MUSTANG VICTORS OVER BOOKER, EARN PLAYOFFS

The Wheeler Mustangs had to beat the Booker Kiowas last Friday to cinch the runnerup spot in District 1-1A and beat them they did and in a 32-0 convincing fashion.

After a year's absence from the playoff picture, the Mustangs finished a strong second to district winner Sunray and their 4-1 district record will be put on the line Friday night, November 24th against the winner of the Plains and Vega contest with the site of the game being tentatively set for Plainview if Plains wins and if Vega is victorious, Pampa is the planned site.

Once again the slow starting Mustang offense was given time to get cranked up by an ever improving Mustang defense. The Kiowas held the Mustangs in check for the first quarter before Wheeler put 17 second quarter points on the scoreboard.

On the first play of the second half, Michael Kenney fumbled the ball away on the Wheeler 24 and this was the only time the Kiowas had the ball in Mustang territory for the game except for one series later when Wheeler punted out from their 10 after Kelly Aderholt intercepted a Kiowa pass on the 4.

The 17 first half points were enough for the win but the Mustangs tacked on two insurance TD's in the final two quarters.

Michael Kenney pounded the Booker defense for 179 yards to lead all ball carriers and added 2 touchdowns to his year's total. Kenney finished the 7-3 regular season with just under 1000 yards gained rushing.

Rafael Tudon fumbled on his own 23 to set up the Mustangs for their first touchdown which they got in just four plays with Kenney going over from the 7. Shawn Bradstreet had run for 14 yards on the previous play and a first down on the Booker 7. Arthur Altamarino booted the Mustangs into

a 7-0 lead at the 8:18 mark of the second quarter.

A 66 yard march, all on the ground, put the Mustangs up by two TD's with 2:03 to play in the half when Kenney once more crossed into paydirt, this time from the 3 yard line. The touchdown ran the Mustangs first down total for the half to 12 at this point and Booker had only one first down.

Each team garnered one more first down in the half but the Mustangs also added a field goal to their total after recovering a Booker fumble on the Kiowa 37. Bradstreet passed to Kenney for 22 yards to the 15 and then Kenney ran for 5 more to the 10. Two plays later, Altamarino booted his three pointer with only 10 seconds to play in the half.

10:05 remained in the game when the Mustangs struck again. Facing third and goal from the Booker 11, Bradstreet hit Brandon Chick with a scoring toss and another two points were added on a Bradstreet to Kenney pass. This drive was good for 52 yards in seven plays.

Booker was unable to move the pigskin following the Mustangs touchdown and booted the ball to the Kiowa 49 from which the Mustangs overcame two fumbles and a penalty and ate up nearly 8 minutes on the clock and got their last touchdown. Staying on the ground once more, the Mustangs scored in 13 plays with Mack Marshall going off tackle for the final yard. Altamarino booted true and Wheeler had their big win and had earned a spot in the playoffs.

"We are where we wanted to be after losing to Sunray and we are definitely an improving ball club but we have got to continue to improve to get any place in the state chase", coach Ronnie Karcher said after the game. He added, "Our intensity has got to get better and we have to learn, especially offensively, that we can't

wait for a quarter or so to get going or it will be all over." "I thought we played very well on defense in the Booker game. We held Booker to just 2 first downs and 30 yards total offense for the game and that is good defense," Karcher said.

Booker's ace running back, Rafael Tudon, was held to just 38 yards on 10 carries by the dominating Mustangs.

J. Wilson Critical After Fire

Johnny Wilson, 34, of Wheeler remains in Lubbock General Hospital in Lubbock following a fire Saturday, November 11, 1989. The fire resulted in the loss of 450 acres of grass and \$100,000 to \$200,000 in property damage.

Wilson received second and third degree burns over 45% of his body and remains in critical condition. He will have to undergo reconstructive surgery on his right arm and the damage to his eyes has not been determined.

