I would have loved to have a picture of the youngsters lined up on the porch of the neighboring house. It looked like all the youngsters in Allison were waiting for the arrival of a new playmate.

We did not take the new ambulance to Allison, but the unit has not set still since Thursday. One patient commented on the smoother ride.

The first annual Charity Stampede is scheduled for Sunday, November 19 at 2:00 p.m. in the Wheeler County Show Barn. This event, sponsored by the Wheeler Livestock Boosters, is planned to give members of charitable organizations a chance to raise money for their organization and have a good time competing against others from across the county.

Events included in the Stampede will be calf tie-down, ribbon race, goat milking and team branding. These events do not require a horse or highly advanced cowboy skills.

A team will consist of two members from the organization and the spouse of a member. There must be at least one woman on each team. Team members must have been a bonafide member of the organization on September 1, 1989 and must be at least 21 years of age on November 19.

Each team will pay a \$30.00 entry fee and compete in three events. Teams may get sponsors to pay their entry fee and the sponsor will receive recognition throughout the Stampede. The entry fee will be jackpotted and paid back to event winner and the champion and reserve champion teams.

Melody Goad went to a Hair show in Amarillo yesterday.

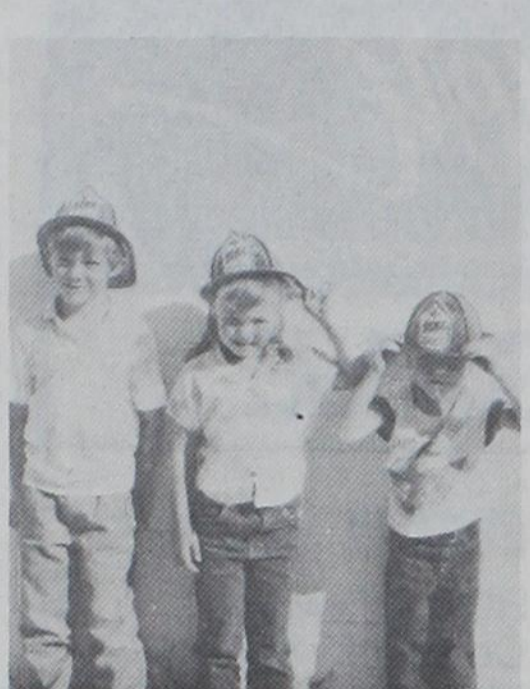

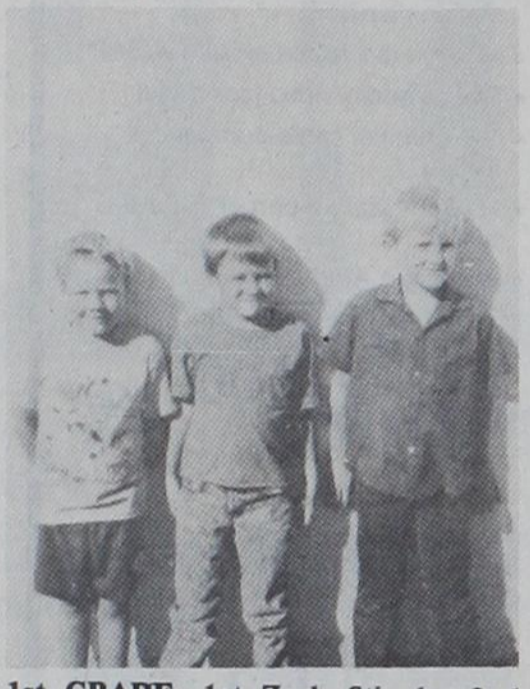

From The Minister's Desk

Did you hear about the farmer who was showing his farm to a prospective buyer? As they were touring the farm, the prospective buyer noticed an apple tree that was obviously dying. But it was loaded with apples.

When the prospective buyer called the farmer's attention to the tree, he said: "Yes, it is dying, but at least it is dying on a good crop."

Perhaps this is an insight that more people should have. One of the inevitabilities of life is that people grow older. But his inevitability is for many people an unhappy experience because as they grow older, they develop an attitude of uselessness. They say such things as "I am over the hill" or "I am only taking up space" or "I have nothing to contribute."

But this attitude does not harmonize with the teachings of the Bible. The Bible does not teach that elderly people are useless. Rather there are several Biblical texts that teach that elderly people have an important function in life. For example, Proverbs 20:29 says: "The glory of young men is their strength, and the honor of old men is their gray hair."

Notice that the last part of this text says: "The honor of old men is their gray hair." Because of the experience that they have gained in life, elderly people are qualified to teach some lessons that younger people are not qualified to teach.

