## MUSTANGS NAMED DISTRICT CHAMPS

### BOOKER TRAMPLED 15-0 IN TITLE MATCH; BI-DISTRICT PLAY-OFF FRI. AT CLARENDON

Last Friday night, the Wheeler Mustangs traveled north to Booker for the opportunity to win a District Title. Both teams entered the game with perfect

4-0 District Records. The winner would claim the District Title and the Number 1 playoff seed.

The game opened with both teams a little tight as the Mustangs and the Kiowas exchanged fumbles on the first two offensive plays. But as things settled down, the Mustangs got on the board first as Travis Stevens kicked a 27 yard field goal on the first play of the 2nd quarter to give the Mustangs a 3-0 lead. Later in the same quarter, Stevens finds Jason Porton in the Booker secondary for a 26 yard TD pass. The extra point was no good and the Mustangs lead 9-0. The Mustangs would threaten again before halftime, but came up just short as time expired and Wheeler leading

Booker 9-0.

The second half produced only one score as Travis Stevens goes around the left side for a 17 yard TD. The extra point was no good and the Mustangs lead 15-0. The Mustangs would make that score stand as they get their first shutout of the year, and win the District Championship.

The Mustangs dominated the stats as they rushed for 241 yards to 66 for the Kiowas. Thru the airways, the Mustangs lead as well with 128 yards to 9 for Booker. Total yardage was Wheeler 369 to 75 for Booker. Both teams were plagued with turnovers as the Mustangs fumbled six times and lost four of them, while the Kiowas fumbled twice and lost one. Booker also threw five interceptions. Hope-

fully both teams got all their turnovers out of their system in this game and will represent the district in fine fashion.

The Wheeler Mustangs will take on the Kress Kangaroos Friday night at 7:30 in Clarendon.