The fire started at the Virgil Simmons place six miles east and 3/4 south of Wheeler. Wilson was attempting to 'jump start' a tractor around noon Saturday when the fire started. The extremely dry grass and weeds

Marvin J. Underwood, 81, died Tuesday, Nov. 7, 1989.

Services were held at 2:30 p.m. Friday, Nov. 10, in Wheeler Church of Christ. Bill Morrison, minister, and Rev. Robert Helsley, pastor of First Baptist Church, officiated. Burial was in Wheeler Cemetery by Wright Funeral Home.

Mr. Underwood, born in Cane Hill, Ark., moved to Wheeler in 1912. He married Lucille Mills in 1933 at Erick, OK. He was a farmer and a member of Church of Christ. He was preceded in Death by twin sons, Dennis Underwood and Danny Underwood in 1947.

Survivors include his wife; three daughters, Anita Breazeale of Apache Junction, Ariz., Judy Marie of Plano and Katherine Jones of Wheeler; a sister, Nora Taliaferro of Perryton; 13 grandchildren; and 13 great grandchildren.

The family requests memorials be to Wheeler Ambulance Service.

required only a small amount of heat or spark to ignite. With the tractor ready for the attempt to start, Wilson is believed to have been sitting in his pickup. He noticed some smoke and opened the door and the flames blew up into his face. In an effort to escape the flames, he threw the ElCamino into reverse; the pickup struck the corner of the house, 100 yds from the tractor.

Wilson then had to walk 3/4 mile back to Highway 152 to summons help. He first stopped an 18-wheeler traveling east. K. D. Ford, a local volunteer fireman, was headed to the scene of the smoke to see if the fire department was needed. The truckers flagged Ford down and Johnny got into the pickup and was brought to the six miles to Parkview. He commented, "This is the longest six miles I've ever ridden."

Wilson was treated at the emergency room at Parkview. The extent of the injury was determined and Carelink, a medical helicopter service, was called. The helicopter landed at the local airport; the local ambulance service picked up the medical crew and took them to the Parkview. The medical crew readied Johnny for the trip to Lubbock General Hospital and the patient and crew were then taken back to the airport.

Johnny's right arm and hand were the worst burned with burns to his eyes, face, neck and torso. Burned in the fire were 450 acres of grass, a garage-workshop, and

several pieces of farm equipment. The house received damage to one corner. Simmons had a tractor, combine, sorghum tank—trailer, a semi-trailer and grain cart parked in the immediate area. The local volunteer firemen were unable to save any of the equipment.

The Dan Kenney home is located a half mile north of the Simmons house and was threatened by the spreading grass fire. Fortunately the Kenneys were home and were able to prevent damage at their home. Simmons lost approximately 300 acres of grass and some 20 large bales of hay. The remaining 120 acres of grass burned belonged to neighbors.

Wheeler and Sweetwater, Okla., fire departments were called to fight the fire.

ADRIAN RISNER TO RETIRE; RECEPTION AT FIRST NAT'L.