When I closely examine my life, I discover that I have been taught some extremely important lessons by some elderly people. One of these people was Cliff Maxwell, who preached for many years for the Church of Christ in Potett,

His life was a contradiction of the popular concept that elderly people are pessimistic, grouchy and critical. (2) Your influence can be powerful. His advice was: "Bill, it is hard to convert enemies. You can pray for them, but it is hard to convert them." Brother Cliff was one of the most respected men in Potett and his influence will always be felt in that community.

Elderly people are not useless! And there is much that they can contribute. For this reason, my advice to elderly people is: "Be involved. Give younger people the opportunity to learn from your experience." And my advice to younger people is: "Observe elderly people. Listen to them. Learn from them. Imitate them." May all of us determine that we will die on a good crop.

Sen. Bivins Supports Trunk System

Senator Teel Bivins presented a prepared statement regarding the Texas Trunk System to members of the Texas Department of Highways and Public Transportation. The Texas Trunk System is part of a long range plan to develop a rural network of four-lane or better divided Roadways. The system will link urban areas in the state, as well as major ports and points of entry from surrounding states and Mexico.

Citing safety, efficient travel and economics as the main reason, Bivins proposed changing a number of existing two lane roads to four lane roads, as well as adding some four lane roads to the Trunk System. "I believe additional considerations should be given to the large number of tractor-trailers that travel our highways," said Bivins, whose 29 county district produces a large percentage of the states agricultural products. He went on to say, "Those (agricultural) products are transported by tractor-trailers weighing close to 80,000 pounds and carrying tons of thousands of dollars in goods. These are additional safety and economic factors that must be considered."

The prepared statement was read at a hearing by the agency at the Harvey Hotel in Amarillo. The hearing is one of the many being held throughout the State seeking public input on the proposed system. The Commission will meet in Austin in March 1990 to consider adoption of the final system.

1. Witch, or whatever, be sure the costume is flame resistant or, at least, flame retardant. If purchases, check to see if the garment or box is so labeled.
2. Home-sewn costumes can be temporarily flameproofed at home by soaking in a special solution and letting them drip dry. Wigs and beards should also be treated this way. Though almost all clothing fabrics will burn to some extent, avoid gauzy or synthetic materials that may flame rapidly.

*Solution for temporarily flameproofing materials:

Mix 3 ounces of boric acid; 7 ounces of borax; and two quarts of water. Saturate fabric or material and allow to drip dry. The material will resist fire until washed or wet by rain.

3. Hemlines should be several inches off the ground. Children can trip in long garments. Avoid costumes with flowing sleeves, voluminous skirts, long scarves or sashes. Anything that can catch on bushes, or brush near flames, is potentially dangerous.
4. Light, brightly colored costumes, easily seen at dusk or dark, are best. If costume is dark, trim with fluorescent or reflective tape that is highly visible to drivers.

5. Children should carry a white shopping bag to collect their "treats". This adds to their visibility and leaves their arms free. Make sure that "pirates" leave swords or sharp pointed objects at home.
6. Masks or hoods can slip and obscure a child's vision. Be sure mask is secure and that the holes correspond to the child's eyes. A safer alternative, one which children find fun, is to use cosmetics. Allow older children to make up their own faces to suit their costumes. For easier removal of rouge, lipstick, eye shadow, have them first apply a thin layer of cold cream.

7. Never permit children to carry pumpkins with lighted candles. Give them flashlights and check to see that batteries are fresh.

Tips for safer "Trick or Treating":
1. A parent should always accompany young children on their rounds. If a group is going out together, a responsible adult should follow to let people know that the youngsters are chaperoned.
2. The "cranks", people who dislike children, are usually well known to the community. Children should be told to stay away from these particular homes.
3. Review pedestrian safety rules before they leave home. Dusk, the time when most children are out, is particularly hazardous. Remind them: cross only at corners; wait on the curb for the green light; look both ways before crossing; walk on sidewalks, not roads.

4. Urge children, to stay in their own neighborhoods where they are known. Tell them to avoid homes that are dark or dimly lit; people who welcome Halloweeners generally leave lights on for them.
5. Never put candle-lit pumpkins outside where they can be knocked over accidentally. If neighbors have placed such jack-o-lanterns outside in the past, suggest they move them to a safer spot indoors. Never use candles in papier mache or plastic pumpkins or other such home decorations.

6. Set a time limit for trick or treating. About one hour is sufficient for ages up to 13. Older children also should be told when to be home. Let them know special refreshments await them when they get home.
7. Emphasize to the children that they are not to eat any of the goodies they collect until they get home. Examine carefully everything they receive; discard anything unpackaged or with wrappings which seem to have been undone or are torn. Wash and cut fruit into small pieces. Unwrap packaged candies to check each piece.

A tip for your community activities:

1. Encourage your PTO, community center, woman's club, church or similar groups to organize a planned Halloween Happening, with games, prizes and simple refreshments. Children of all ages will enjoy this community get-together; parents will enjoy peace of mind knowing that the children are supervised and safe.