### Graveside Services For Vera Lester Oct. 25

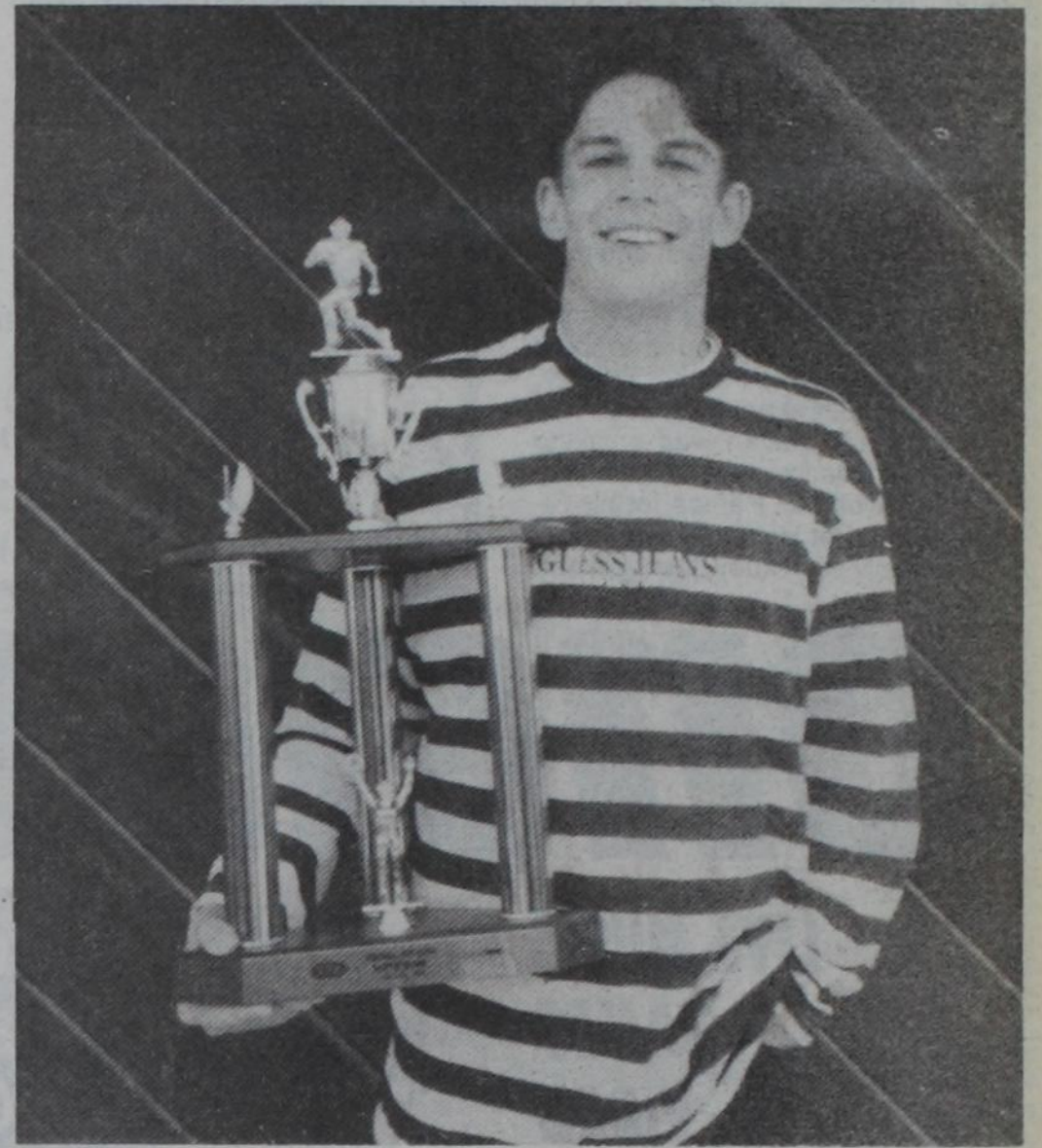

Six Mustang seniors played their last home game last Friday night against Gruver and came away with a victory and an opportunity to play in the playoffs. Dusty Case, Dean Hutchison, Ramon Meraz, Jason Porton, Shane Sparlin and Travis Stevens have done a super job all season in leading the Mustangs into the playoffs and a showdown next Friday night in Booker for the District Championship.

After a Greyhound touchdown cut into the Mustang's lead, Jeremy Davis scores his second TD of the night on a 1 yard plunge to give the Mustangs a 21-6 lead at the half.

The Gruver Greyhounds were not to be denied as they get their second touchdown to trim the Mustangs lead to 21-12 in the 3rd quarter. But that was as close as they would get as the Mustangs dominated the 4th quarter of the ballgame. Less than a minute into the final stanza, Stevens scored on an 11 yard run. Enjoyed the visit with her and know she still misses Wheeler. Snow is just a part of life in Colorado.