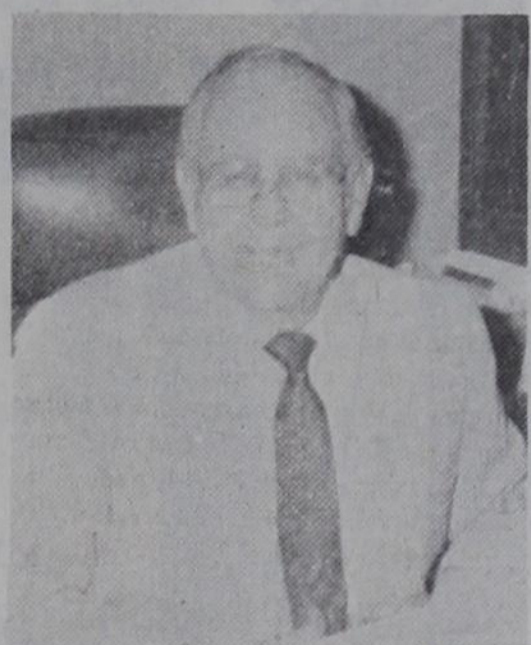

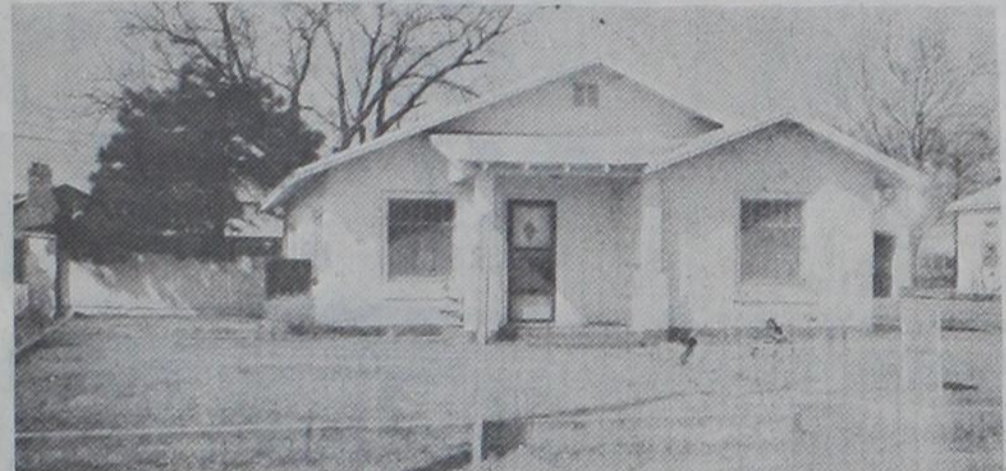

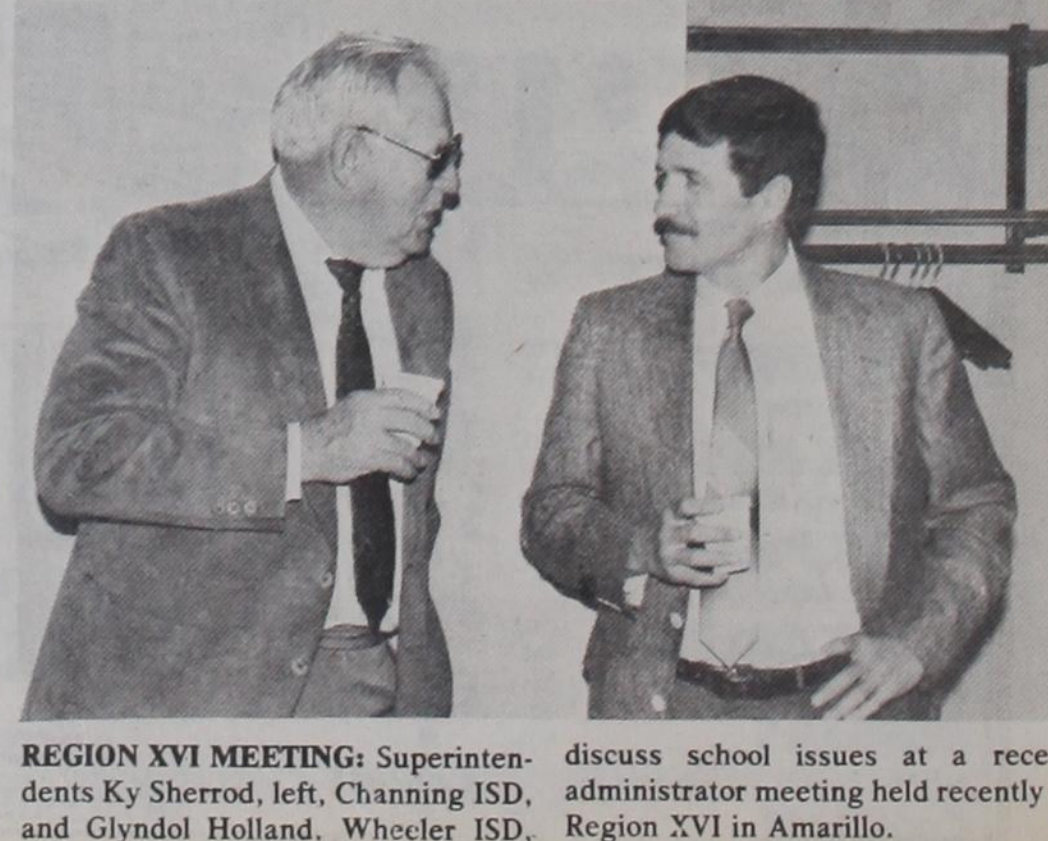

Kirby will address the school finance issue. A recent ruling by the Texas Supreme Court in the Edgewood V. Kirby lawsuit holds that the Texas school finance system must be revamped by May 1, 1990.
Area superintendents, members of TASA, Texas Association of School Administrators also met recently at Region XVI to discuss management and leadership plans for 1990-91 and administrator appraisals.

Once a man who owned a "fix-it" shop in New York City was riding a bus from his downtown shop to his suburban home. When the bus would stop for passengers, this man noticed that the door of the bus would creak distressingly on its hinges.
After several stops, this man said: "I think that I can eliminate that creak." He then took a small oil can from his tool box and oiled the creaky hinges, eliminating the irritating noise.
Christians should be like this man. They should carry an oil can—an "oil can of kindness". And they should use it to ease the pains and hurts that often exist in the lives of other people.
The New Testament contains several texts that clearly teach that kindness is not an optional attribute for Christians. For example,

Colossians 3:12 says: "--As those who have been chosen of God, holy and beloved, put on a heart of compassion, kindness--". And the New Testament teaches that this attribute should be evident in two aspects in the lives of Christians. These aspects are:--

Kind Words
Christians should speak kind words. The Apostle Paul wrote: "Let no unwholesome word proceed from your mouth, but only such a word as is good for edification according to the need of the moment, that it may give grace to those who hear." (Ephesians 4:29) With kind words Christians can have a tremendous influence upon people who are not Christians.

Kind Deeds
