

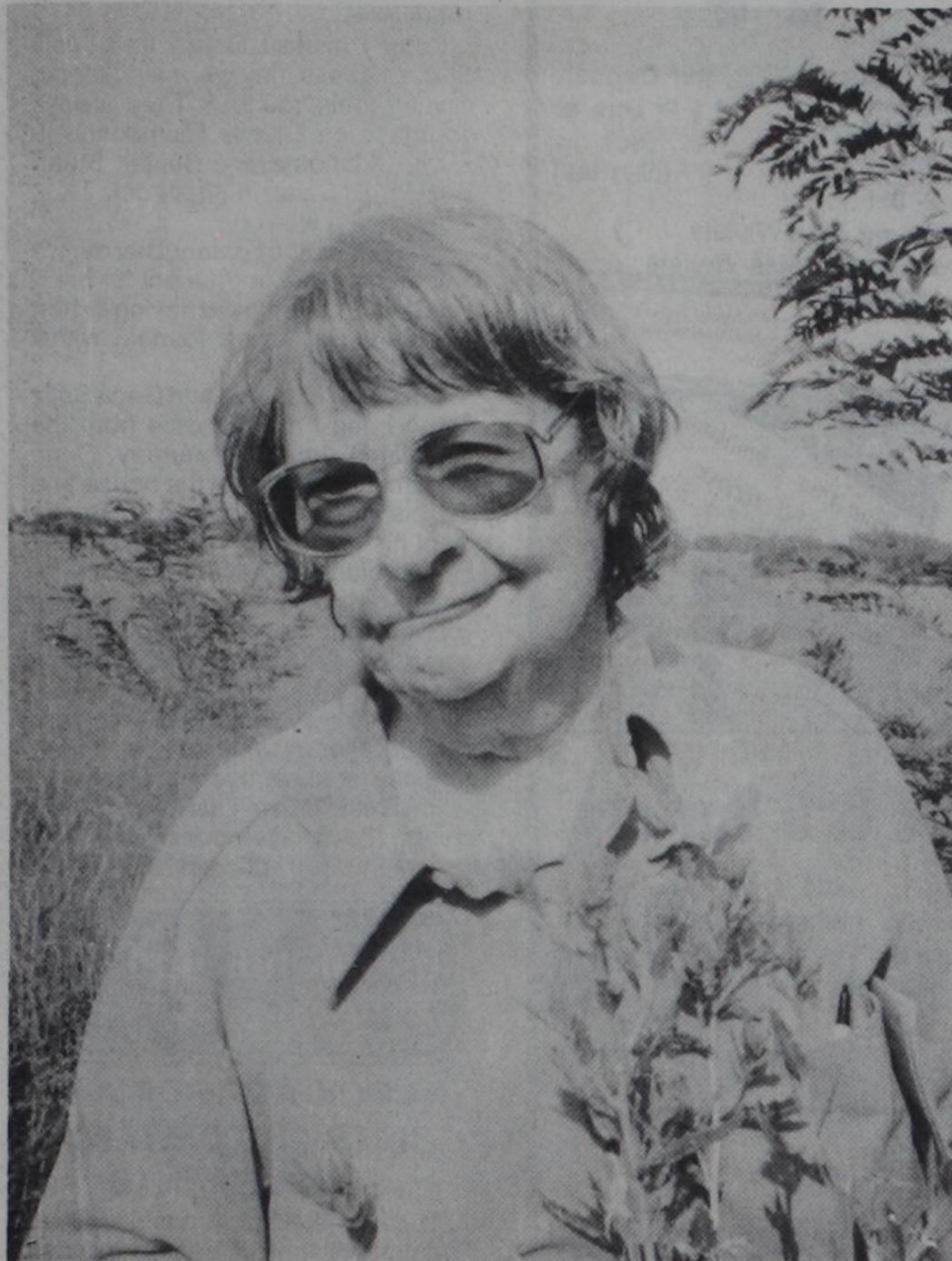

Extended Local Calling Is Available To Mobeetie

GTE Telephone Operations will extend local calling for all customers in the Mobeetie telephone service area, beginning August 7th. Under the plan, all calls to and from Allison will be local calls.