Remind your children:

1. Malicious or harmful pranks are potentially dangerous.
2. Destruction of private or public property is punishable.

'Checkoff' Ruled Constitutional

The recent court ruling that the \$1 per head beef checkoff is constitutional was welcomed Oct. 3 by Roy Wheeler, president of the Texas Beef Industry Council (TBIC). TBIC is the organization responsible for collecting checkoff dollars in Texas.

Wheeler said the ruling assures those beef producers who obey the law that the program has the authority to collect them from those individuals who do not comply.

"We are extremely pleased with the decision of the 3rd U.S. Court of Appeals," Wheeler, an auction market owner and commercial cattleman from Pleasanton, Texas, said. "The decision supports the foundation of the beef checkoff program which requires a uniform \$1 assessment each time a bovine is sold. The only way this program can work is if everyone involved in the industry contributes."

In the Sept. 14 ruling, a three-judge panel upheld the decision of the U.S. District Court for eastern Pennsylvania. The District Court had ruled in favor of the beef checkoff program in a case brought before it by the U.S. Justice Department on behalf of the Cattleman's Beef Promotion and Research Board.

The Beef Board took legal action against Robert L. Frame, owner of Vintage Sales Stables, Inc. of Lancaster, Penn., for refusing to collect the \$1 per head assessment on cattle and

calves sold through his auction market.

Frame was required to collect the checkoff under the Beef Promotion and Research Act passed by Congress in 1985. Frame contended that the law was unconstitutional because it contradicted the limits set on Congress by the Constitution and violated his First Amendment rights to free speech and association and to due process guaranteed in the Fifth Amendment.

Frame also said the law did not provide the government the power to collect overdue assessments and late charges.

After the District Court ruled against Frame in the case, he appealed to the U.S. Court of Appeals.

Wheeler said the program provides stiff penalties for persons who refuse their responsibility. Failure to check off can result in a \$5,000 fine per violation, and there is a \$10,000 fine for willful misrepresentation of information.

"In Texas, we are proud that compliance with the program has been phenomenal," Wheeler said. "The true basis of the program, is the cooperation of the producer and his willingness to check off and help further the profit potential of his product. However, we must recognize that some persons will try to circumvent the law. This ruling allows the industry full authority to collect checkoff dollars from all beef producers. There are no exceptions."

Red Cross Announces Quotaed Campaign of \$42 Million To Recover From Hurricane Hugo

On the heels of Hurricane Hugo, one of the most devastating hurricanes on record, the American Red Cross has announced the start of a quotaed campaign to meet its expenditures for relief to victims. Only three months into its fiscal year, the Red Cross has estimated that its entire

operation for Hurricane Hugo will cost about \$42 million, putting its relief fund into a deficit. In addition to this, another \$10 million is needed to pay for other disasters in the remaining nine months of the fiscal year.

"I can state flat-out that by meeting these current commitments our entire disaster relief funds and reserves will be exhausted. In fact, we'll be in a substantial deficit position," said George F. Moody, chairman of the American Red Cross. "And as the single non-government relief agency chartered by Congress to provide disaster assistance to all Americans, the Red Cross relies totally on the generosity of the American people at times like this. We are confident that Americans will once again come to the aid of those suffering from Hurricane Hugo's destruction," Moody continued.

The American Red Cross has set goals for each county in the nation. The goal for Wheeler County is \$50.00. Your chapter is confident that you will attain and exceed this amount.

SWCD Presents Annual Report

The Wheeler County Soil and Water Conservation District was formed on April 6, 1948, with the protection and enhancement of the available renewable natural resources as its primary purpose. Its boundaries coincide with the boundaries of Wheeler County. It is governed by a board of five elected directors who are resident land owners in the District and are actively engaged in farming or ranching.

The current Board of Directors consists of Clarence Zybach (who has been on the board since its creation), Paul Macina, Jim Batton, Darville Atherton, and John Vermillion.

The District entered into a memo of understanding with the Soil Conservation Service in 1948 to provide personnel specially trained in the field of erosion control. The current SCS consists of Fred Allison, Jr., District Conservationist; Calvin Devereaux, Soil Conservationist; Kenneth Reed and Myron Merz, Ranger Conservationists. Rhonda Ferguson is employed as the District Clerk.

The SWCD works closely with the SCS to promote all phases of conservation. Your SWCD is proud to present this report of some of the work and accomplishments during the 1989 fiscal year.

Wheeler County SWCD has been very busy during 1989. Most of the business was the result of the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) and development of Food Security Act (FSA) plans. Under the CRP program, highly erodible cropland is converted to grassland with government assistance. Each CRP contract is for a ten year period. The land user receives annual rental payments for not farming land in the CRP program. Nine sign-up periods have been held to date. Wheeler County has 339 active contracts on approximately 55,000 acres. Wheeler County has reached its 25% limitation.

