education text books adopted by the state for use in public schools do not provide information to students regarding the development of the Panhandle. Other area museums focus on topics and subjects other than Hidetown, Fort Elliott, Sweetwater, Mobeetie, Wheeler, and Wheeler County. The County Commissioners Court has recognized the importance of the Jail Museum with annual financial support and financial support for projects.

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