"Prior to the start of Extended Local Calling, each call between these areas was billed separately as a long-distance call, and customers would see a long-distance charge per call on their monthly bills," said Danny Ferguson, Area Manager—Customer Operations, Plains district.

"Now, these calls are equivalent to local calls, and all customers in the towns having the new Expanded Local Calling (ELC) must now dial all seven digits, both for local calls and ELC calls," explained Mr. Ferguson.

The implementation of this seven-digit service may require modification to some telecommunications equipment such as fax machines, speed calling, PABXs, key system, automatic dialers and other equipment that may restrict or automatically dial long-distance numbers.

Customers are not required to take any action to take advantage of the new service offering. Once extended calling is operational, it will no longer be necessary for customers to dial "1+" before the number when placing calls between these communities, but you must dial all seven digits for local and ELC calls.

This is a result of balloting which took place in the Mobeetie telephone service area under the rules of Senate Bill 632 and the Public Utility Commission Rule 23.49

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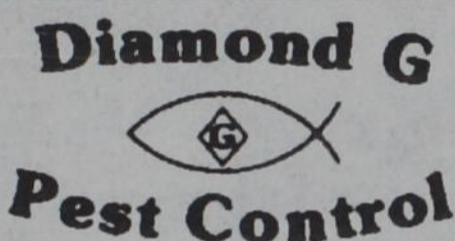

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Extension Update

A LOOK AT ORDINARY DIETS AND DIETARY SUPPLEMENTS

Today, sales of foods in pill or supplement form marketed for their health benefit exceed \$6 billion annually in the United States. In 1988, \$2 billion to \$2.5 billion was spent annually on vitamin/mineral supplements alone with the expectation that the supplement will insure optimal health. Don't be easy prey for supplementation abuse. Instead, look to increasing fruit and vegetable consumption (currently 11 percent or less of the population consumes no fruits or vegetables). Also, include other foods containing beneficial health components as part of a varied diet based on the principles of the Food Guide Pyramid. Before taking any dietary supplement such as chitin, green tea, certain herbal preparation or other supplements which also could be dangerous, consult with your personal physician about the real health benefits of the supplement.