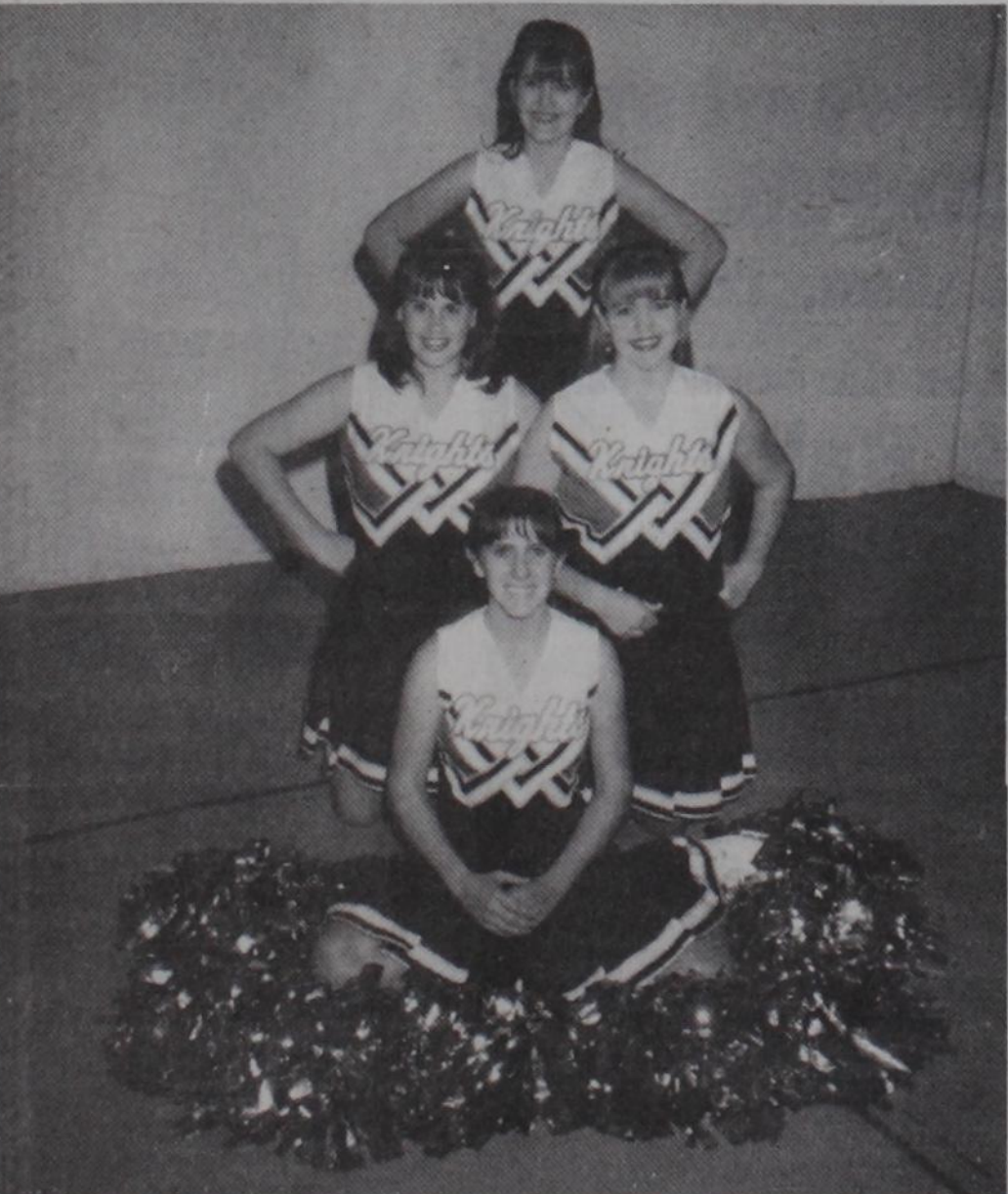

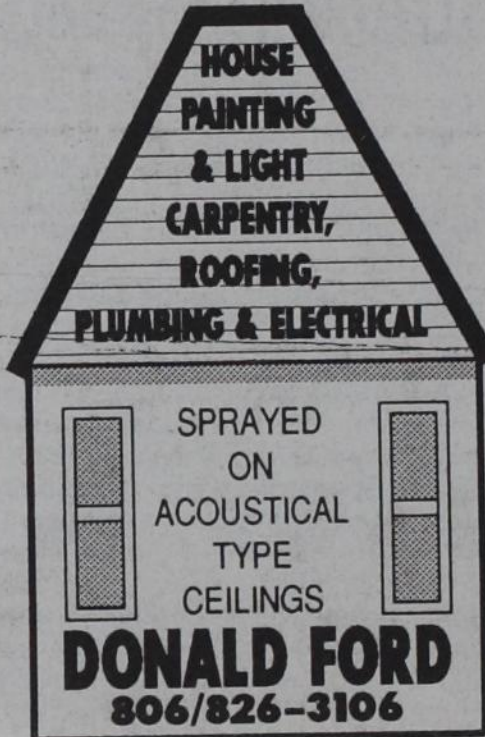

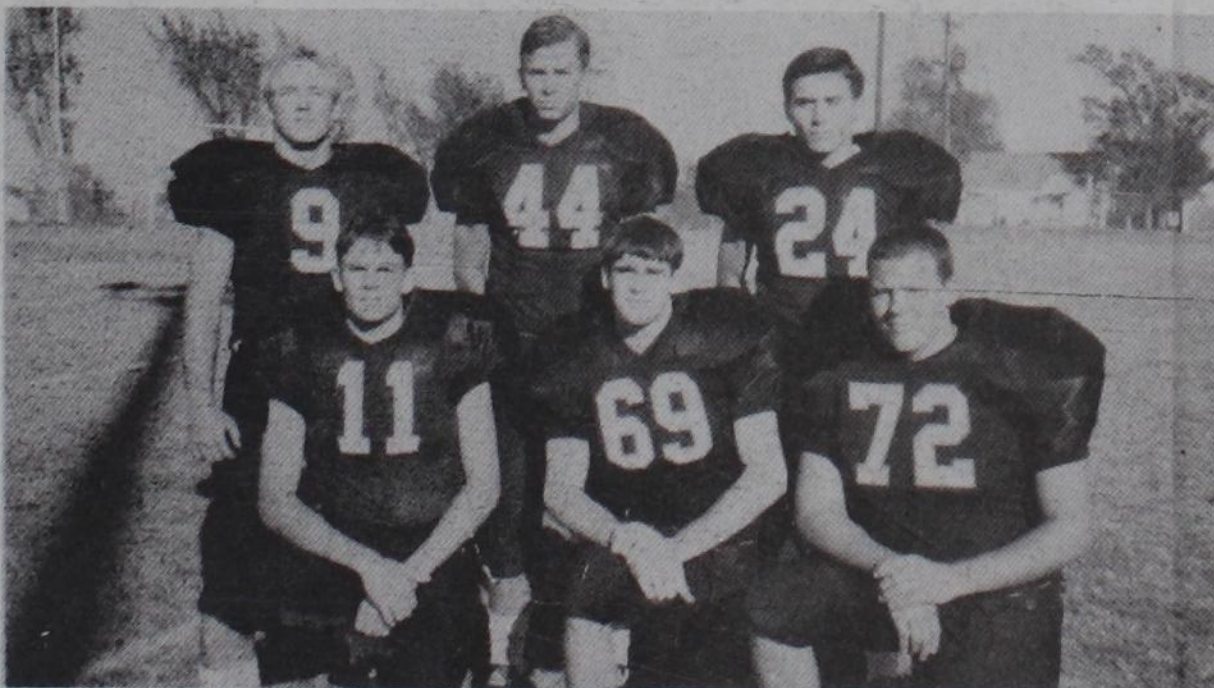

Im sure that youve all heard that saying "A fellers got to do what a fellers got to do" Well one time I went to work for Bear Creek Mine Co., Dr. R. A. Jones wuz the geologist an Bob, as we called him, failed to mention that this exploration work was some of the hardest and most disagreeable work a feller could ever attempt to make a living at. We were guarenteed 80 hours a week, which sounded good but he failed to tell me it be all in one day and in miserable weather an all that stuff including many days away from home an no coffee breaks. Bear Creek wuz a subsidiary uv one of the largest mining companies in the world but this company wuz only interested in copper and moly. What is moly? Well it is molybdenum an it is a mineral to strengthen steel. We would find an area that had potential for such minerals an plenty uv rough unclimbable mountains and there we would stake claims which better be purt near on the penny as being correct in measurements an so forth. We carried a funny looking compus that looked like a pocket watch with some little arms on it. You would grab a 300 ft. chain a few stakes and a bunch uv ribbon on a bolo an no tellin what else and you would start out on a line and you and the boys would make sure that line was correct to the ninth degree an if a great big conifer tree got in your way you had to figer out how to get around it an keep goin in that direct line. Opps, there is a cliff that is about a thousand feet tall rite in front uv you, but dont let that upset you cause all you got to do is put yore climbin boots on backwards and go up the cliff backwards, and if that wont work figer out something else but come hell er high water keep goin. A claim is 20 acres in size an seems like it wuz 1500 ft by 150 ft. No matter it wuz whatever it wuz an you better get it right. You would put stakes at the corners, an stake it rite down the middle and get a stake rite in the center an rite there in the center you would dig a hole about 10 ft. deep an get a soil er rock sample. You would put this sample in a little canvas bag and write on the bag just what claim it wuz an put it in your back pack. Looks and sounds like it is easy but wait a minit. Our crew carried the drill an all the things necessary to do the drilling that is including the gasoline, oil and so forth and our packs were light, wouldnt weigh much over 80 lbs each and by the way if you got thirsty just grab a mouthfull uv snow an if you wuz hungry I always had our lunch in my right hippocket. Yep I carried enough jerkey an hard candy for a crew uv 5 but no napkins included er toothpicks either.