Christians should do deeds of kindness. The Scriptures teach that Christians should bear people up, not bear down on them. (Galatians 6:1-2) And with kindness, as in any realm, actions speak louder than words.
The "oil of kindness" is powerful. Kind words and kind deeds can heal broken hearts and broken lives. As the poet said: --
"I have wept in the night, from the shortness of nights,
That to the needs of others made me blind--
But I never have yet, had a cause to regret,
For being a little too kind."
A Christian should always carry an "oil can of kindness", using it to help silence those "creaky hinges" in the lives of other people.

Holidays become even more special when cornish hens are the featured main course. Set them on a bed of wild rice on a beautiful platter, decorate with sprigs of parsley and start a new holiday tradition.

ROAST STUFFED CORNISH HEN
 6 Cornish hens (about 14 ozs. each)
 1 package wild rice mix or long grain and wild rice combination (2 cups of cooked rice)
 1 medium onion, chopped
 2 tbsp. margarine
 1 tsp. sage or thyme, savory or tarragon
 1/4 cup brandy
 1 cup orange sections

To make the stuffing, cook rice until it is still slightly firm. Drain. In a skillet, melt margarine and cook chopped onion until browned. Add rice and sage; toss gently.
 Clean, wash and dry hens. Stuff lightly and skewer or sew the vents closed.
 Brush hens with 1/2 cup melted margarine and place breasts side up on a rack in a shallow pan. Roast at 350 degrees F., uncovered, about 1 hour, basting occasionally with the melted margarine.

Make a sauce by adding 1/2 cup water to the drippings in the roasting pan, stirring to dislodge browned particles from the pan. Add 1/4 cup brandy and 1 cup orange sections. Cook 2 minutes. Serve with hens.
 Yield: 12 servings
 Take advantage of the bountiful supply of sweet potatoes this holiday season. Spices and pineapple blend to create a heavenly vegetable dish. Serve it often -- it's a no-cholesterol, low-sodium and low-fat treat.