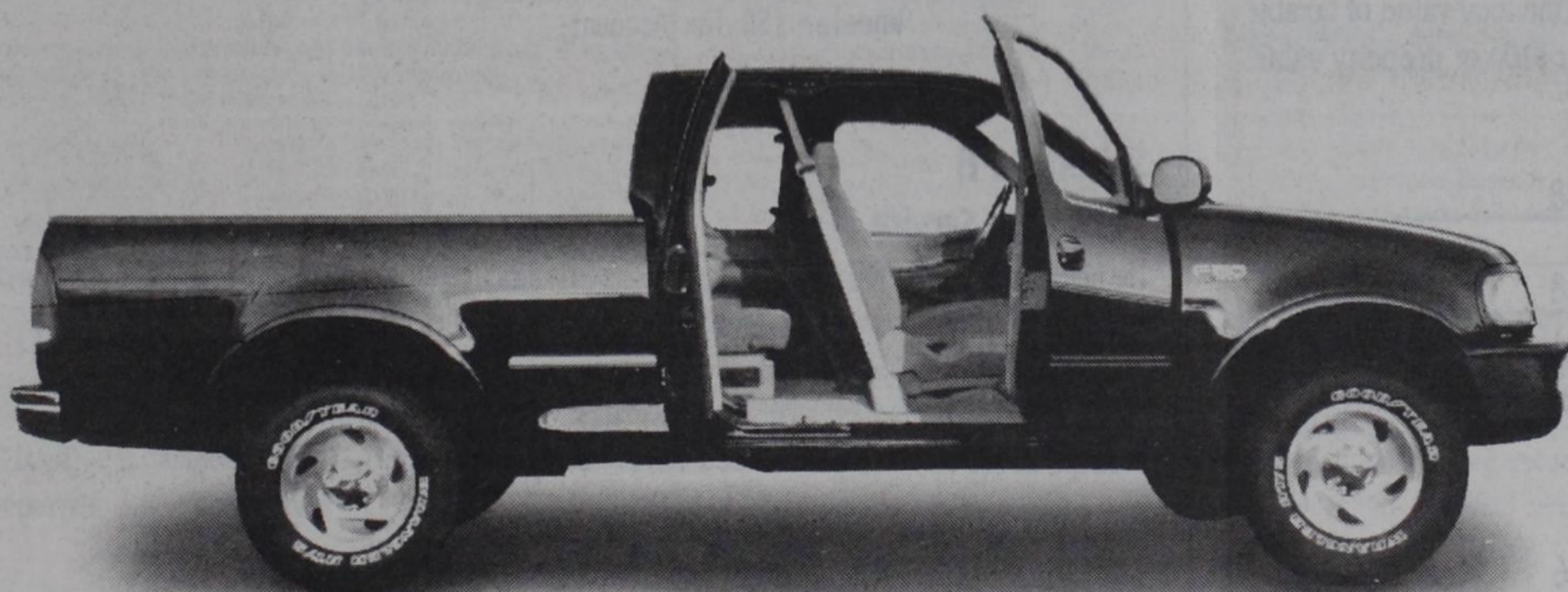

"We expect too much, too quickly from Him. We want answers—yesterday—because we are impatient, raised in an era when instant gratification has been aligned with a lack of individual accountability that has turned social chaos into an art form."

"It's amazing God doesn't get really ticked off. We are like 4-year-olds: Whenever the worst happens, we run crying to Him for help, strength, and advice even though we initiated the problem ourselves."

"TWA Flight 800 is a perfect example. Why? Well, if there was in-

deed a bomb on the plane that was not God's will. God is not some sick homicidal maniac. God does not play games with our lives. God's "plan" doesn't involve explosives, bullets, and bloodshed."

"That's us. You and me."

"Let me explain this in a way everyone might understand: Do you know how a lot of people sell coffee in Dunkin' Donuts? They get a store and rent the brand name from the company."

"Well, the world is overburdened with those who use God's name to carry out their personal evil. Doesn't matter what they call Him—Allah, Jesus Christ, Big Guy, Numero Uno—they kill, terrorize and make war, all the while claiming they are doing it out of love for Him."

"Imagine having to put up with that. Talk about your basic consumer fraud: Bogus free-lancers using the name of the most honored franchise ever in vain."

"Jews claim they are His chosen people. And that makes Muslims mad because they claim to have known Him longer. Then Catholics hear this and get upset because they figure God is their guy and only listens to others because He is polite and all-knowing."

"If He wasn't God, stuff like this would drive Him crazy. As it is, He spends an incredible amount of time and energy separating us here on Earth and trying to whisper common sense to us in the clinches. Like, cut it out."

"But we don't. We keep mutilating each other. We keep adding to the suffering of innocents and, when grief becomes unbearable, we ask Him for help and, incredibly, He's there for us."

"God only knows why."

'Back To School' Means More Cautious Driving

We've all heard the saying, "kids say the darndest things!" Well kids do the darndest things, especially around school zones. With school starting again, there's sure to be trouble afoot. Now is the time for drivers to start thinking about the traffic dangers this presents, says Trooper L. B. Snider, Public Information Officer for the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Whether you drive in school zones occasionally or daily, you must never forget certain lessons. One is you have to use better judgement than the children about you. "It's important to remember that kids are not small adults and don't think like adults. They lack experience with traffic and don't always react logically. When you sound your horn, for instance, they may think it is okay to cross the street in front of your vehicle", Snider adds.

Children also have limited perceptual skills. Sometimes they can't tell if your vehicle is stopped or in motion. They can't judge the speed or distance of vehicles, advises Snider.

"Elementary school children often are not tall enough to be seen on the other side of a parked car, or as they move, move between vehicles to cross the street before being picked up.

Snider reminds drivers that it is the driver's responsibility to be aware of what is happening about them while driving. Drivers must be alert for kids entering the streets, especially at the beginning and end of the school day. Drivers must also stop for school buses when the flashing red lights are activated and remain stopped until the flashing red lights are off. "Let's