We had horses when we ran into real rough country and the horses would carry us to this real rough country. We would unload, make the horses and Ole Rastus our mule comfortable and we would take the stuff in our packs to the real rough country. You can kill a horse er mule if you get in too deep snow but us boys somehow could do alright without loss uv limb.

Youd be surprised what beauty there is out in our wilderness and how peaceful and quiet it is. Sometimes we would top out and you could see for many miles out over the desert and lowlands but with all the hard work you would hardly ever hear someone gripe about anything, maybe we were too tired to think about such.

I still wonder how we ever did it cause our mail box is rite on our front porch an at times I dread to go get the mail. Recon I am gettin lazy but oft I reminisce about all the fun we had back then.

Trash day is tomorrow an Mama says I better get off the duffer an help her get it out to the street. Enjoyed the visit.

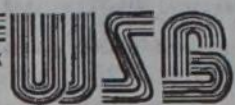

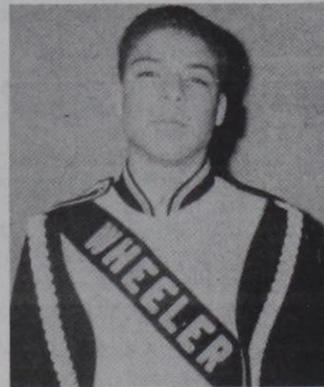

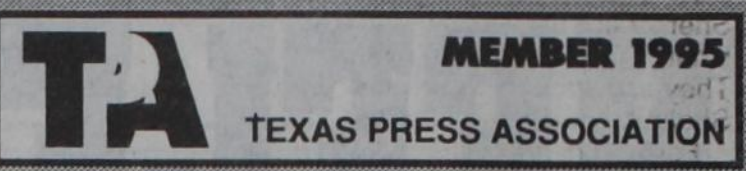

**Wheeler Co. Soil & Water Conserv. District**

The Wheeler County Soil and Water Conservation District was formed on April 6, 1948, with the protection and enhancement of the available renewable natural resources as its primary purpose. Its boundaries coincide with the boundaries of Wheeler County. It is governed by a board of five elected directors who are resident land owners in the District and are actively engaged in farming or ranching.

The current Board of Directors consists of Paul Macina, Jim Batton, Darville Atherton, Eric Zybach, and John McDowell, Jr.

The District entered into a memo of understanding with the Natural Resources Conservation Service in 1948 to provide personnel specially trained in the field of erosion control. The current NRCS staff consists of Fred Allison, Jr., District Conservationist; Kenneth Reed, Range Conservationist; and Calvin Devereaux, Soil Conservationist. Rhonda Ferguson is employed as a District Clerk. Don Humphreys is a Green Thumb employee and Earth Team volunteer.

The SWCD works closely with the NRCS to promote all phases of conservation. Your SWCD is proud to present this report of some of the work and accomplishments during the 1996 fiscal year.

Wheeler County SWCD has been involved with the development, servicing, and revising of Food Security Act (FSA) plans.

Other programs must be carried out in addition to the Food Security Act Provisions. We currently have two active Great Plains (GPCP) contracts, three Long Term Agreement (LTA) contracts, and various Resource Conservation and Development (RC&D) projects. Fencing, livestock water development, pasture planting, range seeding, critical area treatment, and brush management are being performed under GPCP, LTA and ACP programs.