PINEAPPLE SWEET POTATOES
 4 medium sweet potatoes, unpeeled (about 1 pound)
 1/4 cup pineapple juice
 2 tbsp. vegetable oil
 1 tbsp. chopped pineapple
 pinch each cinnamon, nutmeg and allspice
 1 tbsp. molasses
 1 tsp. margarine

Boil potatoes until tender (about 30 minutes), and remove skins. Mash pulp. Add the fruit juice, oil and whip until fluffy. Add chopped pineapple and spices.
 Turn into an oiled 1-quart baking dish. Spread molasses over the top, dot with the margarine, and bake at 425 degrees F. uncovered until lightly browned.

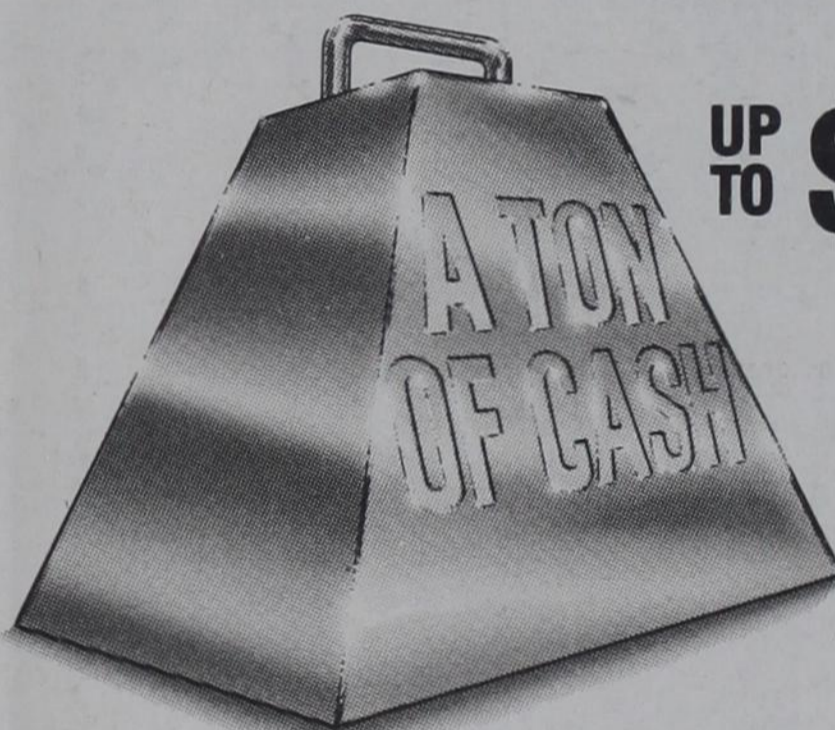

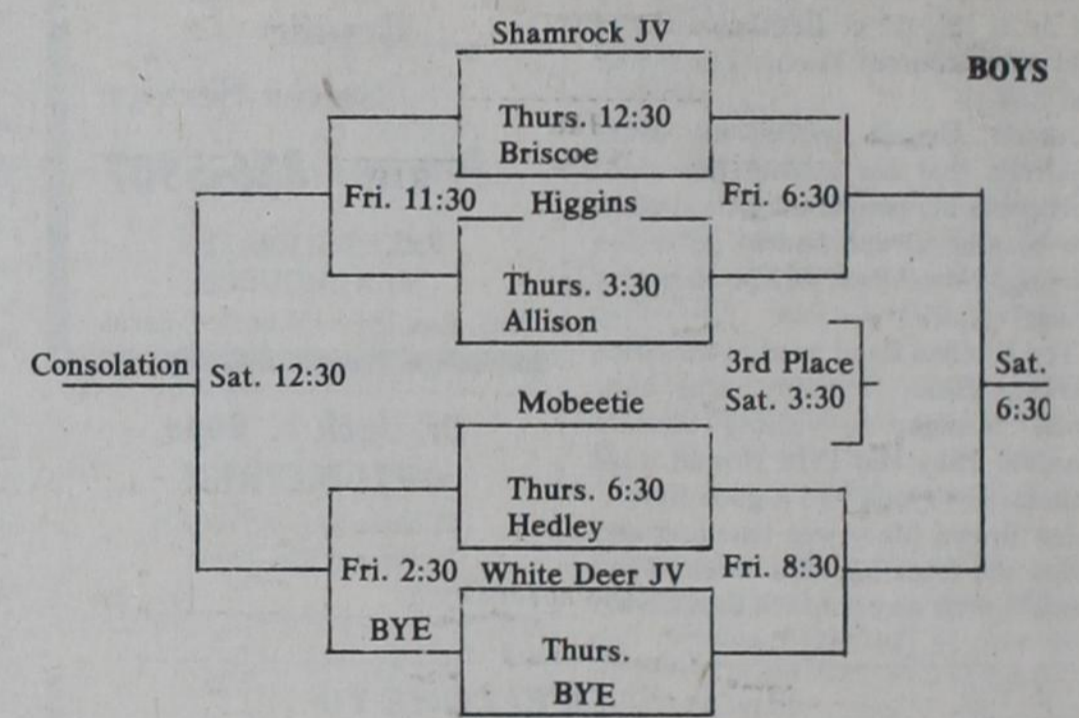
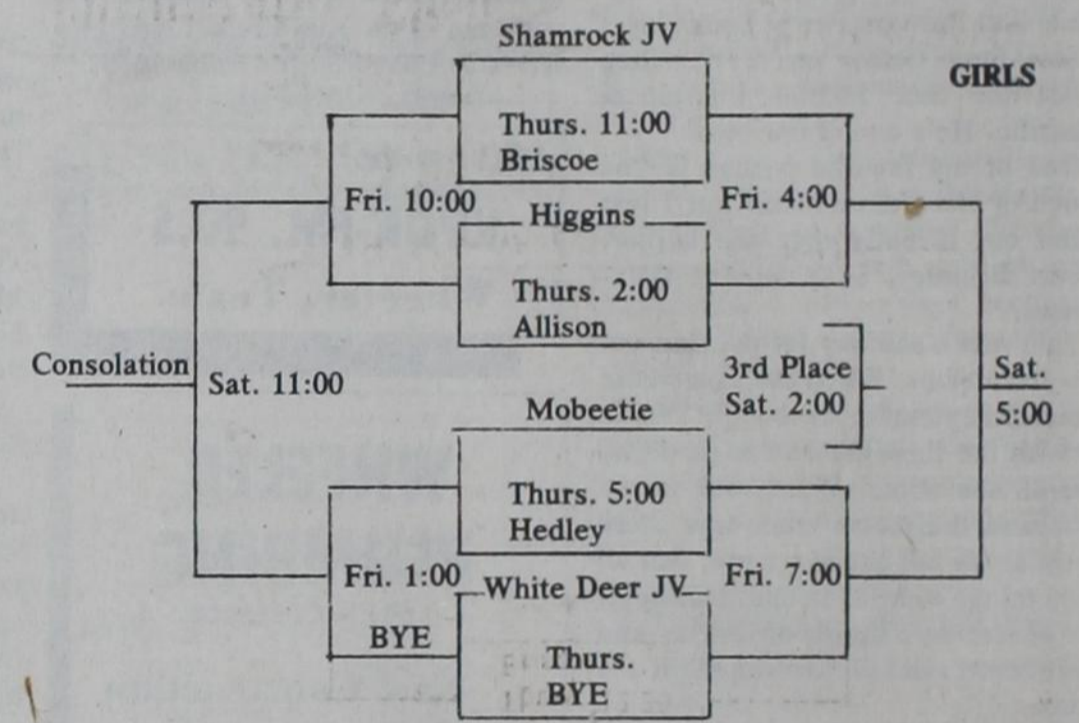