The Food Security Act of 1985 mandated that every farmer who produces crops on highly erodible soils must have a Conservation Plan by January 1, 1990. These plans must be fully reported by January 1, 1995. Wheeler County has approximately 550 farms that must be under a Conservation Plan by January 1, 1990. There have been 529 plans prepared thus far. If you desire federal funds in 1990, do not wait until December 1989 to get an approved conservation plan.

In addition to these new programs, The Great Plains Program, Resource Conservation and Development Program and the regular District Program must be carried out. We currently have one RC&D contract and two active Great Plains Contracts. Fencing, Livestock, Water Development, and Grass Seeding are being done under GPCP.

Some of the accomplishments of the SWCD/SCS for 1989 include: New District Cooperators - 170 for 60,242 Acres; Conservation plans prepared - 357 on 67,688 Acres; Individuals and Units of Government assisted - 811; Individuals applying a practice - 458; Grass Seeding - 6,500 Acres; Deferred Grazing - 50,000 Acres; Cropland Benefited from applying a practice - 11,428 Acres; Ponds - 1 No.; Diversions - 5,000 feet; Fences - 10,000 feet; Conservation Presentations and Tours - 4 No. These are only a few of the conservation accomplishments done in 1989.

Fires cost Texas 322 lives and almost \$5 hundred million in property damage in 1987 and although no firm numbers are available, everyone associated with the fire service agrees that both numbers could be substantially reduced if a combination of more training and better equipment was available to the 53,000 plus firefighters across the state.

Breast Cancer Screening At Parkview

The Breast Cancer Screening Project of the Don and Sybil Harrington Cancer Center and the High Plains Baptist Hospital of Amarillo will begin a community outreach clinic in Wheeler beginning Wednesday, November 29, 1989 from 9:00 a.m. until 3:00 p.m. at the Parkview Hospital.

The project is designed to educate our community about the importance of early detection of breast cancer.

The clinic will provide low cost screening which includes a breast exam, individualized breast self examination instruction and mammograms. The clinic will be staffed by professionals, including a Registered Nurse specially trained in breast cancer detection.

Currently, the most effective method known to win the battle against breast cancer is early detection. Early detection is best done by following the guidelines recommended by the National Cancer Institute for breast cancer screening for women who have no signs or symptoms of breast cancer:

1. Learn and perform breast self examination every month.
2. Have a physical examination including the breasts every year.
3. Have a mammogram according to the recommendations by age.

Age:
40 to 50—a mammogram every 1 to 2 years
Over 50—a mammogram every year.

ber 7 to take a giant step in solving the problem when they vote on Proposition No. 17. Approval of the Constitutional amendment will create a board which will oversee a special emergency fund created by the 71st Legislature to train and equip fire departments. The bill approved by the House of Representatives, Senate and signed by the Governor was the first positive step in several decades addressing a growing problem.

The legislation was passed and funding approved without any increase in taxes or fees. Now, it's up to the voters of Texas to decide the importance of the issue.

Too often as we go to the polls to vote on referendums or constitutional amendments, if we don't completely understand, we vote against the particular item. Often times that is a correct decision since the proposal may serve only a special interest group. In the case of Proposition No. 17 every man, woman and child in Texas will be served by a group of over 53,000 men and women, both paid and volunteer, from fire departments large and small whose only special interest is saving lives and property, often times at the risk of their own lives.

Certainly we owe them our vote of support in their attempts to protect us.

PROPOSITION NO. 17
Special legislation passed by the 71st Legislature will give Texas voters the opportunity to have direct input into life safety and property protection for years to come. The special law creates an emergency fund for the fire service of Texas and does so without an increase in taxes or fees. Texas voters will decide the issue on November 7, in the general election.

The proposed constitutional amendment, Proposition No. 17 on the ballot authorizes the creation of the fund which can be used by all fire departments in the state, paid or volunteer, large or small. The fund may be used only for training and equipment and will be distributed on a priority basis with the most urgent needs being served first.

The fund will be administered by a board under the direction of the State Fire Marshall's Office. The seven member board, appointed by the governor will include fire members representing the fire service and two members representing the general public and will serve without pay.

If approved by a majority of Texas voters, the fund will address the serious problem of funding for the almost 2,000 fire departments in the state. Fire departments across the state will be eligible to apply for low interest loans or grants in an effort to address unnecessary deaths and injuries as well as the needless loss of property due to fire which could be prevented with better training and equipment. During 1987, 322 Texans died in fires which caused \$486,000.00 in damages.

State Representative Rick Perry, (R) Haskell, author of the bill, said, "Voting against this proposition is the same as putting a \$99 price tag on a human life."