**From The Minister's Desk:**  
One of the most interesting stories in the Old Testament is the story of Naaman. This story is located in the fifth chapter of II Kings.

According to this text, Naaman was the "commander of the army of the king of Syria—" (II Kings 5:1) Since Naaman had waged successful military campaigns against the enemies of Syria, he was a man of influence and prestige. He was also a man who was afflicted with a terrible disease. Naaman "was a leper—" (II Kings 5:1)

Naaman's diseased condition aroused the sympathy of his wife's maid, a young Israelite girl who had been captured by the Syrians on one of their raids into Israel. (II Kings 5:2) This young girl believed that Naaman could be healed by Elisha, the prophet of God who lived in Samaria. She said: "Would that my lord were with the prophet who is in Samaria. He would cure him of his leprosy." (II Kings 5:3)

When the king of Syria was informed about the prophet in Samaria who could heal Naaman, he arranged for Naaman to go to Samaria. The text then says: "Naaman came with his horses and his chariots, and halted at the door of Elisha's house. And Elisha sent a messenger to him, saying, Go and wash in the Jordan seven times, and your flesh shall be restored, and you shall be clean. But Naaman was angry and went away, saying, Behold, I thought that he would

surely come out to me, and stand, and call on the name of the Lord His God, and wave his hand over the place, and cure the leper." (II Kings 5:9-11)

Notice that Naaman said: "Behold I thought—" This phrase could easily illustrate a mistake that many of us make when we study the Bible. This mistake is that we allow our preconceived opinions and prejudices to overshadow the revealed will of God. Too many of us are more concerned about what we think than what the Bible says.

The Bible is not a book of abstract philosophy. Rather, it is an infallible record of the will of God which was written by men who were "—moved by the Holy Spirit—" (II Peter 1:20-21) For this reason, the will of God is not determined by personal preference, opinion, or judgment. It is determined by the truths that are plainly recorded on the pages of the Bible.

Naaman's wife maid was correct. The prophet of God could and did heal Naaman. However, Naaman had to do what the prophet of God said not what he thought. (II Kings 5:13-14) What about you and I? We are not lepers, but we are sinners. To be forgiven, we must learn the will of God by carefully studying the Bible. Then we must do what God says, not what we think.

**SWCD to Initiate Resource Needs Assessment**

"As a result of the 1996 Farm Bill the Wheeler County Soil and Water Conservation District (SWCD) with headquarters in Wheeler, along with 3,000 other SWCDs in the national, has been given the charge to lead the way in developing programs and initiatives to improve soil and water resources at the local level," said Paul Macina, chairman of the SWCD.  
 "After years of applying top-down program management approaches in federal conservation programs, the new 1996 Farm Bill establishes a locally driven process, coordinated by conservation districts, to guide the state and nation's agricultural conservation efforts. It provides tremendous opportunities for local people to become involved in addressing local resource needs, Macina added.  
 According to Macina, the process deals with developing a list of concerns for the long range Farm Bill program for Fiscal Year 1998 and beyond.  
 To enact the Farm Bill on the local level, the Wheeler SWCD, in partnership with the USDA Natural Resources

Conservation Service, will conduct a work group meeting with its conservation partners and interested persons or organization on Thursday, October 7th at 7:00 P.M. in the Wheeler County FSA office. The Wheeler County FSA is located at 110 West Oklahoma in Wheeler.  
 The purpose of the meeting is to conduct a local conservation needs assessment, and make program recommendations on what problems the SWCD should address in future years. Local recommendations will then flow to the state level where the district's technical issues, resource priority areas and program policies will be reviewed and integrated into a state, regional and national program.  
 "We are really excited about the opportunities the new Farm Bill offers because Congress is seeking our leadership to assist our community in carrying out a cooperative, locally driven, incentive-based conservation program that wisely invests public resources to protect local natural resources," said Macina.
