Dymple Cooksey, Extension nutrition specialist, said snacks may seem like a ploy for children to get their hands on some candy. But in reality, children simply need extra helpings of the right foods, she said.

A child's stomach is very small, and can not digest enough food at meal time to satisfy their need for certain nutrients that will keep them from being hungry between meals. Snacks are a fantastic way to fill the hunger

The comedic face by Michael Frayn is full of mistaken identities, pratfalls,



should also be avoided when looking for a healthy snack.

As the summer heat arrives and the pools open, parents are looking for quick way to satisfy their children's hunger and thirst.

An absolute must is water. Nothing is absorbed by the body as fast as water. If the taste of water does not satisfy a thirst, dress it up with a slice of lemon or lime. This will provide the water with a tart taste.

Caffeinated colas and sugared juice drinks should be left on the store shelf. The sweeter the drink, the longer it will delay the absorption of fluid into

the body. Caffeine can be particularly harmful because it is a diuretic and will cause the body to eliminate fluid.

When looking for snacks, be sure to keep in mind the age of the child. For instance, a child under a year old should not be served peanut butter. Depending on the age some children may have difficulty with certain raw

When a child and parent work together, they can produce a snack that benefits the child and spend some quality time together. This time spent together can be used to educate the child on nutrition.





Lower Calorie-Low Cholesterol-Low Fat Ice Cream:

1 recipe of Eagle Brand substitute. Beat together throughly in a large bowl with mixer.

Continue beating well and add: 4 cans milnot (or other vegetable blend type evaporated milk); 4 eggs or equal amount of egg substitute; 18 package equal sweetner; 1 package (dry) powder Dream Whip; 1 small size sugarfree instant pudding mix (powdered) vanilla or chocolate; Vanilla Flavoring as desired.

Mix all ingredients well with mixer. Pour into freezer container and fill to "fill" line with low-fat milk. (Approximately 3 cups)

Variations: May use 3 eggs or egg substitute instead of 4.

Fruit Flavors: (Calories will vary) Use different flavors of fruit flavored gelatin, well dissolved - 1 small package. May also add washes and drained fresh fruit.

Example: Strawberry - Add 1 small package of well dissolved strawberry or strawberry sugar-free gelatin or 3 cups of fresh fruit. Yields 4 ats.

Substitute for Eagle Brand Sweetened Condensed Milk: 1 cup dry nonfat powdered milk; 1 tsp. low-fat margarine; 1/3 cup boiling water; 11 packets of Equal artificial sweetner or 2/3 cup of sugar or 1/2 cup sugar twin.

Blend and beat well all ingredients with mixer or blender on high speed. (Will be thick, but not as thick as the canned variety; will substitute in recipes.) Yields approximately 1cup=1can.
